



Preparing to Celebrate the Funeral Mass

Overview

“Because of our belief not only in the immortality of the soul, but also in the resurrection of the body, the Church professes hope in the face of death and acts with charity in the funeral rites. The Church provides a number of prayers for the faithful to offer both to accompany the dying of a loved one and to strengthen our faith upon their death. Through private prayer and public funeral rites, we strengthen our faith and hope, comfort those who mourn, and bury the bodily remains of the deceased with care befitting what was the Temple of the Holy Spirit.” (USCCB).

As Roman Catholics, the Mass is the highest and most perfect prayer that we as humans can offer to God. Celebration of the Funeral Mass commemorates Jesus’ Life, Death and Resurrection and our belief in the Resurrection and eternal life. As members of the Mystical Body of Christ and the Communion of Saints we believe that death is a transition, not an end. We believe that Jesus rose from the dead. We believe that by dying, He destroyed our death and that by rising, He restored our life. We are participants in the Resurrection, not spectators. This participation began with our Baptism and will continue through the transition of death. As members of the Catholic faith, we believe in the Resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come, which we recite in the Nicene Creed at Mass every Sunday.

Our hearts go out to all those who have lost a loved one. May the passage of time and the hand of the Lord soothe your grief, and may you find comfort in the hope of the Resurrection.

Choosing the readings

The readings from the Sacred Scriptures proclaim the Paschal Mystery, teach remembrance of the dead, convey the hope of being gathered into God's Kingdom, and encourage the witness of Christian life. The readings tell of God's design for a world in which suffering and death relinquish their hold on all whom God has called his own. There are (3) readings during the Funeral Mass. The celebrant will choose the Gospel reading, and you may choose the First and Second Readings. The approved selections can be found in this packet. If you are struggling with making a choice, the celebrant can choose the readings for you.

Choosing the music

When you are choosing the music, consider the choices you make, as it can say a lot about what you and your loved ones believe. In addition, the music you select can even inspire new faith or renewed faith in the lives of your family and friends. The approved selections can be found in this packet. If you are struggling with making choices, the music director can assist you. Please note that the Responsorial Psalm, Gospel Acclamation, and the Memorial Acclamation will be chosen by the music director.

Eulogy vs Words of Remembrance

Will there be a eulogy? The Diocese of Wilmington recommends that Vigil (Wake) is the most appropriate time for members of the family and friend memories of the deceased or to pay tribute to the deceased through vocal remembrances, photographs, favorite songs, etc.

The reception after the funeral Mass is another appropriate time.

If a family member wishes to express appreciation or say something in remembrance at Mass, the following should be observed: only one family member or friend is to speak. Because of the intensity of the emotions at the time of a funeral, the person who will speak must be brief: no longer than (5) minutes (approximately one typed page). To speak in remembrance at a funeral liturgy means to offer a brief reflection on the life of the deceased in the context of his or her

faith. These liturgical ‘words of remembrance’ are not the same as the secular understanding of a ‘eulogy’, which is a reminiscing and toasting of the departed. It might be helpful to reflect on the qualities of the deceased that made him or her a good person.
