

American Series (Black Teams in Cuba)

The American Series began in 1891 when a group of “white” Major League ball players visited the island for a five game exhibition series against local Cuban teams. The team was called the “All Americans” and included National Baseball Hall of Famer, John McGraw. From 1891 and forward every time an American team would visit the island to play, the event was called the “American Series.”

The tradition of teams coming from the United States to play in Cuba continued until 1953. Branch Rickey’s Pittsburgh Pirates were the last team from the United States to play in the American Series in Cuba.

Over the years numerous black and Negro League teams visited Cuba to play in the American Series.

Black baseball teams came to Cuba to play in the American Series on sixteen different occasions. When they played the local Cubans teams they always found stiff competition. Over the sixteen American Series in which black teams participated, the black baseball teams had cumulative record of 87 wins 91 loses and 8 ties for a .489 winning percentage. The Cuban X Giants (1900, 1903, 1904, 1905 and 1906) and Homestead Grays (1938 and 1939) were the two most successful black teams to play in the American Series.

- Cuban X Giants played in the most American Series with five appearances.
- Cuban X Giants won the most games in a series with twelve (12) victories in 1900.
- Cuban X Giants had the most overall wins with a 31-22-1 (.585) record.
- Homestead had the best won-loss percentage with an 8-4 (.667) record.
- Homestead Grays played in the only series (1939) without a loss, they were 6-0.

The following summaries review all of the American Series in which black and Negro League teams participated.

1900 Cuban X Giants

The Cuban X Giants were the first black team to visit Cuba. The Cuban X Giants played a fifteen game schedule against local Cuban teams that began on February 15th with the last game being played on April 9th.

E. B. Lamar, the manager of the Cuban X Giants, brought the following roster with him to play the exhibition series.

The Cuban X Giants fielded an excellent squad. According to a newspaper article that appeared in the January 27th issue of El Nuevo Pais, the Cuban X Giants had compiled a won-loss record of 110-21 (.840) for the previous season in the United States. The Cuban X Giants played their first game on Thursday, February 15th against Almendares. The Cuban X Giants defeated Almendares by a score of 13-6. Box scores for fifteen games have been located. One game was rained out and there are possibly two other games for which box scores have not been found. The Cuban X Giants finished their exhibition series in Cuba with a record of 12-3 (.800) before returning home to the United States.

1903 Cuban X Giants

After an outstanding season in the United States, which saw them defeat the Philadelphia Giants for the “Colored Championship of the United States,” the Cuban X Giants sailed to Cuba under the direction of E.B. Lamar to play in the 1903 American Series. The Cuban X Giants brought an outstanding lineup to Cuba that included Charles Grant, Grant “Homerun” Johnson, Clarence Williams, Pete Hill and Andrew “Rube” Foster. Unfortunately for the X Giants several of their other key players did not make the trip. George “Chappie” Johnson (catcher), Andrew “Jap” Payne (outfield) and Sol White (first base) did not accompany the team to Cuba. The Cuban X Giants roster for the 1903 American Series was as follows:

The X Giants arrived in late November and played their first game on December 1st. The Cuban X Giants faced the Colombia team and lost by a score of 6-3 in ten innings. The X Giants could only manage 2 hits in 37 at bats in the game. The loss to Columbia was a prediction of things to come as the X Giants struggled for the entire series against their Cuban opponents. The second game for the Cuban X Giants was no easier as they could only manage 2 hits in 30 at bats and lost to Nuevo Azul by a score of 4-3.

The X Giants hitting woes from the first two games did not improve and lack of hitting became the major nemesis of the X Giants. They only batted .130 (40 for 307) as a team for the series. Ray Wilson (.241) was the only X Giant to hit over .200 for the series. Even with their star studded lineup, the X Giants returned home with a dismal record of 2-7-1 (.222) for the ten games in which they played.

Andrew “Rube” Foster was the team’s leading pitcher in the American Series. Rube’s record of 1-2 did not accurately reflect his pitching performance in Cuba. In the 31 innings he pitched, Rube struck out 31 batters and only allowed 6 runs.

Bernardo P. Carrillo, who pitched two games for the Criollos and one game for San Francisco, totally dominated the X Giants hitters. Carrillo had a 3-0 record and held the X Giants to only 7 runs in 38 innings.

1904 Cuban X Giants

The Cuban X Giants returned to Cuba in October of 1904 for the American Series and were determined to redeem themselves for their poor performance from the year before.

