

Letter From The Editor



I wish you enough sun to light up your days and enough rain that you appreciate the sun. Enough joy to strengthen your soul. Enough pain that you can appreciate life's small moments of happiness.

We are in the midst of summer here in Tropic Isles where the sun is hot, the showers are plenty, and the warm afternoon sea breezes provide us with some respite from the daytime heat.

Many of us spend the better part of the year looking forward to the summer months. The sunny weather inspires vacation plans, outdoor activities, summer festivals, and trips to the pool or beach. With so many activities packed in, it's easy to overlook things. One of the most important things to remember when planning to be outside in the summer is how to protect yourself from ultraviolet (UV) rays.

July is UV Safety Month. As we enjoy the beautiful summertime weather, we need to keep in mind several issues about the effects of the sun's ultraviolet radiation. We need sunshine. It helps with our body's production of Vitamin D and has been tied to issues of depression in some people who don't get enough. However, overexposure to the sun can lead to a variety of health risks. You may be surprised about some of the specific dangers of sun exposure and how you can protect yourself.

There are two main types of UV light, UVA and UVB. UVB is what gives you your sunburn and is responsible for some types of skin cancers. UVA rays are the ones that can make the skin leathery and wrinkly in appearance and these also can contribute to certain skin cancers. (An easy way to remember: "A" is for aging and "B" is for burning). Both types are harmful to you in different ways. UV light can be harmful to the skin as many of us know who have been badly sunburned. However, it can also be very bad for our

eyes. Eye structures such as the cornea, retina, and lens are damaged from UV radiation, so protecting your eyes is vital. Wear your sunscreen and use good eye protection. Have a wonderful summer!

Updates from the Manager's Desk

Dear Residents of Tropic Isles,

Please remember the following regarding our pool and hot tub: <u>Scum Line:</u>

The scum line around the perimeter of the pool is caused by body oils and sunscreen. It is not caused by chemical imbalance or any other reasons. The only way to remove the scum line is with a tile soap which contains muriatic acid. The tiles are scrubbed by the pool company, but I'm told that we should not be surprised if the line returns because of failure to shower before entering the pool. This is the most common problem in all commercial pools.

That is why there is a rule in place that everyone is **REQUIRED** to rinse in the shower before entering the pool or hot tub. This is not just a Tropic Isles' rule, it is a **Health Department Rule**. All you need to do is rinse off and quickly rub your skin to remove any oily residue.

Beverages:

The **State Health Department** rules also regulate food, beverages, and glass containers as follows:

Food and beverages are prohibited in the pool and on the wet deck area, except:

 Commercially-bottled water in plastic bottles is allowed on the pool wet deck for pool patron hydration. (NOTE: the pool wet deck is defined as the four-foot-wide unobstructed pool deck area around the outside of the pool water perimeter, curb, ladders, handrails, diving boards, diving towers, pool slides, waterfalls, water features, starting blocks, planters, or lifeguard chairs.) All glass containers and products are **PROHIBITED** in the fenced pool area or within 50 feet of an unfenced pool, except glass bottles of liquor used only by bartenders in a permitted swim-up bar. We do not have a swim-up bar.

Pool Chemistry:

Our pool and spa chemicals are monitored by a chemical automation system. This system continuously monitors and adds chemicals as needed to maintain optimal water quality. Again, the scum line issue is NOT a result of pool chemistry.

Debris in pool:

The pool company discovered several coins and a screw from the bottom of the pool on one of their visits. PLEASE make sure your pockets are empty before entering the pool. These items, if left on the new surface, will cause staining.

Enforcement of Rules:


The rules are in place for the safety and enjoyment of all users of the pool, and to comply with State Law. This is an adult community and everyone needs to comply with the rules. I'm sure none of you want to live in a community with extreme rules enforcement and I do not want to manage such a community. However, if the rules cannot be followed by everyone, changes will need to be made to how we manage things.

