
GOD'S LOVE (pg 8) for all is grounded in prayer for each other challenging us to

FOOD FOR THE SOUL

Events of hope

There were **two events** in late **September that were occasions for celebration**: one was the Rev. Doug Peck's interview with the Rev. Dr. Jessica Heatherington on Ecotheology, held on September 22 and seen by a number of you on zoom (<u>see video here</u>). The other was the First National day for Truth and Reconciliation September. 30th.

Ecotheology is about caring for the earth. At least it will enrich our lives; at best it will save our planet. The interview touched on our relationship with creation. I found it life giving and hopeful. The good news is there are more events with Professor Heatherington to come (see page 6).

The Day for Truth and Reconciliation was a day of orange shirts and storytelling, a day of pain and hope.

We have our own stories in the United Church. The Rev. Egerton Ryerson's passion was education. He promoted it, established countless schools in Ontario including Victoria University. He has become infamous, however, for being one of the architects of the Residential School system. He said of the Indigenous People, "We need to civilize them and Christianize them and get them to give up their old ways."

Civility with Indigenous people was not exactly our strength. Europeans had come to North America with enough viruses to wipe out about 90% of the Indigenous population. Europeans had taken their land, their livelihood, and their language. They had brought with them their racism that was a factor in the loss of life of approximately

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6000 children, and in our day, the 5000 missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls. That's very uncivil behaviour and it is ours.

Another passion of Ryerson's was to evangelize. It took the church until 1966 to pass a motion to listen and learn from those of other denominations and religions because God could speak through others as well. While evangelism was not forgotten, dialogue was now the approach. For the Indigenous people it was just a hundred years too late.

Indigenous people had and have much to teach us. Indigenous people believed that you could not own the earth. It belonged to the Creator. Owning a piece of the earth was like owning a piece of the sky. It couldn't be done. Indigenous people believed that they were part of creation. It gave them life. It was their mother earth. They had been good stewards of the earth for at least ten thousand years.

So, we are into October a month of thanksgiving. The two September events are still fresh in my mind. There are the gentle words of Jessica Heatherington about our relationship with creation and the words of Egerton Ryerson. "We need to civilize them, Christianize them, and get them to give up their old ways." I hear these words again and realize that the "them" is not the Indigenous people, as Ryerson intended, but us. Whether we are speaking of climate change or our treatment of Indigenous people, the cartoon character Pogo was right after all, "We have met the enemy and he is us."

A warm welcome from Oxford to Janice.



In late November 2017, I began my journey as a Designated Lay Minister Candidate at KTV United Church (Kelvin, Teeterville, Vanessa) in Horseshoe Falls Region. This past

spring, I celebrated my convocation at St. Andrews College through zoom. Due to Covid 19 restrictions, my recognition service with the Horseshoe Falls Region was postponed till October. I will admit that I am a bit startled how emotional I am feeling as with great anticipation the day of the service draws closer.

I am excited for the opportunity to serve Norwich United Church in Antler River Watershed Region. Even with KTV United Church and Norwich UC being in different regions, it is a natural fit for a sharing ministry. In Canada we measure distance by travel time and the churches are only fifteen minutes from each other. OXFORD UNITED REFUGEE SUPPORT COMMITTEE (OURS)

OURS held their annual meeting on September 19,2021 at St David's in Woodstock and welcomed guests Rev. Jeffrey Smith of St. David's UC and Sharon Fraser representing the Mission and Outreach committee of Knox UC in Embro. With regret, we accepted the resignation of Karen Gresty.

We welcome any interested person to contact us for information about how you and/or your church could contribute to the effort to bring refugees safely to Canada.

The situation with our sponsorships has not changed since our last report. We continue to support St. David's UC with the co-sponsorships of 6 Eritreans living in Ethiopia where the civil war continues. The Temnewu family (4), await interviews by Canadian immigration officials based in Nairobi. Our national UCC has submitted the other 2 refugee's applications, the Habte brothers, to Ottawa. We hope to hear soon that their paperwork has been sent to Nairobi to have their interviews scheduled. There is also 1 refugee in Sudan, Yemane, who is also awaiting an interview.

OURS is also supporting Trinity United in Ingersoll as the congregation applies to cosponsor an Iraqi family of 5: Wisam Al-Mohammedawi and his wife Nedi Al-Saadi, and children Anaam, Razan, and Shahad.

Once national UCC has assessed their applications in 2022, they will be sent to Ottawa. We do not expect this family to arrive until 2023.

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



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LONG TERM CARE - CRISIS



Concurrent with the opening of the new session of the Ontario legislature on Monday, October 4, the Ontario Health Coalition (OHC) staged protests at Queen's Park and local offices of MPPs. (see coverage here). Your co-editor (CONNECTIONS) was among those protesting at Ernie Hardeman's office in Woodstock. The conditions of Long Term Care (LTC) homes have been well documented in the OHC's 2019 Report found here "Situation Critical" In 2020, the military's assistance confirmed the promise horrors. The in the Government's throne speech of 30,000 additional beds over 10 years isn't enough to address the 40,000 people on wait lists as of December 2020 with an average wait time of 144 days. Care also а concern because this Government has NOT used present legislation to weed out bad operators. It is an improvement but there is a lot more to be done. For-profit care facilities continue to put profit over care. Any one needing extra care and having someone advocate for them takes time away from normal hours of care for everyone. MM

What can you do? Educate yourself. Become a voice for change.



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




I have been encouraged when I read what is taking place on the campus of my Alma Mater, U of Guelph
