MUSIC MINISTRY

Choir: The Choir features both professional and volunteer singers and welcomes all adults and teens who have strong musical skills. The choir provides musical leadership at the 10:30 a.m. service. Rehearsals are 9-10:15 a.m. in the choir room on Sundays. Contact Dr. Ben Brafford at ben.brafford3@gmail.com.

Evensong: Join the choir and clergy of Holy Trinity for this gem of our Anglican heritage: Evensong. Evensong is sung evening prayer. Magnificent settings have been composed for these prayers over the centuries and lift our hearts in praise and thanksgiving in ways that only music can do. Sept. 14, Jan. 6, and May 3, 5:30 p.m. in the Nave.

Intermezzo: Programs blending readings and music performed by various artists from the area are Wednesdays in October and Wednesdays during Lent, 12:15-12:45 p.m. in the Nave. The programs are free, but donations in October go to the choir tour project, and the donations during Lent go to the Interfaith Housing Initiative for the construction of six affordable townhouses in Greensboro. The townhouses burned to the ground and are being “resurrected” by local faith communities. Traditionally, an intermezzo serves as a connection between two parts of a musical or theatrical work. In this case, our Intermezzo serves as a respite within your day. The Lenten programs are coordinated by The Rev. Mark Lile-King and Dr. Ben Brafford.

Black History Month Concert: The Choir of Holy Trinity will present a program of readings and music celebrating Black History Month. Following the concert, the Beloved Community Commission will host a reception in Haywood Duke. Youth will attend the concert and then share a meal in the Robert Payne Youth House. Feb. 22, 4 p.m. in the Nave.

Labyrinth Walks

A beautiful eleven-circuit paver labyrinth is centered in Holy Trinity’s columbarium garden facing Greene Street. Its design replicates the labyrinth found in the 12th-century Notre Dame de Chartres. In modern times the labyrinth is used as a contemplative practice: walking this unique path is a form of walking meditation, often referred to as a body prayer.



This year, our labyrinth will undergo a transformative renovation in September! Please watch the Epistle for announcements regarding a celebratory dedication! We will also offer workshops during the coming fall and spring to re-introduce this prayer practice to the parish. 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Adult Confirmation Classes: Confirmation classes are for those seeking Confirmation into the Episcopal Church. "Confirmation is the sacramental rite in which the baptized Christian expresses a mature commitment to Christ and receives strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands by a bishop" (Book of Common Prayer, p. 860). Adult Confirmation classes are also for those being Received into the Episcopal Church from a sister confirming tradition and for those who want to recommit themselves to Christian life and faith by Reaffirming their baptismal vows. The class is taught by Father David Umphlett. Wednesdays, Feb. 25-March 25, 5:30 p.m. Dinner, Haywood Duke; 6-7:15 p.m., Class, Roe Library.

Confirmation Sunday: The Bishop's visit on Confirmation Sunday is an opportunity to receive the sacrament of Confirmation, to be Received into the Episcopal Church, or to Reaffirm one's Baptismal Vows. TBA.

Holy Trinity Day School is a half-day preschool serving children ages 3 months through 5 years. Founded in 1954, Holy Trinity Day School provides quality early education in an enriching, nurturing, spiritually-grounded learning environment that educates the whole child; supports the individual gifts of each child; builds on the child's natural inquisitiveness; fosters a sense of caring and compassion; and teaches children respect for themselves and others. The program provides individualized, play-based learning, where children can develop to their optimum.



As a ministry of Holy Trinity, one of the school's chief objectives is to help each child understand and appreciate God's love. Godly Play and weekly Chapel service are important parts of Holy Trinity Day School's curriculum. Children not only learn the Gospel message and the primary Bible stories, but they also learn that we are all God's Beloved, that they don't have to earn God's love, and that God is always with them. HTDS equips young students for success at school and beyond.

