What is the Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Society?

The Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Society is an independent nonprofit Catholic organization formed in 1875 by Italian immigrants new to Hammonton, who took time to celebrate their safe journey to America and a successful harvest by giving praise and thanks to the blessed Virgin Mary. The Society became a chartered organization in the year 1905, with the goal to perpetuate the annual Feast of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel.

From those beginnings, the Mt. Carmel Society has continued forward to this day. The Society consists of members of each of the town's three Catholic church parishes and beyond. Since



its inception, membership in the society has generally passed from father to son. On occasion, as needs require, membership is increased to include extended family members or devout Catholics sponsored by a member in good standing.

The main function of the Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Society is the preparation and presentation of the feast each July 16th. The Society is also involved in a variety of community activities and charitable endeavors, regularly supporting school, community and church fund raising efforts.

A common misconception is that the Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Society is affiliated solely with the parish of St. Joseph's Church. Though it works in close conjunction with St. Joseph church to present the annual feast, the Society also

participates in the activities of St. Martin de Porres and St. Anthony of Padua churches.

The Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Society of today remains much the same as it began in 1875, a brotherhood of devout Catholics honoring the Blessed Mother, Our Lady of Mt. Carmel.

The Beginning

The celebration in honor of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel began in the year 1875 in the home of Antonio Capelli at 232 Pine Road. He, along with a small group of fellow immigrants, prayed in front of a painting of the Virgin Mary and formed a procession in front of the home. They prayed in thanks for their safe journey to America, their successful farming season, and for the blessings and good fortune found in their new home in Hammonton.

Pictured are three founding members of the Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Society. They, along with the rest of the original membership, are responsible for the first procession down Pine Road in Hammonton.

Review.

The Italians had a great crowd at the celebration, Thursday night. Men, women, children, and babies, of every nationality represented in Hammonton, were there; and despite the unavoidable crowding and pushing, all seemed goodnatured, and all enjoyed themselves. The fire-works were not all a success, but enough of them were so, and bright colors and loud reports must have satisfled everybody. There was a sufficient variety of music to satisfy all tastes,month-organs, hand-organ, bag-pipes, and full band. Fruit and pea-nut stands were numerous. The only beverages we saw were lemonade and water.

The Early Years

In the early years, the feast was little more than a curiosity to the townspeople of Hammonton. The town's Italian population consisted of mainly migrant field workers living on the farmlands. The earliest news records reported only that the Italians had a "celebration" or "yearly celebration." It was not until the feast was some twenty years old that it became more widely known as the "Feast of Mt. Carmel." As the feast progressed into the 1900's, coverage became more widespread. The Republican Newspaper now carried articles detailing plans for the forthcoming feast. Bands from Philadelphia would come to entertain. Crowds began to steadily increase. The Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Society was formally chartered in 1905.

The Feast Grows

As the population of the town of Hammonton continued to increase, along with the entire Southern New Jersey area, the Feast of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel also continued to grow. Spurred on by the steady influx of Italian immigrants, attendance at the feast rose quickly. Estimated crowds who came to pay tribute to Our Lady of Mt. Carmel swelled from ten

and twenty thousand to forty and fifty thousand. Ben Pizzi and David Longo, Sr. were two of the

presidents of the Mt. Carmel Society during this era. The feast carried on during World War II despite wartime restrictions that prohibited the presentation of the carnival and the fireworks display. After the war's end, the feast continued its growth, with bigger and better entertainment for those attending

The year 1956 saw the dedication of the Mt. Carmel Society Hall. The hall was built on grounds purchased by the Society many years before. Some members used their own homes as collateral for the purchase of this land. From a simple block building, the Mt. Carmel Society Hall has undergone several renovations in recent years. The small kitchen facilities were commercialized because of the increased demands of the Mt. Carmel food stand operation. An A-roof attachment was completed in the early 1980's for the same purpose. In 1993, a display case showcasing the history of the Mt. Carmel Society was added.

Mt. Carmel Food Stand

It was in the mid-1970's when Amusements of America carnival owner, John Vivona, suggested to Mt. Carmel members that operating a food stand during the feast week might

help to offset the steadily increasing expense of presenting the feast. Although some members were a little hesitant, the majority were enthusiastic and it was decided to give it a try. From its initial origin of selling beer



from a half
keg, the food
stand has
since grown
into a much



more diversified and efficient operation. Many members

fondly recall memories of canvas roofs that leaked during rainstorms or

rebuilding the stand each year with the same materials but somehow always ending up with a different result. Each year since has been a learning experience, but also one that has brought Society members and their families closer together. Many of the younger members of the Society






remember their earliest experience of the feast was helping out

at the food stand as children. Today, the food stand operation continues to evolve and improve. In 1999, based on the design of a Mt. Carmel committee led by Frank Italiano, Jr., a new portable cooking grill was

unveiled. The grill has been affectionately named "Big Pete" in memory of Pete Gregori, Jr. (1937-1997) who was a mainstay behind the grill during the festival week throughout his long years of service to the Society.

100 Years and Beyond

1975 marked the 100th anniversary of the Feast of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel. A commemorative booklet was produced to mark the occasion. Plans were made to place a monument where the feast originated on Pine Road on a piece of land that had been

donated to the Society. The monument was dedicated the following year.

