

QUESTION:

Where did the feast of Divine Mercy come from?

ANSWER:

If you were born well before the year 2000, you know the feast of Divine Mercy has not always been celebrated in the Church. In the early 1900s, a young Polish nun began receiving private revelations. Jesus appeared to her during her times of prayer, speaking a message of mercy and love for the world. She received a set of prayers — the Divine Mercy Chaplet — and the request to have a feast day established to remind the Church of the mercy of God. St. Faustina died in 1938, on the cusp of war and in the midst of one of the most violent centuries in the history of the world.

Her story and her diaries began circulating in Poland and beyond. It quickly became apparent that this was a holy young women, and the cause for her canonization opened. In the year 2000, she was canonized by the first-ever Polish pope, St. John Paul II. On her canonization day, he established the second Sunday of Easter as Divine Mercy Sunday, "a perennial invitation to the Christian world to face, with confidence in divine benevolence, the difficulties and trials that mankind with experience in the years to come."

PASTOR'S COLUMN

Dear Parish Family,

Allow me to extend my gratitude and appreciation to all those who made the liturgies of the Triduum and Easter Sunday so beautiful. I am grateful to our parish staff, musicians, catechists, altar servers, and other volunteers. I will not forget the Holy Week 2024 anytime soon; it was powerful and moving. I pray that special graces were made available to you, and their effects will carry forward.

But wait. There's more! This weekend contains more special observances. The 2nd Sunday of Easter has several names: Low Sunday (long story), White Sunday (because the newly baptized traditionally wore their baptismal garments to this Mass), and most recently, thanks to the efforts of Pope Saint John Paul II, Divine Mercy Sunday.


Divine Mercy came about due to the direct intervention of the Lord Jesus, himself. Beginning in the early 20th Century, the Lord had been moving powerfully in the life of the woman Helena Kowalska, leading her to enter religious life and take the name of Faustina. By the year 1931, Sr. Faustina was instructed to introduce the world to a devotion to God's Divine Mercy by means of instruction, prayer, and the now famous Divine Mercy Image (the same image of Jesus which hangs in the rear of our church).

"My daughter, tell the whole world about My inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day all the divine floodgates through which grace flow are opened. Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet. My mercy is so great that no mind, be it of man or of angel, will be able to fathom it throughout all eternity. Everything that exists has come forth from the very depths of My most tender mercy. Every soul in its relation to Me will contemplate My love and mercy throughout eternity. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the First Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My Mercy."-Diary 699

St. Joseph Parish will commemorate the feast by offering an additional opportunity for confessions at 2:00PM followed by a Divine Mercy prayer service with Adoration at 3:00pm with an Ice Cream Social to follow. Everyone is encouraged to join in and bask in God's love.

REDEEMING "DOUBTING THOMAS"-THE APOSTLE OF DIVINE MERCY

Some time ago I had the gift of being able to read the story of Christ's appearance to the Apostles in the upper room in a new way. As my reading and reflecting progressed, at some point it became a time of deep prayer and revelation. Those revelations have stuck with me through several years now.

The Story From Our Catechesis Days Most of us know the general story of Christ's repeated appearances to the apostles in the upper room, first without "Doubting Thomas,"

and a second time when he is present. I think many of us automatically "tsk, tsk" Thomas for refusing to believe the other Apostles and for daring to ask to touch the wounds of the Word Made Flesh. But I've come to believe that Thomas gets a bad rap unnecessarily. There's much more to this story than meets the eye!

Where In The World Was Thomas?! One of the small yet significant details that struck me about this passage is the simple, unassuming phrase "Thomas was not with them." All the Apostles, grown men—some of them burly fishermen—were hiding ehind a locked door "for fear of the Jews." But Thomas wasn't there. Which means... he wasn't hiding. So then...where WAS Thomas? We don't know; but in any case, when Jesus came, Thomas wasn't hiding out in the upper room. He faced fear while the others cowered. Can you imagine how Thomas felt when he came back from his errand and found that Christ had allowed Thomas to miss out seeing him? In the face of this great disappointment, Thomas's response to the Apostles seems much more realistic and relatable: "Unless I can see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe."

A Man of Bold Statements These daring remarks by Thomas can also be taken at face value, or they can be unpacked further. You see, this boldness of Thomas isn't an isolated incident. If we go back to an earlier passage in the Gospel of John, in which the disciples fear for Jesus's safety when He wants to go see Lazarus in Judea, Thomas tells the others, "Let us also go to die with him." (Jn. 11:16) Thomas wasn't afraid to proclaim his true thoughts. In this earlier instance we see a bold, confident boast —and then in the upper room a bold and bitter doubt. In the wake of the Resurrection, Christ takes this fearless man and gives him the opportunity to turn that bitter disappointment into a beautiful prayer of adoration.

