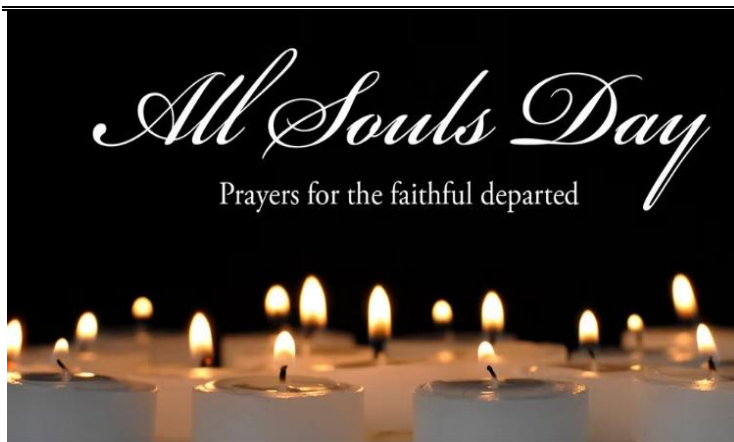

“Life and Death with Christ”

Our Western society and culture do not deal with death very well. Most resist the aging process. In America we spend over 20 billion dollars every year for cosmetic surgery. We also want to live life to the fullest. And we lament that life can be so painful and difficult in its many ways. Consequently, many try to extract every possible pleasure and enjoyment that they can from life. It doesn't even matter to them if it is immoral and wrong. And when pain or suffering finally overtake them – they question — some despair – and others even deny God!

However, true believers have a much different way of dealing with life. And the scriptures for today have much to teach us in this regard. The Book of Wisdom is the last book of the Old Testament. It was written just 50 years before the Birth of Jesus. It reveals that there is life after death. Furthermore, all those who did their best to live by God's ways – are in the hand of God. Nevertheless, some thought them foolish for trying to live a Godly life. Others believed that they no longer existed in any form.

And some could not understand why they never despaired when faced with great suffering – or even death itself. However, the passage also reveals that suffering is part of God's plan for us. We don't get into God's eternal kingdom without proving ourselves. All the sin in our lives must be purged like the dross from pure gold! But the final outcome is to abide eternally with God in divine glory and love!

In his Letter to the Romans, St. Paul gives us some surprising theology about Baptism. People bring their infants and young children to be baptized for different reasons. Some do so,

because of custom or grandparent pressure. Some, because Baptism washes away the Original Sin we inherited from our first parents. Some, to become part of the believing Christian Community – Because they know that others in that Community will serve as mentors and guides all life long.

However, what people forget is that everyone is also baptized into the death of Christ. We are baptized into his suffering and death so that we can rise with him. This will come only after our own suffering and death. Furthermore, all the suffering we experience has a purpose. It can enable us to break with all our personal sinful and unGodly behavior. For these things hinder us on our journey – And they imperil our salvation as well!

In the Gospel of John, Jesus gives us a wonderful hope. Jesus will reject no one that the Father sends to him – Because the Father created every human being for eternal life and glory. Consequently, Baptism is our way back to union with God through Jesus Christ. Baptism erases Original Sin – but it does not wipe out its effects which are suffering and death. That is the reason that life is so painful and hard at times. However, God also gives grace. God likewise calls us to belief, to hope, and to love.

Yet, how we respond to that grace and call is completely up to us. The only salvific response is to walk with Jesus. Because, as his brothers and sisters, Jesus will bring us with him into the Kingdom of the Father. This is the reason Jesus suffered and died – This is the reason Jesus rose from his human death – And it is the reason that our death is no death at all – in the eternal plan of God!

So let us pray for the courage to face the hardships of life — for the patience to endure everything that we suffer — for true sorrow for our many sins — and for all those who have gone before us with faith in their hearts! Amen.
