Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

We just celebrated Thanksgiving this week and I hope we all had a wonderful time, with a lot of goodies of this season. Moreover, I hope everybody had a chance to reflect and find time to give thanks to God for his goodness and blessings. As the Psalm says: it is good to give thanks to God. Personally, I would like to thank everybody for the details and wishes you expressed to me during my birthday. I cannot be more grateful for that great demonstration of affection and friendship.

Advent is a season of preparation and reflection, and one of the signs that reminds us of this is the wreath. The four candles have been connected with different virtues, like hope, peace, joy, and love. During this time of the year, we also preach and talk about hope and expectation. The Christian hope is not a characteristic of the optimistic people (while the rest are more pessimistic). Hope is one of the theological virtues, a gift directly from God to us. Therefore, first of all let us ask the Lord that we may be always people of hope.

As we light the Advent candles this year, I would like to invite every parishioner to think about four particular reasons to be hopeful. With the first candle let us reflect about the power of God; we have hope because God is powerful and can do whatever he wants (Ps 115:3). With the second let us be hopeful because the Lord is good, and his goodness endures forever (Ps 100:5). With the third candle we can set the foundation of our hope

on the certainty that God wants us all to be safe (1Tm 2:4). As we light the last candle, we could consider his personal love for each and every one of us as the heart of our hope, as we each reflect with Saint Paul and say: He Loved me (Ga 2:21).

With these four reasons, we will find inspiration every week to allow the light of the candles to enlighten our souls to be people of gratitude and hope.

Primer Domingo de Adviento

Queridos hermanos y hermanas en Cristo:

Celebramos el Día de Acción de Gracias esta semana y espero que todos lo hayamos pasado de maravilla, con muchas alegrías propias de esta época. Además, espero que todos hayan tenido la oportunidad de reflexionar y encontrar tiempo para agradecer a Dios por su bondad y bendiciones. Como dice el Salmo: es bueno dar gracias a Dios. Personalmente, quiero agradecerles a todos los detalles y deseos que me expresaron durante mi cumpleaños. No puedo estar más agradecido por esa gran muestra de cariño y amistad.

El Adviento es un tiempo de preparación y reflexión, y uno de los signos que nos lo recuerda es la corona. Las cuatro velas se han relacionado con diferentes virtudes, como la esperanza, la paz, la alegría y el amor. Durante esta época del año, también predicamos y hablamos sobre la esperanza y la expectativa. La esperanza cristiana no es una característica de las personas optimistas (mientras que el resto son más pesimistas). La esperanza es una de las virtudes teologales, un don directo de Dios para nosotros. Por lo tanto, ante todo, pidamos al Señor que seamos siempre personas de esperanza. Al encender las velas de Adviento este año, me gustaría invitar a cada feligrés a pensar en cuatro razones específicas para tener esperanza. Con la primera vela, reflexionemos sobre el poder de Dios; tenemos esperanza porque Dios es poderoso y puede hacer todo lo que quiere (Sal 115:3). Con la segunda, tengamos esperanza porque el Señor es bueno, y su bondad perdura para siempre

(Sal 100:5). Con la tercera vela, podemos cimentar nuestra esperanza en la certeza de que Dios quiere que todos estemos a salvo (1Tm 2:4). Al encender la última vela, podríamos considerar su amor personal por cada uno de nosotros como el corazón de nuestra esperanza, mientras reflexionamos con San Pablo y decimos: «Me amó» (Gal 2:21).

Con estas cuatro razones, encontraremos inspiración cada semana para dejar que la luz de las velas ilumine nuestras almas y nos convierta en personas de gratitud y esperanza.



The "O Antiphons"

The O Antiphons refer to the seven verses that are recited (or chanted) preceding the *Magnificat* during Vespers of the Liturgy of the Hours. They cover the special period of Advent preparation known as the Octave before Christmas, December 17-23. These antiphons form the basis of the Advent hymn, "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel," put to music in 15th century France.

December 17—O Wisdom, O holy Word of God, you govern all creation with your strong yet tender care. Come and show your people the way to salvation.

December 18—O Sacred Lord of ancient Israel, who showed yourself to Moses in the burning bush, who gave him the holy law on Sinai mountain: come, stretch out your mighty hand to set us free.

December 19—O Flower of Jesse's Stem, you have been raised up as a sign for all peoples; kings stand silent in your presence; the nations bow down in worship before you. Come, let nothing keep you from coming to our aid.

December 20—O Key of David, O royal Power of Israel controlling at your will the gate of heaven: come, break down the prison walls of death for those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death; and lead your captive people into freedom.

December 21—O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice, come, shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death. **December 22—**O King of all the na-

December 22—O King of all the nations, the only joy of every human heart, O Keystone of the mighty arch of humanity, come and save the creature you fashioned from the dust.

December 23—*O Emmanuel*, king and lawgiver, desire of the nations, Savior of all people, come and set us free, Lord our God.

