

The Language of Love

Just before Advent, in the name of downsizing I decided to cull our record collection. What music will we keep for future listening and what goes? In the process, I came across "The Greatest Hits of Jim Croce", (pronounced "cro-chay" in case there are those who do not remember.) I decided I needed to play it again, in order to decide its fate.

The record begins with his song "Bad, Bad Leroy Brown." The lyrics continue with "baddest man the in whole downtown. . . meaner than a junk yard dog." In contrast, Croce sings his ballad, "I tried to say I love you, but the words just came out wrong, so I'm saying that I love you in a song."

There have always been Leroy Brown adversaries that are "meaner than junk yard dogs" and in the midst, attempts to say "I love you" that go beyond the spoken word.

Thirteen centuries before Jesus, in the face of bad, bad Pharoah, the Hebrews packed up essentials for their escape from slavery. Miriam packed a tambourine, just in case they made it to the other side; just in case there was another side. So when they reached safety, Miriam grabbed her tambourine and led the people in a song about freedom. (Exodus 15: 21) God's words "I love you" became liberation from bad, bad Pharaoh. The response was a song.

Advent ends with what has been called "the song of Mary." It's a song of justice, about a time when the poor will no longer go hungry. (Luke 1:53) These are words of love sung in the face

of bad, bad Herod. God found a way to say "I love you," in a song about justice and the birth of a baby.

So, under the long shadow of bad, bad Omicron, and in the face of the bad, bad climate crises, we, in defiance, celebrate Christmas. We become aware of acts of love that go beyond words.

A 15-year-old grade ten student in London was so ashamed of the few cans of food his class brought for the food drive that he went to the grocery store the next morning and with his own hard-earned money, bought enough food to fill his back pack and took it to school, then he did it again.

A 9-year-old girl said to me, "I am no fan of shots in the arm, but if it will keep someone else from getting sick, I will do it."

The Rev. Jessica Heatherington continues to give us new strategies for addressing the climate crises.

It's "The work of Christmas" which is the name of a poem written by black preacher Wilber Howard and adapted by Jim Strathdee in "I am the Light of the World." It is a song about Jesus' birth, a song about justice, a song about the work ahead. The music has begun. Do you hear it? It's time to grab a tambourine.

Blessings for the journey.

PS. Oh, by the way, Croce's "Greatest Hits" made the cut.

THE REV. STAN STANHOPE (1941-2021)



We were deeply saddened when we heard of the death (Dec. 7) of the Rev. Stan Stanhope (obituary is here).

We got to know Stan not just at the regular meetings of

Oxford Presbytery but during more than a decade of monthly retirees' breakfasts.

Stan would come early and be sitting there chatting with whoever else showed up early. Often that would have been the late Rev. Kent Garrett.

Stan was a devoted husband, father and grandfather to their beloved Conner. He was dedicated to the church at all levels. As the Rev. Maurice Francis said, "He was keen on church policy and finances. He took good care of us who appreciated our church pension." Maurice and Ruth added, "He was very interested in the Francis family because we had a cottage on Jack's Lake, near Golden Valley, an area where Norma had a close connection."

The Rev. Jane Van Patter spoke of Stan as being kind, respectful, encouraging, caring, compassionate, gracious, a gentle spirit and friend.

The Rev. Jeff Smith his current minister at St. David's said, "Stan had a passion and enthusiasm for ministry. He was filled with love. Each time I visited Stan I was ministered to. I always came away encouraged, uplifted and cared for."

Folks posted on Oxford United Ministries Facebook page noting memories and qualities: Cheryl-Ann Stadelbauer-Sampa wrote "Such a dedicated minister!"; Sue Hilborn: "Had many wonderful conversations with Stan, when he would visit our farm. At our monthly breakfasts, Stan was always attentive to what was going on. He was one who did not need to talk but was not shy about contributing to the variety of topics that were part of that fellowship. Stan had a keen interest in early Biblical manuscripts and translations. He read


manuscripts and translations. He read books on "Q", the unknown gospel author. CONNECTIONS published his work in May 2020 and August 2020.





OXFORD UNITED REFUGEE SUPPORT COMMITTEE(OURS)

Wishing everyone a New Year of healing and promise, we also want to express our gratitude to those who support our sponsorship efforts in prayer, interest, and with your donations.

Family of Sara Temnewu (Ethopia)

The Rev. Tracy Crick-Butler of Trinity UC asked us to think about the best gift we received during this year's Christmas



season. For me it was an email from Selemawit Ghebrehiwet, the daughter of Sara Temnewu living as a refugee in Addis Ababa, and one of a family of four that is being co-sponsored by St

David's. She wrote "May God bless you with eternal love and longing, with all the blessings and more, with all the things you need and much more." She closed with "Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!!! Long life and prosperity."

