

CATHOLIC Q & A

QUESTION: What is the meaning behind Palm Sunday?

ANSWER: This is one of those days where the less I say, the better. And there is a very specific reason for this, worth pondering.

On Palm Sunday, as we enter this holiest week of the year, explanations must necessarily fail. The Divine Worship Missal provides an introduction to the whole week, if you will, in this prayer said just before the blessing of the palms:

"Assist us mercifully with thy help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby thou hast given unto us life and immortality."

Contemplation, the prayer says. We do not contemplate simple arithmetical formulas. We do not contemplate sentences that have obvious straightforward translations. We contemplate mysteries: the mysteries of life and love—and God, who *is* life and love.

So let us put it like this. We may want easy answers. We may want explanations that make everything clear. Such things are not available to us this week. This is not the week of black and white, of simple questions and answers; this is the week of death and passion and resurrection.

It is a story. It is a story to end all stories and define all stories. But ultimately, it is a story that we have to confront. We cannot avoid it. We cannot avoid it by acting as if it didn't happen. Nor can we avoid it by seeking to justify it or explain it by this or that simplification. There is, in other words, no story behind the story.

We humans are very good at that—at trying to say, here is really what is happening. And this is good and useful and important as Christians work out their salvation with fear and trembling, as we try to understand what we believe, but there really is no substitute for the story itself, for the encounter. By asking us to walk through these events, over and over again, each Holy Week, the Catholic Church is insisting, in a way, that the defining story of our existence is not something that can be quantified or explained by philosophical proposition or a chemical formula or any other natural this-worldly thing.

It has to be lived. It has to be felt. It is not merely intellectual ideas, or abstract calculations of grace and merit. It is this story of Jesus and his betrayal and death.

How will we respond to this story? How will we find our own lives in it? There's no substitute, no way out. If we want to know the peace and joy that Jesus offers, we have to follow him where he goes. That is what Palm Sunday, and the rest of this week, is all about.

SEMINARIAN'S COLUMN

Dear St Joseph Parish,

As Holy Week draws near, my focus becomes set on the Sacred Paschal Triduum. The Sacred Triduum emphasizes the moments that occur directly before, during and after the passion of Christ. This liturgy leads us through Christ's journey to the cross, whereby we fully enter the greatest event in history. Recognizing that there are many elements that go into the three-day liturgy, I wanted to supply our parish with information that can help everyone to plug into this most profound celebration of Christ work of redemption.

The Triduum begins with Holy Thursday. In the readings we will hear Paul remind us of the institution of the Eucharist at the Last Supper. At the end of the Holy Thursday Mass, we will process around the church with the Eucharist and adore the Blessed Sacrament deep into the night. Then the Gospel reading is of Jesus washing the feet of the apostles. The washing of the feet ought to bring our attention to the fact that Jesus washed the feet of all the apostles, including those of Judas Iscariot. Jesus loves without conditions and thus Holy Thursday emphasizes fraternal love, loving our neighbor without conditions.

Good Friday is the one day of the year that Mass is not celebrated; therefore, the Eucharist is not consecrated on this day (however, the Eucharist will be distributed). On this day, we will hear the Passion narrative according to the Gospel of John, whereby, three lectors will alternate reading the passage. Following the homily, we will have solemn intercessions. This will be different from what we normally see at Mass. On Good Friday, we pray for...everyone! Finally, right before we receive Communion, we will adore the Cross. The Cross will be unveiled, and we will then reverence it one person at a time. On this night, when Good Friday concludes, we are to observe silence as we depart from the Church.

Lastly, the Easter Vigil is the pinnacle, the climax, the greatest celebration in human history and this is not hyperbole. In fact, I have deeply understated this most sacred and treasured night. On this day we experience liturgy like no other day of the year. On this night, we fully initiate new members into the Catholic Church, where they will become sons and daughters of the Father. We enter the church in darkness but leave the church with the radiating light of heaven. It is on this night that Christ defeats death and invites us to enter the banquet feast of eternal life. It is because of this night that we have the Catholic Church. The Church whose desire is to spread The Word throughout the world so that all might intimately live with the Father, and the Son and the Holy Spirit forever.