Let's all remember that we are very lucky to live and work in the most wonderful community in Manatee County. We've come through a catastrophic loss, we worked together, and we are still standing. We need to appreciate what we have and keep working together as neighbors.

Zoom Etiquette



Zoom meetings are now a staple in our day-today lives. Reliable, easy-to-use video platforms like Zoom have helped to restore the ability to hold meetings during difficult times. The challenges and benefits of Zoom meetings can be much different than in-person meetings. The advantage of virtual meetings is the ability to hold

them almost anywhere and have more people participate from anywhere, but there are dos and don'ts associated with participating in a Zoom meeting.

ZOOM "BEST PRACTICES"

- 1. You should try to attend the meeting from a quiet area that has a neutral background.
- 2. Eliminate distractions-- noises (dog barking, dishwasher, voices in the background, TV, etc.) and movement going on around you.
- 3. Wear proper attire—not your pajamas or go shirtless.
- 4. Avoid distracting behaviors—ironing, eating, moving around.

5. Don't do private things— brush or floss your teeth, shave, etc.

REMEMBER: THE CAMERA SEES EVERYTHING AND EVERYONE ON ZOOM CAN SEE YOU. While we like to see everyone, you do not have to participate using video to attend a Zoom meeting. You do not have to have your camera on to see what is going on at the meeting either. Another option is to just cover up your camera lens at the top of the screen with a post-it note. If you choose to have your camera on, aim the camera 'straight' at your face (not from a position that looks up your nose) and try to follow the Zoom "best practices".

Just a reminder: In the chat portion of the Zoom meeting, remember to give your name and address when you ask your question. Questions can't be read without that information.





Cook's Corner



WISCONSIN PARTY BITES Ingredients You'll Need:

For the Spread:

- 8 oz cream cheese, softened
- 1 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese (or a blend of cheddar and Monterey Jack)
- 6 slices cooked bacon, crumbled (reserve some for garnish)
- 1/4 cup green onions, finely chopped (plus extra for garnish)
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder (optional, for added flavor)
- 1/4 teaspoon smoked paprika (optional, for a smoky kick) **For Serving:**
 - Crackers (Ritz, butter crackers, or wheat crackers work well)
 - Baguette slices
 - Carrot sticks, celery sticks, or bell pepper strips (optional, for a lighter option)

Step-by-Step Instructions:

Step 1: Preheat and Prep

1. Preheat your oven to 350°F. Lightly grease a small baking dish (about 8x8 inches or similar size).

Step 2: Mix the Ingredients

1. In a mixing bowl, combine the softened cream cheese, shredded cheddar cheese, crumbled bacon (reserve some for garnish), green onions, garlic powder, and smoked paprika. Stir until evenly mixed.

Step 3: Assemble and Bake

- 1. Transfer the mixture to the prepared baking dish, spreading it out evenly.
- 2. Bake for 15–20 minutes, or until the spread is bubbly and the top is lightly golden.

Step 4: Garnish and Serve

- 1. Remove from the oven and let cool slightly.
- 2. Sprinkle the reserved crumbled bacon and additional green onions on top for garnish.
- 3. Serve warm with crackers, baguette slices, or fresh veggies for dipping.



Friendly Reminders

The Board unanimously approved instituting a \$250.00 penalty for any residents/tenants/renters who do not go through the approval process per the Rules and Regulations. The penalty will be posted to the owner's account.



Safety Tip of the Month ---



WET WEATHER DRIVING

Wet season is here in Florida and lasts from May through October, which can make driving conditions more hazardous. Although it might seem like a good idea to turn on your emergency

lights while driving in heavy rain, don't do it. It's illegal to use your emergency lights if your car is moving— and it's dangerous. "Other drivers now think that your vehicle is stopped and may or may not take evasive actions to avoid your car," said Steven Montiero, with the Florida Highway Patrol. "Meanwhile, you are still moving, but you are telling another driver that your car is stopped in the roadway. You may be causing a crash while you think you are avoiding a crash." What other tips do you need to know about for the wet season?