The roster for the Cuban X Giants for the 1904 American Series in Cuba was as follows:

In addition to the roster of players that came from the United States, Luis Bustamante played for the Cuban X Giants in two ball games. Bustamante was a superstar in Cuban baseball and had played for Abel Linares' All Cubans team that toured the United States. Luis also played in three games (one with Azul and two with Carmelita) against the X Giants.

The Cuban X Giants played nine games on their Cuban tour. Eight of the games were against Cuban teams and one against a "white" Minor League team (Lynn) who were in Cuba for the American Series. There were four "white" teams (Lynn, All Nationals, All Americans and Tampa) that played in Cuba during the 1904 American Series. The X Giants played their first game on October 13th against Azul. Newspaper accounts differ in the final score of the game. One account has the X Giants winning by a score of 8-1 and another newspaper report has the X Giants winning by a score of 3-1. Both newspaper accounts agree that the Cuban X Giants won the game and Harry Bucker was the winning pitcher and Angel D'Meza was the loser. The low point of the tour occurred when Jose Munoz of Habana pitched a no hitter against the X Giants on Sunday, October 30th. The Cuban X Giants finished their 1904 American Series with a record of six wins and three defeats.

The team's hitting did improve over the previous season. The X Giants went 47 for 249 for a team batting average of .189. The leading hitters for the Cuban X Giants were Luis Bustamante (.375), Clarence Williams (.261), Harry "Mike" Moore (.259) and Dan McClellan (.241).

1905 Cuban X Giants

E.B. Lamar, manager of the Cuban X Giants, brought his team back to Cuba for the 1905 American Series. The team that traveled to Cuba in October of 1905 had more players from the Philadelphia Giants on its roster than Cuban X Giants players. Grant "Homerun" Johnson, one of the most feared hitters in black baseball, did not make the trip to Cuba. This was the X Giants fourth trip to the island to play the local clubs.

The roster for the Cuban X Giants for the 1905 American Series in Cuba was as follows:

For the third straight year, the Cuban X Giants failed to hit over .200 for a team batting average. The X Giants went 68 for 312 for a team batting average of .167 for the 1905 American Series. The leading hitters for the X Giants during the American Series were Pete Hill (.351), Clarence Winston (.250) and Rube Foster (.200). Harry Buckner and Rube Foster each went 2-2 on the mound and Dan McClellan won the only game he pitched.

Inocenio Perez (All Cubans) provided the most trouble for the Cuban X Giant hitters. Perez pitched 18 innings against the X Giants and only gave up one run on six hits. He won both of this starts by scores of 7-0 and 4-1. The top hitters for the Cuban teams were Emilio Palomino (6 for 11 - .545), Francisco Moran (4 for 9 - .444), Carlos Moran (5 for 13 - .385), Luis Padron (4 for 11 - .373) and Armando Cabanas (3 for 8 - .375).

Despite their star studded lineup the Cuban X Giants could only manage a record of 5-4 (.556) against their Cuban competition.

After the conclusion of the American Series, the Cuban X Giants stayed in Cuba to play a series against Santiago located in the eastern part of the island.

1906 Cuban X Giants

The 1906 American Series was the fifth and final trip for the Cuban X Giants to play post season baseball in Cuba.

To bolster their roster for their trip to Cuba, the X Giants picked up four players from the “World Champion” Philadelphia Giants. These players were Emmett Bowman, Pete Hill, George Johnson and Harry “Mike” Moore. The complete roster for the Cuban X Giants for the 1906 American Series in Cuba was as follows:

Cuban players, Luis Bustamente and Regino Garcia, each played two games with the Cuban X Giants during the 1906 American Series. Bustamente played shortstop and went 0 for 9 (.000) and Regino Garcia caught two games and went 4 for 9 (.444).

The X Giants only faced two different Cuban teams (Almendares and Habana) during the American Series. The X Giants had little trouble with the Habana squad and took four out of the five games they played against each other. The Almendares team was a completely different situation. The Cuban X Giants could only manage two victories in the six games they played. The Cuban X Giants ended the American series with a won-loss record of 6-5 (.545).

As a team the X Giants posted a team batting average of .243 (90 for 370). It was the highest team batting average than the Cuban X Giants had ever posted in the American Series. The leading hitters for the X Giants were Pete Hill (.351), George “Chappie” Johnson (.333), Clarence Winston (.325) and Emmett Bowman (.250). Pitchers Emmett Bowman, Harry Buckner and Bill Gatewood each won two ball games.

