GHOST RANCH PREACHING RETREAT (PART 2)

Last month, I wrote about my plans of travelling to Northern Central New Mexico and attending a preaching retreat. Let me now tell you how it went and what Hearned.

To my surprise, almost 90 people had made the journey to remote Abiquiu ... a bit intimidating for an introvert like me. Participants came from all over the US and from over half a dozen different denominations (Presbyterian, Lutheran, Episcopalian, Methodist, Baptist, Mennonite, United Church of Christ, and Christian Church/ Disciples). There were pastors of small congregations and large ones, younger and older, men and women, first-call and seasoned pastors. The retreat began on Monday evening (August 11) and ended on Friday morning (August 15). Each day was filled with devotions, worship service, plenary presentations, workshop, unstructured conversations, and some free time. Thanks to the car I had rented in Albuquerque, I was able to go off -campus to visit a site that Carol and Tom Kent had


want to contribute for your meal or want to bid on items at the silent auction and the raffle, your contribution will be much appreciated. In addition to the fundraising there will be live music and dancing.

YEHIEL CURRY ELECTED AS ELCA PRESIDING BISHOP

On July 30, 2025, during our denomination's Churchwide Assembly in Phoenix, AZ, voting members elected Yehiel Curry, 53, to serve a six-year term as ELCA Presiding Bishop. Curry was elected on the fifth ballot during voting on the floor of the Phoenix Convention Center. He was in third place on the first two ballots, when many candidates had singledigit votes. The election was open to any ordained pastor within the ELCA. By the third ballot Curry broke into a decisive lead of 41.45 percent. The closest runner-up was Bishop Kevin Strickland of the Southeastern Synod in Atlanta, at 13.86 percent. By the fourth ballot, the only remaining candidates were Curry, Strickland, and Bishop Tracie Bartholomew of the New Jersey Synod. On the fifth ballot, when the choice was between Curry and Strickland, Curry sealed his victory with 70.34 percent of the vote. Presiding-Bishop-elect Curry's trajectory to this new role has been profoundly different from the trajectories of his predecessors. Growing up Roman Catholic on the South Side of Chicago as one of 11 children, Curry attended a Catholic College, Lewis University in Romeo, Illinois, from which he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree. Subsequently, he became a seventh-grade teacher and later a social worker in the Chicago Public School system.




Curry's journey to leadership in the ELCA began in 1996 at a potluck on Chicago's South Side. There, he was invited by a friend to a program named SIMBA Circle (Safe in My Brothers' Arms). SIMBA Circle was an ELCA camping ministry that began in the early 1990s as a response to racial tensions in the country after the police beating and arrest of Rodney King in Los Angeles. The camp, which paired Black teenage boys with mentors, ran a summer session, follow-up programs, and a worship service during the year. Initially, the program operated out of St. Stephen's Lutheran Church. Curry remembers, "I had these unique students. And I was interested in services for them. ... There was a worship service I stayed for. And I loved it."

Her diary is a record of every birth and death, crime and debacle that unfolds in the close-knit community. Months earlier, Martha documented the details of an alleged rape committed by two of the town's most respected gentlemen—one of whom has now been found dead in the ice. But when a local physician undermines her conclusion, declaring the death to be an accident, Martha is forced to investigate the shocking murder on her own.

Over the course of one winter, as the trial nears, and whispers and prejudices mount, Martha doggedly pursues the truth. Her diary soon lands at the center of the scandal, implicating those she loves, and compelling Martha to decide where her own loyalties lie.

ELCA – CONGREGATIONS, SYNODS, CHURCHWIDE ORGANIZATION

Advent is a member congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). The ELCA denomination was created on January 1, 1988 from a merger of three Lutheran church bodies – the American Lutheran Church (ALC), the Association of Evangelical Lutheran Churches (AELC), and the Lutheran Church in America (LCA).

Since its beginning, the ELCA has been one church body organized in three "expressions" — congregations, synods, and the churchwide organization. This "three-fold" understanding of the church is foundational to our life together as the body of Christ: each expression has its particular functions but all three together share a common mission of doing God's work in the world and proclaiming the good news of Jesus Christ." Together, these three expressions ensure a solid foundation of leadership, active involvement in communities. opportunities for dialogue and diverse perspectives, creative partnerships, and support for members and ministries of the ELCA.

