## **Updates From The Manager's Desk**

**Hurricane Season is Here - Be Prepared** 



#### Dear Residents,

As we enter another hurricane season—lasting through November 30th—the Board of Directors and Staff of Tropic Isles Co-Op, Inc. want to ensure that every resident is informed, prepared, and supported.

This article provides essential information to help you plan ahead, safeguard your property, and understand how our team will work to secure the Park during severe weather events. We kindly ask that you take a moment to review the following details carefully.

#### COMMUNITY COMMUNICATION DURING STORMS

The Management Team will share important updates via mass email and post it on our two official Facebook pages:

- Tropic Isles Co-Op, Inc.
- Friends of Tropic Isles

Please ensure that the office has your most current email address on file.

#### **HURRICANE TERMINOLOGY TO KNOW**

- Hurricane Watch: Conditions are possible within 48 hours.
- Hurricane Warning: Conditions are expected within 36 hours or less.

#### **PARK OPERATIONS & EVACUATION NOTICE**

Once a **Hurricane Watch** is issued, Tropic Isles' personnel will begin securing buildings and common areas.

If an **Evacuation Order** is issued, all water and sewer lift stations will be shut down **three (3) hours** after the order, to protect infrastructure and ensure quick restoration after the storm.

**\*\*Please note:** Staff will not be able to assist individual residents at their homes during storm preparation. Their responsibilities are focused on the Park's mechanical systems and common areas.

#### **STAY INFORMED**

#### PREPARE NOW - RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ALL RESIDENTS

#### 1. Secure Your Home and Lot.

Remove or tie down all outdoor items. If you'll be away, please make arrangements to have shutters closed and loose items stored. If you have a boat, make sure it is properly secured.

#### 2. Emergency Supply Kit

Assemble supplies now. A full checklist is available here: 2022 Disaster Supply Kit Checklist (PDF)

#### 3. Review Insurance

Ensure your coverage is up-to-date. Take photos and inventory valuables. Store documentation in a waterproof container.

#### 4. Special Needs Residents

If you require special assistance during an evacuation, please pre-register with Manatee County.

#### 5. Plan Your Evacuation

Have transportation and a destination ready. Do not wait until the last minute. Leave early, especially if elderly or mobility-limited. When an evacuation order is issued, **everyone must leave the Park**. Emergency services and utilities will be suspended and staff will also evacuate.

#### 6. Plan to Stay Away

Once evacuated, expect to remain away for several days. Authorities may restrict re-entry until conditions are deemed safe.

Make sure you have fuel in your vehicle and some cash on hand, as ATM machines may not be operational.

#### **AFTER THE STORM**

Please allow staff and emergency crews time to assess and restore the community. Do **NOT** call the office for updates—Management will send mass communications via email and Facebook once it is safe to return.

We appreciate your cooperation and urge all residents to stay informed, be prepared, and remain safe. Let's work together to ensure our community is ready and resilient throughout the hurricane season.

## Don't Be Caught Off Guard--Build a Disaster Kit



#### What kind of emergency supplies should I have?

- 7-14 gallons of water per person
- Non-perishable food and utensils for 7-14 days
- · Non-electric can opener
- · Change of clothing and footwear
- A blanket or sleeping bag
- Pillows, air mattress
- · First aid kit
- · Flashlight and extra batteries
- Hygiene materials (toothbrush, toothpaste, deodorant, etc.)
- Medication
- Extra pair of glasses
- Hearing aids and batteries
- · Important family documents in a waterproof container
- Emergency cash or traveler's checks
- · Portable radio and batteries
- Toilet paper, sanitary wipes, paper towels
- Folding chairs, if you evacuate
- · Charger for cell phones and other mobile devices
- For pets: carrier, leash, food and water for 14 days, medications, vaccination paperwork, comfort items, bed, bowls

Creating a complete disaster kit does not have to be a hit to your wallet all at once. Picking up a handful of items during weekly shopping trips will help you build your disaster kit in no time. Manatee County Emergency Management recommends your disaster kit contain water, food and supplies for 7-14 days.