- Check your tires.
- Avoid cruise control. It's great for dry conditions, but when it's raining, your chances of losing control increase.
- Use your headlights when it's raining, but not your high beams. You don't want to blind other drivers, and the extra light could reflect off the rain and reduce your visibility. Remember this: When the windshield wipers are on, your lights should be on.
- Slow down and make sure you leave plenty of room for other drivers. Slowing down can be critical to reduce your chances of hydroplaning. "The second you start to feel that your vehicle is no longer in contact with the road, and you think you need to stop that car, we are telling you to pump the brakes," Montiero said. "There is no reason to slam on your brakes. Pump the brakes until you come to a complete stop."

Rule of the Month

This is a reminder that the Rules and Regulations are in effect and being enforced. All residents and their guests are expected to know and abide by these rules. If you need a copy of the current Rules and Regulations, you may go to <u>www.tropicisles.net</u> to view or print a copy online.

IX. GUESTS 9.1 Registration

- Residents who have Guests that stay in the Community for more than seventy-two (72) hours/3 days, must notify the Office of all of their Guests on the next business day.
- Guests under the age of fifty-five (55) may stay in the Dwelling provided the permitted Residents are then in occupancy and further provided such stay is less than thirty (30) days in any twelve (12) month period.
- The Association's facilities are primarily for the use and enjoyment of the Residents.
- 9.2 Subletting/Sub-occupancy
- The minimum period of a sublet shall be for thirty (30) days.
- Anyone staying in the Community for thirty (30) days or more will be considered a Resident and must meet the Association's requirements for residency including a background and credit check. (SEE APPENDIX 5: SALE OR SUBLETTING OF A DWELLING OR RV LOT)
- Anyone staying in the Community for less than thirty (30) days is considered a Guest.
- 9.3 Restrictions to Operate Golf Carts
- Golf carts are NOT to be operated by children under the age of sixteen (16) throughout the Community.
- The operation of golf carts must comply with state laws and local ordinances.
- 9.4 Resident's Responsibility
- Guests are entirely (financially and legally) the responsibility of their host Resident and must comply with all of the Association's Rules and Regulations.
- Residents will be responsible for violations or damage caused by their Guests, regardless of whether or not they are present at the time of the violation or damage.
- All Guests under the age of eighteen (18) must be accompanied by an adult to use any of the recreational facilities in the Yacht Club or Auditorium.
- Consideration for the rights of others is encouraged and common courtesy is expected.

Here are Some Friendly Reminders to Help to Make Tropic Isles a Happy and Stress-Free Place to Be!

Pool Etiquette



If you enjoy spending time at the pool, please remember these few simple things:

The State Health Department requires all persons using a public pool or hot tub/spa to

shower immediately <u>before</u> entering the pool and hot tub/spa. The State Health Department rules also regulate food,

beverages, and glass containers as follows: Food and beverages are prohibited in the pool and on the wet deck area, except:

- Commercially-bottled water in plastic bottles is allowed on the pool wet deck for pool patron hydration. (NOTE: The pool wet deck is defined as the four-foot-wide unobstructed pool deck area around the outside of the pool water perimeter, curb, ladders, handrails, diving boards, diving towers, pool slides, waterfalls, water features, starting blocks, planters, or lifeguard chairs.) <u>NO</u> <u>food or beverages are allowed IN the pool or hot tub/spa, OR</u> <u>within 4 feet of the water</u>.
- All glass containers and products are prohibited in the fenced pool area or within 50 feet of an unfenced pool. <u>NO GLASS</u> <u>CONTAINERS!</u>

Other reminders to help make your time at the pool enjoyable for everyone:

• Children's hours at the pool are 11 AM to 1 PM and 4 PM to 6 PM.

• Please dispose of the cans, plastic bottles, and trash in the receptacles provided for you.

• If you are a smoker, please smoke in the designated "SMOKE BREAK AREA" outside of the fence.

