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The Mystery of New Life

The following is an overview of the Keynote address at the learning event at Trinity UC, Ingersoll, in early November with the Rev. Dr. Jessica Hetherington.

DISCIPLESHIP FOR HEALING THE EARTH

Although as Christian disciples we worry about the ecological crisis, we seek ways to act which embody hope. Those of us attending were encouraged as Rev. Jessica led us through the stages of Witnessing, Lament, Who We Are in Creation so that we could answer the question: How we are to Respond? In future issues we will provide more details.

Witnessing: the ecological crisis from a Christian perspective. The Universe is old (13.7 billion years) but the speed at which this crisis is happening is unprecedented. The scientists at the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) state that we will have trouble meeting, within the next decade, the 1.5 degree Celsius Centigrade over pre-industrial temperatures. We are in the 6th Extinction period with widespread species extinction. In the 2 previous extinctions (250 million

years ago) the biodiversity loss took 10 million years to recover! Further, we have 20 million refugees today. By 2050, it is estimated that we will have 50 million!

Lament: to be brutally honest with God remembering God's actions in the past. Even though we feel numb or want to hide, we trust that God can handle our honest feelings of fear and despair. We look to the Psalms, Lamentations and Job knowing we are connected to God, to earth community

and with each other.

Who are we in Creation? Everything is interconnected and interdependent in creation, but humans are a complex part of creation. Worldview is how the world The worldview. functions. present however, is divorced from the natural world. Starting with science, (Newton and Descartes) the physical world was isolated from humans and has been assumed to have no meaning. It was up to humans to conquer and master this physical world. We are indebted to Thomas Berry a geologian, and Sallie McFague, an ecotheologian who have challenged this worldview, encouraging us to re-interpret dogmas and doctrines in light of what we know from our earth sciences.

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Ecological literacy is about learning about plants inside our house or birds outside our windows.

We cannot care for what we do not know. We cannot know what we have not experienced.

How are we to respond? We respond not only as global citizens but also as Christian disciples – living our Christian belief out in the world. Discipleship is beyond ethics – Jesus not only fed the poor but also had a deep relationship with them - something



beyond doing the right thing.

Costly discipleship is picking up our cross and carrying it -our response is saying 'yes' to the will of God for our lives.

We are hopeful as we live out our discipleship even in a burning world because we aren't on our own. We pray and reflect and pay attention to experiencing God in the natural world around us. We understand the ecological crisis as being more than one more Justice issue. It is the reality of our planet. And all parts of our planet are connected. We are not alone. God is **with** us. We are part of community.

Vespers For our closing vesper service We placed tea lights on a world map where we



felt healing was most needed. Our souls were strengthened with the music of Susan Barta and Avori Barta in the service prepared

by Lori Minler and Lynne Dunlop.



'The Strawberry Poison Dart Frog

In the country of Costa Rica lives this amazing Strawberry Poison Dart Frog. The "poison dart" in its name comes from the



fact that its skin is poison. Indigenous people once used blow darts. They discovered that if they rubbed the dart across the

skin of this frog it took on the poison which helped in hunting.

The amazing thing about this frog is how it looks after its baby tadpoles. The eggs are laid after a rain, in a small pool of water in the forest. The problem with this is sometimes this water dries up before the baby tadpole grows into an adult frog. However, there is a tree in Costa Rica that has cup shaped leaves that collect water. The adult frog, usually the mother, goes to the tadpole, gets the tadpole to cling to her back, climbs the tree and deposits the tadpole into its new home, one tadpole per leaf cup. Since there is nothing to eat in these leaf cups, she lays an egg for food for each tadpole. She keeps doing that until the tadpole grows into a frog. Then she loads the baby frog onto her back and heads down the tree where the baby can find a home on the forest floor.

Now isn't that just amazing? There's a sister with the problem-solving ability to ensure the survival of her species; for us an ability much admired and much needed.

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FOOD FOR THE SOUL

Advent Part II – The Other Joshua

"A young woman will conceive and bear a son and he will be called the son of the most high." When that long awaited word came to Mary, the son was given a name. "You shall call him Jeshua," said the angel. We know the name as Joshua, which meant "the one who saves" or "the one who delivers". "He will save us from our sins" adds Matthew.

When the text was translated into Greek, Yeshua or Joshua became Iesous. Some of you may remember the letters IHS on a banner or a cross. These were Iota, Eta and Sigma, the first three letters of Iesous.

We know what the original Joshua delivered. It was Jericho. "Joshua fit the Battle of Jericho". If you google that spiritual you will get Mahalia Jackson's wonderful version. If you remember the story, the walls came down without a spear being thrown, or a sword being drawn.

What if our sins are wall building and Jesus is the one who lived and died to bring down walls. Mary seemed to indicate that when she broke into the poetry of Isaiah the prophet when she heard the angels' birth announcement: "The mighty will be brought from their thrones and the lowly will be raised up. The poor will be fed and the rich will go away empty."

The ministry of Jesus was one of getting rid of the walls that had been built by religious authorities. His was a ministry of inclusion. We remember the Samaritan woman at the well, or the one man, a Samaritan, who came back to thank Jesus for his healing. We recall that Jesus refused to vilify the Roman soldier who asked that his daughter be healed. The story of the Good

Samaritan takes on new meaning if it was a parable and not an event. That certain man was on his way from Jerusalem to Jericho. We are all on the Jericho journey.

Are the walls coming down? The Santa Clause parade in Toronto this year was led by a float depicting the Indigenous creation story, a not so small sign of respect from a European culture bent on genocide. At the end of the summit on world poverty, the poorer nations brought forward a plea to compensate them for the pollution caused by the richer counties. The poorer countries are the first to suffer in the climate crises. Church communities have long shut out members of the LGBTQ2S community but that is changing.

Last Sunday was the third in Advent. The theme was joy. Remember what Elizabeth said about the baby in her womb when pregnant Mary came into the room. "He jumped for joy!" Those walls of judgement that had crept into Mary's head suddenly vanished. It was just the beginning of the life of this Joshua/Jesus who would bring down walls on the way to peace on earth.

Next Sunday in worship we light the candle of love. Along with the carols will be that other tune that I can't quite get out of my head. "Joshua (the other one whose birth

we celebrate) fit the battle of . . . and the walls came tumbling down." Hallelujah!
