

FOOD FOR THE SOUL

More Than Benches

It's November. You can feel the chill in the air. By now you may have heard that the Woodstock Council with a 5 to 1 vote has removed all downtown benches and picnic tables including those at the Museum Square. They have also hired two guards at \$50,000 to make sure those, often homeless, who like to gather in the park, don't.

November this year marks the beginning of Advent, that special time of the year when we make an extra effort to reach out to the marginalized as part of the preparation leading up to the celebrating of Christ's birth. We are also aware that poverty is much more than a one-month experience.

Is it possible to eliminate poverty? It is but not easily. We are halfway there. The churches, the community and all levels of government are involved in addressing the problem. We need governments to do more which means higher taxes.

Russian philosopher Nicolas Berdyaev once said, "Bread for myself is a material problem. Bread for my neighbour is a spiritual one." That would make voting for higher taxes a spiritual act.

But back to the benches. The news of the bench removal brought to mind Pete Seeger's haunting ballad "Where have all the Flowers gone?" We could substitute the word benches for flowers. "Where have all the benches gone, long time passing. Gone to storage everyone. When will they every learn?"

There may be a problem in the downtown that needs to be addressed. It is just that

if we are going to spend \$50,000, there should be a more hospitable way for the Friendly City to solve it.

There is no small irony if they decide to put up Christmas lights in the park where this year there will be no room to sit down. Or they could add a sign, "No Vacancy" like in first century Bethlehem.

There is a parable from Matthew's gospel (25:31) where Jesus said, "I was hungry, and you gave me food. I was thirsty and you gave me drink. I was a stranger and you welcomed me," The people said. "We don't remember. . ." Jesus then said, "I was the one you were helping."

It is something that I will remember when I see the Christmas lights in the downtown park, a park and a city, sad to say, that has lost far more than its benches.

Covid: Our Summons

Is the real issue facing us during this difficult time not how we are coping with this virus, or the vaccination options available but rather has it revealed our alienation from one other and the Divine mystery?

Has this pandemic exposed the weakness of our civilization; decline and decaying of absolutes; our care of and for one another. Is the refusal to adhere to government requests, the resistance to accept the information science is offering and the reluctance to consider the welfare and health of one another a symptom of the deterioration of our society's core values? Perhaps the significant dynamic in this failing is that we no longer recognize and feel the interconnectedness between one another; have ceased to accept our interdependence upon one another and are not committed to the responsibility of and for one another.

People are angry, frustrated, fearful. Frequent visits with loved ones have been interrupted; we have had to wear masks that are often uncomfortable, and some are hesitant to go out. Several folks are fearful of what might happen in the near their freedom. future regarding essence our normal way of life has been interrupted. The pillars that sustained our society during our history as a people are crumbling. However, is now "for such a time as this" that we as the people of God must confront this attitude. Is now the time for the church

LONG TERM CARE - CRISIS

The government of Ontario introduced legislation (October 28, 2021) called the NEW LTC Act which sounds hopeful but does not increase care to 4 hours per resident per day until 2025; drops the requirement that the government promote the delivery of long-term care by non-profit organizations. The Ontario Health Coalition provides a detailed analysis here.

In other words, we need to continue to monitor and advocate for better care.


HOMELESSNESS IN OXFORD



On November 4, about 100 people gathered in lawn chairs in Museum Square in Woodstock to protest the removal of benches and picnic tables from the downtown area. Some held signs "What's Missing? Benches! Compassion!" Some spoke with Heart FM from Oxford Coalition for Social Justice and Unifor 636 (listen here) .There is no easy solution. We need to work together to end homelessness. The Oxford Housing Action Collaborative (OHAC) is an alliance of community partners to end homelessness in Oxford. Our church buildings are community hubs and real estate assets. Could we make better use of them for people who are homeless? Housing for all is an important choice for us to make.

SIX NATIONS SHARING CIRCLE (formerly Grandmother's Tea)

The October Sharing Circle led by Gloria A Cook, an elder from Manitoba, was profoundly valuable. Usina Medicine Wheel. Gloria helped understand the traditional way of living a healthy life. Everything which Gloria said was consistent with my knowledge of having mature healthy relationships. showed she us components of the Medicine Wheel for the Order of Life: self, family, community and world. Movement around the wheel gives a whole picture.



Next, she delved deeper into Our Whole Self: My Mind, My Feelings, My Body, My Spirit. It is a powerful and ancient teaching about life. (See here.)

Gloria now works in her local community on the process of reconciliation. She joined us by Zoom!

FOR CHILDREN OF ALL AGES BIRDS

In November, the day after the first snow, we put up the bird feeder. For most of the year the birds are on their



own, but in winter we give them a little help.

