CRUCIFIX WALL

Thank you for those who have donated crucifixes and crosses. Take a look at our wall! This project, enhancing the school's Catholic Identity is off to the races! If you have a crucifix that you'd like to share or happen to see "that one" that captures your attention and heart on a vacation, we ask if you'd like to share with your school! We plan to cover the whole wall no matter how long it takes \mathfrak{S}

Have you ever wondered why the Catholic Church uses a crucifix as a symbol as opposed to other Christian churches that use an empty cross? It is common to hear from those outside the Church that He is risen, but we "leave Him



hanging there" or that the crucifix reduces the power of the Resurrection.

Also, the crucifix is often thought of as gruesome or morbid. These misconceptions are due to a lack of understanding what the crucifix actually means to us as Catholics.

The crucifix also does something that a bare cross cannot do with the same impact, which is: illustrate the act of love by Jesus for each and every single one of us. Yes, Jesus rose from the dead, but that was not the act of love. The Passion and Crucifixion were the lengths to which Jesus was willing to go to save us from our sins, and the Resurrection revealed His power over sin and death. When you gaze upon a crucifix you are reminded of just how much God loves YOU and you can be moved by that fact.

The crucifix also reminds us that we are called to love to that same extent. Jesus tells us, "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13) and St. Teresa of Calcutta said, "I have found the paradox, that if you love until it hurts, there can be no more hurt, only more love." It is not for Jesus alone to love to this extent, but a specific call to all of us to give everything we have in us to the love of God and the love of others. The crucifix reminds us of our own process of self-sacrifice out of love.

Like Jesus, we are also called to lay down our lives for our faith and for anything that is true, beautiful, and good, because it is of God. A crucifix can help convict our hearts in a way that an empty cross cannot.



On October 9th, I.C.'s 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students had the opportunity to visit the Michigan DNR Outdoor Adventure Center. The day was planned for all three classes to engage with a DNR instructor in a classroom or learning environment, as well as to spend time exploring the exhibits in the center.

The 6th grade class (shown above) was able to build upon their prior knowledge of photosynthesis using a deciduous forest as a model. They explored biodiverse ecosystems with the help of maps, animal skulls, and pelts. These added visuals helped them to understand the different species within a given area or habitat. All students participated in constructing a food web using a variety of plants and animals. The following quotes reflect what they learned:

- "I learned that flying squirrels only glide, not really fly."
- "You can identify how old an elk is by looking at its teeth."
- "I know that each thing in an ecosystem needs each other."
- "Raccoons have teeth like us."

The 7th and 8th grade classes explored the health of the Detroit River by conducting water chemistry testing. They found out just how clean it is. The students were instructed on how to collect plankton samples, along with a biological survey of the flora and fauna of the wetland area at Milliken State Park. These quotes highlight their learning experiences:

- "I learned that there are two types of plankton: plant and animal."
- "I was amazed to learn that the Detroit River use to be really dirty, but after a lot of teamwork and time, the community was able to clean it up."
- "Learning new species of insects that I never knew existed."
- "I learned the difference between different larvae, such as the Mayfly and Dragonfly."

Students from all three classes explored the center's three exhibit-filled floors. The following were among their favorites:

- "I liked riding on the snowmobile simulator."
- "Walking across the bridge and seeing everything below."
- "The fishing boat and being able to fish, it really felt like I was catching a fish."
- "Racing my friends on the bicycle simulator."

This field trip provided a valuable hands-on learning experience. Students came away with new knowledge, meaningful memories, and a deeper appreciation for the topics explored.