During the last 25 years, there have been many changes in leadership. In 1975, Anthony P. Jacobs, who had served as the Society's president for over 30 years, retired from office and was succeeded by Louis Tomasello. As president, Louis instituted a variety of changes that increased membership participation, including the delegation of responsibilities and the formation of committees that is still used today. Upon his death in 1982, Anthony Ingemi assumed the office. In 1984, Carmine Pantalone was

elected president. During his tenure, the members began to hold a procession before the regular feast week on every tenth year anniversary. This procession starts at St. Anthony of Padua Church on Route 206 and ends at the monument on Pine Road. Carmine stepped down due to ill health and Anthony Jacobs was elected president. In 1987, the current president, George Campanella, was elected to office.

There are many notable events that have occurred over the years. The Bishop of the Diocese of Camden has come to St. Joseph's Church on numerous occasions on the July 16th feast day to preside over a selected mass. Governor Thomas Kean visited and participated in the procession in 1981. In 1989, the procession was conducted in a record time of 2 hours due to a rainstorm that brought two inches of rain down on the area. In 1990, the Mt. Carmel Society watched as one of their members, Fr. Joseph Capella, was

The Tradition Continues

In November 1989, the sons and junior members of the Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Society arranged a tribute dinner and ceremony honoring their fathers and senior members. Presented was a plaque with a proclamation that read:

Today, with this dinner and this meeting, we honor you... our fathers and our distinguished senior members.

We honor you today for the many years of dedication to this Society and devotion to Our Lady.

We honor you today for all the hard work you have done to make this organization what it is today.

We honor you today for the guidance and leadership you have given us, within this organization and in our lives.

We honor you today for keeping alive the values and traditions of this Society that our forefathers and founder and past members began 114 years ago.

We honor you today for showing us how to work together unselfishly for the common good of this Society and for the camaraderie that has developed between the membership of our organization.

We...your sons and junior members...assure you that we have learned our lessons well.

We pledge to continue to work together...with you...and continue the friendships and goodwill that has helped make this Society what it is today.

We pledge to instill the same values you have shown us to our children and to the membership of the future.

We pledge to continue your efforts...in working for the feast and for this Society, in devotion to Our Lady.

To our fathers, our senior members, our friends...we thank you.

It is this spirit, reflected in the words above, that lives in every member of the Society and, with the help and grace of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel, that we will continue to practice the traditions of the Feast of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel as we continue forward into the new millennium.

St. Joseph's Church

St. Joseph's Church, the first Catholic church to be built in the town of Hammonton, has been associated with the Feast of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel for over a century. Three different churches have been built on this site, located at the corner of Third and French Streets.

The first church was built in 1887 with the first mass being said on March 27th, Passion Sunday. The church was operated as part of a mission run by the pastor of St. Nicholas Church, Reverend Anthony Van Riel.



St. Joseph's was established as a separate parish in October 1890. Rev. Van Riel stepped in temporarily on two other occasions after the separation when St. Joseph's was without a pastor.

In December 1919, a new church was dedicated. This Romanesque styled church contained an altar panel with three niches, the center one of which held a statue of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel, while the other two on either side held statues of St. Joseph and St. John the Baptist. The last mass said in this church was on Easter Sunday, April 14, 1963.

Through the remainder of 1963 and early 1964, church services were held in the parish hall located at Third and Pleasant Streets while construction of the new church continued. The current St. Joseph's Church was dedicated on May 23, 1964.

July 16th

For a member of the Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Society, July 16th is the culmination of a year's worth of preparation. It is a time for prayerful reflection and a time to celebrate. Perpetuation of this feast day is the reason why the Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Society exists. The day is full of traditional activities in which the members faithfully participate. Following is a brief look at the events that make up July 16th for members of the Society.

In years past, the day would begin with a firework bomb salute, which would continue each hour throughout the day until the beginning of the procession. Invariably, the Hammonton Police Department would find out which residents had recently moved into town because they would call on July 16th reporting explosions. In more recent times, however, due to increasingly stringent state regulations, this practice has been discontinued. Sadly, the traditional fireworks show on the night of the 16th has met the same fate, despite the best efforts of Mt. Carmel committee members, fire officials and town representatives to find a suitable alternative.

The morning of the feast day begins at 8:00 a.m. as members of the Society convene at the monument on Pine Road for a prayer session and blessing, usually conducted by Society Chaplain, Fr. Joseph Capella. The monument, dedicated in 1976, commemorates the original location of the feast. The land for this monument was donated by Jennie and Norman Tomasello. Joseph Donio, a neighbor who graciously helps with the upkeep of the site, is unfailingly there to greet the membership with a toast to the day. Former

Hammonton Town Councilman James Garrison, also a nearby resident, frequently attends.

After this brief service, it's back to the Mt. Carmel Hall to prepare for the 9:00 a.m. mass at St. Joseph's Church. The mass is offered in memory of the deceased members of the Society. Mt. Carmel members serve as ushers, and senior members or officers are selected to carry the gifts to the altar.