1907 Philadelphia Giants (1st Series – October 10th to November 8th)

The Philadelphia Giants were the “Colored World Champions” in 1907. They arrived in Cuba in early October to take on Almendares and Habana (the two best professional baseball teams in Cuba) in the 1907 American Series.

The Philadelphia Giants lost the series to the two Cuban teams. Almendares won the series with a record of 4-2-1 (.667), Habana was second with a 3-3 (.500) record and Philadelphia was last with a record of 5-7-1 (.417).

William “Bill” Holland (.321), Grant “Homerun” Johnson (.289), John Henry “Pop” Lloyd (.288), Preston “Pete” Hill (.263) and Charles B. Earle (.261) were the leading hitters for the Philadelphia Giants. Philadelphia had a team batting average of .220 (93 for 422) for the series. Dan McClellan (2-1) and John Davis (2-3) were Philadelphia’s top pitchers.

Carlos Royer (Almendares) was the leading pitcher for the Cubans with a 2-0 record and only allowed 5 runs in 20 innings. Heliodoro Hidalgo (Almendares) was the leading hitter for the Cubans with a .373 batting average.

1907 Philadelphia Giants (2nd Series – December 5th to December 30th)

When the Detroit Tigers cancelled coming to Cuba to play, Cuban baseball officials asked the Philadelphia Giants to extend their stay and play a second series. The 2nd American Series of 1907 was played at Almendares Park. It was held from December 5th to December 30th.

The Giants agreed to play the second series, but had to recruit several players from the United States because four of the players that they had brought to the island were ready to go home and did not want to stay until the end of the year. Pete Hill, Bill Holland, Grant Johnson and Dan McClellan returned to the United States after the Philadelphia Giants finished playing their first American Series. They were replaced by William “Bill” Gatewood, Nathan Harris, Andrew Payne and Clarence Winston who arrived in Cuba on November 20th. For some unknown reason, Nathan Harris never appeared in a game during the Philadelphia Giants 2nd American Series.

Luis Gonzalez who was from Cuba and played in the United States for the Cuban Stars also appeared in one game for the Philadelphia Giants.

There were eleven games scheduled for the series. Box scores have only been found for the first ten games. A box score for the game that was to be played on December 30th has yet to be found. Philadelphia went 5-5 (.500) for the ten games for which box scores have been located for the 2nd American Series in 1907. Habana was 3-2 and Almendares went 2-3 against the Giants.

The Giants leading hitters for the series were Charles Earle (.414), Clarence Williams (.307) and Clarence Winston (.297). As a team the Giants batted .232 (70 for 302). John Davis was the team’s top pitcher with a 4-2 record and 11 runs given up in 53 innings pitched.

1908 Brooklyn Royal Giants

The Brooklyn Royal Giants traveled to Cuba in 1908 to play in the American Series. The Royal Giants faced the two top teams (Almendares and Habana) in the Cuban League and played one game against the Cincinnati Reds of the National League.

In addition Ricardo Hernandez (2B) and Agustin Parpetti (1B) also each played one game for the Brooklyn Royal Giants during the 1908 American Series.

Brooklyn faced Jose Mendez and the Almendares squad in its first game in the American Series. The game was played on October 10th and resulted in a 3-2 victory for Almendares. Victories in the series went back and forth between the Royal Giants and the two Cuban teams with no one team dominating the series. The Brooklyn Royal Giants completed their trip to Cuba with a 9-8 (.529) record. Almendares was 5-4 (.556) and Habana was 3-4 (.429).

Preston "Pete" Hill was the leading hitter for the Royal Giants with a .269 batting average for the series. The Brooklyn Royal Giants only hit .204 (95 for 465) as a team. Harry Buckner led all pitchers in the series with four victories and added another victory against Cincinnati. Jude Gans and Charles Earle each had two victories.

A summary of the Brooklyn Royal Giants American Series in 1908 is as follows:

1910 Leland Giants

The Leland Giants were based in Chicago and managed by Andrew “Rube” Foster. When they finished their regular 1910 season, the team barnstormed from Chicago to New York City to catch a ship that would take them to Cuba to play in the American Series. On their barnstorming tour of the East they are reported to have won 18 straight games, giving them a record of 123-6 (.953) for the season. Foster promoted his Leland Giant team as the greatest baseball “white,” “black” or “Latin” club ever to be assembled.