Children's and Family Ministries seek to nurture your child's relationship with God through opportunities that introduce the life, love, and example of Jesus. Our aim is to partner with families in the parent/child journey of discovery towards a life of discipleship and faith. Children bring gifts of joy and wonder to the church. As they begin their walk with God, we endeavor to nurture this vital relationship with encouragement and guidance. We also understand the significance of fostering meaningful friendships among children and creating faith-filled bonds between parents, leaders, and children. Children's values and beliefs are first formed within the context of their family and part of our mission is to support parents as they develop and strengthen their own relationship with God.

On Sunday, Sept. 7, Children's Chapel for 4-year Pre-K – third grade resumes during the 10:30 a.m. service and nursery care for birth – 4 years will be from 8:15 – 11:45 a.m. Sunday School for Children, Youth, and Adults resumes Sunday, Sept. 14 from 9:30 a.m. - 10:15 a.m.

SUNDAY MORNING FAMILY WORSHIP OPTIONS

Children are always welcome at all worship services at Holy Trinity. The 10:30 a.m. service is particularly family friendly. Everyone is encouraged to dress as casually as they wish, and children making a joyful noise are welcomed! Green worship bags in the Narthex contain a variety of ways to occupy small hands. Please return the bags and their reusable contents to the baskets after the service.

Nursery Care: The nursery for birth through four-year Pre-K is located on the first floor of the Parish House in Room 105 and is open on Sundays, 8:15 – 11:45 a.m. (during both the 8:30 and 10:30 services and Sunday school hour). Our paid childcare providers are supplemented as needed by volunteers. No pre-registration is required. Enter from the back parking lot by the door under the breezeway, and the nursery is the first door to your left.

Children's Chapel: Offered Sundays at the 10:30 a.m. service during the program year for children four-year Pre-K through 3rd grade. Children hear a story, sing songs, and pray. They take turns serving as acolytes, crucifer, and ushers. Please have your children bring money for the offering, which is added to the offering in the church. The Eucharist is a time of discovery and full participation for children. When the alms basins are brought forward at the Offering, the young people from Children's Chapel and their leaders will follow the ushers to the altar. There, the young people may stand around the altar for the whole eucharistic prayer. Their presence helps remind everyone that the celebration of the Eucharist is our communal feast of eternity. Children will return to their families to receive communion.

Host Families at 10:30 a.m. Worship Service: On the first and third Sundays, there will be a host family who serves as Oblation Bearers (members of the host family bring the bread and wine for Communion to the altar). Members of the host family can also serve as Lectors (reading the scripture lessons for the day) and Intercessor (reading the Prayers of the People), but reading is always optional. If members of the host family are acolytes, they can also serve in this capacity.

Children's Sunday School Classes: We offer a combination of intergenerational, milestone, and grade level Sunday school classes. We also have a designated monthly Sabbath Sunday. Unless otherwise announced, kindergarten – fifth grade meet 9:30 – 10:15 a.m. on the second floor of the Parish House. Both classes gather to sing with Mr. Riley in Room 211 before moving to their individual classes: Kindergarten - second grade in Room 209, and third - fifth grade in Room 211. Each of the classes is led by two adult volunteers and use a combination of “Feasting on the Word,” a lectionary-based curriculum, and Godly Play, a Montessori-based curriculum.

Sabbath Sundays, Time to Rest, Reflect, Connect: The following Sundays have been designated as Sabbath for children, youth, and adults: Oct. 12, Nov. 16, Jan. 11, Feb. 22, March 29, and April 5. Between services on Sabbath Sundays, we will gather informally with our church family from both the 8:30 and 10:30 a.m. services to enjoy a coffee hour and doughnuts. An intergenerational gathering with no agenda or program, simply a time to hang out and talk with old friends and meet new friends.

