Maths at Davies Lane

The Young Mathematicians of Davies Lane Primary School have continued to build upon their fantastic skills from last term and are using their mathematical knowledge to tackle problem solving activities. This has been supported by daily 'Early morning Maths', beginning from 8.40am onwards. Maths activities at the start of the school day are designed to allow children to engage not only with practical resources which can help in their understanding of how to use logical thinking in solving reasoning questions but also develop a positive mindset and enjoyment of maths!


Mathematical Thinking

Mathematical thinking is central to how pupils from Davies Lane learn mathematics. This includes how children look for patterns and relationships in numbers, making connections and thinking about how they can solve problems with reasoning and finally being able to verbalise their ideas. During lessons children are actively engaged in mathematical thinking - in this example discussing the properties of shapes, and then communicating their ideas using precise mathematical language.

n this example if a regular hexagon has six sides then its perimeter will be '6 lots of...'. Reasoning allows this knowledge to be transferred to other shapes, for example a rectangle.

Using everyday resources, in this case coins, children from Year 1 are given opportunities to discuss money, learning about coins and notes and their symbols - £ for pounds and p for pence.



In this instance the child is solving money problems practically, finding a fraction of an amount and moving towards understanding that 2/4 of an amount is equal to ½. From this your child will progress to using addition and subtraction and recording money amounts using decimals.


Phonics at Davies Lane

At Davies Lane, we believe that synthetic phonics is an effective method of ensuring children learn to read quickly and proficiently. During the Spring Term, the children made significant progress in their journey to becoming fluent readers.

Children and teachers have been working extremely hard in revising and consolidating phonics sounds. Using a range of multi-sensory methods for example phoneme fingers, sound buttons, magnetic letters and flashcards, children have been encouraged to become more confident at reading real and pseudo words. A variety of interactive resources were used to support the children in decoding, blending and segmenting unfamiliar words. The sessions were also a great way of teaching the children how to form and write letters correctly.

Thank you to all the parents who have been reading regularly with their children. We appreciate your support in consolidating their learning and encouraging their love for reading.








Writing at Davies Lane


At Davies Lane Primary, we are committed to developing confident and articulate writers through a curriculum that integrates writing across all subjects. From September, remarkable progress is visible in the children's work, from creative narratives in Literacy to historical analyses, persuasive speeches, and balanced arguments.


Writing is embedded throughout the curriculum, reinforcing key skills in different contexts. In Literacy, pupils write for a range of purposes, developing settings and characters in narratives, crafting newspaper reports, persuasive speeches, and structured arguments. In History, writing is used to showcase learning, justify opinions, and evaluate primary and secondary sources. In Art and Design Technology, pupils analyse artistic styles, discuss techniques, and write evaluations of their own work. Through PE, children develop fine motor skills which in turn support their writing, building the muscles and resilience required to write legibly at length.

This term, Davies Lane has excelled in the debating competitions held across the academy, providing pupils with opportunities to showcase their linguistic and critical thinking skills.

The cyclical nature of our curriculum ensures that pupils continuously revisit, refine, and improve their writing skills. Exposure to a variety of writing purposes across subjects equips them with the confidence and expertise to express themselves effectively. By the time they leave Davies Lane, our pupils are mature, articulate, and skilled writers, prepared for success in their future learning and beyond.

Part of our promotion of reading also involves our caught reading challenge. For this we challenge the children to be 'caught reading' in unusual places (the more unusual the better). From this we then create a display for our library. The challenge is outgoing throughout the year so if you do catch your child reading in an unusual place take a photograph and send it in. We love to see some of the creative places the children think of.






MFL at Davies Lane

In Year 3, we learned language relating to celebrations of special occasions and activities and games. We also learned to say the name of the month in which we Reading is at the heart of all our work and our children celebrate our birthday. This unit consolidates language-





In Year 4, we worked on sounds and spellings. We continued to gain confidence in manipulating numbers. We learned some common adjectives, revised how to make simple feminine agreements and gave instructions to each other. This unit is based on the story of Goldilocks and the three bears, so we even wrote a new story with different characters.

In Year 5, we learned how to understand and use names for places in the local area. We followed and gave directions, and we described our route to school. We drew a map of our journey to school and labeled it in French.



In year 6, we learned to ask for drinks and snacks. We listened to songs and discussed healthy and unhealthy diets. We used the dictionary to look up healthy snacks and we wrote a paragraph about our favourite foods. Using the computer, we created a presentation about our favourite snacks.



Music at Davies Lane

This term has been a remarkable showcase of musical talent and dedication. Year 3 and Year 5 have worked diligently on their respective musical productions, with Year 3 presenting A Midsummer Night's Dream and Year 5 delivering a compelling adaptation of The Highwayman.

