SEPTEMBER 9, 2025 through SEPTEMBER 13, 2025 LIVESTOCK SHOW RULES, REGULATIONS AND PREMIUM LIST

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. Competition will be open for <u>ONLY</u> Marion County residents. Juniors must be a Marion County resident <u>and</u> be members of a Marion County FFA or 4-H club to be able to participate in show and premium sale.
- 2. Marion County Fair Association will make every effort for the safeguarding of all entries, but will not assume responsibility for an injury of damage whatsoever. No claim for injury or damage to any person or property shall be asserted against the Marion County Fair Association, its officers or members.
- 3. The Board of Directors will approve non-resident judges, and the decision of the judges will be final.
- 4. All questions in dispute not covered by rules of this catalog will be referred to the Marion County Fair Association Board of Directors, whose decision will be final.
- 5. Premium checks not cashed within 90 days after the fair will be voided.
- 6. Premiums must total at least \$1.00 before cash award will be paid.
- 7. Youth may exhibit in Junior Division no later than the fall after graduating from high school.
- 8. Premium checks will be mailed (no exceptions). To insure prompt delivery give proper mailing address when registering. Every effort is made to issue checks as soon as possible. Please do not call the fair manager.

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

PRE-REGISTRATION IS DUE BY MONDAY SEPTEMBER 1, 2025. ENTRY FEES AFTER THAT DATE WILL DOUBLE

Entry fees may be mailed to Marion County Fair & Livestock Show, PO Box 356 Summit, AR 72677. ENTRY FEES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED AT THE MARION COUNTY EXTENSION OFFICE. Make checks payable to: Marion County Fair and Livestock Show. Failure to pay the entry fees will result in the forfeiture of premium award money.

GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES

- All entries must have been raised by the owner or must have been purchased at least 30 days before the day of the show to be eligible for competition. The exhibitor must be the bona-fide owner of each entry except produce of dam in the case of dairy cattle. MUST PROVIDE A PROOF OF OWNERSHIP WHEN CHECKING IN!
- 2. Ribbons for livestock will be awarded. No ribbons will be awarded to animals below placing. Champions and Reserve Champions of each breed will receive purple ribbons.
- 3. In the Livestock Division, premiums will be paid on a point basis. The number of points earned in each department in both the junior and senior division will be divided into the total amount of money set up for premiums to determine the value of each point.
- 4. All entries of livestock must be handled by the exhibitor. If exhibitors have more than one entry in a class this will be excluded. If an animal gets loose from the exhibitor more than twice in the show ring they will be asked to leave the ring.
- 5. All livestock exhibits must be in place by 8:00 pm Wednesday, September 10, 2025, and remain in place until the auction is over Saturday, September 13, 2025, or forfeit premiums.
- 6. A showmanship contest will be held for junior exhibitors in beef cattle, dairy cattle, sheep, swine, goats, and rabbits. Showmanship divisions will be broken by age as of January 1, 2024 The divisions will be peewee 8 and under, junior 9 to 13 and senior 14 and above. To be eligible for showmanship, the exhibitor must have shown their own animal in a class.
- 7. Animals will be judged on a competitive basis and must be trained to lead or handle with ease. International Code Ring of Ethics will be followed. Failure to follow these guidelines may result in removal from fairgrounds.
- 8. Animals having no competition will be placed according to the merit of the animal.
- 9. An animal may be shown in all classes for which it is eligible.
- 10. No exhibitor is to show more than two animals in any one class.
- 11. Feed, water and care for livestock and poultry must be provided by the exhibitor. Exhibitors are responsible for the clean-up of their stalls, pens and aisles daily and refuse disposed of as the superintendent may direct. Failure to do so may result in management having said area cleaned with the cost to be deducted from the exhibitors premium check.
- 12. All Superintendents of each department must be familiar with all rules applying to their department, and abide by the rules.
- Poultry must be from pullorum free flocks, with a letter showing such, or be tested prior to the fair.
- 14. Help with the fitting of show animals will be limited to 4-H Leaders, FFA Advisors, parent/ legal guardian, siblings, and other Marion County Junior showman participants. NO HIRED PROFESSIONAL FITTERS!!
- 15. Junior Exhibitors are allowed to enter only one county fair. This is per state fair board rules. Any violation of this rule will cause forfeiture of premiums and added money.
- 16. Steers will be checked for appropriate age. Weigh-in for livestock will be Wednesday, September 10, 2025 at the time of check in (time may change.)

- 17. There will not be any intact males in any market classes this includes all species.
- 18. A class must have 3 animals in a class to have a grand and reserve. Single Entries will go to sale only with Judges approval.
- 19. In the case the Reserve animal is owned by a child that has chosen to sell a different species then the Born and Bred winners will move to the sale spot of the reserve animal.

IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS) NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE national Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial, and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug of the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only, and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 4. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

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SCHOLARSHIPS AND CAREER OPPORTUNITIES AVAILABLE

- 5. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 6. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 7. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitters trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 8. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible persons to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 9. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for action prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statues, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

ARKANSAS LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

- 1. All animals entering the grounds, including those showing in pet zoos, children's barnyard animals, Old McDonald Farms, etc. must meet the requirements of their particular species.
- 2. Arkansas livestock (except for Arkansas sheep, goats, horses, steers and rabbits) must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection issued within 90 days prior to exhibition, showing the following:

ARKANSAS CATTLE

1. Negative brucellosis test within 90 days prior to exhibition, for females and bulls 18 months of age and over. All heifers that have calved or are bred must be tested. Animals originating from a Certified Brucellosis Free Herd and Certified Herd number is shown on certificate are exempt. If Arkansas is a class free state, Arkansas cattle are exempt from testing.



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- 2. All heifers that are 4-12 months of age shall be vaccinated before entering show.
- Heifers that were born on or after January 1, 1985, that are over 12 months of age and are not official calfhood vaccinates will not be allowed to show (unless they are from a Brucellosis Certified Free Herd).

ARKANSAS SWINE

- 1. As of July 1, 2001, all swine must have an official premise identification.
- 2. Animals 6 months old or older to be tested negative for brucellosis within 90 days of exhibition or originate out of a Validated herd, with Validation number and date of last herd test shown on certificate (barrows exempt from brucellosis testing, but must be pseudorabies tested).
- 3. Animals to be tested negative for pseudorabies within 90 days of the exhibition on a test approved by the State Veterinarian or originate directly out of a Qualified Pseudorabies Free Herd, with Qualified Herd number and date of last test shown on certificate.
- 4. Free of other contagious, infections, and communicable diseases (erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, etc.); otherwise they will not be allowed to show and will be released from fairgrounds.
- 5. See Exhibitor Affidavit and back of catalog. This must be signed and turned in at the time of entry of animals in the fair.

ARKANSAS SHEEP

Sheep will be inspected on grounds. No sheep showing symptoms of disease, particularly foot rot, sore mouth, sheep pox, evidence of fungal infection and evidence of abscesses or with draining abscesses will not be allowed to show.

ARKANSAS GOATS

Goats may be examined on grounds by fair personnel, veterinarians or state-federal personnel. No goats showing evidence of abscesses and certainly draining abscesses will be allowed to show and may be released by fair officials, veterinarians, or state-federal personnel. Goats showing evidence of any other disease may be released. All goats except pygmy or dwarf must be dehorned or have horns tipped or padded for safety.

IDENTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS OF SHEEP AND GOATS

A Scrapie Tag or Official Goat Registry Tattoo with Registration Certificate is Required. A Scrapie Tag is Required on all Sheep & Goats. Original Paperwork from the state is required at the time of entry.

ARKANSAS HORSES

All horses must be healthy and serviceably sound. A negative Coggins test conducted within the past 12 months of show will be required for all animals over 6 months of age. Nursing foals under 6 months of age are exempt from testing if accompanied by negative tested dams. Must have original Coggins when entering fairgrounds. Papers will be checked.

ARKANSAS POULTRY

The requirements are as follows:

- All in-state poultry, which includes domesticated game birds, quail, pheasants, peafowl, guineas, and turkeys, present at exhibitions in Arkansas shall have originated from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent flocks or have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test within ninety (90) days of the movement to the exhibition (pullorum-typhoid testing on fairgrounds during the fair is prohibited). This information will be documented on a NPIP Form VS 9-3, 90 Day Certificate, NPIP Flock Certification Form or similar certificate which will accompany the poultry during exhibition.
- 2. All non-certified birds must be banded (leg or wing band), with a sealed band. Wrap-around plastic bands are not acceptable. In-state waterfowl are exempt from pullorum-typhoid requirements.
- 3. Any poultry showing evidence of infections or contagious disease or insect infestation will not be permitted to exhibit.

LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENTS

No temporary pens are to be made on the fairground property such as; barbed wire, hot wire etc. Tie outs are permitted without enclosure. In the premium sale, no spots will be bumped up to enter the auction or gain a placing. The animals in the prospect market hog class will not be eligible for the premium auction.

NEW AWARDS IN THE LIVESTOCK DIVISIONS

Owner must show proof of ownership and breeding on their family's farm in Marion County. The exhibitor must have the Verification Form signed by either your 4-H Leader, County Extension Agent or FFA leader. This form must be turned in at registration. These awards are for trophies only. No premium points will be awarded.

DEPARTMENT 1: DAIRY CATTLE Junior and Senior Divisions

ALL Cattle must be shown with a halter.

All Breed dairy cattle must be accompanied by registration papers to be shown in age classes. All bulls must be purebred in the breed classes. Females may be purebred or crossbred. Purebred will be shown by breeds and crossbred females shown separately. All breeds will be judged separately, except for County Grand and Reserve Champion. Classes will be the same for both Junior and Senior Divisions. All Blue and Red Ribbon winners in each breed will compete for Champion and Reserve Champion of the breed. Bulls 1 year of age or older must have a ring in their nose before being unloaded.

DEPARTMENT 1A: BUCKET CALVES Junior Division Only

- 1. Calves must be born after May 1, 2025.
- 2. Exhibitor can exhibit only one calf.
- 3. Calves will not be shown in other classes.