**What about filling my prescription medication?** Per <u>Florida State Statute 252.358</u>, during a state of emergency, health insurers, managed care organizations, and other licensed entities shall waive time restrictions on prescription medication refills to allow refills in advance.

#### **Pet Disaster Kit**

- Identification tags with phone numbers for collars and/or harnesses.
- Leashes, harnesses, and carriers to transport pets safely and securely.
- Water and food for 14 days.
- · Medication for 14 days.
- Vaccination records, medical conditions, behavior problems, feeding schedule, veterinarian information stored in a waterproof container. This is needed if you have to board your pets.
- · Current photo of your pets in case they get lost.
- First aid kit
- Pet bed, toys, and treats

## The Proper Use of Sandbags



Sandbags are used to create barriers against floodwater or to redirect water flow.



#### **Detailed Steps:**

#### 1. Prepare the Area:

Remove any debris from the area where you plan to place the sandbags.

#### 2. Placement:

- <u>Lengthwise</u>: Place the sandbags lengthwise, parallel to the direction of the water flow.
- <u>Tuck and overlap</u>: Tuck the open end of the bag under the filled portion and overlap each bag by half the length of the previous bag.
- <u>Tapping</u>: Tap down each sandbag firmly to eliminate gaps and create a tight seal.

#### 3. Stagger Joints:

Stagger the joints between layers of sandbags to create a stronger barrier.

#### 4. Consider Plastic Sheeting:

Use plastic sheeting under the sandbags to reduce seepage, especially if placing them against a wall or door.

#### 5. Specific Locations:

- <u>Doorways and Windows</u>: Place sandbags directly in front of and against the bottom of the doors and windows, creating a tight seal.
- <u>Drains and Toilets</u>: Place sandbags over floor drains, toilets, and other potential entry points for floodwater to prevent backflow.

#### 6. Height:

Build the sandbag wall as high as the expected flood level or higher to provide adequate protection.

#### 7. Pyramid Placement:

For unsupported layers over 3 courses high, use the pyramid placement method, alternating header and stretcher courses.

## **Important Announcement**



When severe weather is approaching, the City of Palmetto makes sandbags available to help residents protect their homes and properties.

- Where: Palmetto Public Works, 601 17th Street West
- When: Available ahead of major storms (watch for city alerts)
- What to Bring: Proof of residency (ID or utility bill)
- · Limit: Up to 10 sandbags per household

## 7 Things Florida Newcomers Should Know About Hurricane Season

Still with two months left of the 2025 Hurricane Season, if you are a new, full-time resident of Florida, or just a snowbird, here are some things you should know. Tens of thousands of newcomers move to Florida every year.

Long-time residents of the Sunshine State know the drill that comes with hurricane season: Keep your gas tank full, your pantry stocked, and one eye on the tropics at all times.

We also appreciate the importance of things like having an extra propane tank or plenty of charcoal to grill with during power outages and filling your bathtub with water before a storm hits so you can flush toilets if water service is knocked out or turned off.

If you're a recent transplant, here are some insider tips about hurricane season:

#### 1. It Doesn't Have to Be a Hurricane to Be Dangerous

Even a storm that isn't a hurricane at landfall can be destructive and deadly. Two tropical storms that hit Florida in 2021 - Elsa and Fred - made NOAA's annual list of billion-dollar disasters for the damage they caused. In 2020, Tropical Storm Eta made the list. Eta dumped between 10 and 20 inches of rain on South Florida, and both it and Fred claimed several lives due to flooding as the storms moved up the U.S. East Coast. While hurricane season runs from June 1 through November 30, named storms can happen any time of the year.

#### 2. Categories Are Just a Guideline

Hurricanes are ranked ranging from Category 1 to Category 5 based on their wind speed under the <u>Saffir-Simpson Hurricane Wind Scale</u>, first developed in the early 1970s, but the scale doesn't take into account other factors, including flooding rainfall and storm surge. Those two things kill far more people than wind. Flat-natured Florida is surrounded on three sides by salt water and is pockmarked by springs, lakes, and marshes, which means that flood waters can, and do, rise quickly with or without winds of 75 mph. Another hazard newbies might not know: There's often animals like alligators and snakes hiding in those waters, too.

