The Dedication of the Lateran Basilica

“Our God-Given Integrity”

It's always distressing when something is used in a way for which it was never intended. It's likewise sad when something is ornamented in ways that detract from its true beauty. One does not pound steel nails with a brass hammer. Nor does one add something modern to a valuable antique. Everything has an inherent – and basic – integrity. And to compromise that integrity is to devalue – or even desecrate – it in some measure.

Today, St. John's Gospel speaks to the integrity of our places of worship. And St. Paul extends this to the human person with regard to our body and soul! The Temple of Jerusalem was an edifice that God commanded to be built in honor of Himself. The Lord God wanted a gathering place wherein any and all could offer Him worship. As a result, the members of the Chosen People would journey to that temple, periodically, to worship and offer personal sacrifices. There, they could offer the appropriate sacrifice that the Law of Moses required. There was even a special court where the Gentiles – or non Jews – could pray and worship the true God.

However, the stockmen and bird breeders had taken over that space. Allied with them were the money-changers. These made sure that everything was paid for in shekels. Seeing all this, Jesus was justifiably upset. His Father's house had been turned into a marketplace. Not only had the court become a stockyard – but there wasn't even any room for the Gentiles to pray. Consequently, with controlled anger, Jesus restored something of the temple's integrity. Of course, the religious leadership was furious. They were taking a percentage of what was sold or exchanged. In their outrage, when they asked

Jesus for a sign – his answer was enigmatic: “Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up!” However, Jesus was speaking of the integrity of his human self as the Son of God in material flesh and blood! St. John goes on to tell us that no one really understood these words of Jesus – until he had risen from the dead. Then, everything fit into place.

In his First Letter to the Corinthians, St. Paul reveals something wonderful. In the plan of God, each of us is God's building – because we are built on the foundation of Jesus Christ himself. We compromise that integrity if we are allied with anything else. However, we are much more than a building. We are each God's temple – because the Holy Spirit dwells within us. Furthermore, to desecrate that temple in any way is to make it less of a place wherein God wants to dwell.

Consequently, we should ask ourselves many questions. How do we take care of our physical body? How do we take care of our spiritual soul? Are we overweight? Do we eat or drink too much? Do we eat the right foods? Do we exercise enough? Are we addicted to anything? How attached are we to our cell phones, tablets, or computers? How much time do we spend on them? What about tattoos? Are we trying to ornament – or paint over – the beauty that God gave us? What about prayer? What about quiet time with God? What about the silence in which we can hear the voice of God in our mind, heart, and soul? These are just some of the questions we should ask ourselves as brothers and sisters of Jesus, the Son of God!

600 years before Christ, the Chosen People were exiles in Babylon. Ezekiel tried to give them hope. He told of a new temple, someday in Jerusalem. But what he was really describing was eternal life. It is, in human concepts, what God has prepared for all those who truly love Him and serve Him. However, we know, now, that eternal life with God is infinitely more. St. Paul tells us that “Eye has not seen, ear has not heard, nor has it even entered the human heart what God has prepared for those who love Him”!

So, let us be encouraged, Brothers and Sisters – Let us open our minds and hearts to God – Let us take time to be silent and alone with God each day – Let us respect the integrity of the body that God has chosen for us – Let us never forget that we are temples in Jesus Christ who is the living Temple of God! Amen.
