CALLED TO VENTURES...

It is the last day of September, and my October newsletter article is by now badly overdue ... but what shall I write about?

The prophet Isaiah says that the word that comes from God's mouth won't return empty to God, but "it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it" (Isaiah 55:11). I firmly believe Isaiah's words to be true, but they don't make the task of sitting down and writing a newsletter article any easier. My staring at a blank screen hasn't helped either, and neither has my looking at what other pastors in other places have written. So, I do what I often do in this situation – sit back and ask myself the same question, "What is it that Advent Lutheran Church needs to hear right now?" And then I wait . . .

Also in November, we hope to do an art event. So, get into artist mode and come to have a good time and fellowship as we get creative.



Here is a book as joyous and painful, as mysterious and memorable, as childhood itself. I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings captures the longing of lonely children, the brute





next to us have passed away; other longtime members now attend worship at a different church; our choir is smaller than it used to be; the Women's Bible Study group has stopped meeting; and it is getting harder to recruit volunteers for leadership positions. In short, Advent

Lutheran Church is experiencing what many mainline Protestant congregations are experiencing.

As your pastor, I am aware of the institutional challenges of keeping things running. The fact that giving is down is related to our

related to our
shrinking worship attendance and the shape of our economy. But here is the thing, I don't think that God is done with us yet. It simply means that we have reached a new season in the life of our congregation, a season that requires imagination, discernment, and creativity as we seek to meet the needs of our own

members and the needs of the



community at large. I believe that God is with us as we step out to do ministry in new ways!

During this new season in the life of our congregation, the words of a prayer that is by now over a hundred years old proves ever more meaningful to me:

O Lord God,
who called your servants
to ventures of which we cannot see
the ending,
by paths as yet untrodden,
through perils unknown;
Give us faith
to go out with good courage,
not knowing where we are going,
but only that your hand is leading us,
and your love is supporting us
to the glory of your name.
Amen.

(British clergyman Eric Milner-White wrote this prayer for the soldiers he served as chaplain during WWI).

God's Word won't return empty but will accomplish God's intended purpose and succeed in the thing for which God sent it. God's purposes include showing humanity how to love, forgive, and support one another, how to bring

healing to God's entire creation, and how to be in life-giving community with God. Those are lofty purposes, and it is often hard to view our modest present as part of God's lofty purpose. At the same time, every small thing that we do for one another and for our neighbors is an important aspect of God's history with humankind.

Thus, I am grateful for the way that Advent Lutheran Church serves our community. We do so by partnering with other local organizations – the Sunrise Christian Food Ministry (the "food closet"), Citrus Heights H.A.R.T. (Homeless Assistance Resource Team), and Grace House, a faith-based

residential recovery program that seeks to provide paths out of homelessness and incarceration, to both men and women. On Tuesday afternoons, Grace House is using our new patio to distribute hot meals to the local unhoused population (for a 3-month trial period).

Their first distribution day was
September 23, with a great attendance
on both the serving and the receiving
end. With Advent making available our
property on Tuesdays, meals are now
being distributed by churches and faithbased organizations every day of the
week.

Considering our aging membership, we also continue to adjust the way we function. Sunday after worship has emerged as the most popular time slot for offering classes, sponsoring outside speakers, and hosting fellowship events. We have launched a new kind of gathering ... house church. Meeting monthly in people's homes enables us to

bring the message of God's love to people where they are. A first gathering took place on September 19 at the home of Bob and Linda Mathews. We will continue offering monthly meetings in Roseville-Rocklin and surrounding areas. If they take

off, a similar monthly house church gathering could be launched in Citrus Heights. All the while, our Wellness Team continues to sponsor events that are tailored to the needs of an aging congregation.

The same prophet Isaiah comforts his hurting and grieving people with words of promise that he received from God, "a bruised reed he will not break, and a dimly burning wick he will not quench; he will faithfully bring forth justice." We, my friends, are that bruised reed and the burning wick. It is to us that God promises to never abandon us and to always love and support us. May it be so!

DID YOU KNOW...

Candy Corn is a Halloween favorite. Sure, there are lots of candy corn haters, but it's actually one of the most popular Halloween candies. It takes a second place only to chocolate, and it's the number one favorite in Oregon, Texas, Tennessee and South Carolina.

To create that striped effect, the candy corn batter is poured in three phases. First, they do white, followed by the yellow and the orange. Then, they finish the candies with confectioners glaze to give each candy its characteristic shine.

Each piece of candy corn has only seven calories. As long as you contain your munching to under 14 pieces, you can enjoy them as a tasty 100-calorie snack! They do contain a lot of sugar, though, so it's not the ideal choice for dieters.

Recently we were offered the opportunity to serve our homeless neighbors in a different way, when Grace House requested permission to use our front patio each Tuesday afternoon to serve a hot meal and to-go sack lunch to the homeless in our neighborhood. Grace House, transitional housing program has been offering this same service for many years behind the Walmart on Auburn Ave., but recently lost that location.

The Church Council agreed to give them a 90 day trial period to see if this partnership worked for both the church and for their mission. See photos on pages 18-19.


