

"Are We in Denial?"

So much of our world is in denial. Fundamentally, it is a denial about what is true, what is good, and what is beautiful. World leaders are in denial about the rights of other nations – Politicians are in denial over what their opposition espouses – Family members can be in serious denial about issues that divide them – And we, personally, can be in denial about ourselves.

Admitting the truth about our thinking or behavior can be difficult. It means being able to look honestly at ourselves. It means that we might have to change something that is ingrained in our lives. Yet, because of selfishness or pride, many refuse to become different. Consequently, most will deny that they have a problem – or that they are wrong!

Jeremiah was a prophet sent by God to speak the truth to the Chosen People. They had been worshiping false gods – They had been indulging in a pagan lifestyle.

Jeremiah warned about a siege and destruction. It was to come from Babylon. However, the princes of the ruling class refused to listen. They refused to make the necessary changes in their lives and hearts. They refused to repent, themselves – or to urge the people to repent. They even pressured the king to do away with Jeremiah!

The king was politically weak – Yet, he knew that Jeremiah had been unjustly accused. So, he was persuaded to, secretly, allow Jeremiah to be rescued. Eventually, the majority of the Chosen People perished – or were led captive to Babylon. Fortunately, some of the faithful few escaped to Egypt and brought Jeremiah with them.

In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus reveals something that most people choose to deny. Jesus did not come to bring a material peace to the world. Instead, he came to spread division. He came to light a fire of controversy in the world.

Jesus came to reveal God's message to the fallen human race. That message was about truth, and goodness, and beauty. Moreover, the words of the Gospel – and the life of Jesus – would be a contradiction – They would completely contradict what is false, evil, grotesque in every age!

Nevertheless, many today – maybe even the majority – continue to resist that contradiction – Because they are under the influence or the power of satan!

This is the reason our families are often divided – This is the reason our political world is in such disarray – This is the reason nations make war against other nations. And, tragically, all this divisiveness will never end until God's Truth, Goodness, and Beauty are embraced by everyone!

So, how do we survive in the meantime? Brothers and Sisters, we must do more than just endure and survive. We must grow spiritually in our heart and soul. We must honestly look within ourselves – at the way we live our own lives. We must ask penetrating questions about ourselves – And we must pray for the enlightenment of God's grace.

We must candidly listen to others: – when they criticize us – when they disagree with us – when they tell us any truth that hurts our ego or our feelings!

And there is even more. We must pray for the world – We must do all we can to make the world a better place – We must cultivate the peace of mind, heart, and soul that only God can give – And like Jesus, we must accept any baptism of pain that we suffer. This will undoubtedly occur when we follow what God asks of us.

So, let us pray that we can discover the truth of whatever we deny about our hearts and lives. And may we always choose God's Truth, Goodness, and Beauty! Amen.