The churchwide organization operates out of the Lutheran Center in Chicago and functions in collaboration with the ELCA's 65 synods (organized into 8 regions) and nearly 9,000 congregations across the 50 states, Caribbean, and U.S. Virgin Islands.

The structure of governance is similar at each level. The highest decision-making body for each of the three expressions is the "assembly," an elected body comprised of lay and ordained leaders (annual congregational meeting, synod assembly, churchwide assembly). Congregations have annual meetings. Synod assemblies are convened either annually or every other year. The churchwide assembly (CWA) meets once every three years (in years where there is no youth gathering or national pastors meeting). In-between those assembly gatherings, elected councils make decisions for the church (church council, synod council, churchwide council).

In addition, all ELCA bishops meet twice a year as Conference of Bishops to support each other in ministry and coordinate their work.

At each level, four elected officers oversee the ongoing business of the church (President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary). Within synods, the synodical bishop functions as the synod president. Within the churchwide organization, the Presiding Bishop serves as its president. The Vice President at each level is a lay person.

Advent belongs to the Sierra Pacific Synod (Synod 2-A). Together with four other synods in the Southwest (SW California, Pacifica, Grand Canyon, and Rocky Mountain Synods), we belong to ELCA Region 2.

Each synod is subdivided into conferences, each headed by a dean (a pastor who is elected for a three-year term). Sierra Pacific Synod currently is divided into nine conferences. Our conference, the Capitol Valley Conference (Conference 3), consists of 19

congregations (from Fairfield in the South to Woodland in the North and Roseville in the East). Pastor Gabi was elected for a second term as conference dean in May.

The ELCA also nurtures important connections with Lutheran organizations and ecumenical/interfaith partners, working alongside 27 colleges and universities related to the ELCA, 7 seminaries, more than 2,000 schools and early childhood education centers, campus ministries, outdoor ministries, social service agencies, and other agencies and institutions across the country and throughout the world.

The work God calls us to do in the world is never done alone or in isolation, and the churchwide organization plays a key role in developing and supporting a culture of interdependence, diversity, and common mission across all expressions of the ELCA and its partners.



Curry went home and told his wife,
LaShonda, about the great experience he
had had there, and they returned together
the following weekend. "We came back
and joined," he said. "And we didn't
understand the organizations of the
Lutheran church. We just saw a home, we
saw a community."

When the program outgrew the St.
Stephen's facilities, it moved to Riverdale,
to a building that had previously housed
Our Savior's Lutheran Church. There,
Curry and others started a new church,
Shekinah Chapel.

Eventually, the community, and the synod staff, asked Curry to consider being a lay mission developer. He was unsure. After his election as ELCA Presiding Bishop, he told the assembly, "I never saw myself as good enough, so for two years, I said no. I finally said yes. When I said yes, your support, this church's support, of that ministry meant everything. So if you want to know what your benevolence dollars look like, it looks like me. And I want to say thank you. Thank you for your investment." As a church planter on the Far South Side, Curry never took home a reliable or lucrative paycheck. He and his wife, an

assistant principal at a Chicago public school, made ends meet with ingenuity, frugality and prayer as they raised their three daughters.

After agreeing to serve as lay mission developer, Curry enrolled in the Theological Education for Emerging Ministries program at the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago and received his ordination certification in 2009. In 2012, when Shekinah became an official ELCA congregation, it called Curry to be its pastor. In 2013, Curry earned a Master of Divinity degree from the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago.

At Shekinah Chapel, Curry learned about the long, slow process of starting a new congregation. As a startup church, Shekinah had many of the assets that new congregations need, such as a core group of young families, a building, vibrant youth outreach and a young, energetic pastor. But that was not enough to gain members, Curry recalled. "We moved to Riverdale, and I quickly learned that they weren't impressed with the young families. They weren't impressed with our mentoring program. People in Riverdale initially weren't coming to the church, and I

couldn't figure out why."