What is truly amazing about birds is they were here millions of years before we were. The birds we see came from the time of the dinosaurs that lived from 100 to 66 million years ago. These bird ancestors were small, had feathers but instead of beaks they had mouths and teeth. These birds survived when their larger sister and brother dinosaurs didn't.

The birds with beaks evolved or were created in the last forty million years. We can use the word "evolved" when we speak of science, or the word "created" if we want to use a faith word. That work Is still going on. We refer to that in The New Creed that is sometimes repeated in worship when we say the words, "We believe in God who has created and is creating..."



understand how much of my faith is bound to my culture.



DAGMAR WERNER AND US

It was the 9th of November in 1989. We were living in London. Our guest was the



Rev. Dagmar Werner, a Lutheran Pastor serving in Communist East Berlin. She was one of the auests Conference London the year that pastors from denominations and

countries were invited to the Conference to tell us what it was like to be a Christian where they lived.

Pat (in picture above with Dagmar) and I were asked if she could stay at our home during the few days that she was in the city.

Dagmar and her husband were both Pastors. The church that she served consisted of about 20 families. Dagmar and her husband had refused to join the Communist Party although being members of the party meant certain privileges. Not joining the Party was a faith decision.

On the Thursday of her week with us she was invited to visit some of the churches in London. Not much was happening except a fashion show, to raise money, being held at one of the large downtown churches. She attended and said that she wanted some time to explore the city after the event.

That happened to be the day of the announcement that the Berlin Wall was coming down. We could hardly wait for Dagmar to return so we could share the good news.

When Dagmar returned, she was obviously upset. Before we could tell her about the Berlin wall, she said that when she left the church, she was stopped by a man who asked her for money. She said, "I did not know what to do. I

looked at him and started to cry. I felt so badly. We do not have homeless people in East Berlin." Then she added, "It must be so hard to be a Christian in your country."

There we were face to face, both feeling sorry for each other. I almost forgot to tell her about the wall and when I did, she said "Oh no, now we will have poor people in our country." She was right. A few years later I remember reading that the Salvation Army had been invited into East Berlin to help needy people. Also, the advances Mikhail Gorbachev made in meeting the needs of the poor would not last. Now 13% of people in Russia live below the poverty level, slightly more than Canada's 11%.

It is difficult to be a Christian when there is so much need. We also know that walls do not work. Sooner or later they come down. We know that Germany opened its borders and took in more than a million refugees from Syria. It is what countries in the "free world" do.



The world will have changed for Dagmar and her family as it has for us, but I am sure she is giving her time and energy in what we all see as part of our task – living and working for the world's healing.

In that difficult task we are not alone. It is God's world. That gives us immense hope.

WHAT WILL YOU WEAR TO YOUR FUNERAL?

Dark November; Hallowe'en; Death; Costumes! I have been jolted back to a time early in our ministry when Peter and I lived in the manse in Courtland, ON, with our 3 children: Darren, Neil and Shelley. They were all 3 preschoolers, and the manse was adjacent to the cemetery, separated only by a woven wire fence. Every week there was at least one funeral which ended in the cemetery and my children found them fascinating.

They would stand glued to the fence to watch every detail of the ritual and listen to the cadences of the liturgies very very carefully.

Once the people had left, the kids retired to the patch of garden behind our garage, carefully dug a suitable grave in the sandy soil, then busily re-enacted the most recent funeral. One boy would play Funeral Director, the other Minister. Shelley was always the deceased. She dressed up in old curtains and lay in the grave with her hands neatly folded and her eyes closed. The Boys' performances became polished and very credible. They did not know any of the words, of course, but their cadences and gestures were great. We and many of our friends were quietly impressed and vividly amused.

Thinking this month of their play acting, I wondered what I might like to wear for my own funeral, what clothes, which rituals, which liturgies. I mean, we each take nothing but ourselves with us to death, but we do not leave this world empty handed. We take with us what we

hold in our hearts: negative, angry thoughts, or peaceful, loving ones. Thanksgivings and blessings, or hostility and hatred.

WINTERHORSE

A great white horse broods paused as snow slants from her dapples nostrils flared scarlet, muzzle etched against cedars. Her birds flit in the edge of the woods and all are preparing: the fields have pulled on her gift of a white blanket, day's light is going bluer, stars brighten as her trees stand alert. She breathes the time awake and watches over the wild things without a name over flakes and gusting wind over the ponds' freezing pale-crystal shards at creek's edge. And air billows now from her bunching shoulders, snow plumes from her knees as she trots, circling our days each deep hoofprint marking a place where fieldmice hearts may shelter and find rest.
