Now That's the Spirit or Wasn't That a Party?

We think of harvest festivals as fall events. For first century Jews in Palestine the thanksgiving for **the wheat harvest** was celebrated in the spring. They called it Pentecost which was 50 days after Passover. Pentecost, like Passover had political implications. The 50 days represented the Jubilee when there was to be a redistribution of land and resources so that there would be no poor people. It was to be an exercise in economic justice.

These were anxious times for those early followers of Jesus. For some people everything had changed; for most people, nothing had.

There were reports that Jesus, who had been crucified, had risen. That this Kingdom of God, long hoped for was just around the corner. There were other reports that Jesus had ascended into Heaven. Now what were they to do? What was their next step?

Rome was still very much in charge. **The followers of Jesus were being imprisoned**. This longed for and hoped for kingdom of God was just not there as envisioned.

John the Baptizer had warned people that the coming Kingdom meant a day of wrath, a day of judgment.

Jesus had a different vision for the coming of God's reign. Although he also looked to the future for the fulfilment of God's Kingdom, Jesus said God's Kingdom is already here. It is among you. It is within you. (Luke 17: 21) Kingdom building was and is a collaborative

effort with God. As the late Archbishop Desmond Tutu once said, "God without us will not, as we without God cannot."

When the people gathered early on that Pentecost morning to celebrate the wheat harvest, did the aroma of fresh baked bread recall for some the stories of the feeding of the 5000? You could not have a festive celebration without wine. Did the bread and wine remind those from Judea of the presence of Jesus? As wine was to be poured, did they think of the prophet Joel's words, "In the last days I will pour out my Spirit?" (Joel 2:28)

We know what happened at that Pentecost house party. The disciples and other followers of Jesus, both men and women were gathered. Also, there were people there from 14 different countries, included people from both Judea and Rome.



There was a rush of wind. Flames lit up people's faces; they heard one another in their own languages. (Acts 2:9ff) They

saw the whole community as children of God. All racial, cultural, economic, and religious barriers no longer mattered. All were members of God's family. All were loved; all were included. There was no longer an "us" and a "them". It was a protest against all that attempted to disrupt and destroy the human family.

When people gathered that day, they brought, like most congregations, fear, uncertainty, grief, hope, disappointment, love, gratitude, anger along with their question to God, "what is our next step?" They were at a cross road (pun intended).

In their vulnerability the Spirit found room. They came away with a new vision and new courage. For the



One Step Closer

On March 9 we received a request from the Resettlement Operations Centre of Ottawa (ROC-O) to submit **a plan for quarantine for Bisrat Berhe Yemane**, one of our sponsored refugees. Thanks to Marj Martin, the plan was submitted the same day. The quarantine plan is the last hurdle in the process.

For those who may have forgotten

in August of 2016, Freweini Mebrahtu and her family, daughters Sasyt, 3, Salem, 5 and her son Bisrat, 16, left Eritrea for Khartoum, Sudan.

In 2018 Freweini and her family were sponsored by St. David's UC. When the time came for the final interview by a Canadian examiner, it was alleged that Freweini's proof of refugee status document was a copy and not an original. Her application was turned down. She had the option of reapplying through The United Church of Canada. However, by this time Freweini was so discouraged she did not want to spend another 2 to 3 years in Khartoum. She and her two daughters left for Uganda. We believe that Freweini and her daughters are now living in the Netherlands. Bisrat decided to stay in Khartoum and re-apply.

The next correspondence from Ottawa should be Bisrat's flight schedule. **We look forward so much to welcoming Bisrat to Canada.**

Knox United in Embro and Westminster United in Thamesford are still fundraising.

It's hardly new thinking, but trading goods with our neighbours and friends is a way to reduce your costs and the costs to the environment of our wasteful ways.

You see: We live in an effluent society.

Everything we extract from the earth and manufacture for our use and pleasure costs us plenty. And when we discard things, they continue to cost us; the costs in dollars of hauling garbage and holding it for centuries in landfill sites are astronomical, as are the human and environmental health costs when trucks spew carbon, or dumps exhale methane or spill pollution into ground water and streams.

Isn't it better then to reuse and reuse and reuse... and to rethink our relationship with goods. That's where a ReuseapaloozAHA comes in.

AHA! That eureka moment when you realize that the clothing you are finished with is needed by someone else, those garden tools could go to a new homeowner while you downsize to a condo, that large furniture could grace another house, the books you've read could be enjoyed again, and again, and again.

Brownsville saw the crew organizing a giant free swap meet South-West Oxford's folk promoting composting rainwater collection pavilion. For the next four hours, in the alorious sunshine, people brought reusable goods and/or collected useful things. Children found toys. When a 4 vear-old knows her last name means Lion, she knows which stuffie to collect. When a handyman sees a power drill set, he hangs onto its handle. A furniture refinisher filled a truck and trailer; Beautiful wooden tables, chairs, and dressers will serve again at prices below those of short-lived 'cheap' chipboard and laminate. families Generous people fleeing wars (in Ukraine and Syria and...) found kitchen wares quests will need soon and for a while. A local service club stocked up for the next fundraiser for local and international projects - books, books and more books. Retail charities now have more goods for sale; at the end of the morning donations were headed by the carload.

Fast fashion and disposable goods aren't cheap when you pay multiple times to replace them, and to discard them. 40% of some landfills are fabrics, much to the dismay of quilters, and rag rug makers.

ReuseapaloozAHAs, community garage sales, porch pick-up sales, crafters and artisans' shows all help the economy, the environment and the community. Keep your eyes peeled for the next one. Already, those attending, those organizing, those supporting Brownsville's ReusapaloozAHA are saying "Let's do it again" in other communities.

