Bulk item policy: Every residence receives one free bulk item pickup per year. Additional pickups are available for a fee. Call the city's Solid Waste Department to schedule a pickup at 941-723-4580.

**NOTE: As of 10/1/25, yard waste will NOT be accepted in plastic bags.

Yard waste must be set out in:

- Reusable containers (bins or cans)
- Tied bundles (no longer that 4 feet in length)
- Compostable kraft paper bags

Yard waste that is not properly prepared cannot be collected.

To dispose of electronics, paint, or chemicals call 941-748-5543 for disposal options.

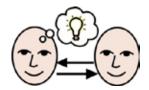

Cook's Corner



Ingredients:

1 loaf Italian bread
½ tsp garlic powder
½ cup butter, melted
1 ½ cup shredded mozzarella cheese

Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees.
- 2. Line a large baking sheet with parchment paper or foil and spray with Pam.
- 3. Cut the bread lengthwise and place both parts face up on the baking sheet.
- 4. Brush both pieces with melted butter.
- 5. Sprinkle with garlic powder. (If you don't like garlic, try a dry Ranch seasoning mix.)
- 6. Cover both pieces with aluminum foil and place in the oven.
- 7. Bake for 10-12 minutes.
- 8. Uncover the bread and top with cheese.
- 9. Place bread back in the oven for 2-4 more minutes to melt the cheese. Watch the bread while melting the cheese and remove from the oven as soon as it reaches the desired look.
- 10. Remove from the oven and place on a cutting board. Let cool for a few minutes.
- 11. Slice and serve.



Honor Flight – September 21, 2025

My name is Don Stroud. I want to tell you about the Honor Flight that I was indeed fortunate to be an invitee. First, I must tell you that the "Honor Flight", which air transports veterans to Washington, DC to visit the military memorials, was originated in Dayton, Ohio 50 years ago by a group of young men who flew 12 veterans in 6 single engine aircraft from the Wright Patterson AFB Aero Club. Today there are about 140 Honor Flight associations throughout the US offering commercial airline flights to vets.



I was so very fortunate to have been invited on the 50th anniversary flight, because the Air Force provided two of their newest transport aircraft (C-17s). They carried over 160 veterans with support volunteers for each vet, plus medical teams. We departed in the dark at 0630 and after a one-hour flight, we landed at Andrews AFB. My Support Guardian was Scott Martin.

We were loaded on six large buses and started our tour of our military monuments and memorials. I will not mention all the monuments, but suffice it to say, we saw lots of them. All of the memorials had special significance for everyone. In my particular case, the Vietnam Wall meant the most to me.

I had never seen the WWII Memorial before and I must say it is magnificent and a must see for all.





Most of the vets served during the Vietnam War, however, there were a few who served in Korea. One in particular was my friend, 93-year-old Sylvester (Syl) Kerstanski, who was a fellow volunteer at the Wright "B" Flyer organization near Dayton, Ohio.





We were also honored to have on our flight, Major General Mechenbier, a six-year POW at the Hanoi Hilton.

Our return flight turned out to be much later than expected, but you would not believe what we encountered upon entering the aircraft hangar late that evening.

There was a column of military personal all saluting us as we walked by and there were hundreds of people from the Dayton area greeting us

upon our return. All were shouting "Welcome home, welcome home". It was something I never heard when I returned from Vietnam. It was a day I'll never forget!

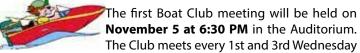

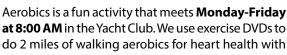

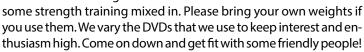

Zoom Etiquette



Zoom meetings are now a staple in our day-to-day lives. Reliable, easy-to-use video platforms like Zoom have helped to restore the ability to hold meetings during difficult times. The challenges and benefits of Zoom meetings can

be much different than in-person meetings. The advantage of virtual meetings is the ability to hold them almost anywhere and have more people participate from anywhere, but there are dos and don'ts associated with participating in a Zoom meeting.