Communion Milestone for K, First, and Second Graders: On Sunday, Oct. 19 and Oct. 26 at 9:30 a.m., the children will have special lessons on the Eucharist during their regular Sunday school class. On Sunday, Nov. 2 at 9:30 a.m. in All Saints Chapel, Fr. David Umphlett and Marjorie Donnelly will lead a family-friendly conversation with the children and their parents about the Eucharist and its symbols and then visit the sacristies. The preparation culminates on Sunday, Nov. 9 at the 10:30 a.m. service with a Celebration of Communion for the children and their families. The children will have Milestone Buddies with 13-year-olds in the Rite 13 Milestone. Our party on Sunday, Nov. 9 will be in the Robert Payne Youth House with our milestone buddies!

Every other year, we give our third, fourth, and fifth graders a Bible of their own. Presenting them with a Bible during worship reiterates that scripture is the touchstone of our faith and invites them to connect their lives with the great story of God's love. To prepare children for this milestone in their lives, we have planned the following special events: Sunday, Jan. 25 and Feb. 1 at 9:30 a.m., children will attend Bible Sunday school classes in their regular classroom. Sunday, Feb. 8 at 9:30 a.m., children and their parents will meet in All Saints Chapel with Fr. David Umphlett and Marjorie Donnelly. Sunday, Feb. 15 at 10:30 a.m. children will receive Bibles during the worship service. We will have Milestone Buddies with ninth graders in the Confirmation Milestone. He, She, We, and God: A sexuality program for fifth and sixth graders and their parents. This is a unique opportunity to place the gift of sexuality within our Christian faith. The program is only offered every other year. It is facilitated by Jenny Beaumont, Missioner for Adult and Life-long Formation in our diocese and Faith and Human Sexuality educator. Price Scholarship 2026: Seniors in high school who are confirmed members of Holy Trinity are eligible to apply for the Price scholarship, which provides \$16,000 if they attend an accredited four-year college or university as a full-time student for four years. Candidates must demonstrate commitment to achieving success during high school and in future collegiate studies and have financial need. Applications will be available online Tuesday, Jan. 13 with a due date of Thursday, March 19.

Easter Day Nursery, Flowering of the Cross, and Children's Chapel: We will have nursery care during the 9 a.m. service. A large wooden cross is placed outside the church doors, and parishioners are encouraged to bring flowers from home to flower the cross at all services. After flowering the cross at 9 a.m., bring children ages kindergarten through third grade to Broome Hall for a special Easter Children's Chapel. Children will rejoin their families at the Peace.

Easter Coffee & Lemonade and Egg Hunt: After the 9 a.m. Easter Day service, parishioners and guests are invited to the Patterson Terrace for fellowship and the start of the Easter Egg hunts.

Vacation Bible School registration opens in February. Open to rising four-year-old Pre-K through rising fifth graders. There is a special service-learning track for fourth and fifth graders with field trips off campus to volunteer at places such as Backpack Beginnings. WORSHIP MILESTONES

All worship milestones have suggested ages for participation, but you can reach out to Jenny Campbell if you want your young person to participate.

Rite 13 is a class to explore and celebrate the passage from child to teenager for anyone turning 13 or who just turned 13 (seventh grade suggested). There are two classes with just the youth, one youth/parent combined class, and then presentation in worship service. This year, Rite 13ers will have a "Milestone buddy" in grades K-2. Communion milestone children and Rite 13ers will meet and be paired up on Oct. 5 in the Intergenerational Sunday School class. Milestone buddies will walk in the All Saint's Day Parade at the 10:30 a.m. service together on Nov. 2. On Sunday, Nov. 9, Rite 13ers will throw a party for their buddies in the Youth House and support them in worship at the 10:30 a.m. service. The Rite 13 liturgy will be during the 10:30 a.m. service on Nov. 16. Oct. 19, Oct. 26, Nov. 2. Buddy party Nov. 9, Rite 13 Liturgy Nov. 16.

