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
GATHERING + GOSPELLING - A SUMMER WORSHIP SERIES

As much of the world shifted back to inperson gatherings, the time was ripe for our faith community to explore the 'hows' and 'whys' of Sunday morning worship. For most United Churches (and, quite frankly, most churches), worship on Sunday morning starting some time between 9:30 and 11:00 is pretty standard. And the structure of worship can be startlingly similar between churches.

This is not a bad thing. But I believe there is value in diving deep into the purpose of worship gathering, so that it continues to be meaningful and valuable in the development of our faith.



Using Priya Parker's book, The Art of Gathering: How We Meet and Why It Matters, our congregation explored the questions of why and how we gather, and which of those practices hold meaning for us. We answered questions together during worship:

What brings you to church today?

What is your favorite space at church?

Where do you like to pray?

What is your favorite hymn?

Do you make a better host or a better guest?

What do we enjoy about gathering?

What are your gifts?

We offered up these questions right near the beginning of the service and provided a minute or two for reflection, and then we took some time to answer them together a little bit later in the service. And while we didn't always have concrete answers that morning, I heard from many folks throughout the week as they reflected on the conversations from Sunday morning.

We also experimented with different ways of praying and listening to scripture and one morning the chairs were rearranged to be "in the round."

We wrapped up the series a few weeks ago and I sent out a survey for folks to provide feedback on the series, and we will use that

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information to help shape worship as we go forward.

It felt good to stretch our wings a little bit, to bump up against discomfort and explore the source of that discomfort.

It felt good to have conversation and a great deal of laughter in the service, as well as moments of profound reflection and deep meaning.



We are all called to go out into the world and love

and serve. Worship that is meaningful and spirit-filled strengthens us to do that work well. This is not just the job of the minister or the musicians or the worship committee.

We all participate together to make worship meaningful—we open ourselves up to the Spirit, we offer what we can and pay attention to the places that God is calling us to.

FROM THE HOSPITAL BED

During WW II bombing raids, a single night would often spell the end of three or four church buildings. For example: Church of Baptist, Methodist England, Congregationalist. So, the next morning remaining members would gather and work together to sort through the ruins and salvage items such as hymnals, prayer books and Bibles as well as useful furnishings such as chairs and benches and even an occasional piano! Then, working together, the surviving clergy and church members would make a simple shelter such as a Quonset hut designated to be shared by the four congregations as a place of Christian worship. By the next Sunday the new 'church' was open and full of worshipers. Maybe the leader was a Baptist and the musician was Anglican. Maybe the furniture was mismatched and the cups were cracked but nevertheless, we worked and worshiped together and were strengthened in community.

As I lie here in the Ingersoll Hospital, presently under a COVID lockdown that isolates us all from seeing family and friends, I cannot help but remember those bombings and their effects. It is easy to feel helpless and alone but, it is possible to

draw together in the Spirit, share the positive and walk on the sunny side of life.

FOR CHILDREN OF ALL AGES. Scarab Beetles masters of

recycling The most fascinating of the Beetle world

It is found mostly in dry tropical climates.



For those unfamiliar with the word "dung" you might recognize this as poo or poop.

But back to basics. . . The Scarab is one of

the best recyclers. It dines on animal poo. There is enough undigested food in animal poo to give the Scarab Beetle all the nutrients it needs. When there is too much competition, that is too many beetles for the poo pile, the beetle forms a poo ball and rolls it away to feed its family elsewhere.

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It does this by rolling this ball backwards, pushing it with its back feet, while upside down. How on earth does it see where it is going? What is remarkable is that it rolls the ball in a straight line, using the sun by day and the moon or the milky way as a guide by night. The beetle, about one and a half inches long can roll a ball about 30 times its weight.

Now isn't the Scarab Beetle absolutely awesome??? How wonderful is creation!

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FOOD FOR THE SOUL

Justice Matters

A plan for justice came early in Biblical stories. The plan was that all people should have a "just" amount of the world's goods and services; that all would have social and economic opportunities a place to live and food security.

On God's last day of creation, it was not human beings that were created but the Sabbath. Did God save the best until last? As important as a day of rest is, sometimes we forget that the Sabbath became a template for justice. Every seventh-year debts were to be forgiven. All were to take a year off from work. Even the earth was to be given a year's rest. The purpose was to make sure there were no poor in the land and that the earth was given time to heal.

Then every 50 years (7x7+1) this was to be repeated plus the land was to be returned to it's original owners. It was the jubilee, the time of the great adjustment or applied justice.

I wonder if the harvest festival called Pentecost, 50 days after Passover, the Emancipation Day for Jews, may have contained Jubilee hope. Add to that the Spirit of Pentecost that we celebrate and you have a Spirit of love (justice) that would not be contained.

If you are looking for a current "Pentecostal" moment i.e. distribution of harvest driven by a spirit of justice, it was Aug. 1st of this year. It began with a blast of wind that was heard around the world. The wind was directed through a ship's whistle. Against all odds, the first shipload of grain left a Ukrainian port, food for those most in need. In the midst of one of the

great injustices of history, The UN, Turkey and yes the Russians, brokered the release. That first ship of twenty thousand tons of corn was followed, by 30 more and counting. By the way, Aug. 1st marked the seventh (Sabbath) month of the war. A coincidence? At the very least it is a sign of immense hope.

Although God's vision of a "just" world where all people have what they need has never gone away we are still working on a plan. Adding to the difficulty is our climate crisis. We cannot think of justice without its inclusion. We are on a slippery slope of possibly losing the earth's ability to sustain life.

Such urgency has compelled some of us to plan a weekend of spiritual, down to earth reflection and action with The Rev. Dr. Jessica Heatherington. Details are elsewhere in this CONNECTION edition.

We begin Friday evening, Sept. 30th. Sept. is not the seventh month but it <u>is</u> the ninth month, which has its own rebirth symbolism for mother earth and for us. We believe it to be nothing less than a vital

part of our call to deep spirituality, bold discipleship and daring justice. You are invited, Blessings, *Glen Wright*, co-editor