DEPARTMENT 2: BEEF CATTLE Junior and Senior Divisions

ALL Cattle must be shown with a halter.

All Breed Beef Cattle must be accompanied by registration papers to be shown in age classes. All bulls must be purebred in the breed classes. Females may be purebred or crossbred. Purebred will be shown by breeds and crossbred females shown separately. All breeds will be judged separately, except for







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County Grand and Reserve Champion. Classes will be the same for both Junior and Senior Divisions. All Blue and Red Ribbon winners in each breed will compete for Champion and Reserve Champion of the breed. Crossbred heifers will be shown by breed group (American, English, or Exotic). Bulls 1 year of age or older must have a ring in their nose before being unloaded.

You can be disqualified if you do not contend to the judge's requests. Exhibitor must care for Poultry at least once a day or have a designated (person/member) assigned to the job. If someone other than the exhibitor is caring for the animals please inform the superintendent when animals/birds are entered. Lack of caring for your animals will forfeit your premium money.

Any rabbits showing symptoms of illness, including but not limited to, ear mites, nasal and/or eye discharge will be denied entrance to the barn and unable to show. Exhibitors are responsible for caring or arranging for care of their own rabbit(s) while in the barn. This includes food, water, and clean-up. Exhibitors are NOT to feed or water other exhibitors animals, if an animal is without feed or water, please contact the Rabbit Superintendent. Rabbits MUST be placed on the judging table by the EXHIBITORS or their designate. Rabbits are to be checked in and remain on exhibit until designated release time. Exceptions to check in or release time are at the discretion of the Rabbit Superintendent. Removal of rabbits without Rabbit Superintendents permission could result in premiums being withheld. Any class with less than 3 entries will be awarded only if the judge determines animal to be fit for award. Only rigid nondrip water bottles allowed for rabbits. The barn will be open for rabbit judging. Fryer Rabbits will be born January 1 2025 or after.



Special entries <u>ONLY</u> for baking, horticulture, and field crops will be Wednesday September 10, 2025, from 7:00am to 8:30am. <u>NO</u> other departments will be entering this day. All exhibits will be judged Wednesday, September 10, 2025, beginning at 9:30am. The building will closed to the public during this time.
- All articles and products must be the work of the exhibitor and should not have been exhibited in previous years. Articles must have been completed within the previous year.
- 4. No exhibitor shall duplicate entries in any subclass or class within a department. This means ONLY 1 ENTRY PER CLASS OR ITEM LISTED.
- 5. Unfinished, broken, or soiled articles will not be accepted.
- 6. Each item must be tagged correctly with the class, department, division, name, and age if in division 1 or 2. if you need assistance, please view the video on Facebook or our website or go by the county extension office for assistance. DEPARTMENT 14 - FOOD PRESERVATION

RULES

- 1. All entries must have been preserved within the previous 12 months and can only be entered once.
- 2. Products exhibited must be in the name of the person who canned them.
- 3. Exhibits should be labeled with the product, date of food preservation, and method of preservation. Method should state whether processed in water bath, pressure canner, or using another method such as dehydration. For labels, contact County Extension Office or download from http://uaex.edu/health-living/ food-safety/preservation/. Low acid foods must be pressure canned.
- 4. Judging will be done by comparison to recognized standards of quality and safety. For a copy of these standards, contact the Extension office.
- 5. No food coloring of any kind is to be used in any products entered.
- 6. For judging and safety reasons, jars must be clear glass with Mason-type labels on jar or box. They must have a clean metal lid and ring, vacuum seal. and of acceptable size per recipe instructions. Jars must be sealed. Jar sizes specified on recipes will be accepted which are typically quart (32 oz), pint (16 oz), or half-pint (8 oz); quarter pints may be used in dried foods ONLY. ABSOLUTLY NO SQUATTY JARS OR TALL 12 OZ JARS WILL BE ACCEPTED. OR DISPLAYED.

DRIED FOODS: Jars of any size are not required to be sealed and points will be awarded for each product.

FLAVORED VINEGARS: clear bottle/ iar with closure. Vinegars are not required to be sealed.

JAMS AND JELLIES: No food coloring. All jars must be processed and properly sealed. No paraffin or wax seals. Further instructions found in the jams and jellies section.

**HONEY: All Honey should be entered in Department 23A, APIARY



Criteria for Judging Photography

I. Picture Quality - 25 points

Is this picture in focus; exposed correctly; sharp or grainy; blurry; clean (no dust spots, scratches, smudges or finger prints); correct shutter speed used; correct lighting, contrast, color (processor's fault sometimes); appropriate use of flash; consider technical aspects of picture in this criteria.

II. Story Telling Ability - 25 points

Is one idea presented; what story does picture tell; significance of picture or subject; does it have impact; is it unusual, interesting or blah; is it just a "pretty picture": what is emotional effect.

III. Composition - 50 points

Does it follow the Rule of Thirds; what is center of interest; good use of elements of balance, design, color, lines, angles, contrast, depth, framing and focus; is background appropriate; close-up or wide-angle use; are all of the elements composed in a pleasing arrangement.