Confirmation: A sacrament for anyone who wants to deepen and recommit to their faith. Recommended for ninth grade or higher. There are four Sunday morning classes and one required weekend retreat. Confirmation candidates will work closely with an adult mentor and attend two Holy Week worship services together. This year, candidates for confirmation will have a “Milestone buddy” in grades 3-5. Bible milestone children and youth candidates for confirmation will meet each other and be paired up on Jan. 11 from 9:30 a.m. - 10:15 a.m. They will do a service project together on Jan. 18 as part of our Intergenerational MLK Sunday School Class. Classes run Jan 25, Feb. 1, 8, and 22, with a Milestone Buddies party in the Robert Payne Youth House on Feb. 15, 9:30-10:15 a.m. The required confirmation retreat is Feb. 27-March 1. Confirmation date TBD.

Youth Sunday: Youth Sunday is when sixth-12th graders plan and lead worship. The youth confirmation class writes and reads the prayers of the people. Other youth read the lessons, acolyte, usher, and preach. We celebrate graduating seniors, who are invited to write a homily to preach at all services. The Price Scholarship recipient will also be announced. There will be a reception to celebrate graduating seniors from 9:30-10:15 a.m. May 3

DURING THE SUMMER

Glory Ridge Mission Trip serves the people of Madison County through community outreach construction projects. Glory Ridge is for youth who have completed 9th through 12th grade. It takes place the third or fourth weekend in July yearly. Dates released in December 2025.

BELOVED COMMUNITY

The Holy Trinity Beloved Community Commission (BCC) puts into action our Baptismal Covenant “to seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbors as ourselves, and to strive for justice and peace among all people, respecting the dignity of every human being.” To this end, we oppose racism and bigotry in all forms. Through education and self-reflection, we work to raise awareness of the sin of racism. We ally ourselves with others in the wider community to combat racism and to honor and grow a rich and varied diversity within our parish.

Why form a Beloved Community Commission? The BCC was formed in response to the bishop's mandate that churches engage in the work of racial reparations. As Christians, we follow the directive from Jesus to "love our neighbors as ourselves."

Where do we begin? We start by being clear about our own beliefs and values by becoming aware of racism in all its forms and by learning from our own historic privilege and hidden biases. Holy Trinity can only be a Beloved Community if we are willing to speak the truth to each other and to those in power about what we believe to be the Way of Jesus. This includes acknowledging how our own beloved Episcopal Church has historically violated what Jesus taught and for which it has more recently sought redemption.

What does the BCC do? To support Holy Trinity in being a Beloved Community, the BCC offers educational programs in the form of book studies, film series, guest speakers, visits to historic sites that tell the story of racism and antiracism, and through adult formation classes. Every year, we participate in the Black History Month service and host a reception afterwards. We have a lending library, which contains books on racism and antiracism, both fiction and non-fiction, for adults, youth, and children. In addition, the BCC has a Black Literature Book Club to offer opportunities to learn through the voices of Black writers. Many of our active members have attended trainings offered by both the diocese and the Racial Equity Institute to learn more about systemic racism. Last, our BCC has a working relationship with the Greensboro Beloved Community Center as well as with the Racial Justice Committee at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Hillsborough, NC, so that we can learn from and support each other.

Sacred Ground: A Spiritual Journey Toward Racial Justice and Reconciliation is an 11-week series offered through the diocese and endorsed by the BCC for our congregation. This program is framed as a spiritual journey, grounded in the Christian faith through the power of scripture, prayer, God's grace, and the Holy Spirit to help us step closer to the dream of becoming a Beloved Community. Capital Giving Campaigns

- While there is no active capital campaign at present, previous campaigns have been transformational in building God's house—creating the original 1922 building (now All Saints Chapel), the 1949 Sanctuary, and the 1963 Parish House that continue to serve our worship and fellowship today.
- Subsequent campaigns have addressed essential needs and expanded our ministry capacity: the 1990 campaign funded stone facing on the Parish House, resolved water problems in the undercroft, and added accessibility through an elevator and the sacred space of our Columbarium.
- Our most recent Second Century campaign in 2022 raised \$3.3 million in faithful response to critical infrastructure needs—\$2 million for water remediation and plaster repair to preserve our sacred spaces, plus \$1.2 million to establish a maintenance endowment, ensuring good stewardship of our facilities for future generations.