THE SYMBOLS OF ADVENT

The Advent Wreath and the Colors of Advent are probably the most popular symbols of the season. The Advent wreath is a circular garland of evergreen branches where four candles (and often a fifth, in the center) are arranged. During Advent one candle on the wreath is lit each week representing the coming of the Lord. The first, second and fourth weeks' candles are violet, the primary color of Advent, symbolizing royalty as we await the birth of Jesus Christ our King. The rose colored candle used during the third week represents joy as Christmas draws nearer. If used, white is the color of the center candle, representing the purity of Christ.

Another symbol, **The Jesse Tree** represents the family tree of Christ as a member of the royal family of King David, whose father was Jesse. Through this family history (see Mt 1:6-16), the story of God's salvation plan is recalled in the royal line from Jesse to the coming of the Messiah. Each day of Advent a homemade ornament is added to the Jesse Tree, a small tree made of evergreen branches. These symbolic ornaments each represent a family member, event or prophecy that moves God's plan to fulfillment in Jesus.

Other symbols include a **Nativity Scene** (**Crèche**) representing the birth of Jesus, and often including figures of Mary, Joseph, baby Jesus, shepherds, angels, and animals. **Angels**, which are significant in the Advent season as messengers of God's announcement of Jesus' birth to Mary, Joseph, and the shepherds. **Evergreens**, plants like holly, ivy, and pine represent eternal life and God's everlasting love.

Feasts of Mary During Advent & Christmas

Immaculate Conception December 8 (December 9th this year). Mary, conceived through an act of love by her mother and father, was born free of original sin and its effects from the first moment of her existence. This special privilege was conferred on her through God's grace in anticipation of the Redemption.


Our Lady of Guadalupe December 12. This feast celebrates the apparition of Mary to Juan Diego in the hills near Mexico City in 1531. Diego's cloak bore the image of Mary and has become Mexico's most popular religious symbol. This appearance encouraged native peoples to embrace Christianity.

Mary, Mother of God January 1. The Council of Ephesus (431), one of the earliest councils of the Church, declared that Christ was divine as well as human and that Mary, therefore, could be called not only as "the Mother of Jesus," but also as "the Mother of God."

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




We Are Pilgrims of Hope

On May 9, 2024 Pope Francis solemnly announced that the Church's Jubilee year 2025 "will be a Holy Year marked by a lively experience of grace and an opportunity to be renewed in the hope that does not fade, our hope in God. May it help us to recover the confident trust that we require, in the Church and in society, in our interpersonal relationships, in international relations, and in our task of promoting the dignity of all persons and respect for God's gift of creation. May the witness of believers be for our world a leaven of authentic hope, a harbinger of new heavens and a new earth, where men and women will dwell in justice and harmony, in joyful expectation of the fulfilment of the Lord's promises."

"Hope is the virtue that gives inward direction and purpose to the life of believers so that we may bear credible and attractive witness to the faith and love that dwell in our hearts; that our faith may be joyful and our charity enthusiastic; and that each of us may be able to offer a smile, a small gesture of friendship, a kind look, a ready ear, a good deed, in the knowledge that, in the Spirit of Jesus, these can become, for those who receive them, rich seeds of hope."

Our Pilgrimage Journey to and with Jesus

A pilgrimage is both an outer journey to a sacred place, and an inner journey to meet Christ and deepen our relationship with him. Thus Pope Francis desires that this Jubilee Year be a time "to encourage and sustain the hope that guides our steps towards the goal of a genuine, personal encounter with the risen Lord Jesus, who is not only the destination of our earthly pilgrimage but also a constant presence in our lives. I invite everyone to place their trust in the Lord who not only guides us, but is God-with-us, who loves us and walks with us in every circumstance of life. He shows us the path of love, lifts us up when we fall and supports us in our labors, opens our eyes to see our wretchedness and that of the world, but at the same time fills us with hope."



THE MEANING OF THE JUBILEE LOGO: PILGRIMS OF HOPE

The official logo of the 2025 Jubilee Year shows four colorful pilgrims, who symbolize all of humanity coming from all directions on their common journey to Christ. As they embrace each other in unity, the figure in front grasps the cross, which is the sign of our hope that united with Jesus we will also move through our death to new life. The elongated cross also changes at its base into an anchor, which was an ancient sign of hope because sailors used the anchor to stabilize ships during storms. So during the challenges of our daily lives and the events of the wider world symbolized by the rough waves beneath the pilgrims, hope keeps us focused on the goal of our pilgrimage to draw ever closer to encounter the Risen Christ.

WHAT IS A JUBILEE YEAR?

The jubilee year (from the Hebrew word *yobel*, meaning horn, which was blown to proclaim the year's beginning) is an ancient Jewish tradition (see Leviticus 25:8-17, 29-31) of pardon and reconciliation celebrated every 50 years (after a "sabbath of sabbaths," 7 x 7 years) when the community imitated God's mercy and forgiveness by forgiving debts and by each family returning to its own land and not cultivating it that year.

