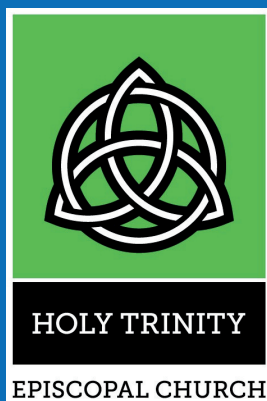

The Richard Cox Concert Series 2026-2027: All programs are free. The inaugural Richard Cox Concert Series honors the legacy of Richard Cox, a beloved educator, musician, and member of Holy Trinity Episcopal Church. Through songs that stir the heart and lift the spirit, we offer our gratitude for his years of service and honor the legacy he continues to inspire.

- **See You on Broadway** is an annual concert offering wonderful songs from musicals and film. Featuring works from several shows including *Hello Dolly*, *West Side Story*, *Into the Woods*, and *Harriet*, See You on Broadway offers a great time for the entire family. Sunday, Aug. 30 at 4 p.m. and Wednesday, Sept. 2 at 7 p.m., Haywood Duke.
- **Intermezzo:** Traditionally, an intermezzo serves as a connection between two parts of a musical or theatrical work. In this case, our Intermezzo serves as a respite within your day. Intermezzo Fall 2026 offers music performed by various local artists on Wednesdays in October from 12:15-12:45 p.m. in the Nave. The programs include a wide variety of music including classical, sacred, popular, and jazz genres. Each concert is free and donations go to the Interfaith Housing Initiative for the construction of six affordable townhouses in Greensboro. Oct. 7, 14, 21, and 28, 12:15 p.m. in the Nave.
- **House of Compassion** is an offering of poems by Dr. Linda Brown combined with instrumental music, silence, and Taizé for all to sing. The choir from St. Andrew's Episcopal Church will join the Holy Trinity Choir, Trinity Chamber Strings, and harpist Grace Ludtke for this time of calm and healing. - Join the **New Day Singers** for a free concert. Celestial Choir: The Celestial Choir is an “ad hoc” group of singers who sing hymns and lead the liturgy at funerals. If you like to sing with a group and have time available during the day, this is an excellent opportunity to minister to bereaved Holy Trinity families. Celestial Choir members are contacted by email or phone when needed, usually a few days in advance. Members arrive 30 minutes prior to the service to vest and review the chosen hymns. Chalicists: Chalice Bearers, also known as Chalicists, are men and women of the parish who assist the priests by serving the chalice of wine at communion. They vest in cassock and surplice and sit in the sanctuary during the service. Chalice Bearers require appointment by the Rector and licensing by the Bishop for a two-year term. LABYRINTH WALKS

A beautiful paver labyrinth is centered in Holy Trinity’s columbarium garden facing Greene Street. Its design replicates the labyrinth found in the 12th-century Notre Dame de Chartres. Over the past three decades the labyrinth has emerged as a contemplative practice. Walking its unicursal path is a form of meditation often referred to as a body prayer.

First Sunday Name Tags: On the first Sunday of each month everybody is invited to wear a name tag to introduce ourselves to one another. This is a great way to get to know your pew neighbor, make new friends, and welcome all people to Holy Trinity! Name tags are available as you enter worship services.

Get to Know Holy Trinity & Walking Tour of the Holy Trinity Campus, Second Sundays, 9:30 – 10:15 a.m.: Learn about Holy Trinity ministries on a walking tour of the Holy Trinity campus. The tour begins in the Nave on the steps at the front of the church. Led by Rev. Mark Lile-King.