In addition to these performances, we were proud to have some of our most accomplished musicians and vocalists represent us at the annual Stratford and East London Festival. The competition was formidable, yet the Arbor Choir performed with exceptional passion and skill, gaining second place in their category. The newly established Arbor Orchestra delivered an outstanding debut and came home with first prize! These ensembles, comprising students from Davies Lane and other schools within the Arbor Academy Trust, foster a strong sense of teamwork and collaboration—an invaluable experience, given that we are often competing against one another in debates and spelling bees!

Our music curriculum continues to provide students with access to a diverse range of musical styles, encouraging both technical proficiency and individual creativity in performance. The spring term has seen a continued focus on the BBC Ten Pieces initiative, where students compose, rehearse, and perform original pieces inspired by iconic works of music, further enriching their artistic development.

Our RE classes typically explore the teachings, practices, and histories of major world religions such as Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, Judaism, and Buddhism. The children learn about secular beliefs and philosophies, encouraging critical thinking and self-reflection on their values and worldviews.

Beyond academic knowledge, our lessons encourage moral development, teaching children to consider ethical dilemmas, personal responsibility, and the importance of compassion. Science at Davies Lane has gone from strength to strength this term, with curious learners across the school deepening their understanding through engaging experiments, thoughtful research, and the development of their working scientifically skills.

Our young scientists have been busy using their problem -solving abilities to explore relatable scientific questions. From making predictions to testing and analysing their results, the children have demonstrated excellent reasoning skills. Year 1 investigated properties and their material- testing out suitability of materials for a purpose. Year 3 continue their learning on forces; making predictions and analysing their findings.

Across the school or classes have also made observations over time with our 'science in action' station in our classes. Focusing on questions to make meaningful connections between classroom learning and real-world applications. Year 5 explored the concept of artificial propagation- attempting to grow a new spring onion using various cuttings from an existing one.





History in Davies Lane

This term the children have been learning about what life was like in the near and distant past. Year 1 have been learning British Industrialisation. This includes learning about the Industrial revolution, railways, bicycles and the invention of the telephone.






Year 2 have been studying the lives of significant individuals such as Elizabeth I and William Caxton with his printing press. They have also been looking at the national and global impact of Mary Seacole and Florence Nightingale. This included identifying the bias involved in the history of the 2 nurses.

Year 3 were excited to visit the British Museum as part of their discovery into the Ancient Egyptians.

The children were able to develop their knowledge of the time by studying artefacts and images. Year 4 have been immersing themselves in the Viking and Anglo Saxon struggle for the Kingdom of England to the time of Edward the Confessor. They learnt about the trade and exploration alongside the laws and justice system. Year 5 have been learning about the changing power of the British monarchs. They have studied the monarchy form the Saxon kings to Queen Elizabeth II.

Year 6 tackled the complexities of Changes in social history through Crime and Punishment. The changes in crime and punishment reveal lots about the society at the time. They have also visited the Tower of London to discover how it was used as a prison in the past.



Geography at Davies Lane


This term in Geography we have been studying data and what this can tell us about the world and the local environment. The data we have analysed includes information about human and physical geography. Year 2 have been comparing and contrasting the population of a rural and urban area. They have included examining the different numbers of men and women in each location.

Year 3 have also been analysing the data displayed on a line graph to discover the changes to the population of London over time. This has allowed them to make statements and predictions about what might happen to the population in the future. Year 4 have been learning about topography and have created diagrams to demonstrate the different elevations depicted by the topography lines on a map.

Year 5 have been using the data collected to understand which biomes have the most and least rainfall and the impact the rainfall has on the vegetation growing in each biome.









Year 1 have been learning about compasses and have created their own maps of the local area. They were able to follow compass directions and instructions to move from one area to another.



Computing

This term, our Computing lessons have been packed with creativity and digital skill-building. Each year group has been developing their understanding of technology through exciting, hands-on projects:

Year 1 – We Are Painters: Our youngest learners have been using digital tools to create artwork, exploring how technology can help them express their creativity.

Year 2 – We Are Researchers: Students have been developing their research skills, learning how to find and present information safely and effectively.




Year 3 – We Are Presenters: This term, students have been creating and delivering digital presentations, building confidence in using multimedia tools.

Year 4 – We Are Musicians: Using BandLab, students have been composing and editing their own music, discovering the power of digital audio creation.



Year 5 – We Are Artists: Exploring the links between computing and geometry, students have been creating digital artwork using mathematical concepts.



Year 6 – We Are Advertisers: Our oldest students have been designing and producing digital advertisements, combining creativity with persuasive communication skills.





PE at Davies Lane

At Davies Lane Primary School, Physical Education is more than just an opportunity for students to be active—it is an integral part of their learning experience.
