BLESSING OF NEWNESS FROM THE OLD

The Window Sonnets by Robyn Marie Butt

Stained glass and sonnets seem to be a natural pairing. The Sonnet, a 14-line poem, originated in Italy in the thirteenth century. By that time, coloured glass windows in cathedrals and monasteries had become a familiar and sophisticated art form.

These two classic art forms come together exquisitely in **The Window Sonnets**, thanks to author Robyn Marie Butt and photos by Jim Silcox and Kathryn Skelly (cover photo by Richard Bain). The 57-page full colour paperback features a poetic commentary inspired by the historic stained glass windows of First-St. Andrew's United Church, London, ON.


Bain's front cover photo of towering First-St. Andrews United Church framed by a giant spruce and the hint of a complimentary maple, anchors the setting. Silcox and Skelly give us window colour and perspective that enable the reader to see the windows with vivid clarity. The back cover photo of an outdoor sculpture made from old organ pipes, standing against the church wall in winter, is a picture that invites a thousand words.



For one to compose 30 Sonnets that begin with a five Sonnet "Introit" and "Caveat" then move to poetic commentary and reflection on the windows of First-St. Andrew's is an awesome task, to say the least. Robyn Marie Butt does that with poetic precision and power, sometimes prophetic, sometimes pastoral but always deepening and widening for us the biblical scene or story caught in coloured glass.

The Caveat incudes a criticism of King Henry VIII for ordering the destruction of the mediaeval multi-racial coloured windows as "papist", so that much-later

window craftsmen "Whitened" the skin of biblical characters. Before Henry's "reforms" people could see, states the sonnet, ...God like us, come to warm/ our sorrows into hope. Butt concludes the next sonnet with the words,



It's we/ must let our many-coloured Lord go free.

In sonnet iii of four that address the huge Chancel Window, the focus is on the women. The concluding couplet reads Having known birth she'd know/ gift grows gift; that gifts remembered, glow.

On the Memorial Window East, dedicated to those from the church who lost their lives during the first world war, the sonnet mentions grief or loss that anchor us in night then continues prophetically, with seems we'll always still/ need this window. This invitation to grieve takes us deep into an almost forgotten part of our faith – lament. What a gift to have a window of lament for a church's healing ministry.

Included in this window is a Roman soldier, pointing to the early church's conflict with

Rome. This is brilliantly described in the words, through Rome's fist/ slide love's Resistance....

These are just a small sample of the poetic gems that give these windows new life.

Over thirty years ago, Old Testament professor Walter Brueggemann wrote a book called **Finally Come the Poet**. The title is a reference to the Old Testament prophets, who when speaking with and to power, with conviction and compassion resorted to poetry. **The Window Sonnets** by Robyn Marie Butt keeps that sacred tradition alive with poetic brilliance.

Then he danced all around the parade scaring all available children and amusing all the adults who tried to name him. When they reached the Green, he was awarded the first prize for his costume.

What fun we all had! The fireworks were grand, the music lively, the dancing lively. We enjoyed every minute. Guy Fawkes or Hallowe'en, both are celebrations of remembrance, barriers against darkness and death as winter comes.

Christians can celebrate with all people as the days shorten and we celebrate the fact that soon the season will change, light will

Christians we return. But as also remember that Advent has come with its promise of Christ's birth. We begin to prepare our hearts to welcome our Saviour into our hearts afresh.

With a Little Help from our Friends

We feed the birds in winter so in the spring, when it is grass cutting time the bird feeder gets moved to its place behind the pine tree in the corner of the yard. Last spring, since there were a few seeds left in the feeder, I moved it into the garden.


This year we wanted sunflowers so I bought a package of seeds, thinking that seeds selected for growth might be more reliable than those relegated to bird feed.

When I opened the package, the seeds looked more like just the shells of seeds, as if the packaging machine was scraping out the last seeds in the bin. I planted and watered them anyway and waited. . . and watered and waited. Nothing happened.

A few weeks later when we began weeding, we noticed a couple of strange plants, already about 4 inches high. We left them. In another week they had doubled in size. They were not where we had planted the sunflower seed but about three meters away, not far from the bird feeder. We

lived in hope. Then we noticed some buds and more growth and finally blooms. Sunflower blooms! I took a picture of them.

Had a finch or a cardinal in search of the perfect seed kicked out a couple of



We watched the sunflowers mature, grow old, bow their heads under the weight of seeds, as if in an extended prayer of thanksgiving. Then one afternoon we watched a goldfinch hang upside down under one of the seed heads, plucking out a seed or two. It was a tender moment of humility and grace.


OXFORD UNITED REFUGEE SUPPORT COMMITTEE (OURS)

FOOD FOR THE SOUL

Advent

"A time to be born, a time to die, A time to sow and a time to reap..." will be recognized as the first two lines of a poem from the book of Ecclesiastes. (3:1-8) It was folk singer Pete Seeger who put this poem to music and added the refrain:

"To everything, turn, turn, turn. There is a season, turn, turn, turn. And a time to every purpose under heaven." He also added the line "A time of peace, I swear it's not too late."

I was reminded of this when I began to think of Advent which begins November 27. With Advent, we get the story of John the Baptist who called people to prepare for the coming of Jesus, by turning from their sins.

In Luke's version of the story, John suggests things like, "If you have two coats and you know someone who has none, give her or him one of yours". (3:11) It was a call to be a good neighbour, to build a place of greater justice.

So, what are the turning points for us? There are many but here are three that come to mind.

1. Racism. One of my two grandmothers had a Mennonite background. The family came from Germany in 1720 to Buck's County, Pennsylvania. The family described the new land as "a wild place, filled with dangerous animals and the equally dangerous red man." We have come a long way from that, but we have a long way to go. We have September 30, a day of Truth and Reconciliation to keep us focused on that journey.

As I began to write this article, I could hear the bang, pop and crackle of fireworks. It was the Diwali celebration in northeast Woodstock where we live. Diwali is a festival of lights, a celebration by those of the Hindu, Sikh and Jain faith of light over darkness, good over evil. How do we tell those celebrants that we are so pleased that they have found in Oxford a good place to live, work and raise their families and that we are delighted to have them as neighbours?

2. Housing and Hunger. Premier Ford is suggesting that we should be able to build three dwellings on the land we use for one. Maybe we do use too much land, but his plan to weaken the purview of the Conservation Authorities makes us nervous.

Hunger is as close as Operation Sharing and the Christmas Place. We commend the work and hopefully can respond to that need. But who is studying how to increase incomes? How about a pilot project in Oxford on a Guaranteed Annual Income?

3. The Climate Crisis. This last weekend some of us met at Trinity United, Ingersoll on how to deepen our discipleship response to the ecological crisis and climate change. There is a critical need to be a better neighbour to the planet that gives us life.

In Advent we hear once again, "Turn, turn, turn". It is the way to Hope, Peace, Love and Joy.