Adult Confirmation Classes: Confirmation classes are for those seeking Confirmation into the Episcopal Church. "Confirmation is the sacramental rite in which the baptized Christian expresses a mature commitment to Christ and receives strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands by a bishop" (Book of Common Prayer, p. 860). Adult Confirmation classes are also for those being Received into the Episcopal Church from a sister confirming tradition and for those who want to recommit themselves to Christian life and faith by Reaffirming their baptismal vows. Children's and Family Ministries seek to nurture your child's relationship with God through opportunities that introduce the life, love, and example of Jesus. Our aim is to partner with families in the parent/child journey of discovery towards a life of discipleship and faith. Children bring gifts of joy and wonder to the church. As they begin their walk with God, we endeavor to nurture this vital relationship with encouragement and guidance. We also understand the significance of fostering meaningful friendships among children and creating faith-filled bonds between parents, leaders, and children. Children's values and beliefs are first formed within the context of their family, and part of our mission is to support parents as they develop and strengthen their own relationship with God.

On Sunday, Sept. 13, Children's Chapel for 4-year Pre-K – third grade resumes during the 10:30 a.m. service and nursery care for birth – 4 years will be from 8:15 – 11:45 a.m. There will be an intergenerational coffee hour, 9:30 – 10:15 a.m. on Sunday, Sept. 13. Sunday School for Children, Youth, and Adults resumes Sunday, Sept. 20.

SUNDAY MORNING FAMILY WORSHIP OPTIONS

Children are always welcome at all worship services at Holy Trinity. The 10:30 a.m. service is particularly family friendly. Everyone is encouraged to dress as casually as they wish, and children making a joyful noise are welcomed! Green worship bags in the Narthex contain a variety of ways to occupy small hands. Please return the bags and their reusable contents to the baskets after the service.

Nursery Care: The nursery for birth through four-years-old is located on the first floor of the Parish House in Room 105 and is open on Sundays 8:15 – 11:45 a.m. Our paid childcare providers are supplemented as needed by volunteers. Enter from the back parking lot by the door under the breezeway, and the nursery is the first door to your left.

Children's Chapel: Offered Sundays at the 10:30 a.m. service during the program year for children four-year Pre-K through 3rd grade. Children hear a story, sing songs, and pray. They take turns serving as acolytes, crucifer, and ushers. Please have your children bring money for the offering, which is added to the offering in the church. The Eucharist is a time of discovery and full participation for children. When the alms basins are brought forward at the Offering, the young people from Children's Chapel and their leaders will follow the ushers to the altar. There, the young people may stand around the altar for the whole eucharistic prayer. Their presence helps remind everyone that the celebration of the Eucharist is our communal feast of eternity. Children will return to their families to receive communion.

Host Families at 10:30 a.m. Worship Service: On the first and third Sundays, there will be a host family who serves as Oblation Bearers (members of the host family bring the bread and wine for Communion to the altar). Members of the host family can also serve as Lectors (reading the scripture lessons for the day) and Intercessor (reading the Prayers of the People), but reading is always optional. If members of the host family are acolytes, they can also serve in this capacity.

Children's Sunday School Classes: We offer a combination of intergenerational, milestone, and grade level Sunday school classes. We also have a designated

monthly Sabbath Sunday. Unless otherwise announced, kindergarten – fifth grade meet 9:30 – 10:15 a.m. on the second floor of the Parish House. Kindergarten – 2nd grade in Room 209, and 3rd - 5th grade in Room 211. Each class is led by two adult volunteers, using a combination of lectionary-based curriculum and Godly Play, a Montessori-based curriculum.

Sabbath Sundays – Time to Rest, Reflect, Connect: The following Sundays have been designated as Sabbath Sundays for children, youth, and adults: Oct. 18, Nov. 22, Jan. 10, Feb. 21, March 21, and April 4. Between services on Sabbath Sundays, we will gather informally with our church family from both the 8:30 and 10:30 a.m. services to enjoy a coffee hour and doughnuts. An intergenerational gathering with no agenda or program, simply a time to hang out and talk with old friends and meet new friends.

