FOOD FOR THOUGHT: POUND CAKE

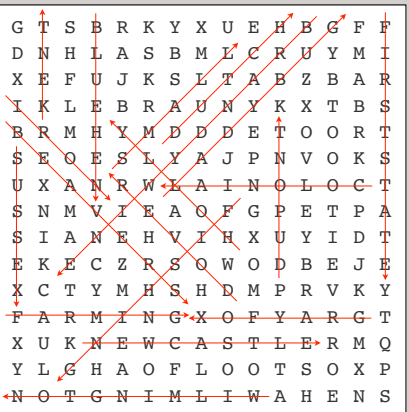
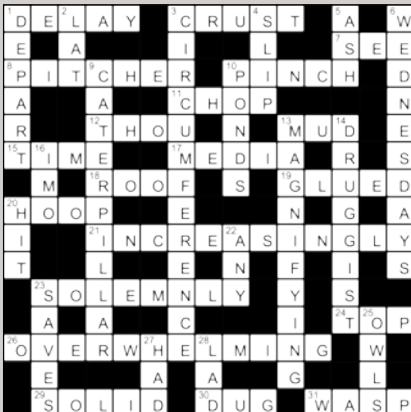

FUN FACT: CHRISTMAS TREES

Did you know the tradition of decorating Christmas trees has roots over 500 years old? It all began in 16th-century Germany, where devout Christians would bring evergreen trees into their homes as a sign of enduring life and hope during the darkest days of winter. They would adorn their trees with apples, symbolizing the fruits of paradise, along with nuts and the soft glow of candles—a far cry from the dazzling decorations we see today.

As the years rolled on, this tradition caught on throughout Europe. When German immigrants arrived in America, they brought their love of Christmas trees with them. 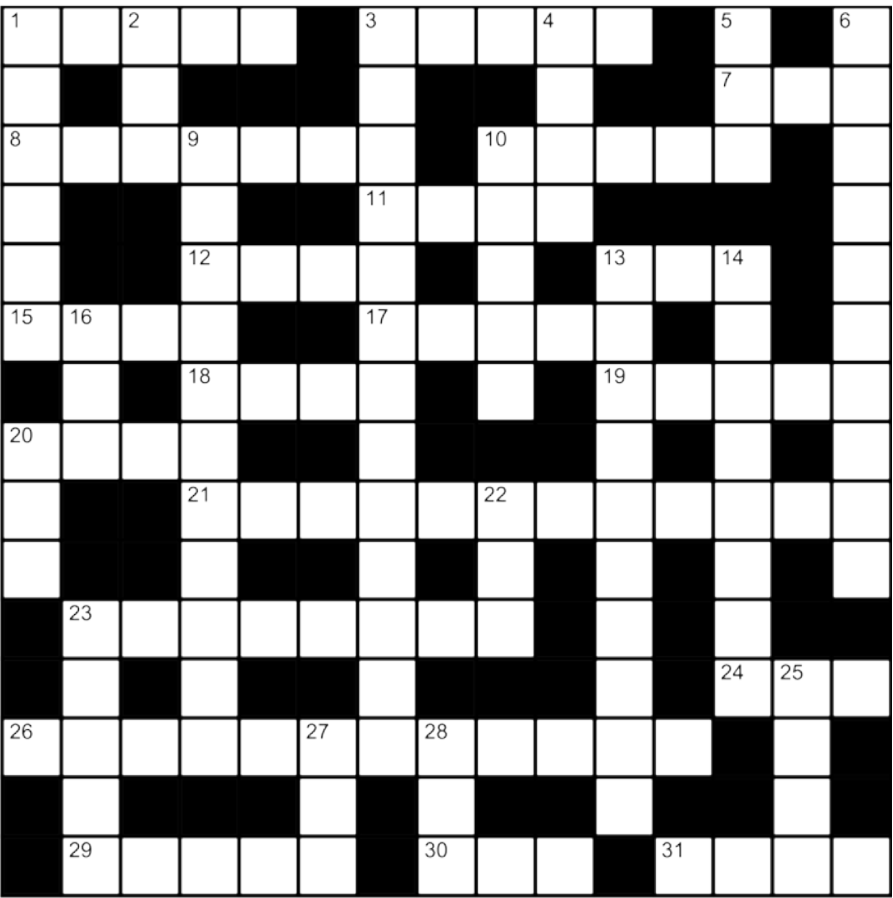