While serving coffee and doughnuts at a community event, Curry started talking to neighbors and asking if they'd be open to meeting to get know each other. During those meetings, he learned that the sewers in the community had been backing up and flooding homes. That led the church to get involved with local efforts to get the sewers fixed — a process that took years.

"That's really what I learned as a mission developer — it is not about what you think you're bringing into the community. It's who you are in the community. The minute we showed that we cared is really when the community adopted us," he said. "People don't care about what you know till they know that you care, and that was the

biggest learning for me."

Bishop Curry his wife LaShonda have been married for 30 years and are the proud parents of three adult daughters. The

couple's daughter Shemiah currently is a student at the Lutheran School of Theology and is expected to graduate at the end of this academic year.

Taking on the new role of ELCA Presiding Bishop is bittersweet, Curry says. He had just been elected to a second term as bishop of the Chicago synod in May and had been busy working with leaders to develop a plan for its future. Now, he has to say goodbye to staff and churches that he has come to love. He hopes to take some of the plans from Chicago to the larger church, in particular the idea that the ministry of the church includes being part of the broader community, he said. As presiding bishop, he hopes to spotlight outwardly focused ministries that serve their communities. He said that churches of all kinds, at times, focus so much on

what's happening in their buildings, they don't recognize what is happening out in the community.

When asked about what he believes should be among the ELCA's top priorities, he said, "I think there's this unique opportunity around lay equipping and lay education," he said. "The ethos and the structures of many of our

congregations are changing. In some cases, they've gone from full-time pastors to part-time pastors; we have leaders who are serving two- and three-point congregations.

Curry will be installed Oct. 4 at Central Lutheran Church in Minneapolis, beginning at 2 PM.

- The program will include an abridged worship service, with hymns, prayers Scripture readings, a short homily, and Holy Communion.
- There will be time for conversation about the topic of the day as well as unstructured conversation.
- All are welcome members, friends, guests, neighbors, those living further South, etc.

Other details will evolve over time and depend on the needs and input of those who participate.

Our first gathering is scheduled for Friday, September 19, 3 PM, at the home of Bob and Linda Mathews (see the Advent church directory for their address).

passionately recommended (Santuario de Chimayo).

The two main organizers of the event – Karoline Lewis and Matt Skinner—both have been teaching for many years at Luther Seminary in Saint Paul, with Prof. Lewis serving as Professor of Biblical Preaching and Prof. Matt Skinner teaching New Testament Studies. Since 2007, both have been instrumental in founding the popular

www.workingpreacher.com resource that Luther Seminary is hosting. Both professors (with the help of a small staff) also produce the weekly "Sermon Brainwave" podcast, which discusses the texts of the Revised Common Lectionary. While the travel to Abiquiu was a bit exhausting, that journey was well worth the effort. I found the lectures and conversations inspiring and met lots of new people serving in churches near and far (including two Methodist pastors serving in Dixon and Roseville, and a German ELCA pastor serving in Walnut Creek). It is safe to assume that all who attended the retreat enjoy preaching and put considerable efforts in their weekly sermon preparation.

At the same time, it was surprising to me

how much many of them are affected by the cultural and demographic changes in US Christianity. Regardless of whether they serve ELCA congregations in the California diaspora or in Iowa, the pastors told stories of declining membership and worship attendance. Regardless the geographic context of their ministry, pastors seem stressed by the political tensions and divisions in their congregation and by how those factors make their work more difficult. Regardless their denominational affiliation, mainline Protestant pastors are burdened by the tremendous cultural impact of fundamentalist Christian preaching and beliefs.

So, how does one preach in such a tense climate of anxiety over decline and political rifts? While this question was not the theme of the retreat, it bubbled up time and again over the five days we spent together. The most important answer that the presenters gave was "stay close to the text," let the text speak for itself. To me personally, this was reassuring, for that is what I have been trying to do for most of my ministry. I am firmly convinced that there is deep power and clear current relevance in biblical

texts, and that it is my responsibility as a preacher to help unleash that power and help my listeners hear how texts speak to them and their concerns.

I am grateful for this continuing education opportunity that this retreat offered and hope that this second article (Part 1: August Newsletter) was interesting to you.