Holy Baptism Milestone for Third, Fourth, and Fifth Graders: We are introducing an exciting new milestone this year! Holy Baptism is the primary moment in the life of a Christian person when they become members of the church by water and the Holy Spirit. Children will explore the four essential elements of Holy Baptism: forgiveness of sin, uniting us to our savior, Jesus Christ, being sealed by the Holy Spirit as Christ's own forever, and finally, making us members of Christ's church. On Sunday, Sept. 20, we will meet with our Rite 13 milestone buddies in the Youth House for an introduction to the Milestones, doughnuts, and fellowship. On Sunday, Sept. 27 and Oct. 4, the children will have special lessons on Holy Baptism during their regular Sunday school class in Room 211. On Sunday, Oct. 11, at 9:30 a.m., in All Saints Chapel, Fr. David Umphlett and Marjorie Donnelly will lead a family-friendly conversation with the children and their parents about the meaning of Baptism. The preparation culminates on Sunday, Oct. 18 at the 10:30 a.m. service when the children witness a baptism. Our party on Sunday, Oct. 25 with our milestone buddies will be in the Youth House.

Capital Giving Campaigns:

- While there is no active capital campaign at present, previous campaigns have been transformational in building God's house—creating the original 1922 building (now All Saints Chapel), the 1949 Sanctuary, and the 1963 Parish House that continue to serve our worship and fellowship today
- Subsequent campaigns have addressed essential needs and expanded our ministry capacity: the 1990 campaign funded stone facing on the Parish House, resolved water problems in the undercroft, and added accessibility through an elevator and the sacred space of our Columbarium
- Our most recent Second Century campaign in 2022 raised \$3.3 million in faithful response to critical infrastructure needs—\$2 million for water remediation and plaster repair to preserve our sacred spaces, plus \$1.2 million to establish a maintenance endowment ensuring good stewardship of our facilities for future generations

BELOVED COMMUNITY

The Holy Trinity Beloved Community Commission (BCC) puts into action our Baptismal Covenant “to seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbors as ourselves, and to strive for justice and peace among all people, respecting the dignity of every human being.” To this end, we oppose racism and bigotry in all forms. Through education and self-reflection, we work to raise awareness of the sin of racism. We ally ourselves with others in the wider community to combat racism and to honor and grow a rich and varied diversity within our parish.

Why form a Beloved Community Commission? The BCC was formed in response to the bishop's mandate that churches engage in the work of racial reparations. As Christians, we follow the directive from Jesus to "love our neighbors as ourselves."

Where do we begin? We start by being clear about our own beliefs and values by becoming aware of racism in all its forms and by learning from our own historic privilege and hidden biases. Holy Trinity can only be a Beloved Community if we are willing to speak the truth to each other and to those in power about what we believe to be the Way of Jesus. This includes acknowledging how our own beloved Episcopal Church has historically violated what Jesus taught and for which it has more recently sought redemption.

What does the BCC do? To support Holy Trinity in being a Beloved Community, the BCC offers educational programs in the form of book studies, film series, guest speakers, visits to historic sites that tell the story of racism and antiracism, and through adult formation classes. Every year, we participate in the Black History Month service and host a reception afterwards. We have a lending library, which contains books on racism and antiracism, both fiction and non-fiction, for adults, youth, and children. In addition, the BCC has a Black Literature Book Club to offer opportunities to learn through the voices of Black writers. Many of our active members have attended trainings offered by both the diocese and the Racial Equity Institute to learn more about systemic racism. Last, our BCC has a working relationship with the Greensboro Beloved Community Center as well as with the Racial Justice Committee at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Hillsborough, NC, so that we can learn from and support each other.

Sacred Ground: A Spiritual Journey Toward Racial Justice and Reconciliation is an 11-week series offered through the diocese and endorsed by the BCC for our congregation. This program is framed as a spiritual journey, grounded in the Christian faith through the power of scripture, prayer, God's grace, and the Holy Spirit to help us step closer to the dream of becoming a Beloved Community.
