Week 2: Gather for Rhythm

Why Rhythm Matters

Habits shape who we become. The early church understood that spiritual growth doesn't happen by accident—it happens through intentional, repeated practices centered on Christ and shared with others.

The Four Rhythms of the Early Church

1. Teaching (Learning)

The early believers gathered to learn God's Word together. The reward: deeper understanding of Scripture and a stronger foundation of faith.

2. Fellowship (Gathering Together)

They made gathering a regular part of life—not an occasional event. The reward: encouragement, connection, and strength for the journey.

3. Breaking of Bread (Communion)

They remembered Jesus together—His sacrifice, His resurrection, and His promise to return. The reward: unity in Christ and remembrance of the gospel that binds us together.

4. Prayer

They prayed with and for one another. Jesus Himself taught us to pray in community—"our" and "us." The reward: shared dependence on God and power through collective prayer.

We gather because it's who we are—and because God grows us when we walk together.
