Our Mission

To help African Americans and others in underserved communities achieve their highest true social parity, economic self-reliance, power, and civil rights.

The League promotes economic empowerment through education and job training, housing and community development, workforce development, entrepreneurship, health, and quality of life.

Brief History

For many years, Buffalo's Ellicott District welcomed immigrant families. During the Great Depression, new challenges led the National Urban League to turn its attention to Buffalo. Dr. Charles Johnson of Fisk University was appointed to conduct a study and recommended the establishment of an affiliate office to serve Buffalo's African American population, which had reached 9,000. With the generous funding of Mrs. Alfred Schoellkopf, the Buffalo Urban League was founded and operated out of a four-room office suite located at 357 William Street. William L. Evans, Executive Director, and Teresa Green were among the early administrators providing services from the offices housed above a clothing store.

In the fall of 1927, the first Urban League Guild was formed under the leadership of Mrs. Schoellkopf, Ms. Clara L. Payne, Mrs. William H. Bethel, and Mrs. John Montgomery. The Guild served as the publicity arm of the League, with membership spanning the city. In 1963, Nelson H. Nichols Jr. was appointed Executive Director, succeeding William L. Evans, who had served for 37 years. In the fall of 1972, Leroy R. Coles, Executive Director of the Union County Urban League in New Jersey, was appointed to lead the Buffalo Urban League. Following Coles' retirement in 1998, after 26 years of service, Brenda W. McDuffie became the first woman to be appointed President and CEO of the Buffalo Urban League.

In the fall of 2020, amidst the COVID-19 pandemic, widespread protests for racial justice, crucial political moments, and economic uncertainty, Thomas Beauford Jr. was appointed President and CEO of the Buffalo Urban League.

Fidelis Care Center for Community Advancement

In January 2025, the Buffalo Urban League launched the Fidelis Care Center for Community Advancement (FCCCA) to strengthen the infrastructure of Community Based Organizations (CBOs) across Buffalo. The Center directly supports nonprofits that often operate with limited budgets, funding barriers and lack access to customized resources.

Aligned with the Buffalo Urban League's mission to advance social and economic self-sufficiency, the FCCCA provides:

- Strategic training and tailored support to build organizational resilience.
- Peer learning and mentorship networks through support circles and experienced mentors.
- Collaborative online workshops focused on grant-writing and resource development.
- Technical assistance and consulting services, including financial and grantreadiness support.

Together, these efforts equip CBOs with the tools, knowledge and connections needed to thrive and expand their community impact.

MOBILE OUTREACH



The Buffalo Urban League convened a coalition of health partners including the Health Foundation for Western and Central New York, Highmark Blue Cross Blue Shield and Univera Healthcare to jointly identify, fund, and purchase a mobile outreach unit.



By spring 2025, this vision was realized with the acquisition of a 37-foot Mobile Health Unit, formerly utilized as a mobile exam center and now renovated to include three exam rooms. Beginning in fall 2025, the Buffalo Urban League will deploy this unit to expand access to critical health and wellness services for residents of Buffalo's East Side.

The Mobile Health Unit will be a community-based hub for:

- Collaboration with local healthcare providers to maximize reach and impact
- Support network development to strengthen families and neighborhoods
- Community health workshops and trainings focused on prevention and wellness
- Advocacy for equitable access to high-quality healthcare. Maternal mental health awareness campaigns to support mothers and families

YOUNG PROFESSIONALS