#### 3. Know Your Zone

Where needed, Florida counties have designated <u>evacuation</u> <u>zones</u>. Most are identified by letters ranging from A to L, with A being the most vulnerable areas. Note that these are different than <u>FEMA flood zones</u>. You should know your evacuation zone and evacuation route.

Separately, people living in low-lying areas or certain types of buildings are also sometimes told to evacuate, regardless of how far they might live from the coast. The bottom line: If you're told to go, GO. If you do plan to evacuate, know where you're headed. If it's a friend or relative's house, work out the details with them AHEAD OF TIME. Many hotels waive pet restrictions and extra fees and offer flexible reservations with no penalties for cancellation when a storm is coming.

Shelters are usually opened when evacuation orders are issued, but emergency management officials say they should be a <u>last resort</u> for evacuees. If you plan to rely on a shelter, make sure to check your county's emergency management website to see what you should (or shouldn't) bring with you and have those items <u>packed</u> and ready to go throughout hurricane season.

#### 4. Know Your Home

Do you have impact windows? If so, there's typically no need to board up or worry about hurricane shutters. Sometimes called hurricane windows, they're designed to withstand a hit by flying debris in certain wind speeds. Impact windows are required by the building code in many areas, so whether you have them might depend on where you live and when your home was built. This information should have been provided to you when you purchased the home.

Did hurricane shutters or plywood come with the property? If so, you'll want to make sure you have all the hardware and tools to install or secure them <u>before the time comes</u> and that you know how to do so. If you are buying shutters or plywood or anything that goes with them, add that to your list of things to buy, <u>well in</u> advance.

Renters should make sure they know their responsibilities in terms of prepping a house or apartment for storms.

Do you have <u>flood insurance</u>? Typical homeowners' insurance doesn't cover water that comes in from outside your home. There's often a waiting period before flood insurance kicks in, so don't wait until a storm is coming to buy it. Flood insurance is separate from what most people call "hurricane insurance" or a "hurricane rider," which is actually windstorm insurance and is usually added to a regular policy.

#### **5. Stay Safe During Power Outages**

Dozens of people have died in the Gulf states in recent years from carbon monoxide poisoning while running generators after a hurricane or tropical storm. Generators should never be used in, near, or adjacent to a building or partially enclosed space. They should be at least 20 feet away and never be placed near windows, doors, or vents. If you plan to use a generator, make sure you have battery-powered carbon monoxide detectors for your home.

Heat is also deadly during post-storm power outages, especially for the elderly and those with underlying health issues. People who might need extra assistance during a storm or its aftermath should reach out to local emergency officials to see what services they might provide.

#### 6. Keep a Supply Kit Stocked and Ready


Emergency officials recommend having at least 7 days of nonperishable food and water for every person and pet in your family, plus a two-week supply of any necessary medications.

Every household should also have a <u>"TO GO KIT"</u>. This includes things you will take with you if you evacuate. The kit should also include a list of important documents or other things - like phone chargers or pet leashes - that you might want to gather as you leave. Make sure to know where those things are. Make a list of things you need to take so that you don't forget anything.

#### 7. Stay Informed

Know how your county and city send out information and sign up for text alerts and other communications. Familiarize yourself with relevant websites and terms. Have a NOAA weather radio on hand.

## **Business Trespass Program**

Over the summer and at other times throughout the year, we've had problems in the pool area, the peninsula, the Marina, the North Basin, and other areas with non-residents. The issue of non-residents on the property has been an TRESPASSING



on-going problem. The Palmetto Police Department has developed a program to help us at Tropic Isles. On June 19, 2018, we enrolled in this program, the **Business Trespass Program**. You may have noticed the signs that are up at the entrances on 28th Ave. and Aloha Dr., the pool, Office, and peninsula. These signs are part of the program.




