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"Never Complacent"

One of the situations that most have to face is pursue righteousness in all things – We are to be dealing with those who beg. It would seem that devoted in our relationship with God - We must beggars are everywhere - at least in our cities. Should we help them – or pass them by? Are they addicts? Are they veterans suffering from PTSD? Are they victims of real misfortune? Are they "conartists" - whether men or women - some with children?

Because of these questions, most people disregard those who beg. They don't want to enable addiction - They can't be sure about the truth of a beggar's plight - They don't want to spend time asking important questions.

The passages from the Book of Amos and St. Luke's Gospel deal with this very issue. They also warn us to be on guard against an attitude of complacency in ourselves. Jesus told the story about the rich man and Lazarus. The rich man had everything he wanted or needed. But he was complacent and unfeeling. Everyday he passed by Lazarus who had nothing but constant hunger. Both died. But Lazarus went to an eternal reward - Whereas, the rich man became subject to eternal damnation!

Jesus used this parable to warn the Pharisees about their own complacency - especially toward the poor. But they also resisted Jesus and his words - as well as his teaching about salvation. Jesus had a new teaching and a new revelation. Jesus was the Son of God - Jesus was the way to God – Jesus brought the truths of God – And Jesus brought eternal life for those who could embrace him and his Gospel way!

Sadly, most of the Pharisees rejected Jesus and this new truth and revelation. It was more comfortable for them to remain on their island of complacency. Change is hard - Giving up old habits is hard - Especially when we are very comfortable with the way our life happens to be!

The Book of Amos warns about the complacency of deep-seated sin. The passage today condemns both the kingdoms of Israel and Judah. The wealthy religious leadership had been complacent. They had no concern for the poor in their midst. In those times, the poor were truly suffering through no fault of their own. Yet, even worse, was that all the rich had neglected or forgotten the true worship of the Lord God. For all this, they would severely punished. Consequently, kingdoms were destroyed - Israel, by Assyria - and Judah, by Babylon!

In his First Letter to Timothy, St. Paul teaches us how to rise above any complacency. We must truly believe with our faith - We must bring love everywhere we go – We must be patient with others - and with the hardships of life. We must be gentle - especially when others can be so harsh.

Furthermore, this is to be a lifelong task. We must rise above any moral complacency and keep every the Commandments. The aspect of Commandments that God gave to Moses are absolute. But in a way, they are the basic minimum. The Two Great Commandments of Jesus incorporate everything. They are openended and all-inclusive. We must love God with every fiber of our being - And we are to love our neighbor in the same way that we love ourselves! This means that we are to treat everyone - no matter who they are - just like we want to be treated ourselves!

Thus, would we pass by ourselves - if we were hungry, or thirsty - poor or homeless? Hopefully, not! Moreover, even if we must refuse someone we must still be patient, gentle, and kind!

Brothers and Sisters, most of us have much of what we really need. Some have even much more. Others have less – even much less. But complacent - we can never be! Because life is tenuous. It can change in a split second. So, let us pray, that God will help us discern who truly needs our help - May God continue to assist us on our lifelong journey here - And may God be praised and glorified for all He is and will, forever, be! Amen.
