## FOOD FOR THE SOUL

#### The Road to Easter

"April is the cruellest month, breeding Lilacs out of the dead land,...stirring Dull roots with spring rain."

You will recognize these lines from T.S. Eliot's poem "The Wasteland". Written in 1922, the poem is generally a lament. Elliot decerned that after the first World War, the "war to end all wars," the world had not changed. It had not learned the ways of peace.

As we travel the road to Easter, we remember that it was Jesus who said that of Jerusalem. It is the phrase, sadly, that comes to mind when we see pictures of Ukraine, now resembling "Wasteland." "We have not learned the way of peace."

Long before Palm Sunday and Jesus's ride on a borrowed donkey into the "Holy City" we were made aware that the "Kingdom of God" would face adversity. According to Mathew's story of Jesus's birth King Herod ordered the killing of all male children in and around Bethlehem in order to get rid of this new King.

Jesus had a less poetic way than Eliot's "breeding lilacs out of dead land" when he described the way to a better world. Jesus said that if we wanted to follow him, we needed to deny ourselves and take up our cross. That is necessary because we have membership in both the Kingdom of God and in the kingdoms of this world. We slip too easily into the latter.

We recognize our part in the damage done to Indigenous and Metis people in our own period of empire building.

In March we heard eco-theologian Jessica Heatherington give us another <u>excellent sermon</u>. In the discussion following, our "crucifixion of nature" was identified. **Our**

pursuit of prosperity has put our planet and its people in peril.

Changing is not easy. Something in us must die in order for new life to take place.

The road to new life for our Indigenous and Metis sisters and brothers and our planet is slow and painful and ongoing.

We are witnesses to those who suffer on the way to a more peaceful world when we watch the daily news from Ukraine. No government is able to live out the radical nature of the "Kingdom of God" but people who are able to choose their own governance, i.e. democracy, have the best chance of living out that Kingdom's justice.

Good Friday worship will stir in us a compassion for those in Ukraine who sacrifice their lives so others may be free.

SO WHERE IS THE GOOD NEWS? WHERE IS EASTER? It is in the raw courage shown in Ukraine by so many who are giving up their lives so that future generations will live in freedom. Easter is 9-vear-old Amella Stelios singing the Ukrainian national anthem, first in a bomb shelter in Ukraine and then in a packed stadium in Poland. There is more power in that performance than in a battalion of tanks. Easter is a Canadian doctor on а plane carrying Ukrainian child with cancer enroute to Toronto's Sick Kids Hospital. On the way he taught his patient a Canadian card game and saw the delight in her face when she won. It was a resounding "Hallelujah".

This year on the road to Easter our love will be deeper, our prayers more heart-felt and along the way we will look not just for the liles, but for the liles and the sunflowers.

Blessings for the road. **We travel together.**



#### **OXFORD UNITED REFUGEE**

#### **SUPPORT COMMITTEE (OURS)**

We have some progress to share. The Knox United sponsorship application for Maqssoud is complete and has been sent to the refugee office of the United Church in Toronto. Maqssoud entered Pakistan as a refugee from his home country of Afghanistan when he received death threats from the Taliban. We are hopeful that his application will be forwarded for approval to Immigration Refugees Citizenship Canada, IRCC before summer.

**Trinity United's sponsorship application** has passed another hurdle as the IRRC approved the application and has forwarded it to the visa office in Ankara, Turkey. **The Al- Mohammedawi family of 5** will undergo interviews, medical exams and gain assistance with obtaining travel loans, exit visas and other preparations as needed. This application has moved forward more quickly than expected. However, it is difficult to know how long it will be before this last step is completed.

Westminister United in Thamesford are early in the application process for a Syrian family of 5 who are living in Lebanon as refugees. We wish them well as they prepare to submit the application to the refugee office of the United Church of Canada.

On April 2 the Oxford Coalition for Social Justice held an instructive virtual

emergency health care privatization summit hosted by Bryan Smith, Coalition Chair. See here. Speaker Linda McQuaig, journalist, reminded us of the principal of equality which undergirded our medicare system - that those at the front of the line are the 'sickest people not the wealthiest people'. Generally, huge backlogs and chaos have been used to allow private profit-making corporations to come in and fix thing even though their focus is profit making not patient care. She reminded us of the problems (care and mortality rates) in Long Term Care (LTC) homes which were publicly exposed during Covid. Speaker Randy Robinson, Ontario Director, Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives (CCPA) provided solid money facts that our Provincial government is not broke but is one of the richest GDP/capita with a strong economic foundation. effort' is the term used to assess how hard a government raises money from its Own Sources. He compared Ontario's "Own-Source" revenue (i.e. percentage of each province's total economic activity, Gross Domestic Product (GDP)) showing that Ontario's is 15.2% (2<sup>nd</sup> from bottom) and the average for rest of Canada is 17.5%. Yes, Ontario needs to make a 'fiscal effort'



## FOR CHILDREN OF ALL AGES The Arctic Wooley Bear

The Arctic Wooley Bear caterpillar is a cousin of the larger black and orange Wooley Bear caterpillar that we see here in the fall.



The Arctic version is unique because when it is cold it sleeps and when it's warmer it eats. It

eats for one month and sleeps for eleven. Since it only grows during the eating month It takes about 7 or 8 years to pack on enough micrograms to finally become an adult.

In the long 11-month Arctic winter this caterpillar freezes solid. It does not die because it has a built in microdrop of an antifreeze-like liquid that protects its vital organs.

In the long journey to become human we did not inherit that trait. Maybe because our ancestors came from Africa instead of the Arctic.

The adult has to look out for its number one enemy, the bat. However, the moth has a built-in bat radar sensor. It can pick up a pursuing bat at 30 metres, enough time for a quick flight plan change.

In the 7<sup>th</sup> or 8<sup>th</sup> year, usually in June, this caterpillar is mature enough to spin a cocoon, emerge as a beautiful moth, find a mate, lay about a hundred eggs and die. It does this in just four weeks. **It has been doing this for millions of years.** 

Now isn't God wonderful?

This is my question. During the last ice age, which lasted for about 75,000 years, did the Arctic Wooley Bear sleep through it? If it did and if it could talk, what a yawn that would be.

Just wondering. . .

MUDDY THOUGHTS FOR SPRING THAW

Years ago, I took an evening class to learn the basics behind working with clay; wedging, reproof and correction is where we began, to remove the impurities in our lump of dirt for the process ahead. I became somewhat familiar with the wheel as I learned to remove the air pockets trapped in the dirt. I learned why centring was important to create a symmetrical pot. Boy, was that ever a tough job! Then, as the wheel spun, we learned how to apply pressure to begin to shape our pot. Every movement was important, and we had to be quite clear about the shape we had in our mind to get it right.

Once the masterpiece emerged on the wheel, we learned how to lift and scrape to remove it whole and set it to air dry. At any point before the dried item was placed in the kiln, it could be squished back into a lump, recycled and reformed and begun anew.

Lately, enjoying the spring thaw and sloshing through the mud brought back those long-gone lessons and also reminded me of Isaiah's words: "You, Lord, are our Father. We are the clay, you are the potter; we are all the work of your hand."-Isa.64:8

The Bible tells us time and time again that God is the Potter and we are his clay. In God's eye an unimpressive lump of Clay becomes a useful, beautiful pot. Once we have been through the kiln, we can never return to the clay we were before. Only in the skilled hands of the Master Artist is a lump of dirt made into a beautiful vessel. In God's hands we are changed into a new creation.

"Anyone who is in Christ is a new creation. The old has passed away;