ZOOM "BEST PRACTICES"

- 1. You should try to attend the meeting from a quiet area that has a neutral background.
- **2.** Eliminate distractions-- noises (dog barking, dishwasher, voices in the background, TV, etc.) and movement going on around you.
- **3.** Wear proper attire—not your pajamas or go shirtless.
- **4.** Avoid distracting behaviors—ironing, eating, moving around.
- **5.** Don't do private things— brush or floss your teeth, shave, etc. **REMEMBER: THE CAMERA SEES EVERYTHING AND EVERYONE ON ZOOM CAN SEE YOU.**

While we like to see everyone, you <u>do not</u> have to participate using video to attend a Zoom meeting. You <u>do not</u> have to have your camera on to see what is going on at the meeting either. Another option is to just cover up your camera lens at the top of the screen with a post-it note. If you choose to have your camera on, aim the camera 'straight' at your face (not from a position that looks up your nose) and try to follow the Zoom "best practices".

Just a reminder: In the chat portion of the Zoom meeting, remember to give your name and address when you ask your question. Questions can't be read without that information.

The Crows Are Back . . . Or Did They Ever Leave?

9 REALLY WEIRD CROW FACTS:

- 1. Crows living in suburban areas require only 10% of the nesting territory that crows living in the wilderness do.

- 3. They also will build fake nests to fool predators.

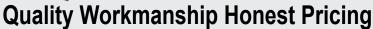

How much do you really know about manatees? Sure, they're cute, and Manatee County is named after them, but did you know manatees are smart?

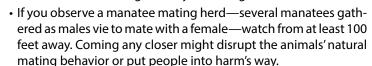


Did you know?

- that manatees are related to elephants?
- that fishermen back in the day used to think they were mermaids?
- that they're vegetarians?
- that they have their own state proclamation signed by the governor declaring that November is Manatee Awareness Month?
- that manatees—not dolphins-- are the state's official marine mammal?
- that they're defenseless against the cold, red tide, watercraft, and disruptions to their habitat?
- that they're endangered?
- that November is a critical time for manatees because that's when they start returning to warm-water winter refuges in Florida and many seasonal manatee protection zones go into effect.

Here are some tips to make sure that manatees stay safe, so the next generation of humans can be charmed and fascinated by them.

- Wear polarized sunglasses on the water to better see manatees in your path.
- Follow posted signs for slow-speed manatee protection zones.
- Keep your distance from manatees—never feed, chase, touch, or harass them.
- Stow trash and fishing line when underway.
 Marine debris that accidentally blows overboard can become ingested by or entangled around manatees.



Call 1-888-404-3922, *FWC, or #FWC on a cell phone, or use VHF Channel 16 on marine radios to report:

- A manatee with a pink or red (fresh) wound.
- · A dead manatee.
- A manatee tilting to one side, unable to submerge, having trouble breathing or acting strangely.
- A manatee calf by itself with no adults around for an extended time.
- Anyone harassing a manatee in any way.
- · Boaters speeding in a manatee zone.
- A manatee entangled in monofilament, crab-trap lines, or other debris. Do not attempt to remove debris by yourself. It may be embedded underneath the skin, and only a trained veterinarian can adequately assess and treat wounds.



There's something about a manatee that makes people smile. November through March, the gentle giants move inland to warmer water and fascinated fans can see them up close. Here are some places to do that:

- Manatee Viewing Center—Apollo Beach Tampa Electric draws water from Tampa Bay to cool its Big Bend power plant, returning the warm, clean discharge into the canal that becomes a manatee spa from November to April. With viewing walkways over 50 acres, it is also a federally designed sanctuary.
- Three Sisters Springs—Crystal River—This oasis frequently hosts 100 manatees at a time drawn by the constant 72-degree water. Accessible by canoe or kayak (rentals are available in town), the springs also feature a viewing boardwalk on a 57-acre preserve.
- **Blue Springs State Park**—Orange City-- The St. Johns River refuge has a population of manatees exceeding 300 during the coldest months. With public diving, canoeing, and swimming prohibited between November and March, the manatees have room to frolic and visitors have unobstructed views.

Safety Tip of the Month ---



With a growing number of older adults living independently, it's increasingly important to make sure that they're safe at home. Falls, burns, and poisonings are among the most common accidents involving

older people. Older adults who live alone may also become the victims of criminals who target older people. If you're an older adult living on your own, or care for an older person living alone, here's what you need to do to stay safe.