After mass, members return to the hall for refreshments and to greet members of the

Carmine Pantalone Mt. Carmel Society Band, who arrive to participate in the morning procession through the center of town. This long-standing, traditional march includes several stops. The first stop is at the Veteran's Memorial Park on Bellevue Avenue and Schoolhouse Lane. Next, the procession proceeds to the Senior Citizens Center at 310 Bellevue Avenue where the band entertains the assembly.

John Celona of Celona's Tire & Auto Center, BeBe Scola of Archie Daubs and the Mazza Family of Mazza Furniture have all hosted the Society for many years. A stop is made at Town Hall, where Police Chief Frank R. Ingemi and Mayor Barbara Berenato continue the tradition of assisting Mt. Carmel President George Campanella in the raising of the flag for the feast.

The morning procession concludes with a march to the Sons of Italy Club located on North Third Street. Their membership hosts the Society in a show of fellowship and brotherhood.

After the morning procession, members return to the hall to prepare for the busy afternoon and evening ahead. Most members bring several changes of clothes with them for the day's different activities because the schedule does not allow for time in between events to leave and come back. The Mt. Carmel Society food stand usually opens around noon. It is staffed mainly by family, friends and only the barest minimum of members who will remain at

the stand during the procession. After a quick lunch, the members get ready to start the procession.

The Society makes its way towards
St. Joseph's Church at approximately 2:00 p.m.
Along the way, the Society is joined by members of
the Our Lady of Assumption Society and St. John
the Baptist Society who will also march in the
procession. The American and Italian National
Anthems are played at each stop.

After the statues of the saints are taken out from the church and lined up in formation (each one escorted by members of a particular society or church group), the procession is ready



to begin. The membership body of the Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Society, along with local elected officials, leads the procession. Anchoring the procession is the statue of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel, followed behind as always by the faithful, many of whom have made this annual pilgrimage for decades. The pastor of St. Joseph's Church, currently Fr. Louis Micca, along with senior Mt. Carmel Society members, walk with the statue and hand out scapulars to those who make offerings. All monetary offerings collected during the procession go to the benefit of St. Joseph's Church. A

position at the statue is a place of honor for a Mt. Carmel Society member. Those members currently positioned at the statue include: Larry Longo Jr., P. Charles De Stefano, Carmine Pantalone, Louis Pantalone Sr., Anthony Jacobs, Sam Mascioli, Anthony Tomasello, Joseph Monzo and John Zucconi.

The procession moves along slowly. Starting from the church, the procession proceeds on Third Street, turning left onto Fairview Avenue. It moves down Fairview Avenue to Egg Harbor Road. Along the way, many residents kindly offer refreshments on this typically hot summer day. Members of the Sons of Italy provide soothing ice water.

John Capelli, a longtime resident of Fairview Avenue, has a special fountain set up from his garden hose. Further along Fairview, The Triboletti's, a large family that gathers yearly to view the procession, also provides water. The Panarello Family on North Egg Harbor Road also offers water to all those in need. The procession continues from Egg Harbor Road to the Bellevue Avenue downtown business area, turning back onto Third Street en route back to St. Joseph's Church. As the statue of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel nears the church, the pace slows as the streets swell with people making offerings. The Mt. Carmel members at the front of the procession line the church steps to await the arrival of the statue. Upon completion of the procession, a homily is given by one of the priests present. Fr. Joseph Mungari, pastor of St. Joseph Church during the 1960's and 1970's and again in the 1990's, was known to conclude his passionate sermons with

Carmine Pantalone wanted more. He felt the procession needed another full band rather than the practice of splitting one band into two squads. He recruited a local resident musician, Anthony Guerere, and soon a band was formed. Robert Hitman, another local resident, also participated. A few years passed and this group evolved into the meeting Carmel Society Band, with uniforms provided by the Mt. Carmel Society.

In early 1997, bandleader Herb Roselle requested that the name of the band be changed to the Carmine Pantalone Mt. Carmel Society Band in his honor. The officers of the Society agreed that it was an excellent suggestion and plans were quickly made to implement it. Carmine has been a member of the Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Society for over 50 years. To this day, he continues to dedicate

much of his time and energy for the benefit of the Society.

Lawrence has observed many changes throughout the years. He recalls, "When I started in the Society, the parade route was at the original Pine Road site, down the White Horse Pike to

town. Cars only occasionally came by, disrupting the procession. In the morning, we would walk out as far as Chew Road, wherever anyone would have us." "Rules were strict back then," he added, "No matter how hot it was, if you were carrying the flag, you were expected to keep holding it high."


The wartime years of the 1940's provided some of the fondest memories of the feast. "The town was really packed," he said. "I remember the people coming off the trains from Philadelphia, from all over to attend the procession. During World War II, with so many fathers, sons and family members away, it brought many people back to their faith."

Lawrence is very proud to be part of the Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Society, and to see that the traditions and heritage of the Society continue to this day. "It's a great bunch of guys. I like how everyone works together and gets things done."

Faith and commitment remain the strength of the Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Society. This dedication, which has been passed down through the generations, would not be possible without devoted members such as Lawrence Longo, Sr.