• Please remember to put down the pool umbrellas when you are through using them and return your noodles and water weights to their proper location. Leave no trace.

• Use a towel to protect the chairs from sunscreen.

• Dogs, golf carts, bikes, smoking, and glass are NOT allowed in the pool deck area.

• Remember to be considerate and respectful of others.

• Please keep your music and conversation levels LOW so as not to disturb others.

• Disorderly conduct, public intoxication, and profane language will NOT be tolerated.

Remember to Shower Before Entering the Pool



The **State Health Department** and our Rules and Regulations <u>7.5 Shower</u> state:

The State Health Department requires all persons using a public pool or hot tub/spa to shower immediately before entering the pool and hot tub/spa.

This is not just Tropic Isles' rule <u>7.5 Shower</u>, it is a Health Department Rule. All you need to do is rinse off and quickly rub your skin to remove any oily residue. It keeps the pool and hot tub/ spa cleaner. No shampoo or soaps are permitted in the pool or hot tub/spa deck area.

The shower at the pool is located near the fence on the west side of the pool near the boat docks.

Pet Owners

Dog owners—please pick up after your pets **no matter where you are**. This includes 28th Ave. W. along the fence. Be respectful of your neighbor's property and don't allow your



dog to urinate on your neighbor's garbage/recycle cans, vehicle tires, flower pots, lawn decorations, etc.

Cat owners—Please do not allow your cats to roam free. Do not



put out food for any feral cats because cats become food for coyotes and food attracts other unwanted critters (raccoons, foxes, rodents, opossums, etc.).

We all love our pets, but please be respectful of your neighbors, so that your pet does not become a nuisance to others. When your dog's gotta go, your dog's gotta go, but please take it with you and leave no trace.





It's Spring and the Manatees are



on the move!

In balmy spring weather, both manatees and boaters are cruising through Florida's waterways. For manatees, it is a seasonal ritual when they abandon winter retreats and head north along the

Atlantic and Gulf coasts and through inland waters. For boaters, it is a critical time to be on the lookout for manatees to avoid colliding with these large, slow-moving creatures.

From April 1-November 15, seasonal Manatee Zones, marked by signs, require boaters to slow down in certain areas to prevent manatees from being struck by motorboats or personal watercraft.

Because manatees are difficult to detect when underwater, operators of boats, including personal watercraft, need to take basic steps to avoid causing injury to manatees.

- Wear polarized sunglasses to help spot manatees.
- Look for large circles on the water, also known as "manatee footprints", indicating the presence of a manatee below.
- Look for a snout or what looks like a "rock" which is their back sticking out of the water.
- · Follow posted manatee zones while boating.

The FWC also asks anyone who sees an injured, distressed, sick, or dead manatee to call the agency Wildlife Alert Hotline at 888-404-FWCC (3922) or dial #FWC or *FWC on a cellphone.

Another Pelican Rescue

The pelican walked up to where I was working behind the house and didn't fly away. I got llene and she saw he had a hook and fishing line in his right wing. She waded out and got the fishing line out of the water and I netted him, so we could get him up on the back walkway. Together, we held him with a beach towel over his head and a finger between the beaks so he could breathe. Then while I held him, llene found the hook in the feathers. With side cutters, she cut the shank of the hook off with the attached fishing line and pulled the remaining hook out with the barb through, point first. He was fighting trying to get away as was expected, but we were successful and released the pelican. He flew about 30 ft. into the bay, then paddled out, and took off when he got further away.

Understanding the Hay Bales on Anna Maria Island

You might have spotted some new additions along Bradenton Beach – barriers made of hay bales. These aren't just for show. They're playing a vital role in protecting our beloved sea turtles!



This year, like every year from May through October, we're right in the heart of sea turtle nesting season. These incredible creatures come ashore to lay their eggs, and it's our job to help ensure their journey is a safe one back to the sea.