The team arrived in Cuba in early October to play a fourteen game series against Almendares and Habana who were the two best professional teams in the Cuban League. However, the combination of Jose Mendez and Eustaquio “Bombin” Pedroso for Almendares proved more than the Leland Giants could handle. In six games against the Almendares pitching duo, the best the Giants could do was a lone 7-6 victory on October 30th.

Almendares won the American Series with a record of 6-2-1 (.750), Leland was second with a 7-6-1 (.538) record and Habana was third with a 0-5 (.000) record.

John Henry “Pop” Lloyd (.390) and Andrew “Jap” Payne (.288) were the Leland Giants best hitters during the series. Andrew “Rube” Foster was the team’s top pitcher with a 3-1 record.

Rafael Figarola of the Cuban Stars also caught one game in the American Series for the New York Lincoln Giants.

The first game of the series was played on December 2nd against Almendares. The game matched up Eustaquio "Bombin" Pedroso and Smoky Joe Williams. Almendares easily defeated the Lincoln Giants by a score of 10-1. The Lincoln Giants struggled the entire series. New York hit reasonably well and finished the series with a team batting average of .244 (94 for 403). John Henry "Pop" Lloyd (.370) was the leading hitter of the American Series. Spottswood Poles (.292) also turned in a good hitting performance. Pitching which should have been the strength of New York let them down. Smoky Joe Williams who was considered one of the best if not the best pitcher in black baseball went 1-4 for the series. Williams gave up 27 runs in the 44 innings he pitched. Dick "Cannonball" Redding turned in the best pitching performance with a 2-1 record.

The New York Lincoln Giants finished the American Series in last place with a 5-8 (.385) record. Almendares finished in first place with a 4-2 (.667) record and Habana was second with a record of 4-3 (.571).

The highlight of the series for the Lincoln Stars were 1-0 and 3-0 shutouts that were pitched by Dick “Cannonball” Redding against Habana on October 15th and October 19th. Unfortunately Redding also took four losses in the series.

Spottswood Poles led the Lincoln Stars in hitting with a .308 batting average. His 16 hits in 52 plate appearances were the most of any player in the 1914 American Series.

Future Cincinnati Reds (Major League Baseball) pitcher Adolfo Luque totally dominated the Lincoln Stars. Luque pitched for Almendares and was 3-0 in the series

Almendares won the American Series with a record of 6-1 (.857), Habana posted a 3-3-1 (.500) record for second place and the New York Lincoln Stars were last at 4-9-1 (.308).

The Indianapolis ABCs got off to a good start by winning three of their first four games. Dick Redding got the win in all three games. After a 3-1 start, the ABCs hit a brick wall and went 5-11 over the rest of the series. Over the course of the series, Redding won six games to lead all pitchers in the American Series. The leading hitters for Indianapolis were Todd Allen (.404), Ben Taylor (.380), James Jefferies (.363), Bingo DeMoss (.333) and Dan Kennard (.333). As a team the ABCs hit .287 (182 for 634). Pitching, however, was the downfall of Indianapolis as their pitchers gave up 123 runs in 171 innings.

Cristobal Torriente (Almendares - .423), Bernardo Baro (Almendares - .393) and Eusebio Gonzalez (Habana - .367) were the leading hitters for the Cubans. Adolfo Luque was the leading pitcher for the Cuban teams with four victories.

Even with an outstanding lineup that included such stars as Oscar Charleston, Louis Santop, Dick Lundy, Dick Redding and Red Ryan; the Bacharach Giants went winless in the six games that they played in the 1920 American Series. The best that the Giants could do was two tie games. Almendares and Habana had two wins each in the series.

The Bacharach Giants had a disastrous series at the plate. As a team Bacharach had a team batting average of .148 (28 for 189). This was the lowest team batting average by any “black” team in the history of the American Series. Dick Lundy was the only player on the team to hit above .200. 1925 All Yankees

During the 1924-25 Cuban League season, Almendares was so dominant during league play that Cuban baseball officials ended the season early. With the season shortened and the Negro League players still on the island, Cuban baseball officials decided to hold a special series between all star teams. One team (All Yankees) was made up of the Negro League players and the other was chosen from the Cuban players (All Cubans). John Henry “Pop” Lloyd was named the manager of the All Yankees and Adolfo Luque and Miguel Gonzalez were chosen to manage the All Cubans. One of the highlights of the all star series was having Kenesaw “Mountain” Landis (Commissioner of Baseball in the United States) attend a game.

