

Dear Parishioners.

This Sunday, we reflect on two powerful stories of divine healing: the ten lepers in Luke's Gospel and Naaman the Syrian in the Old Testament.

At first glance, the stories seem to be relatively the same. They are both about leprosy being cured miraculously. But on a deeper level, the New Testament story teaches us something new. Let's explore what changed from the Old Testament to the New Testament, and why it's important for us today. Naaman was a great military commander. His unfortunate leprosy left him ill, humiliated, and desperate for a cure. He is proud, however, and so when he seeks healing from the prophet Elisha, he expects a grand, dramatic miracle, befitting his status. Instead, Elisha tells him to do something simple: go wash. He simply needs to jump into the Jordan River. Naaman is indignant and almost refuses, until his attendants' reason with him. His pride and his sense of entitlement nearly kept him from the healing he sought. His story hints at something more than

leprosy afflicting him: his pride.
In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus encounters ten lepers who cry out to him, "Jesus, Master, have pity on us!" Jesus instructs them to show themselves to the priests. This, as in the story of Naaman, is a simple task. As they go, they are healed. They are no longer outcasts! They can return to their families, their communities, and their lives. And moreover, they can return to worship God in the Temple. However, only one, a Samaritan, returns to give thanks, falling at Jesus' feet in gratitude. The other nine were too caught up in themselves and their lives to look to heaven and render thanks.

In this Samaritan who returns, we see how something deeper is at work here in the New Testament. As we delve deeper, they point us toward a far greater affliction: sin. The nine who did not return received the gift of bodily restoration, but the one who returned received something greater: eternal salvation. He had faith, a heart transformed by gratitude, and a soul reconnected to God through praise. Sin, unlike leprosy, wounds not just the body but the soul, tearing us away from God, from others, and even from our true selves. Sin, spiritual leprosy, is far worse than any physical ailment. To be a leper was to be cut off from life. Yet, as terrible as leprosy was, it pales in comparison to sin. Why? Because sin is a wound of the soul, a rupture in our relationship with God, who is the source of all life, love, and goodness. When we sin, we hurt God. Sin is not merely a mistake, a misstep, or a moment of weakness. Sin, at its deepest level, is an existential turning away from God. It is a choice to reject the love that sustains us, to break the communion for which we were created. When we sin, we hurt ourselves. It distorts our identity as children of God, clouding the divine image within us. It builds walls around our hearts, making it harder to love, to trust, to hope. And when we sin, we hurt others. Sin ripples outward, wounding relationships,

fracturing families, and sowing division in our communities.
Why is sin worse than leprosy? Because leprosy, though terrible, is temporary. It afflicts the body, which will one day pass away. Sin, however, afflicts the soul, which is eternal. If we could see the state of our souls as clearly as the lepers saw their diseased skin, we would cry out to Jesus with even greater urgency: "Master, have pity on us!"

Saint Teresa of Jesus (1515-1582) October 15

Let nothing disturb you; let nothing frighten you. Gifted with a passionate spirit, young Teresa dreamed of converting Muslims and becoming a martyr. All things are passing; God never changes.

But her mother's death when Teresa was fourteen inspired lifelong devotion to Our Lady, and Teresa entered the Carmelites, Mary's order, despite her father's objections and her own fragile health. Patience gains everything. Initially, she enjoyed her lax convent's sociability and "busyness," but mystical prayer and John of the Cross' collaboration inspired her to reform the Carmelites. Whoever has God, lacks nothing. When her ideals encountered resistance and brought suffering, she maintained her peace —and humor. Discovered devouring leftovers, she told her mildly scandalized nuns, "When I fast, I fast! When I eat, I eat!" To nuns demanding less work and more prayer in the convent schedule, she retorted: "What we really need around here are fewer starry eyes and more strong arms!" God alone is enough! The italicized sentences here are her "Breviary Bookmark," the simple, profound prayer of Teresa, the first woman Doctor of the Church.

Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time Miracles of Faith

Besides being cured, what do Nathan (first reading) and the leper who thanked Jesus (Gospel) have in common? Both of them began to believe. Nathan proclaims Israel's God to be the only God. The only leper who returned to thank Jesus was "glorifying God in a loud voice" (Luke 17:15). It makes me wonder, what miracles do we see that help us grow in faith?

For an answer, we can look at a second thing they had in common: they both asked for help. Sometimes we get caught up in self-sufficiency mode, thinking we have to handle all our problems by ourselves. We may miss out on ways to solve those problems by not asking for help. If you think asking for help is a sign of weakness, you may be missing a chance for God to act through one of your friends and give you support. And, of course, you can ask God for help in prayer.

We may have friends who help us in times of need or inspire us with their faith, but we have to decide to make a leap of faith ourselves. The third thing that Nathan and the leper did in common was express their faith. You can spend your whole life thinking that you are a Christian, but if you never express that faith, it will be just a theory. St. Paul in the second reading, for example, was suffering in prison, but he didn't mind because his suffering demonstrated the importance of Jesus' message to him. So he wrote from prison in the hope that other Christians would be encouraged in their faith. Perhaps you know of someone who inspired you with their faithfulness and dedication. Having a friend who helps us grow in faith can be a very nice miracle indeed.