From Bitter Doubt to Intimate Adoration When Christ appears to the Apostles a second time, Thomas is there. While Christ does give the general admonition, "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe," He doesn't punish Thomas for his doubt and desire. (Jn. 20:29) Instead Christ uses this weakness, and this poignant desire, to create an intimate moment with Thomas. In his mercy, Jesus gives the bitter yet honest Thomas precisely what he asked for: He spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Do not be unbelieving any more but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' (Jn 20:27-28)

The Apostle of Divine Mercy I always thought that reading Christ's appearance to the Apostles on Divine Mercy Sunday was simply for liturgical reasons. But now I see that this passage also perfectly fits because Thomas experiences God's Mercy in a very, very real way. Two quotes of Christ to St. Faustina Kowalska bring this connection beautifully to light:

- "I do not want to punish mankind, but I desire to heal it, pressing it to My merciful Heart."
- "Souls that make an appeal to My mercy delight Me. To such souls I grant even more graces than they ask. I cannot punish even the greatest sinner if he makes an appeal to My compassion, but on the contrary, I justify him in My unfathomable and inscrutable mercy."

Thomas, though he doubted, was not afraid to make an appeal to Christ and acknowledge the littleness of his trust in God. As Christ told St. Faustina, He cannot resist the soul who appeals to Divine Mercy. Therefore, Christ takes Thomas's weak faith and gives Him a tender moment beyond his wildest hopes. Thomas probably didn't think he would ACTUALLY get to touch the wounds of his Lord. His plea was simply a cry of frustration and doubt and desire. Christ allowed Thomas to actually touch His Sacred Heart, to actually place his hand where the Fountain of Mercy flows out. This prompts a beautiful act of praise, the one which many people privately repeat during the Consecration of the Host at Mass: "My Lord and My God."

I've used the term "Apostle of Divine Mercy" several times now, and I like it more each time I use it. I think it's a much more accurate and thoughtful title than "Doubting Thomas." No one wants to be famous for doubting. But I sure wouldn't mind being called an Apostle of Divine Mercy, up there with such promoters of mercy as St. Faustina and Pope St. John Paul II!

On this Feast of Divine Mercy, let us ask for this humbled saint's intercession, so that we will turn our doubts and fears into offerings to the Merciful Heart of God. St. Thomas, Apostle of Divine Mercy, pray for us!



6 TIPS FOR MASS WITH A SPECIAL-NEEDS CHILD

Go to daily Mass, Sunday Mass, and even Adoration. Take the whole family, sit in the church, and be a witness of the beauty of God's creation. Your child is a gift, a beloved son or daughter of God. You have just as much right to be there as anyone. So go, and and sit in the pew.

Meet with your pastor, and bring your child

How well do you know your pastor? How well does he know your child? If the answer to either question is not well, remedy that-and soon. Make an appointment to meet with Father and explain your family situation. Share literature about your child's condition and talk with him about ways in which you can accommodate any special needs. Your pastor is the shepherd of the entire parishyou and you'r family included.

Join (or start up) a special-needs apostolate

Chances are, you are not the only special-needs family in your parish. Find out if your church has a special-needs ministry or apostolate and get involved. If they don't, start one. Community, outreach, and awareness are key.

Build a church bag just for church My good friend Maura has a daughter with profound developmental disabilities. Her daughter loves books, and so Maura has reserved a special title just for Mass. The bag with the book stays in the car: it only comes out when they head into church. Maura's daughter uses the book throughout Mass, participating as best she can.

Think about what your child loves. Is it something you could adapt for church? Perhaps a soft toy or silicone rosary, a prayer book or a special blanket. Whatever you can bring to encourage peace and participation, carry it. You might be surprised with the results.

Sit up front. Really.

All children—special needs or not—do better when they can see what's going on. The closer you are to the altar, the easier it is to be present in the sacrifice of the Mass.

Explore the beauty and mystery of the Church Catholicism rocks for a variety of reasons, and not just because we have the Eucharist. Our parishes are full of beauty and mystery, from the Tabernacle and the altar to the Stations of the Cross and statues of the saints. Visit the church during off hours. Talk about the crucifix and the stained-glass window. Let your child get a closer look at the beauty of our faith so that Mass becomes a welcoming occurrence.

When you feel like Mass isn't worth the effort, and you worry that your family won't be welcome, remember this:

"Disabled people are . . . living icons of the crucified Son. They reveal the mysterious beauty of the One who emptied himself for our sake and made himself obedient unto death. They show us, over and above all appearances, that the ultimate foundation of human existence is Jesus Christ. It is said, justifiably so, that disabled people are humanity's privileged witnesses. They can teach everyone about the love that saves us; they can become heralds of a new world, no longer dominated by force, violence and aggression, but by love, solidarity and acceptance, a new world transfigured by the light of Christ, the Son of God who became incarnate, who was crucified and rose for us.

You are the light of Christ. We need you in our midst. Come to Mass, mama. Bring your children, and shower us with your light.


