


This beautiful Queen Anne style house was built in 1900 by the Samuel Round Family. The home has a fieldstone foundation. A widows walk, just off, the master bedroom accents the front of the house. The wainscoted entry gives way to an ornately scrolled oak railing on the staircase which extends around the upper part of the foyer.

Mr. and Mrs. Gary Kelley present owners of the home, have restored and decorated this nine room home with the skill and flair of an artist. The exterior has been painted with colors carefully selected to fit the style of the house. Nearly every interior room has been renovated, the most recent being the kitchen with glass cupboard doors and lovely black and white ceramic tile.

Nine gables accent this home with scroll barge board and a steep roof outline. One of the few Gothic Revival structures in Cedar Falls, The home was built by Fitzroy Sessions in 1867-68. The Session Family lived in the home for an unknown number of years. Roger Leavitt, who came to Cedar Falls to help organize the new Cedar Falls National Bank, rented the home from Fitzroy Sessions.

The home is now owned by Mr. and Mrs. James Mather. The Mather's have done extensive work to this beautiful house including removing the exterior paint on the brick, detailing the scroll bangeboard, and converting the potting shed at the rear of the house into a family room.

This three story four square house was built in 1913 by William E. Walters. The home has a full length porch on the front of the house. Beveled glass windows adorn the first floor along with an inlaid ceramic tile entryway. Original wood floors and woodwork dominate the first and second floor.

In February of 1991, Dr. and Mrs. James Peterson bought the home from Martha and William Acker III. The Peterson's have maintained the originality of the house on the first two floors. The recently renovated third floor boasts a contemporary master suite with fireplace and Jacuzzi.

This Queen Anne style home with Gothic watch tower was built in 1981. From the entrance hall, a beautiful carved staircase winds to the third floor ballroom. This house is accented by unique poplar flooring, one of five different types of woodwork used in the home.

The original owner was Norman Harris of the Harris & Cole Co., a wooden pump manufacturer. The house was latter sold to Frank Cotton, builder of the Regent Theater. The Christie or Lawn City Convalescence Home occupied the home from WW II until 1975 when it was purchased by Mr. and Mrs. Wilcox. This gracious home has been renovated and redecorated by the Wilcox's to bring back the nostalgia of the past.