I pray that the entire church would attend the Triduum liturgy and witness the glory, power, and compassion of God. May God bless us and draw us ever closer to Him,

HOLY WEEK is the most significant week in Catholicism. Spanning from Palm Sunday to Holy Saturday, it marks the final stretch before Easter Sunday, the celebration of Jesus' Resurrection. During this sacred week Catholics pray and reflect on the profound journey of Jesus' suffering, sacrifice, and victory over death. It starts on Palm Sunday, a day that commemorates Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. Holy Thursday celebrates the Last Supper and the institution of the Eucharist while Good Friday reflects on Jesus' death by crucifixion. Throughout this week, Catholics reflect on the emotional intensity of Jesus' Passion, contemplate His boundless love and mercy, and anticipate the joyous hope of His Resurrection. An intentional Holy Week can serve as a spiritual pilgrimage that deepens our faith.

What is Holy Thursday? Holy Thursday is the first day of the Easter Triduum, the most sacred days of the Catholic faith. It begins with the Mass of the Lord's Supper, commemorating the Last Supper celebrated by Jesus and his disciples on the Jewish holiday of Passover. It's not a Holy Day of Obligation, but many Catholics attend Mass. During this Mass, the priest washes the feet of some members of the parish in memory of Jesus washing the feet of his disciples. It was during the Last Supper that Jesus taught his disciples that the Eucharist is truly His Body and Blood. Jesus' disciples were the first Catholic priests. So during the Last Supper, he taught them the importance of the Eucharist, and why priests celebrate Jesus' sacrifice during every Mass. Because of this, the Last Supper is also significant because it was the beginning of the priesthood.

How to Observe Holy Thursday There are many traditions that surround Holy Thursday. Some people use it as a day to go on a local pilgrimage and visit as many churches in their area as they can. Walk around and observe the beauty and symbolism found in each



church, then take some time to pray for our priests. Holy Thursday is a celebration of the institution of the Eucharist, so it's a great day to spend some time in Adoration. It's also highly recommended to attend the Mass of the Last Supper held in the evening.

A Prayer for Holy Thursday Jesus, In these last few days leading up to Easter, as I recall your passion and death, let me remember that, above all, I am called to feed your sheep. You have given me a model of how to live; may I strive to be all that you created me for, spreading the love of God and the truth of our Catholic faith wherever I am able. You are the way, the truth, and the life. Amen.



Why is it called Good Friday? Good Friday commemorates the day Jesus died and saved us from our sins. His death and Resurrection on Easter is the most important event, which is why it's called "good.". On this day Catholics fast and remember the suffering of Jesus when he died on the cross. It's the only day of the year in which Catholic Mass is not celebrated. Instead many Catholic Churches have a Stations of the Cross prayer service, as well as a Veneration of the Cross service. It's traditionally a day of solemn prayer. How to Observe Good Friday Maintain an element of silence throughout Good Friday. Don't listen to music in the car and turn off distractions. Work to intentionally make it a day of quiet and reflection. Move a crucifix to a place of prominence in your home. The hours of noon until three in the afternoon are especially solemn, as this was the time of Jesus' crucifixion. Attend a Veneration of the Cross service or Stations of the Cross prayer service during this time. And read the Passion accounts in the Gospel (or watch a movie adaptation) to reflect on the agony of Jesus' sacrifice for all of us.

A Prayer for Good Friday Jesus, No one knows change better than you. You died on the cross, and three days later you rose from the dead. Forty days later you ascended into heaven and left the world transformed for the rest of time. Help me to transform my soul, to die to sin and death and be reborn in your love and eternal life. Amen.

How to Observe Holy Saturday While there is no Mass offered until the Easter Vigil, many churches host a short prayer service in the morning. This is an opportunity to read the Morning Prayer together as a group. If you have not yet received the Sacrament of Reconciliation during Holy Week this is a good time to go. Most churches spend the afternoon preparing for the Easter Vigil so you can volunteer to help with set up as well! Holy Saturday is typically a day of preparation for Easter Sunday. Families can dye Easter eggs, a symbol of new life, in preparation for the celebration of new life in the Resurrection. A Prayer for Holy Saturday Jesus, You are courage incarnate. As you hung on the cross for my sins and the sins of the world, you showed me that all things are possible. You knew that life did not end on the cross. It was only the beginning of a new and glorious eternal life. Amen.