DIY SALT DOUGH ORNAMENTS

WHAT YOU'LL NEED:

- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 cup salt
- 1/2 cup water



WHAT YOU'LL DO:

1. Mix the flour, salt, and water together until you have a smooth dough.
2. Roll it out about 1/4 inch thick. Use cookie cutters to cut out shapes. Don't forget to poke a small hole near the top for hanging!
3. Place the shapes on a baking sheet and bake at 250°F for 2-3 hours until hard and dry.
4. Once cool, decorate with paint, markers, or glitter, then thread a ribbon or string through the hole and hang on the tree!

Shari is a talented musician who shares her beautiful music with residents of Renaissance Senior Living on a regular basis. In honor of Shari and her remarkable instrument, we'd like to say thank you for brightening our days—and share some fascinating facts about what it really takes to play the harp!



- ♪ The harp is one of the oldest instruments in the world, dating back over 5,000 years.
- ♪ Playing the harp takes serious multitasking: most harps have 47 strings, and professional harpists use all their fingers (except the pinkies!) on both hands to pluck, glide, and create music.
- ♪ Not only do harpists need strong, agile hands, they also use seven foot pedals to change the pitch of the strings as they play—sometimes changing pedals mid-song!
- ♪ Reading sheet music for the harp is a challenge in itself, involving both the bass and treble clefs, and players learn to coordinate hands and feet all at once.
- ♪ The harp's graceful sound comes from hours of practice, careful hand technique, and a gentle touch (believe it or not, plucking too hard can break a string!)
- ♪ Because of all this, becoming a skilled harpist is considered a major musical achievement—just learning to tune the instrument can take time and patience!



★ NOTABLE THEN & NOW ★

ANTHONY HOPKINS

After his early experiences with theater, Hopkins' career took off. He made his television debut in 1967 in a BBC production of the play *A Flea in Her Ear* and then made the jump to film with his performance in *The Lion in Winter* (1968) as Richard the Lionheart, eldest son of King Henry II of England. He received his first BAFTA (British Academy of Film and Television) nomination for the film. He later won a BAFTA for his performance as Pierre Bezukhov in the BBC miniseries *War and Peace* (1972). That same year, he starred as British politician David Lloyd George in *Young Winston* (1972), the first of several collaborations with director Richard Attenborough.

Throughout the 1970s and 1980s, Hopkins worked nonstop, starring in many films, plays, and television shows. In 1981, he won an Emmy for Outstanding Lead Actor for his portrayal of Adolf Hitler in *The Bunker*, a television film about Hitler's last days while hiding in Berlin. In 1989, he performed on the West End stage for the last

time in the musical drama *M. Butterfly* and received another Emmy for his role in the miniseries *Great Expectations*. By this point, Hopkins had been working steadily for more than 25 years, but his biggest break was still to come.

In 1991, Hopkins took on one of the best-known roles of his career: psychologist and cannibalistic serial killer Hannibal Lecter. He starred as Lecter opposite Jodie Foster as FBI recruit Clarice Starling in *The Silence of the Lambs*, an adaptation of the 1988 Thomas Harris novel. The film was a runaway success, winning Academy Awards for Best Picture, Best Director, and Best Adapted Screenplay. Hopkins and Foster also won Oscars for Best Actor and Actress, respectively. Hopkins' portrayal of the cultured yet sinister Lecter has since become one of his most famous and most loved performances. He reprised the role in the sequel *Hannibal* (2001) and again in the prequel film *Red Dragon* (2002). Hannibal Lecter has become one of the most feared characters in film history, placing first in the American Film Institute's list of the greatest villains in American cinema.
