Her career began with hands-on work at boar studs across Ohio, and she previously managed an 80-sow show-pig herd. She later provided technical service for two swine genetics companies, supporting pork producers around the world.

Today, Voight is product optimization manager at SwineTech, where she works directly with producers to translate herd and production data into practical benchmarks and tools that support performance, sustainability and animal care.

Voight is a certified animal-welfare auditor and a PQA Plus and TQA trainer. She is participating in the 2026 Pork Leadership Institute and serves on the National Pork

Anthony Stateler, Director-at-Large

Stateler, a sixth-generation farmer from McComb, was elected as a director-at-large. He is co-owner of Stateler Family Farms and oversees its operations.

With more than 20 years of pork production experience, Stateler manages a family operation that includes a 2,400-head nursery and two 2,400-head finishing barns. The farm is a contract grower for Hord Family Farms. Before entering contract production, the Stateler family operated its own farrow-to-finish farm.

Stateler Family Farms was selected as one of the Blanchard River Demonstration Farms, an opportunity that has allowed the family to host thousands of visitors and demonstrate how modern pork production and practical conservation can work together to protect water quality.

In addition to his agricultural leadership, Stateler has served with his local fire department for 26 years. He previously served on the McComb Local Schools Board of Education, was appointed to the Hancock County ADAMHS Board and has coached junior high basketball.

Logan was elected to represent District 2. He brings 13 years of pork industry experience, blending practical production expertise with a background in livestock marketing.

Logan manages a 2,500-head wean-to-finish barn for Terrill Farms. He also serves as regional sales manager for United Producers, Inc., working with pig farmers throughout Ohio to develop marketing strategies and navigate changing hog markets.

A graduate of OPC's inaugural Ohio Pork Leadership Class, Logan continues to seek opportunities to serve fellow producers and strengthen the industry. He is active in his church and assists several county fairs with hog marketing.