This jubilee tradition was first adapted for Catholics in 1300 by Pope Boniface VIII as a universal "year of forgiveness of all sins." Since that time the "ordinary" jubilee years have usually been at 50 or now 25 year intervals (the last was in 2000), with other "extraordinary" jubilee years declared for special reasons like that of Mercy in 2015. Jubilee years are characterized especially by prayer, good works, pilgrimages to sacred sites (especially Rome), cultural events and special indulgences for those who participate.

THE HOLY DOOR OF ST. PETER'S

Since the 1500's, the ceremonial opening at St. Peter's Basilica of the usually locked massive bronze Holy Door (also called the "Door of the Great Pardon" since its 16 panels portray various biblical scenes of sin and re-



demption) begins each Jubilee Year. After reciting specific prayers and invoking the Holy Spirit, the Pope pushes open the door and enters the Church, inviting pilgrims likewise to renew their spiritual journey and cross the threshold.

The opening of the Holy Door invites the faithful to embark on a journey of even deeper

faith. Crossing the threshold of the door is a powerful act, inspired by Jesus' words in John 10:9, "I am the door. If anyone enters by me, he will be saved and will go in and out and find pasture." This passage highlights the transformative experience of entering through the Holy Door, symbolizing the decision to follow Jesus, the Good Shepherd. The door serves as a physical and spiritual gateway, leading pilgrims into the sacred space of the church and inviting them to renew their commitment to their faith.

2025 JUBILEE PRAYER PILGRIMS OF HOPE

Father in heaven,
may the faith you have given us
in your son, Jesus Christ, our brother,
and the flame of charity enkindled
in our hearts by the Holy Spirit,
reawaken in us the blessed hope
for the coming of your Kingdom.

May your grace transform us into tireless cultivators of the seeds of the Gospel.

May those seeds transform from within both humanity and the whole cosmos in the sure expectation of a new heaven and a new earth, when, with the powers of Evil vanquished, your glory will shine eternally.

May the grace of the Jubilee reawaken in us, Pilgrims of Hope, a yearning for the treasures of heaven.

May that same grace spread the joy and peace of our Redeemer throughout the earth. To you our God, eternally blessed, be glory and praise for ever. *Amen.*





Waiting, but Quick!

This is the first Sunday of Advent, and the excitement is palpable. Writing 800 years before Christ, the prophet Isaiah sounds like breaking news: "They shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks." The psalmist announces we are already there: "And now we have set foot within your gates, O Jerusalem."

Saint Paul tickles our fancy with another whole round of "revelation" yet to come "on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ." Only Jesus himself seems a little cautious: "Be watchful! Be alert!" The Lord "is coming," but he's not here yet. Leave it to Jesus to force the paradox for which Advent seems to have been created: Jesus is present, but we dare not "sleep," lest we miss him!



How do we wait for Christmas? After Halloween, the Christmas lights go up, the carols start, the "Merry Christmas!" / "Happy Holidays!" debate begins. Lent is a time for repentance, alms, and fasting. But there's no fasting in Advent: we fill bags with gifts and stockings with goodies. The

Church tries to slow us down and encourage a little reflecting to prepare the way, led by John the Baptist. So let's keep waiting; let's hold on to our peace. Christmas Eve will be here soon enough. But let's not be too austere. A full menu of holiday parties and concerts and family feasts can legitimately "anticipate" Christmas. Let's cheer each other: Merry Advent!

Reflect What can I do to prepare for Christmas mindfully, peacefully, and joyfully?

Is Advent a penitential season?

Strictly speaking, the penitential times in the Church are "every Friday of the whole year and the season of Lent" (*Code of Canon Law*, 1250). Advent is a time to prepare for Christmas when Christ's First Coming is remembered, and this remembrance directs the mind and heart to await Christ's Second Coming at the end of time. (See *Universal Norms on the Liturgical Year and the General Roman Calendar*, 39.) While Advent is more



anticipatory than penitential, the US Conference of Catholic Bishops states, "Advent also includes an element of penance in the sense of preparing, quieting, and disciplining our hearts for the full joy of Christmas." Although, historically, Advent was similar to Lent as a forty-day period of prayer and fasting, it was less severe than the season preceding Easter, and it lacked uniformity in the Western Church. The Eastern Church still begins the Nativity Fast on November 15, while in the Western Church, Advent begins four Sundays before Christmas.

Regardless, the significant focus of Advent is our Lord's coming (adventus in Latin). The Church reflects this anticipation of Advent through such practices as limiting floral arrangements in the sanctuary, simpler liturgical music, and omitting the Gloria at Mass until Christmas. We can also reflect the anticipation of Advent through such spiritual practices as participation in works of charity, moderation in shopping, celebration of the sacrament of penance, fasting on Fridays, and prayerful contemplation on our Savior's Incarnation.
