Sunday School in February

Can you remember from our January write-up who we are studying this month? Here's a wee hint...This Prophet was born a Hebrew, raised in the Egyptian court by the Pharaoh's daughter and was a heroic leader for the Israelites. I don't want to give away all the juicy details of this brave man's life but yes, you've got it... it's Moses!!

We left off in January just scratching the surface of our *Journey with Moses*, studying his miraculous beginning and the privileged upbringing of this Hebrew baby.





On February 4th we met at Knox to dive into Moses in his young adult years. He was all grown up now and curious about who he was and where he and his descendants had come from. He lived like a Prince but his people were slaves – who was he? One day, when out in the hills, Moses saw a

bush in fire. It was God! And he explained everything to Moses. Moses

was afraid but he knew that he could trust in God and that his word was good. Exodus: 3 tells us – "God Talks to Me" and all we have to do is listen and trust in Him. Using a variety of different crafting materials, we made our own burning bushes on this day.





February 11^{th,} we gathered at Alsfeldt to jump into our next chapter of our

Journey with Moses. Today it was all about the terrible plagues that God sent upon the Egyptian people. My goodness our young children sure do like talking about bugs, frogs, flies and locusts. We got right to work on this day making all kinds of bugs out of clothes pins. We then enjoyed black bottom cupcakes (a delicious Jean Field recipe) and juice.



Our final time together in February was on the 25th (as the 18th we stayed in church to participate in communion to mark the first Sunday of Lent). We met at Knox for a "Double Lesson" of Moses while the Annual Meeting took place. Oh, the time we had to talk all things Moses and wrap up our journey with God's heroic Prophet. We started at the Red Sea, where Moses and his Hebrew people were trapped. They had travelled many miles through the desert only to find themselves blocked by the Red Sea and Pharaoh's angry army that wished to bring them back to Egypt. But God was there! He was there to part the sea and bring the Hebrew people safely to the other side. He gave them food to eat, water to drink and special instructions on how they should live and worship our one-and-only God. During our Sunday School time



together, we read about Moses in our Bible in segments and watched short videos to illustrate each Milestone. To demonstrate crossing the red sea further, we transformed a simple popsicle stick to look like Moses and then used his staff to 'part the sea'. We sprinkled pepper in a small cup of water, dipped Moses' staff in dish soap and then placed the staff in

the peppered water. Immediately the pepper separated and repelled away from the soap covered staff! Brilliant! Science



can build up an appetite, so we made the parted red sea using blue icing and a graham cracker to snack on.



We then dove into the Ten

Commandments – Learning how to live in God's way according to the special instructions God gave Moses on top of Mount Sinai. After we had a fun time memorizing the Commandments and creating a poster board, we made our own Commandment stones using graham crackers, white icing and smarties.





So that's it for Moses, a Prophet who spoke to our Lord and lived his life showing his faith in God for 120 years. A teacher and leader to those who continuously thought that they had no way out, no way to their promised land. It took strength, community and a whole of a lot of faith and patients in God. But a happy ending for all!


I believe churches are meant for praising God. But so are 2am car rides, showers, coffee shops, the gym, conversations with friends, strangers, etc. Don't let a building confine your faith because we will never change the world by just going to church, we need to be the church.

On February 26, Kindred Works held a ground-breaking ceremony for a new redevelopment project at St. James United Church in Waterdown, ON. The United Church of Canada established Kindred Works to repurpose church properties to respond to Canada's housing crisis and create lasting benefits and a legacy for future generations.

Janet McCausland, Senior Advisor for Kindred Works, describes the ground-breaking: "The sun was out as we broke ground on the St. James United Church redevelopment project, bursting with new hope for the future. The mixed-income housing project, developed with partner Kindred Works, will build 44 rental homes in three-storey apartments and three-bedroom townhouses.

"The project also includes a children's play area and a community garden, along with adding a new daycare space in the church. The site is in close proximity to many amenities and is located near the

Aldershot GO station, so residents will enjoy convenient and efficient access to the greater golden horseshoe through Metrolinx regional transit system. "The development is sustainable - climate safe, designed for the 2050 climate and uses carbon reduction strategies, and accessible - with one third of the homes available at below market rent. The congregation is excited to see their efforts over a number of years finally come to life, offering new revenue and community engagement opportunities to keep its ministry strong and vibrant for many years to come."