The program works this way. If you see a non-resident who you believe is trespassing anywhere in the park, call the police. DO **NOT CONFRONT THEM. No**tify the Manager and/or a Board member. The police will come out to Tropic Isles and determine if they are in the "Trespass database". If they are, they will be immediately arrested. If not, they will be given a warning and

placed in the Trespass database with the Manager or Board Member present. If they are caught on the property another time, they will be arrested. Our participation in this program prevents the need to file a complaint each time a trespass occurs. It also raises the awareness level of non-residents of the seriousness of their actions. A non-resident is a person who has not been invited to be on the property by a resident of Tropic Isles. Again, please do not confront these people. You never know who is violent. TAKE A PICTURE. CALL THE POLICE!

#### **THE HUMAN BODY**

- Humans are bioluminescent, but this natural glow is invisible
  to the naked eye. Researchers have discovered that the human

This membrane served as an additional layer of protection and moisture for the eye. In humans, however, this feature has evolved into what we now see as the "plica semilunaris," the small, pink, crescent-shaped tissue at the inner corner of our eyes. While it no longer functions as a protective eyelid, its presence is a fascinating reminder of our shared evolutionary history with other species.



 Believe it or not, the high atmospheric pressure experienced during airplane travel or underwater diving might accelerate hair growth. This intriguing concept arises from the idea that increased pressure can stimulate the hair follicles.

#### **Ingredients**:

- 2 teaspoons chili powder
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon smoked paprika
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper, to taste
- 1 ½ pounds boneless, skinless chicken thighs
- 1 tablespoon canola oil
- 12 mini flour tortillas, warmed
- 1 cup Pico de Gallo, homemade or store-bought
- 1 avocado, halved, peeled, seeded, and diced
- 1/2 cup chopped fresh cilantro leaves
- 1 lime, cut into wedges

#### **Equipment**:

· Cast Iron Skillet

#### Instructions

- In a small bowl, combine chili powder, cumin, paprika, oregano, garlic powder, 1 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon pepper.
- · Season chicken with chili powder mixture.
- Heat canola oil in a large cast iron skillet over medium high heat.
   Working in batches, add chicken to the skillet in a single layer and cook until golden brown and cooked through, reaching an internal temperature of 165 degrees F, about 4-5 minutes per side. Let cool before dicing into bite-size pieces.
- Serve chicken in tortillas, topped with Pico de Gallo, avocado, cilantro, and lime.





## Juspiration The Making of an NFL Football Player



Pictured are Tropic Isles' residents, Bob & Sharon Williams with their grandson, Joe Huber. (The picture was taken at Minnehaha Falls in Minneapolis, Minnesota.) Joe was recently selected for the 53-man NFL roster of the Minnesota Vikings. Joe played high school ball in Columbus, Ohio. He never played a varsity snap until his Senior year. After they put Joe in the game, they saw his potential and he played both offense and defense. Joe was also a varsity heavy weight wrestler. He earned a spot in the State finals, but didn't get to go due to Covid. He would have been the first student at his Columbus High School to go to State in both wrestling and football. He got no college scholarship offers because the high school never played him until his Senior year. He went to the University of Cincinnati because they had a good engineering program. When he got to

Cincinnati, he walked on to the football field and told the coach, Luke Fickle, he wanted to play. The coach said you'll have to prove yourself. The coach got rid of all the walk-ons with the exception of Joe. As a red-shirt freshman, Joe, was in on extra point plays and field goals. In his second year, Joe started on the offensive line as guard and tackle. During his second and third years, Cincinnati went to the Final Four for the National Championship. Cincinnati lost to Georgia one year and lost to Alabama the second year. Coach Fickle was offered a head coaching position at Wisconsin. Fickle's salary at Cincinnati was about \$1 million per year. Wisconsin offered Fickle \$7 million per year for 7 years for a total contract of \$49 million. So Fickle went to Wisconsin. When he went, he asked Joe to go along with him and Joe did. Joe was a first team starter for Wisconsin during his fourth and fifth years. Joe played guard, tackle, and some center. Joe showed interest in the NFL. He got an agent and worked very hard. During the fourth round of the 2025 NFL draft, Joe got a call from his agent. The agent said that the Vikings and the Ravens wanted Joe to commit to their teams. Joe's agent recommended the Vikings, so Joe went to the Vikings as an Undrafted Free Agent. He worked really hard and showed his determination. It paid off. He is now a player on the Minnesota Vikings football team. (People are amazed that Joe and his grandpa look so much alike--almost like twins.) Joe is, and always has been, number 60. Watch for him. We went to his first preseason Vikings game in Minneapolis. He played the entire game in all 3 preseason games.

