PRAYER: Forgiving God, give us release from those things that wear us out. Help us to rest secure in your promise of forgiveness. Amen.

ACTION: Release forgiveness to someone – you know who – and ask for it in return.

There's a fancy phrase out there called the "Wesley Quadrilateral." It simply means the four ways in which the founder of Methodism taught believers to approach learning about our faith. These four things are: scripture, tradition, reason, and experience. When used together, these four pieces do amazing work in helping us to live out our faith! **PRAYER:** Loving God, help us to grow in grace and knowledge as we seek to live lives that honor You. Give us wisdom and discernment to navigate the complexities of our faith, and fill us with Your peace and patience. May our lives reflect Your love and justice, bringing glory to Your name. Amen.
