# The Peace of Christ – part 4

The first word from Jesus to the locked down disciples, after the resurrection, according to John's gospel was "Peace". Then, showing his disciples his wounds, Jesus said "As the father has sent me so I send you." With the one word, "Peace" Jesus erased the guilt. There was no need to dwell on personal failures, or thoughts of "If only I had said this or done that." That was the past. It was over. It was "Christ has risen. Christ has risen in us. Our mission is to represent the risen Christ in the world."

That first statement of faith "Jesus is Lord" flew in the face of the political statement at the time, "Caesar is Lord." To say, "Jesus is Lord," amounted to treason. Death squads were enlisted to stamp out this new movement. These followers of "The Way" were tracked, traced, arrested, put in prison, crucified or stoned to death. Some were thrown into arenas with wild animals or armed gladiators to be killed.

As we know, a Roman citizen by the name of Saul was a member of one of these death squads. When a follower by the name of Stephen was killed by stoning Saul was so touched by Stephen's courage and love that Saul was converted. Paul, his new name, spent the rest of his life working for the cause, in and out of prison, until he was finally executed by the state.

Paul was without malice, though admitting they were being "killed all the day long." (Romans 8:22) Paul suggests that if they did feel like heaping burning coals on the heads of their persecutors, just be kind to them. "When your enemy is hungry, feed

him and when he is thirsty, give him a drink". (Romans 12:20-21) Paul was a strong believer that evil would be overcome by good. It was the only path to lasting peace. The persecutions lasted for two hundred years and the number of followers increased slowly. By the year 300, an estimated 10% of the population (6 million) were followers of "the Way."

Then a strange thing happened. Constantine, a follower of the official Roman Sun god, Sol Invictus, was about to fight a rival candidate for the position of Emperor. He had long admired the courage



of Christians. Before the battle he decided to paint crosses on his soldiers' shields. When he won the battle, he was convinced that this new God was now his God.

In the year 313 Constantine passed the Edict of Milan, giving freedom of worship throughout the Empire. He gave his palace in Rome to the bishop of Rome and built a cathedral. For the first time churches, with the support of the Empire, began to be built. **The church had won, or had it?** The Empire had finally embraced the church, but the church had just embraced the Empire. What was gained? What was

lost? What would be the future of this non-violent path to peace?



**Honey Bees** The honey bee begins life



when the Queen bee lays a tiny white egg in a six-sided bee-sized cell made of bees wax. In just three days the egg hatches into a tiny worm or larva. The larva turns into a pupa which looks **like a** 

worm in a onesie. How cool is that? The pupa becomes an adult bee. From egg to adult takes just three weeks. Wow! How would you like to grow to be an adult in three weeks?


Adult worker bees can be larva moms, who feed the larva; cleaners, to keep the hive clean; guards, who keep the hive safe; air conditioners, who keep the hive cool in summer; and pollen and nectar gatherers. Next comes flight school where they learn where to find flowers. From pollen and nectar from flowers bees make honey.

Bees can't talk, so they dance. Bees wiggle their bodies and stamp their feet to tell other bees where the flowers are. We have a dance that tells a story. Do you know what it is? The name starts with "b". After flight school the bees go to collect pollen and nectar. (Short CBC video)

Bees need flowers to make honey, but the flowers need bees to make seeds and fruit. So, next time you eat an apple or crunch down on a dill pickle, thank a bee. Better than that, do a little dance. You can call it the "Honey Bee". If you think that is a silly name for a dance, ask your grandma if she ever danced the "Mashed Potato". Maybe she will show you how.

Allow God to lovingly transform your spirit into a 'pearl of great price.'



# The committee has established guidelines for applications for the work of Clusters/Networks.

- To support the publication of Oxford Connections, the monthly newsletter produced by Marg Murray and Glen Wright - e.g. online site, licensing
- To support the Friends of Oxford gatherings - e.g. guest speakers' expenses
- To support projects/special events of Clusters/Networks (a minimum of 3 pastoral charges)

#### WHAT HAS HAPPENED TO DATE

A committee of four - Lori Minler, Lloyd Bennett, Celia Orth and Lynne Dunlop (current chair) - was appointed by ARWRC in November 2019.

This committee approved funding of \$4,000 to Christina Crawford and \$2,000 to Nancy Vandenberghe (pro-rated for 1 semester) for 2019 studies as candidates for ministry.

The committee approved funding of \$1482 to Nancy Vandenberghe for 2020 studies as a candidate for ministry.

#### THE HISTORY OF THIS FUND:

One of the final decisions made by Oxford Presbytery in November 2018 was to create a Legacy Fund with half of the remaining financial assets as of the closing of presbyteries on Dec. 31, 2018. After all financial obligations were met, this Fund received approximately \$55,000, held now in trust by ARWRC.

(<u>Note</u>: the use of the word Oxford or the phrase Oxford County is understood to include the boundaries of the former Oxford Presbytery 2018.)

#### **PURPOSE OF FUND**

- 1. to promote the work of clusters and networks that include Oxford United Church communities of faith.
- 2. to provide financial support to candidates for ministry who are connected to Oxford United Church communities of faith.

#### ADMINISTRATION OF FUND

That up to one-half of the original fund be allocated for financial support for Candidates for Ministry who are currently connected to Oxford.

That at least one-half of the original fund be allocated for the work of clusters/networks linked with Oxford.

That Antler River Watershed Regional Council appoint a Committee comprised of 4 people from Oxford ideally: 2 ministry personnel and 2 lay reps to the Antler River Watershed Regional Council and representing both north of Hwy 401 and south of Hwy 401.

That this Committee's work would be in effect from Jan. 2019 to Dec. 2021 with an option in 2021 to request that the Regional Council extend the mandate of the committee by one year to Dec. 2022. **Any**

monies remaining at the end of the mandate of the Committee are to be turned over to the Regional Council as unrestricted funds.

# GUIDELINES FOR APPLICATIONS TO THE FUND

1. Clusters/Networks (at least half of the original total of the fund)

That grants be available to clusters/networks for proposals that would further the faithful work of clusters or networks that would include as part of their makeup Oxford communities of faith with a further requirement that these clusters/networks would include a minimum of 3 pastoral charges.

- 2. Financial Support for Candidates for Ministry (up to half of the original total of the fund)
- That up to \$4000 per calendar year be available to each full-time student enrolled in a ministry pathway. That a pro-rated amount be available each calendar year for part-time students enrolled in a ministry pathway.


