# From the Hebrew Scriptures

**Psalm**, VU 51, p. P. 776-777 (REFRAIN 1) - Responsive

Jeremiah 31:31-34 (Inclusive Bible)

Behold, the days are coming, says God, when I will establish a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt – a covenant they broke, though I was their spouse, says God. But this is the covenant I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says God: I will put my Law in their minds and in their hearts. I will be their God and they will be my people.

## **From the New Testament**

## John 12: 20-33 (Inclusive Bible)

Among those who came up to worship at the Passover festival were some Greeks. They approached Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and put forth this request: "Please, we would like to see Jesus." Philip went to tell Andrew, and together the two went to tell Jesus.
