Allison

For sure, many people in the car hobby have had a desire to find a previous car that they owned and sold or an elusive car. I think the first car I searched for was a 1948 Pontiac Silver Streak. I was the third owner and purchased it in 1962. It was a 6-cylinder with 4-speed Hydramatic trans and was in good shape because the two previous owners did not drive it on the snow in Iowa. I drove it for three years and blew the engine while hunting mushrooms in Illinois. A friend of mine had a 1948 Pontiac that belonged to his mom, and she was involved in a wreck. The car had 28,000 miles, so I bought the engine & trans and my friend installed them in my car. I went to pick up my car, and my friend said, "come check out my basement". What a sight - a restored Franklin – the first Franklin I had ever seen! After drooling over the car, I asked why don't you drive it? He handed me a tape measure and we measured the Franklin-then we measured the doorway which was 4" narrower than the car. In addition, he had forgotten to measure the height of basement floor to house floor BEFORE starting the Franklin restoration! I had to sell the Pontiac in 1971 and have never been able to find it again.

Because we own a 1937 Dictator Custom Coupe and previously owned two Skytops, a 1962 from Bruce Sandburg and a 1961 4-door which MAY have been a factory demonstrator, I have always been interested in finding out more about the 1937 4-door sedan with a Skytop-Moonroof. I have seen a picture of this car, but never able to find any more info.

Another car I was interested in was the Studebaker factory built 1953 Commander convertible (later converted to 1954 by Studebaker). I met Bob Temple who worked on that car and drew the cut-a-way picture that was later published in Cars & Parts. I was able to trace that car from 1953 to the mid 60's, but nothing after that.

I had a color picture of the Futuristic 1957 Packard Predictor and traced that car to a Duesenberg Collection owned by Homer Fritterling in South Bend. My wife and I liked 1957-58 Packards a lot and were collecting parts to build one with factory air conditioning around 1995.

The Cab Over Engine (COE) trucks built by Studebaker in the 1930's are the most beautiful trucks ever built, so when I heard thru the Studebaker Grapevine that there was an early 50's COE I was on the hunt! This search eventually led me back to Bob Temple. That truck was produced and driven in the back alleyways (for secrecy) of South Bend by Bob and then discarded to the swamp at the back of The Proving Grounds. Bob made the one-off grille which resembled the Trailer Toter trucks and Bob thinks the grille was cut up and trashed after the "cob-job" project was abandoned.

I had a brief racing career in 1962-63 when I and my best friend, Armand, owned a 1955 Chevy 150 C Gasser. The people building this car ran out of \$ and went to their friend who owned a jewelry store for help. The car got built with a 421 Pontiac bored to 440 cubic inches-tri power and Iskederian 550 Super Leguera roller cam. My Dad bought the belly-up jewelry store for 3 cents on the dollar, and Armand and I bought the car. I told my mom that it was my dad's fault that I had the car, but she did not buy that story! So now you know I was hooked on racing. Over the years I have heard many stories about Green Monster cars. Art Arfons and his half-brother Walt built the first Green Monster on a 3-wheeled chassis powered by a 6-cyl Oldsmobile and painted with left over green tractor paint and went 85 mph. My wife and I loved green tractor paint, especially John Deere because my father-in-law, who was born in 1904, bought a new 1937 John Deere for the family farm in Indiana. That tractor was in our family for 86 years, but recently went to a new home.

Back to the story. By now Art and Walt had a terminal case of race ITIS, so in 1953 they built Green Monster 2. It was 20 feet long, had six wheels and was powered by a 12-cylinder Allison aircraft engine which enabled it to hit 100 mph in the quarter mile!

Art's Mom painted the car to resemble the WW2 Curtis P40 Flying Tiger fighter plane with open mouth showing teeth. The Allison had so much power that it could shred the rear tires, so a new 4-wheel rear design was added. Top speed was estimated at 270 mph!

Lee Pendleton bought the Green Monster from the Arfons family in 1957 and later sold it to Charlie Hall. Yes, the renowned car restorer Charlie Hall who lived on Kleindale in Tucson, AZ. Charlie restored the Green Monster, drove it one time and had a wreck, so he parked it in his yard on Kleindale under a tarp for 38 years. Fast forward to April 20, 2024. There were three car happenings that day. One at Tucson Raceway Dragstrip, one in Sahuarita (next to us) at Steve and Bob Lanz and then ASC-ASC had an event in Buckeye. ASC-ASC had slowly been going down, so Mimi Halgren (national ASC President) wanted us to get it going again. Ed and Linda Smith and Joe and Glinda Bailey spear headed the revival and Maria Grainger came up with The Tin Lizzie Ranch in Buckeye, so off we went to that. Our neighbors are serious racers and drive two rails and have two enclosed trailers to haul them in. As we were getting ready to go to Buckeye I spotted Bobby (neighbor) in his driveway, so I popped over for a quick chat. (Nora says there is NO such thing as a guick chat with Fred). I asked Bobby if they had heard about Paula Murphey (fastest woman in the world) dying at age 95? Years ago, I wrote an article about Paula and her friend Barbara Nieland who worked for Andy Granatelli (MR 500) to drive Studebakers in 1962-63. You may remember Andy and his brother Vince who owned a speed shop in Santa Monica, Calif had been hired by Studebaker to run Studebaker's High Performance Project. According to the scuttlebutt that I heard, Andy told the two women to drive as fast as they could -set as many Land Speed records in Studebakers as they could - but if either of them ran faster than Andy they would be FIRED! Bobby (you remember my neighbor) said he had something to show me and opened the car trailer. Inside was the ALLISON GREEN MONSTER! Now owned by a man in Rio Rico who cannot drive, so he asked his friends to drive and show it at Tucson Raceway! Now back to Charlie Hall.

Charlie was the most talented man I ever met. He loved to play his piano, which I think came from his mom. Charlie's shop was on ground level and he lived on the second floor. At one point in time he became unhappy with the sound of the piano and after lots of thinking decided that the floor was the culprit, so he installed tongue and groove oak flooring so that the piano would sound correct. Also, he could expertly repair pot metal. We had several Morris Minors, and with our son doing most of the work, we redid three of them. A 1961 1/4-ton pickup, 1958 4-door sedan w/external sun visor and spats (fender skirts), and a 1961 Traveler (Woody Wagon). We had the Purple P/U with five foot long flames for 47 years and it had about 300,000 miles (five engines) when we sold it. A very sad day.

Morris Minors and many other British cars have external hinges on the bonnet (hood) and boot (trunk) which have been broken by careless people, so when Charlie repaired them he would reinforce them. I think Bruce Sandburg introduced us to Charlie.

The 1961 P/U was bought new in 1959 by Foreign Car Sales and Service in Automobile Row on N. Stone near J & B Motors, the Studebaker Dealer. Foreign Car Sales & Service was owned by Jack Rowe and later on moved to Speedway and became Precision Motors. Jack could not sell the P/U, probably because Americans did not want a truck the size of a shoe box. So, they used the P/U as a shop truck for two years. Then they convinced MVD that the P/U was still new and got a 1961 title for it. With the new title came a plastic tag saying 1961 which was attached to the fire wall by the serial number. We bought it in 1971 and went to meet Jack Rowe. He was so excited to see it. Back then foreign cars were covered in Cosmoline® grease to protect them from rust. We met the man who worked for Jack Rowe removing the grease. He also remembered the truck but with mixed feelings!

Jim drove to Deming, New Mexico where we stopped for a late breakfast then I took the wheel for the scenic back roads with an overnight stop in Las Vegas, New Mexico at the historic Plaza Hotel. 