Unfortunately, last year's storms had a significant impact on our beautiful coastline, eroding sand dunes and washing away important barrier foliage like sea oats. This natural protection is crucial for nesting sea turtles, guiding them, and shielding their nests from hazards. So, how do the hay bales help?

<u>Preventing Misdirection</u>: Without the natural dune structure, mother turtles and tiny hatchlings can become disoriented and wander into dangerous areas like roadways or get trapped in rock revetments. The hay bales act as a temporary, gentle barrier, helping to keep them on the beach and headed in the right direction – towards the sea!

<u>Reducing Light Exposure</u>: Bright, artificial lights can confuse nesting turtles and, especially, emerging hatchlings, drawing them away from the ocean. While the hay bales offer some minor shielding, the loss of dune vegetation makes it even more critical for all of us to be mindful of our lighting near the beach.

Manatee County's Natural Resource Department has strategically placed these hay bales in areas like the Bridge Street Beach Access to address the loss of natural barriers. It's a proactive step to safeguard these protected marine animals.

What can YOU do to help?

- <u>Respect the Barriers</u>: Please don't disturb the hay bales or any marked sea turtle nests.
- Lights Out for Turtles: If you live near the beach or are visiting, please turn off or shield any lights visible from the shore after dark. Use turtle-friendly lighting, if possible.
- <u>Keep Your Distance</u>: If you're lucky enough to see a nesting turtle or hatchlings, admire them from a distance. Never use flash photography.
- Leave No Trace: Remove all beach furniture, trash, and fill in any holes before you leave the beach. These can be obstacles for turtles. Level the sandcastles before leaving the beach. They can

block hatchlings from the water. Don't use balloons, wish lanterns, or fireworks. They litter the beach and turtles can ingest the debris.

By working together, we can help ensure a successful nesting season for our Bradenton Beach Sea Turtles. Let's give them the best chance to thrive!



Advice from a Sea Turtle

Swim with the current. Stay calm under pressure. Be well-traveled. Age gracefully. Spend time at the beach.

Architectural Review Committee (ARC) Procedure

ARC approval is needed for **<u>ANY</u>** improvements that happen outside of your door—on your home, dock, or lot. The ARC procedure is as follows:


- 1. ARC application forms are available in the Office and on the website <u>www.tropicisles.net</u>. Fill out an ARC application and submit it to the office. Make sure to include diagrams, drawings, or photos as needed. If possible, please show the neighbor's homes and the distance from each. Include the labels N, S, E, and W on your diagrams.
- 2. All applications must be logged in at the Office and assigned a date for review by the ARC Committee or 3-COR.
- 3. The ARC approval process begins with a preliminary review by a 3-person team, referred to as 3-COR. Simple improvements and replacement issues may be approved by this group and not require a review by the full ARC committee.
- 4. The ARC Committee needs a week to review the application and go to the lot before the next meeting date.
- 5. If there is not enough time to do this, you will have to wait for a future date.
- 6. You will be notified when your request is placed on the agenda for an ARC meeting. Meetings are usually held the first and third Tuesday of the month at 9:30 AM in the Auditorium. You are encouraged to attend that meeting.

- 7. After the meeting, you will be notified, by phone or in writing, as to whether your request is approved or denied.
- 8. If denied, you can appeal the decision to the Board of Directors, if you so choose.
- 9. To obtain a permit from the City, you must <u>first</u> receive the Architectural Review Application <u>approval</u>, signed by the ARC committee and the Manager.
- 10. You must also provide a copy of all required permits to the Office.
- 11. BOTH THE ARC APPLICATION AND THE CITY PERMIT NEED TO BE POSTED ON THE FRONT OF THE HOME <u>BEFORE</u> THE WORK CAN BEGIN.
- 12. <u>NO WORK should begin on your project until your final</u> <u>approval letter from the Office is received</u>. If you fail to get ARC approval for your project before you begin, you may be asked to deconstruct it and/or a fine of \$100 can be imposed. Contact Steve Tourtilotte at 860-682-7656 with any questions you may have.