## **Carts vs Bicycles and Pedestrians**



Please remember that golf carts must follow the same "rules of the road" as cars and other motor vehi-



cles. Golf carts need to stay on their side of the street, follow the "one way" signs on the streets, stop at all stop signs, and proceed into an intersection after carefully looking both ways. There have been way too many "near misses" on our streets involving bicycles and pedestrians with drivers not following the "rules of the road". Pedestrians and bicycles have the right-of-way. Remember also, that according to our Rules and Regulations and state law, golf carts are not to be operated by children under the age of 16. (See Rule 9.3 below.) Please follow the "rules of the road" and the posted speed limits on our Tropic Isles' streets for the safety of all of our residents.

#### 9.3 Age Restriction to Operate Golf Carts

According to state law, golf carts are not to be operated by children under the age of 16. The operation of golf carts must comply with state laws and local ordinances.



## **Speed Limits**

The speed limit in the park is 15 mph, although it is not posted on most streets. Please check your speed as you travel throughout the park and slow down on those tight corners. There are people riding bicycles and walking, so please slow down, where people may not be visible until you turn the corner. Then it is too late. Golf carts must also abide by the rules in the park.

The speed limit on 28th Ave. W. is posted as 25 mph. Many people speed down 28th Ave. and create an unsafe situation for walkers, bikers, and people walking their dogs along that street. **Please drive safely, observe the speed limits, and SLOW DOWN!** 



## **Stop Signs**

For the safety of our residents and guests, obey all the **STOP SIGNS!** Please **STOP at every sign** and proceed with care. There have been some near misses of pedestrians, bikers, and vehicles and we are asking for your co-operation to avoid any serious problems. It is such a little thing to ask, for something so important! After all, IT IS THE LAW!

### **Pedestrians vs Vehicles**



When walking on 28th Ave., please remember to walk facing traffic. According to Florida state law, **pedestri-**



ans must walk facing oncoming traffic on the same side of the road as the oncoming traffic. Also, you should get as far to the side of the road as possible to provide additional space between you and oncoming cars. It is important to see the vehicles that are approaching you for your own safety. This gives you the best chance to see traffic approaching closest to you and take evasive action when needed.

When bicycling, you must ride on the right side of the road (going in the same direction as automobile traffic). In the early morning hours and in the evening when it's dark, please remember to be safe while walking on our streets. If you are walking at night, wear light-colored or reflective clothing AND CARRY A FLASHLIGHT! If driving a golf cart or riding a bike, lights are needed. When driving, be attentive to pedestrians and bikers. Obey our park speed limits! **SLOW DOWN!**

## Rule of the Month HAVE YOU READ YOUR RULES LATELY?

This is a reminder that the Rules and Regulations are in effect and being enforced. All residents and their guests are expected to know and abide by these rules. If you need of a copy of the current Rules and Regulations, you may go to <a href="https://www.tropicisles.net">www.tropicisles.net</a> to view or print a copy online.

**Guest Parking** 

When Tropic Isles is in full season, guest parking is always a challenge. If you have overnight guests and you do not have sufficient parking for them at your home, Tropic Isles has several areas for temporary guest parking. Unfortunately, our parking facilities are limited. If you have a need for temporary overnight parking for your guests, please come into the Office to get a parking permit. At that time, we will assign you an area for your guest to park. Temporary permits are issued for parking for up to 48 hours. If your guest arrives on the weekend, they can park at Bimini Point or the north parking lot of the Auditorium, unless there is an event happening in the Auditorium. Please come into the office on Monday morning to get a temporary permit. Do not park on empty lots, on the grass, in other people's driveways without their permission, or on the streets overnight.