As reported previously, this family has been living in fear as the Ethiopian civil war crept closer to them, yet Selemawit was able to reach out and bestow blessings on us. Epiphany is the time in the church year when we are asked to think about what we can do in response to Christ being born and to put our thoughts into action. Selemawit's message reminds us that in our position of grace we can do just that.

There has been a de-escalation in the Ethiopian civil war recently. The forces that had Tigrayan been approaching Addis Ababa have retreated to their own region which could be a decisive opening for peace as well as an increase in humanitarian aid to that region. We hope that this may make conditions favourable for our sponsored refugees to get their final approval to come to Canada.

Magssoud Mohammad Yar

(Afghanistan)

We are happy to report that Magssoud Mohammad Yar, Embro's refugee, safely crossed the border from Afghanistan to Pakistan and is Islamabad awaiting appointment with the UN office to become registered as a refugee. His sister Hanna, a Woodstock resident and co-sponsor, tells us that he is still in danger as some Afghans in the same area as he is, have been deported back to Afghanistan for no apparent reason. Some of these are held and sometimes killed, or beaten, sometimes just disappear. Knox United has sent an email to the UN in Islamabad letting them know that Magssoud has a sponsor in the hope that it will shorten his wait time for an appointment.

Other Refugees

The situation with our other sponsored refugees has not changed since the last update.

Funds

Funds are in place for all but two of our sponsored refugees.

Trinity United Ingersoll is accepting donations for the Al-Mohammedawi family of five, living as refugees from Iraq, in Turkey.

They're back and they're

looking for more.

This is the second year for the Coldest Night of the Year (CNOY) Woodstock fundraiser and Scott McKague, Woodstock event director, is optimistic the event can raise \$100,000. Similar fundraisers are being held across Canada and the local one is in support of Operation Sharing's The Inn homeless shelter, which runs daily starting at 7:30 p.m. at Old St. Paul's Anglican Church in Woodstock.

"I do feel pretty confident it (the \$100,000) is doable," McKague said, adding in the first year more than \$82,000 was raised. The event this year is being held Feb. 26 with teams gathering at the Inn at 4 p.m.

The CNOY fundraiser went ahead as a virtual event in 2021 due to COVID-19. The aim this time around is to do it as an actual mass walk with two and five-kilometer routes.

The event is designed to raise funds and awareness surrounding homelessness.

"People are becoming more aware of the homeless situation," McKague said.

There are a number of volunteers already on board, including some from Operation Sharing. And Operation Sharing's Bullwinkle's Eatery is supplying food for the local event.

Cambridge-based Logikor is the lead corporate sponsor and has already contributed \$5,000 to the cause.

CNOY began in 2011 and McKague walked in the Kitchener Coldest Night for several years before helming the Woodstock walk.

FOR CHILDREN OF ALL AGES A Remarkable Bird

What bird has legs and feet but cannot walk? What bird loves to swim but if she decided to fly into a back yard pool, she could not fly out. **This bird needs about a third of a kilometer of water for take off.** You will have to go north to see one. By now you will have guessed the bird's name. It is the Loon, of course.



The Loon's feet are made for swimming and not for walking. They are so far back on the body that the loon can push herself

up on to the nest, which is on land at the water's edge, but she cannot stand up.


Loons lay just one or two eggs. If you are in a canoe and are trying to get a photograph of the baby Loon, called a loonlet, it will be impossible. The Loon will keep her body between you and her baby. The attempt will just lead to anxiety for both you and the Loon and that's not what canoe trips are about.

The Loon has eyes that change colour. In the cooler weather their eyes appear to be grey. When it is warm with bright sun, their eyes turn a reddish brown. They have built in sunglasses.

Loons spend the winter on costal waters in Florida. The parents leave about two months before their grownup offspring. Not to worry though. Loons come with GPS set to take them to Florida and in the Spring, back to the lake that they left.

WHERE THE LIGHT SHINES

My Mother had a Quaker background from which she carried the habit of giving the house a top to bottom cleaning at year end so that we would start the new year CLEAN. Since we heated the house with a wood and coal furnace that meant thoroughly brushing down walls and ceilings, disturbing spiders in shadowed corners and cleaning the inside of all the windows to maximize the growing sunlight inside as the year turned. Curtains were washed, ironed and rehung; mats were shaken outside on the snow; Christmas decorations were carefully packed away for another year. The energy Mother found was amazing; we all got tired out helping her efforts.

In Luke's Gospel Jesus tells the story of a man who cleaned his house to rid himself of an evil spirit. That spirit could not find a new home to occupy so eventually returned to its old home, finding it clean and tidy. It invited 7 friends, each one worse than he was, to come to live there with him.

Did that mean that Jesus was telling us not to break one evil habit in case 7 worse ones replaced it? Or, did it mean that we ought never to concentrate on the negatives? If we ONLY remove the evil and do not fill up the empty space with goodness, we have created a vacuum into which even greater evil can come.

Little children, before they can be disciplined, must learn the difference between good and evil; non-activity is not