Making Land/Territorial Acknowledgements Meaningful

Many are the ways to understand the place where we live. Land Acknowledgements are much more than statements about the history of the land on which we live or work. Expanding our understanding of place can help us to feel a deeper connection to the land which is in peril and with those first peoples who have a long history with this land. This work of Truth and Reconciliation is laying the ground work for the future. It is part of our shared environmental stewardship to honour the land, which is God's creation.

Well over 100 participants joined with Triregional staff, Thérèse Samuel, Diane Matheson-Jimenez, and Kathy Douglas to view a PowerPoint Presentation developed by Rev Matthew Stevens. It will be available later as a teaching tool.

If you are keen to start, there is an interactive tool available at https://native-land.ca/ in which you can type in your town or address, and it will locate it. Settler labels and colour can be added or removed, etc.



There is much to discover and uncover about these stolen lands we occupy. The formal treaties which were signed. The historical use of the lands for hunting and fishing. How did settlement affect them? How do we reconcile our prosperity at the

How do we lean into the words of Amos 5:24 "Let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream"? How do we live out our part in the Recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission?

The GS08 Proposal which is before General Council 44 notes that the work of Climate Justice is the work of reconciliation! It could be valuable to learn together about our collective history. I look forward to working with interested folk. Stay tuned!

FOR CHILDREN OF ALL AGES Marvelous Mothers

Since Mother's Day was last Sunday, you may still be thinking about marvelous mothers.

I thought that we might extend those thoughts to all the marvelous mothers that have inhabited our planet millions of years before we humans evolved. After all, they are our ancestors. Without those awesome mothers we would not be here.

Can you think of a marvelous mother from the wide world of nature?



How about Humpback Whale mothers? Did you know that a Humpback Whale baby calf is 15 feet long and weighs 2000 pounds at birth? Wow! Also, they need about 500 litres of their mother's milk each day to survive. Because they are born in the water but breath air, they don't always know how to manage that, so the mother swims under her baby, carries her on her back to the surface so she can learn to breath.

Whale babies are always born during our winter, when whales are in the tropics. Humpback whales feed on shrimp-like krill and herring which are found in the northern waters, so the mothers do not eat in the winter while looking after their babies. They wait until they go north to put the weight back on that they have lost.

The whale baby stays on the milk diet for about 5 months. By that time the baby is

strong enough to make the 1500 km journey north with her mother, a whale of a swim.

Some whales are endangered. They have one main predator, us. Fishing nets, ships and pollution take their toll.

Scientists tell us that about 50 million years ago whales walked on the earth on 4 legs, but gradually evolved into these beautiful sea creatures we see today.

Whales are such awesome creatures; mother whales are quite marvelous.

Then they were asked the same question, but the condition was changed to having




to step on a cockroach. After an embarrassing pause, 80% had answered 'Yes'. Many had even added that they would

Their Facebook page has a lot of valuable information on it about Hosting Safety Measures, Matching Guidelines, Offer to Host or Hosting Needs (still to come), Coming to Ontario, COVID guidelines, Provincial and Municipal Federal, Supports. For information you can also oxfordhelpsukraine@gmail.com. Councillor Mark Shadenberg, of the City of Woodstock brought greetings from the City and Deputy Mayor, Connie Lauder. Other elected reps present were David Mayberry (SWOX), Marcus Ryan (Zorra).

Current rules re **Driver's Licenses for Ukranians** are posted <u>here</u>.

Irene Tiegs, a retired medical social worker, who initiated the City Woodstock's Ukraine Relief, spoke of the tremendous support already received in terms of clothing. Previous donations of clothing are being warehoused, at 225 Main St courtesy of Ross and Jeff Bon, to be distributed to people when they arrive here in Oxford. (Shipping costs are high.) Irene needs help sorting and folding clothes. Her phone is 519-536-5554. Also needed are silverware and dishes. Irene is very knowledgeable about who to trust in terms of sending money or goods. She arranged delivery of life saving tourniquets to the front line in Ukraine within 10 days!

Who are Karen and David Murray?

Karen is a retired nurse from the Woodstock Hospital;

David is a retired renovator and farmer formerly of Bennington. They now live outside of Thamesford.

When I asked, 'what inspired you?', their reply was "Our 3-year-old granddaughter, watching the footage on TV of the initial missiles exploding in Ukraine, asked her parents 'Why are the children running away? Where are they running to?'

Their response to my query 'what keeps you going' is people's generosity, willingness to help, energy and the gratitude of those receiving. RESPONDING TO A CRY FOR HOPE



We have just celebrated Family Sunday or Mother's Day here in Canada. I attended the UNJPPI event in London this past weekend,

Responding to a Cry for Hope. Think for a moment about Palestine, a country illegally and violently occupied by Israel for 47 years. Hard as this reality is for adults, the reality is worsening for children. What do the children dream about? They want to live! wondered? What is happening to the children? After I read reports of children being detained and imprisoned, no fair trial, no adults present, I realized it is not such a strange dream. Reading accounts like the Military Court Watch which is one of a broad based cross-Canada coalition working on behalf of Palestinian children's right is disturbing necessary. Their most recent newsletter reports that at the end of March 2022, there were 134 Palestinian children held as 'security prisoners' in Israeli prisons. 67% of children were detained inside Israel in violation of the Geneva Convention IV and the Rome Statute of the International Criminal Court.

Our country, Canada, needs to stand up for Palestinian Children's Rights.

Join me in writing to our Prime Minister Justin Trudeau, The Honourable Mélanie Joly, Minister of Foreign Affairs, The Honourable Mary Ng, Minister of International Trade, Export Promotion, Small Business and Economic Development and local MP, Dave MacKenzie, The letter should simply state that Canada needs to support Palestinian children's rights. Children are being tried in military courts.