- **1.5 Parking** (taken from page 43 of the Rules and Regulations)
- Each Resident is permitted no more vehicles than can be accommodated by their carport, driveway, or assigned parking.
- All vehicles must be parked parallel to the carport. Parking across the end of the driveway by Residents is prohibited.
- No vehicle may be parked in such a manner or location to impede visibility around any intersection/corner or stop sign.
- PARKING AND/OR DRIVING ON THE GRASS IS <u>NOT</u> PERMITTED ANYWHERE IN THE COMMUNITY, except as described in Section Parking Vehicles in the RV Section.
- Any area not designated (grass, stone, vacant lots/pads, etc.) as a parking or driving surface may NOT be used by any vehicle.

## Remember to Shower Before Entering the Pool



The **State Health Department** and our Rules and Regulations <u>7.5 Shower</u> state:

The State Health Department requires all persons using a public pool or hot tub/spa to shower <u>immediately before</u> entering the pool and hot tub/spa.

This is not just Tropic Isles' rule <u>7.5 Shower</u>, it is a Health Department Rule. All you need to do is rinse off and quickly rub your skin to remove any oily residue. It keeps the pool and hot tub/spa cleaner. No shampoo or soaps are permitted in the pool or hot tub/spa deck area.

The shower at the pool is located near the fence on the west side of the pool near the boat docks.

The new shower has a shower head, wand, and foot spout. There are 2 round control knobs. The bottom knob turns on/off the water. The top knob has three positions. Turn the knob to produce water out of the foot spout at the bottom, out of the shower head from the top, or remove the wand for directed use on your body. When you are finished, be sure to turn off the water flow to all areas of the shower.



## Residents



We want to take a moment to remind everyone that the pool, hot tub, buildings, and all the common areas are for the use and enjoyment of all residents. For your safety, there are surveillance cameras in all of these locations. If you see someone breaking the rules in these areas or trespassing, please note the day and approximate time of the rule infraction and report it to the Office. Taking a picture is always helpful, too. Our Manager, Bobbie, will review the tapes and be able to determine who has broken the rules and take the appropriate action.

## **Tropic Isles Co-Op Inc. Compliance Policy**

#### **COMPLIANCE GOAL:**

To ensure the overall appearance of Tropic Isles Co-Op by encouraging residents to maintain their homes and property at the highest possible level in accordance with the Governing Documents and the Rules & Regulations. The obligation of the residents of Tropic Isles to maintain their homes and property are found in the Governing Documents, as follows:

- 1. Paragraph 48 of the Declaration of Master Form Occupancy Agreement
- 2. Article 12.1 of the Bylaws
- 3. Rules & Regulations (as they may be updated from time to time)

#### **COMPLIANCE PROCEDURES:**

- Email communication to advise resident, as well as owner of the property, of compliance issue with request to resolve within seven (7) days.
- Rules & Regulations Compliance Request Notice: If the violation is not remedied within seven (7) days, the Manager (at the direction of the Board) shall provide written notice to the resident alleged to be in violation, as well as the owner of the property, of the specific nature of the alleged violation, including a statement setting forth the provision(s) of the documents allegedly violated. This document requires compliance within seven (7) days.
- Final Notice of Violation: If the violation is not remedied within seven (7) days, the manager (at the direction of the Board) shall send a Final Notice of Violation, which is required to be sent via certified mail.

Phone 239-995-0333 E-mail: mh@bassineinsurance.com • If the violation is not remedied within ten (10) days of the Final Notice of Violation, the matter will be referred to the Executive Committee of the Board to impose a fine and/or proceed with further enforcement action as set forth in Article 12.1 of the Bylaws.

Prior to a fine being imposed, the Board shall:

Appoint a Fining Committee of at least three (3) members appointed by the Board who are not officers, directors, or employees of the Co-Op, or the spouse, parent, child, brother, or sister of an officer, director, or employee. When an issue is sent to the Fining Committee, it is because the Board has determined to levy a fine. The amount of the fine will be determined by the Board in accordance with the powers granted by the Governing Documents and Florida law. As of the writing of these guidelines, the fines per violation have been set at a maximum of \$100.00 per day or \$1,000.00 in the aggregate for continuing violations. If the Board has approved the levying of a fine, the Board will provide at least fourteen (14) days' written notice to the unit owner and, if applicable, any occupant, licensee, or invitee of the unit owner sought to be fined or suspended, and an opportunity for a hearing before the Fining Committee at a duly called meeting of said committee. The date and time of the hearing will be included in the notice. The alleged violator shall have a right to be represented by counsel and to cross examine witnesses. If the Fining Committee, by majority vote, does not approve a proposed fine, it may not be imposed. The role of the Fining Committee is limited to determining whether to confirm or reject the fine or suspension levied by the Board.

