The mystery to everyone is: We do not know at which station we ourselves will step down. So, we must live in the best way, love, forgive, and offer the best of who we are.

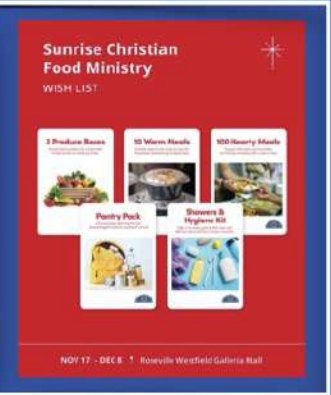
It is important to do this because when the time comes for us to step down and leave our seat empty, we wish to leave behind beautiful memories for those who will continue to travel on their train of life.

OUR RWANDAN SISTERS AND BROTHERS

Thanks to the diligence and dedication of Melanie and Cornelia Chancellor (Advent's current liaisons to our companion parishes in Rwanda) and thanks to the marvels of the digital age, we recently have been receiving regular news about the challenges that our two companion parishes (Matimba-Bwera and Nyagashanga) are facing.

Being companions to these two parishes means that we accompany each other through the unique trials we each are facing, learn from each other, and uphold each other in prayer.

This article intends to share some of those news with you ... *not* in the hope to send more funds from Advent to Rwanda, but to help you pray for these two parishes.

As reported in a previous newsletter article, the political system of Rwanda is best described as "benevolent dictatorship." Rwanda's president, Paul Kagame, has held his office since 2000. Between 1994 and 2000, while serving as Vice President and Minister of Defense, Kagame already was the nation's de facto leader. Prior to 1994, Kagame served as one of the commanders of the Rwandan Patriotic Front (RPF), a rebel armed force which invaded Rwanda in 1990.

The *benevolence* of Kagame's dictatorship manifests itself in a series of government-controlled public-health campaigns. All Rwandan homes, for example, have metal roofs instead of their previous thatched roofs that don't keep the rain and critters out. All

Rwandans are required to wear footwear (sandals or shoes) to prevent parasites from entering their bodies. Rwandans are also encouraged to establish micro-savings accounts. All Rwandans enjoy universal health coverage, vaccinations, HIV prevention and treatment. Village community health workers provide decentralized care at the village level.

The Rwandan government's latest public health campaign involves churches and other faith communities. A few years ago, churches were put on notice that their leaders must have adequate professional education and their facilities must meet minimum standards. Rwanda is one of the world's poorest countries (no. 28 on the World Bank's list of poorest countries, with a GDP-PPP (gross domestic product based on purchasing power parity) of \$4,103 (US: \$89,105 as of 9/1/2025). The supposed goal of these requirements is to protect Rwandans from religious groups that prey on their money but do not offer tangible spiritual benefits in return.

Sadly, these requirements have led to the temporary closure of all but one church building of the Lutheran Church of Rwanda (LCR). Neither the people of Matimba-Bwera Parish nor Nyagashanga Parish are currently permitted to gather in their sanctuary. Instead, Pastors Musafiri Jackson and Twesige George are holding small worship gatherings at people's homes. As few Rwandans own smartphones, it is currently

not possible to hold virtual worship services. The simple phones that most people use do not support apps like WhatsApp or FaceTime. Let us pray that a solution can be found and church life will thrive again in the near future.

Let me now share some of the recent developments in the two pastors' own words:

Pastor George/Nyagashanga Parish

[12/10/25]

Good morning, pastor Gabriele. Yes I visit door to door at home and preach, sometimes because laws and regulations of the government, and these days, we meet every Sunday in one home then we pray and preach, but few people come from village to village. We shall take photos on Sunday that I will send to you.

WhatsApp cannot yet be used for preaching, but we need to try. I have only four Christians with smartphone; the others have small phone. Then [we'll have to do repairs,] all those things we need to do, but these days, [we] do [the] floor inside the church and outside the church within foundation. And [a few] other things.

[12/10/25]

Youth we have many, but almost the secondary-school students have not yet come back home, so we have primary-school students and children from very poor families.

[12/10/25]

Material for construction it is very expensive here, and constructors also, so we collect money from members. If it costs too much, we wait a bit, we wait another season, then we collect again and again; just like that. That's our strategy. Thank you so much for supporting us. We received the funds from you. God bless you.

[12/11/25]

There are repairs outside and inside. [Next, we will have to install] water tanks, in order to collect rain water from the roof.

[12/13/25]

Construction items for the church that are remaining are gutters on the roof to collect water, water tanks for water, ceiling-board within the church, sound-proofing the church, cement pavement, and some other things. We are doing this slowly slowly. Thank you.

Pastor Musafiri Jackson/Matimba-Bwera

Hello, dear Cornelia, praise God. It's a great pleasure to have this opportunity to communicate to you by wishing you a merry Christmas and a new year of 2026.

At Matimba Parish, we are doing well, and as you know we are not gathering as Sunday services, because we are still in the process of fulfilling the Government's requirements for the Churches to open.

Re. the Matimba congregation, we were advised by the Government to [tear the building] down and we start afresh because the building is old and does not meet the current standard.

Re. the Bwera congregation, the building is not yet completed; it is now on finishing stage and it requires much money that the congregants can't manage in the short time.

Re. the Bwera primary school, it is now operating but recently the Government

closed it because of the insufficient classrooms.

We are now lacking two class rooms to offer all primary-level grades as it is required by the government. Due to the abrupt school closure, many pupils went to other schools.

But we later negotiated with the government leaders to re-open our school and we proceed with the construction process.

We thank God that now the school is working and the pupils are still few but expecting that next year, they will increase.

We closed the first term with 70 Pupils and we are looking forward to have more.

We are under pressure from the government to add those two remaining class rooms and other requirements to complete the school accreditation. So keep on praying for us and with time, things will come to settle.

notions of what makes a good pastor, to remain flexible in your expectations, and to continue being an active and engaged member of the Advent community during this period of transition. I invite you to use the interim period to take stock and to reflect deeply on the gifts that you are looking for in your next leader and on the specific leadership gifts that God has equipped you with. Please remember that the future of churches in this rapidly changing cultural context will be very different from the previous religious landscape. I truly believe that God is up to a new thing, and that congregations willing to discern that new thing and embrace change will thrive.

Having walked with you through a global pandemic and the renovation of parts of our church campus, I feel I have come to a fork in the road – in one direction, the road grants access to familiar ways of doing ministry. In another direction, unknown challenges lie ahead. God willing, I hope that I can work for maybe 5 years before retiring. By moving to a new congregation, I hope that I can press a professional and personal reset button.

Additionally, my departure will also afford Advent the opportunity to call a leader whose fresh perspective will guide you in

developing a sustainable vision for the future in which Advent will serve the surrounding community in novel ways.

My future life will be different from what my life was like when I first came to Advent. My marriage of 30 years has mostly fallen apart, my two adult daughters have either moved out or are about to do so in 2026, and I plan to move out of my home and rent it out by September of 2026. In short, my new life has changed significantly and is bound to change even more. I therefore treasure the lasting relationships and friendships that I have formed and the encounters that I have had while serving at Advent. Those relationships and memories won't go away; they will forever stay with me and inform how I live my life.
