THE PEDRO BALLESTER AWARD - 2025

Pedro Ballester was born in Manchester on 22 May 1996 to Spanish parents and grew up in Yorkshire, excelling academically and being noted for his cheerful, sociable character. Deeply devout, he committed himself to a life of spiritual service in Opus Dei. He earned a place studying Chemical Engineering at Imperial College London in 2014, but was diagnosed with advanced pelvic cancer that December, which cut short his studies. For three years he underwent treatment (first in Manchester, then briefly in Germany) and maintained remarkable faith and kindness. Pedro passed away on 13 January 2018, surrounded by loved ones, and was later awarded a posthumous master's

degree by the University of Manchester. The Cedars has a strong connection with Pedro for he volunteered in 2016 at the school, and his life has inspired many young people. He is currently being considered for sainthood.

The Pedro Ballester award is the most prestigious Cedar's award. It celebrates the efforts in service and charitable contributions of our pupils. The 2025 edition goes to Dominic Prescott for his great contribution to Aid to the Church in Need, and his service to the school community.