Keep emergency numbers handy

Always keep a list of emergency numbers by each phone. Write this information in large enough print that you can read it easily if you are in a hurry or frightened. Be sure to list numbers for:

- 911
- Poison Control: 1-800-222-1222
- Family member or friend to call in case of emergency
- Healthcare provider's office

Prevent falls

- If you have difficulty with walking or balance, or have fallen in the past year, talk to your healthcare provider about having a special falls risk assessment.
- Ask your provider if you would benefit from an exercise program to prevent falls.
- If you have fallen before, or are scared of falling, think about buying a special alarm that you wear as a bracelet or necklace. Then, if you fall and can't get to the phone, you can push a button on the alarm that will call emergency services for you.
- Don't rush to answer the phone. Many people fall trying to answer the phone. Either carry a cordless or cell phone, or let an answering machine pick up.
- When walking on smooth floors, wear non-slip footwear, such as slippers with rubber/no-slip bottoms or flat, thin-soled shoes that fit well.
- If you have a cane or a walker, use it at all times instead of holding onto walls and furniture.

Rule of the Month HAVE YOU READ YOUR RULES LATELY?

This is a reminder that the Rules and Regulations are in effect and being enforced. All residents and their guests are expected to know and abide by these rules. If you need of a copy of the current Rules and Regulations, you may go to www.tropicisles.net to view or print a copy online.

3.2 Unit/Lot Numbers

All residents shall post three-inch (3") Unit/Lot numbers on their Dwelling facing the street, at the corner of the Dwelling closest to the carport or driveway, and according to local ordinances.

3.10 Grills, Fire Pits, Other Flammable Appliances

- Grills, fire pits, or other open flame appliances using firewood are permitted.
- Open flames are NOT permitted within or under carports or covered patios.
- Outdoor gas or electric grills and appliances used for cooking are permitted and must be used according to manufacturer's specifications.

6.3 Use of Equipment

- All chairs, tables, or any other equipment in the Yacht Club and the Auditorium are to remain in their respective buildings, unless approved by Management.
- After use of any such equipment, the person making the use thereof, shall promptly restore and replace the same items to their original position.
- The Association will NOT loan out chairs, tables, or any other equipment without prior approval from Management.

 Children under the age of eighteen (18) are NOT permitted in the Yacht Club fitness center, library, or billiards room unless accompanied by a Resident/Guest adult.

9.4 Resident's Responsibility

- Guests are entirely (financially and legally) the responsibility of their host Resident and must comply with all of the Association's Rules and Regulations.
- Residents will be responsible for violations or damage caused by their Guests, regardless of whether or not they are present at the time of the violation or damage.
- All Guests under the age of eighteen (18) must be accompanied by an adult to use any of the recreational facilities in the Yacht Club or Auditorium.
- Consideration for the rights of others is encouraged and common courtesy is expected.

12.2 <u>Unacceptable Conduct</u>

- Disorderly conduct, public intoxication, and profane language by Residents or Guests constituting a disturbance or public nuisance to other Residents will not be tolerated.
- A Resident will not interfere with another Resident's quiet and peaceful enjoyment of their Dwelling and Unit/Lot.
- An act which endangers life, health, safety, property, or peaceful enjoyment of the Community or its Residents is a violation of these Rules and Regulations and the Governing Documents of the Association. The Association can take prompt action and use all the remedies available under the Association's Governing Documents and FL statutes.
- Residents should call the Palmetto Police Department (941-721-2000) at the time of the offense to report any violations of the law or City ordinances.

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Marina Store Upgrades — Exciting News!

Great news for everyone who enjoys spending time at the Marina. Some exciting upgrades are underway at our marina store!

First off, a big "thank you" goes out to the Board and to Bobbie for recognizing the importance of our fuel, bait, and tackle store. Their support and dedication help to keep this part of our community thriving.

Starting in late October or early November, we'll be seeing a brand-new commercial fuel dock installed. No more replacing the EZ dock floats every couple of years. This new system is built to last, likely for the lifetime of most of our residents!

Our fuel dispenser, which was badly damaged during last year's hurricane, will also be replaced with a commercial-grade unit. It'll sit about three feet above the concrete base for extra protection against high water, and a protective cage will be built around it to shield it from flying debris during storms.



You might have noticed the new bubbler system on the water side of the ramp. This handy addition helps prevent floating seagrass from piling up when

the west winds blow in, making the ramp safer and easier to use when launching or retrieving boats.

For a special touch, check out the beautiful antique anchor now on display! A big thanks to Dean Brown for providing it! The anchor dates back to the mid-to-late



1800s and was carefully restored by Dean's neighbor, John Olsen, to bring back some of its original charm.

Thanks to everyone involved in making these improvements happen. Our marina just keeps getting better, and it's all thanks to the teamwork, pride, and care that make Tropic Isles such a wonderful place to live.