The series began on February 5th with Rats Henderson (All Yankees) facing off against Emilio Palmero (All Cubans). The All Cubans won the first game by a score of 6-5. The All Yankees came back two days later to even the series with Wilbur “Bullet” Rogan pitching a 6-0 shut out. The All Yankees built on Rogan’s victory and won the next two games by the scores of 2-1 and 7-4. The All Cubans sent Jose Mendez to the mound for game five. Mendez pitched a good game and the All Cubans responded at the plate with 15 hits and 10 runs to win the ball game by a score of 10-3. The All Yankees won games six and seven by the scores of 2-1 and 6-4. The final game of the series ended in a 7-7 tie. The All Yankees won the series with 5-2-1 (.714) record.

The key to the All Yankees winning the series was their hitting. They had a team batting average of .299 (78 for 261) for the series. The leading hitters for the All Yankees were Leon Daniels (.405), Biz Mackey (.333), Crush Holloway (.333), Clint Thomas (.333) and John Henry “Pop” Lloyd (.321).

Vic Harris (Manager of the Grays) had an outstanding team that included two of the best Negro League hitters of all time in Buck Leonard and Josh Gibson. Homestead also had an excellent pitching staff that was anchored by National Baseball Hall of Famer Ray Brown.

To bolster their roster for the American Series, the Homestead Grays added the following players to their team: Sam Bankhead (Pittsburgh Crawfords), Barney Brown (New York Black Yankees), Terris McDuffie (New York Black Yankees) and Willie Wells (Newark Eagles). To accomplish his goal of bringing home an American Series championship, Cum Posey (owner of the Homestead Grays) recruited eight players from other Negro League teams to join his Grays team to make the Cuba trip. Most notably among this group of new recruits were Sam Bankhead (Toledo Crawfords), Henry Kimbro (Baltimore Elite Giants), Sammy Hughes (Baltimore Elite Giants) and Willie Wells (Newark Eagles).

The American Series was played at La Tropical Stadium in Havana and began on October 8th. The Grays opened the series with a 7-4 victory over Habana. Raymond "Smoky" Owens (who had pitched for the Cleveland Bears during the regular Negro League season) got the win and Luis Tiant took the loss. The Homestead Grays won the next five games and took the series with a perfect record of 6-0. During the series they beat Habana twice, Almendares twice and the Estrellas Cubanas (Cuban All Star team) two times.

The Homestead Grays returned home to the United States with the American Series championship and the distinction of being the only black team ever to visit Cuba and return with a perfect won-loss record.

Josh Gibson (.375), Henry Kimbro (.370) Sam Bankhead (.333), Sammy Hughes (.333), Clarence "Fats" Jenkins (.304) and Willie Wells (.300) led the Grays in hitting. Homestead batted .280 (60 for 214) as a team. Five different pitchers were used by Homestead during the series. Lamb "Bud" Barbee started two games and led the staff with a 2-0 record. The Grays pitching staff ended the series with a 2.04 team earned run average. In the two games that they played against the Cuban All Star team (Estrellas Cubanas) the Homestead pitchers only allowed 7 hits in 61 at bats for a miniscule .115 batting average for the Cubans.

1945 New York Cubans

Alex Pompey's New York Cubans were definitely not the best team to represent Negro League baseball in the 1945 American Series. The New York Cubans had come in next to last place in the Negro National League during the 1945 season. Pompey didn't even take his best team to Cuba for the American Series. Missing from the team that went to Cuba in October were such players as Dave Thomas, Horacio Martinez, Tom Parker, Dave Barnhill, Barney Morris, Pat Scantlebury, Louis Louden, Johnny Taylor, Ameal Brooks, Jesse Cannady, Carranza Howard, Bill Anderson, Carols Santiago and Greene Farmer. To fill out his lineup for the Cuban series, Pompey recruited players from other Negro League teams, Latin players from the Minor League teams in the United States, five players from the Mexican League and even one player from the Washington Senators.

Jose Maria Fernandez, legendary Cuban great, managed the New York Cubans.

The New York Cubans arrived in Cuba in early October and played a five game schedule against a Cuban All Star team. Game one was played on October 10th at the La Tropical Stadium in Havana. The New York Cubans could only manage three hits and lost the opener by a score of 3-0. The games didn't get any easier for New York after their opening round loss. Over the next four games, the best the New York Cubans could do was a 1-1 tie in game four. The New York Cubans ended the series on October 13th with a 2-1 loss. New York was 0-4-1 (.000) for the last American Series in which a black or Negro League team would compete.
