


Message from Our President:

From the Editors:



(While PM Compares Six Cool Compacts in Depth)

Popular Mechanics Car Compare Original article by Jim Whipple

The Popular Mechanics Magazine, January 1964, compares several cars including a Studebaker. The cover of the magazine peaks your interest stating "PM Compares Six Cool Compacts in Depth". The article was written by Jim Whipple. The words here are based on that article, edited by Bob Miles to focus on Studebaker, and augmented by Larry Northington. The cars were: the Chevrolet Chevelle, Ford Falcon, Plymouth Valiant, Studebaker Commander, Pontiac Tempest, and Rambler American. The magazine evaluated these cars based on criteria such as performance, handling, and comfort.

The Chevrolet Chevelle and Pontiac Tempest were new contenders for the 1964 model year, featuring a "senior compact" or intermediate size. The Tempest was essentially a re-badged version of the Chevelle.

The Ford Falcon was a solid, middle-of-the-road entry in the compact class. The magazine had previously conducted a long-term test on a 1960 Falcon.

The Plymouth Valiant was praised for its roominess and economy, although it was often criticized for its distinct, unconventional styling.

The Studebaker Commander was noted for its unique body-on-frame construction and classic styling. The Commander was an aging model, and the company was in financial trouble.

The Rambler American was another economical and well-built compact car, with a reputation for solid unit-body construction and practical design.

This on the spot road comparison made on the road racing course at Lime Rock, Connecticut and on hilly highways. All cars were six-cylinder automatics except the Chevelle as the six was not available. Because it is well-nigh impossible so early in the year to get six 1964 models which match closely in terms of engines, horsepower, transmissions and axle ratios, we don't pretend the comparison is perfect. This doesn't make the test results any less valid. But keep in mind that weight and horsepower of the six cars varied widely. The 195-hp Chevelle weighed 3155 pounds; the 145hp Valiant 2888; the 112 hp Studebaker Commander 2955 the 101 hp Falcon 2596; the 140 hp Tempest 3139 and the 138 hp Rambler American 2788.

Fuel economy

Tests that involved metered steady speed mileage at 40 and 60 mph. Over the road mileages were computed in a 57 miles tank mileage highway run in a convoy, all the cars running the same speeds at a given time. Studebaker was last place with 17 mpg with the Tempest at 22.9 mpg.

6-cylinder automatic transmission disk brakes with power booster, manual steering

At 55 or 60 mph, there's a little wind buffeting from an open window in a Commander. But when the window is buttoned up, most of the noise cuts off.

The feel of the power front disk brakes is one of the nicest we've experienced. on the medium to good blacktop road, the first impression is that the ride is a bit busy, but the body seems pretty solid. The seat to pedal location isn't too great for a long-legged person.

The instrument panel is one of the best in the group. It might be that very short people will find the steering wheel a bit intrusive; it cuts through the cluster and up into the windshield.

The ride impression is somewhat busy, although this frame is bolted tightly to the body leaving little rubber hysteresis to soak up the vibration. Windows are nice and high, and you get a good view of all the corners of the car.

The seat is comfortably upholstered, but there's no thigh support and a six footer's knee angle is a little too acute.

The engine has adequate power, but that's about all. Its economy should be more impressive to match its moderate output. Passing performance is nie with the kickdown into intermediate carrying you to an indicated 58 miles per hour.

Entry is commendable on this sedan. Doors are high and floor sills are flat at the edges. The hump is unobtrusive.

Among the car's strong point's are its roomy body, and truly excellent vision. It's like riding in a wide-open solarium, yet there's little "baking" from the lack of protective overhang. There's a good deal of seat room in the rear.

Editor's note: In the same issue Popular Mechanics published the comparison's in production between 1962 and 1963 models. in 1962 with two models, Studebaker had 94,731 produced between two models. In 1963 Studebaker production was 76,145 between three models, a 19% drop in production. Studebaker has at the end of the 1963 model year 1.04 % of total automotive production. This article was written but not published before the announcement that production would end in South Bend on December 20,1963 RMM