Calling All Kayakers!

Last year at this time, we were surrounded by water, but we could not launch our boats. Our launch was sitting in the Auditorium parking lot as a result of the flood waters of Helene on September 28th! But TI persevered and on December 3rd, the launch was slowly moved by Tom, using the TI tractor, and John Partridge's dolly to the Marina along with a group of volunteers. The launch was slowly lowered down the ramp and was once again afloat!



Thankfully our launch is still in its place behind the Auditorium and we can again enjoy all that kayaking that our water paradise provides:

- Our water is mostly shallow for our novices. (If you tip over, you can usually stand up!)
- We have the mangroves nearby to shelter us on windy days.
- Terra Ceia Bay is full of marine wildlife.
- The canals in our park beg to be explored.
- Our beloved Bird Island is our gateway to bird watching.
- Emerson Point is just down the road by car or by boat!

Kayak storage is available behind the Auditorium and can be arranged with the Office. The charge is \$75 for a top rack and \$100 for a bottom rack for a year agreement. We have not had a lot of theft, but it can happen. Be sure to secure your kayak to the rack with cable locks.

There is a sign at the launch giving directions how to use the launch and about signing out. If someone is signed out (meaning they are on the water), the ramp is left down to provide easy egress from the water. Once everyone is back and out of the water, the rope under the ramp should be tightened so as to keep the ramp out of the water. At the north side of the launch area there is a place to put your kayak and hose it off before placing it back on the rack.

Of course, being a TI resident means you can kayak whenever you want, but consider going out with other TI residents every Wednesday morning. It takes a while to get everyone in the water, so plan to be ready to launch at 9 AM and we all gather in the lee of Bird Island at 9:30. I maintain a list of interested "yakkers" and usually put out a comment on Tuesday about weather conditions. We have had groups of twenty plus and some days where I am the only one on the water due to tide issues. Cleanup of Hurricane Debris by Kayaks

If you know anything about kayaks, they are not BIG boats. They are designed to get you smoothly through the water. They are not barges. We soon learned that kayaks are soon overwhelmed AND we didn't have a place to unload the trash. Thankfully, Terry Foley provided the muscle to pull and lift the trash off our boats. We then manhandled the trash to the huge pile by the Auditorium.

Weeks later a full group of volunteers from Tropic Isles and Suncoast Waterkeepers launched a massive cleanup. Two dumpsters were filled with siding, roofs, and insulation. It was amazing to see how much debris was sitting in our waterways and I do believe there are still two planters and a bench in the shallows off Terra Ceia Drive!











Kayak Launch Use Reminders



If you are using the Tropic Isles' kayak launch, please make sure to do the following:

- 1. Read the directions if you are not sure how to use the launch.
- 2. Make sure you sign out and erase your name when you return.
- 3. When you lower the ramp, do not undo both ends of the rope. Undo one side, lower the ramp, and then cleat it off.
- 4. If no one else is signed out when you return, please lift the ramp out of the water.
- If the ramp has debris on it, please hose it off.Your help in taking good care of our launch is appreciated.



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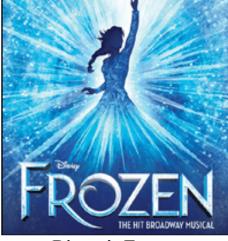
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Friendly Reminders



That we encourage you to follow the "See something, say something, do something" slogan if you see someone not following the rules or trespassing

in the park. Take a picture and report it to the Office AND call the Palmetto Police 941-721-2000 Ext. 4.

- If you have corrections or additions to make for the Resident Directory, please complete an Information Form with your information. A copy of the form can be picked up in the Office.
- ARC (Architectural Review Committee) approval is needed for any work that is done on the outside of your home, on your dock, or on your lot. ARC application forms are available in the Office and need to be completed to get placed on the ARC agenda. No work should begin on your project until your final approval letter from the Office is received. An ARC application can be picked up in the Office.
- Make sure the Office has your email address to be included in the important Mail Chimp notices that go out to residents. You can email the Office at info@tropicisles.net to make that request. Mail Chimp requests to make an announcement must be made 48 hours in advance and sent to info@tropicisles.net.
- All residents of Tropic Isles Co-op (including private renters) are required to have a background check and be approved by the Co-Op. The Board unanimously approved instituting a \$250.00 penalty for any residents/tenants/renters who do not go through the approval process per the Rules and Regulations. The penalty will be posted to the owner's account.
- DO NOT feed stray cats or dogs. This attracts unwanted critters to the area. Our Rules and Regulations clearly state: 10.5 General

Residents are not permitted to leave food or water dishes outdoors. This includes bird feed.