If the fine is confirmed by the Fining Committee, the Co-Op must provide written notice of such fine by mail or hand delivery to the property owner, and, if applicable, to any tenant, licensee, or invitee of the owner. No further notice or hearing shall be necessary to enable the Board to levy fines for an uncorrected violation or violations, or for recurring or continuing violations substantially similar to violations for which a hearing opportunity was previously provided and that occur within one (1) year of the last date a previous violation occurred or was ongoing.

#### **PAYMENT OF FINES:**

Fines shall be paid no later than five (5) days after notice of the imposition of the fine. In the event that the fine is not paid when due, the Co-Op may pursue legal action against the owner to recover the fine, as well as recover all legal fees incurred. Nothing in this policy shall be construed to require the Board of Directors to initiate fining against a violator. The Board has the authority to determine the most effective enforcement approach on a case-by-case basis in accordance with Article 12.1 of the Bylaws. This decision is solely within the discretion of the Board of Directors. Consideration may be given regarding the severity and frequency of the infraction in determining the appropriate level of enforcement action to be taken. In the event such other means are pursued, the Co-Op shall not be required to comply with the procedures and provisions of this policy. Additionally, notwithstanding the above, the Board may forego sending the first and second notices in situations where public safety is a concern or in other exigent circumstances, provided that Florida Law is followed prior to levying any fine or taking any legal action. This Compliance Policy was adopted by the Board of Directors on the 16th day of March, 2023 and is reflected in the minutes of the Association.

## What Is "Mail Chimp"?

Mail Chimp is the system that has been put into place that will allow the Office the ability to instantly communicate with ALL Tropic Isles residents---Co-op, Property Owners, and Homeowners, separately or all together. Mail Chimp requests must be given to the Office 48 hours in advance of when you want the Mail Chimp sent out. This is how it works:

When the system of communication was established in January of 2018, a database of all known email addresses was taken out of the Tropic Isles Directory and assembled. The "Mail Chimp" system has the ability to send messages to all, or any segment of Tropic Isles separately. This "Mail Chimp" program DOES NOT share email addresses with everyone. It DOES NOT allow the recipient to "Reply to all", and it also gives residents the option to **unsubscribe**, if desired. Your privacy will thus be protected.

#### What should you do?

Check the phone directory to be certain your email address is correct. If a correction is needed, or your email address is not in the directory, or you are a new resident of the park, or you have NOT been receiving email notices from the Office, see Robin in the Office to be included in the "Mail Chimp" email list. Not everyone has an email address, so if you know of a neighbor or friend who does not use email, please try to spread the message to them. This system WILL NOT replace notices that are legally required to be mailed out to all residents, but rather it is used as a quick method to keep as many residents as possible, updated on situations as they occur in the park that may affect them. This system came in very handy during hurricane season and for other events in the park (i.e. water or power shutoff, sewer testing, etc.), so make sure you get on the list for important information as it happens. **The Office asks for 48-hour notice to request a Mail Chimp to be sent out and only one per event.**

- 5. If the ramp has debris on it, please hose it off.