- Remember that NO yard waste (grass clipping, branches, etc.) should end up in the canals or streets. Please notify your lawn care service of this as well.
- Avoid driving down the streets where demolition of homes is being done or new homes are being installed. Many nails, screws, and sharp metal pieces get left behind which could do damage to your tires. Residents on those streets can help by walking the street you live on and picking up the sharp metal items that get left behind. We all can do our part to help!



- That dog owners are EXPECTED to be responsible and pick up after your dog EVERYWHERE and dispose of their waste in the proper container. Dogs must be on a leash throughout the park and in the control of the Resident or an authorized caregiver at all times.
- Smokers, please do not use the streets, parking lots, or common grounds as

your ashtray. Please dispose of your cigarette butts in the trash can.

• THE POOL IS OPEN 24/7, BUT PLEASE BE CONSIDERATE OF YOUR NEIGHBORS. OUIET HOURS ARE 10 PM TO 8:30 AM.

- If your activity changes the formation of the tables in the Yacht Club or Auditorium, you must return the tables to their original formation.

Grass Recycling Is Important



We want to take a moment to remind you to practice "grass recycling" when your lawn gets mowed. Grass recycling (or mulching) means leaving clippings on your lawn. This

helps to make sure grass clippings do not blow into bodies of water or onto surfaces such as driveways, sidewalks, or street curbs, where they will eventually end up in the canals during rain events. Nutrients trapped in organic matter, such as grass clippings, leaves, and branches, can be re-released as pollutants when organic debris enters drainage areas, basin canals, and waterways. We all need to do our part to protect our waterways, and making sure to blow your grass clippings back onto your lawn is an important step. Please remind your lawn service to do the same. Thanks!

If you have items that you would like to donate, there are many thrift stores in Palmetto and Bradenton that accept donations, besides your church or homeless shelters.

NOTE: The Treasure House at 21 Flores is no longer accepting any type of donations. The Community Sale Program has been discontinued. The house belongs to the Co-op and is being used as a storage facility.

Thinking of Installing a New Home?



Anyone wishing to install a new home must complete an ARC application and should stop in the Office to pick up a copy of the Requirements for New Home Installation.

Architectural Review Committee (ARC) Procedure

ARC approval is needed for **ANY** improvements that happen outside—on your home, dock, or lot. The ARC procedure is as follows:

- 1. ARC application forms are available in the Office and on the website www.tropicisles.net. Fill out an ARC application and submit it to the office. Make sure to include diagrams, drawings, or photos as needed. If possible, please show the neighbor's homes and the distance from each. Include the labels N, S, E, and W directions on your diagrams.
- 2. All applications must be logged in at the Office and assigned a date for review by the ARC Committee or 3-COR.
- 3. The ARC approval process begins with a preliminary review by a 3-person team, referred to as 3-COR. Simple improvements and replacement issues may be approved by this group and not require a review by the full ARC committee.
- 4. The ARC Committee needs a week to review the application and go to the lot before the next meeting date. If there is not enough time to do this, you will have to wait for a future date.
- 5. You will be notified when your request is placed on the agenda for an ARC meeting. 3-COR Meetings are usually held the first and third Wednesday of the month at 9:30 AM in the Auditorium. ARC Meetings are held on an "as-needed" basis and are announced via Mailchimp in October. You are encouraged to attend the meeting.
- 6. After the meeting, you will be notified, by phone or in writing, as to whether your request is approved or denied.
- 7. If denied, you can appeal the decision to the Board of Directors, if you so choose.
- 8. To obtain a permit from the City, you must first receive the Architectural Review Application <u>approval</u>, signed by the ARC committee and the Manager.
- 9. You must also provide a copy of all required permits to the Office.
- 10. BOTH THE ARC APPLICATION AND THE CITY PERMIT NEED TO BE POSTED ON THE FRONT OF THE HOME BEFORE THE WORK CAN BEGIN.
- 11. NO WORK should begin on your project until your final approval letter from the Office is received. If you fail to get ARC approval for your project before you begin, you may be asked to deconstruct it and/or a fine of \$250 can be imposed. Contact Steve Tourtilotte at 860-682-7656 with any questions you may have.