## **Friendly Reminders**

- IF YOU ARE LEAVING THE PARK, PLEASE PREPARE YOUR HOME FOR HURRICANE SEASON (June 1-November 30) BY REMOVING EVERYTHING IN YOUR YARD THAT COULD BECOME A MISSLE IN STRONG WINDS AND SECURING ANYTHING THAT YOU KEEP STORED IN YOUR CARPORT OR OUTSIDE OF YOUR HOME.
- That we encourage you to follow the "See something, say something, do something" slogan if you see someone not following the rules or trespassing in the park. Take a picture and report it to the Office AND call the Palmetto Police 941-721-2000 Ext. 4.
- If you have corrections or additions to make for the Resident Directory, please complete an Information Form with your information. A copy of the form can be found in the Office.
- ARC (Architectural Review Committee) approval is needed for any work that is done on the outside of your home, on your dock, or on your lot. ARC application forms are available in the Office and need to be completed to get placed on the ARC agenda. No work should begin on your project until your final approval letter from the Office is received.
- Make sure the Office has your email address to be included in the important Mail Chimp notices that go out to residents. You can email the Office at <a href="info@tropicisles.net">info@tropicisles.net</a> to make that request. Mail Chimp requests to make an announcement must be made 48 hours in advance and sent to <a href="info@tropicisles.net">info@tropicisles.net</a>.
- All residents of Tropic Isles Co-op (including private renters) are required to have a background check and be approved by the Co-Op. The Board unanimously approved instituting a \$250.00 penalty for any residents/tenants/renters who do not go through the approval process per the Rules and Regulations. The penalty will be posted to the owner's account.
- DO NOT feed stray cats or dogs. This attracts unwanted critters to the area. Our Rules and Regulations clearly state: 10.5 General
  - Residents are not permitted to leave food or water dishes outdoors. This includes bird feed.
- Remember that NO yard waste (grass clipping, branches, etc.) should end up in the canals or streets. Make sure your lawn service is aware of this as well.
- Avoid driving down the streets where demolition of homes is being done or new homes are being installed. Many nails, screws, and sharp metal pieces get left behind which could do damage to your tires. Residents on those streets can help by walking the street you live on and picking up the sharp metal items that get left behind. We all can do our part to help!
- That dog owners are EXPECTED to be responsible and pick up after your dog and dispose of their waste in the proper container.
   Dogs must be on a leash throughout the park and in control of the Resident or an authorized caregiver.



- Smokers, please do not use the streets, parking lots, or common grounds as your ashtray. Please dispose of your cigarette butts in the trash can.
- THE POOL IS OPEN 24/7, BUT PLEASE BE CONSIDERATE OF YOUR NEIGHBORS. QUIET HOURS ARE 10 PM TO 8:30 AM.
- If your activity changes the formation of the tables in the Yacht Club or Auditorium, you must return the tables to their original formation.

\*\*NOTE: As of 10/1/25, yard waste will NOT be accepted in plastic bags.

Yard waste must be set out in:

- Reusable containers (bins or cans)
- Tied bundles (no longer that 4 feet in length)
- Compostable kraft paper bags

Yard waste that is not properly prepared cannot be collected.


## **Grass Recycling Is Important**

Nutrients trapped in organic matter, such as grass clippings, leaves, and branches, can be re-released as pollutants when organic debris enters drainage areas, basin canals, and waterways. We all need to do our part to protect our waterways, and making sure to blow your grass clippings back onto your lawn is an important step. Please remind your lawn service to do the same. Thanks!







- That ALL ARC APPLICATIONS AND ACCOMPANYING PAPERWORK MUST BETURNED IN BYTUESDAYTHE WEEK BEFORE THE MEETING TO GET PLACED ON THE ARC AGENDA? PLEASE DO NOT SUBMIT YOUR APPLICATION ONLINE. Scan it and email it to the Office email at info@tropicisles.net OR bring it to the Office in person.
- That all ARC Guidelines for making any improvements/changes outside of your home or in your yard can be found in Appendix 2 (p. 24-42) in the current 2022 Rules and Regulations that you have received.
- That the purpose of the ARC Guidelines is to assist and guide Residents in the submittal of an application for a new Dwelling, remodeling of an existing Dwelling, and/or Unit/Lot improvements. ARC can be a resource to help the applicant get through this process as seamlessly as possible.

That pre-planning, along with an understanding of the requirements that apply to your ARC project, will help ensure a smooth process. In addition to these ARC guidelines, applicants should consult the Governing Documents which may contain additional information on applicable codes and ordinances of outside governing authorities (e.g., The City of Palmetto).


