AT LAST - GOOD NEWS FOR REFUGEES

(Editorial comment. Refugees leave their homeland where they are subject to persecution or death. Most can never return. They can live for years in a no person's land awaiting approval to come to a safe country. There are 23 million refugees under The UN Refugee Agency's mandate.)

We want to provide you with some updates concerning our sponsored refugees.

With Bisrat Yemane's arrival, St David's UC sponsored Eritrean refugee, we hoped we might be welcoming others soon. Bisrat is now living with a relative in Guelph and working at an automobile parts manufacturing company. We have recently received welcome news that Sara Temnewu and her 3 children (shown



here Lt-Rt: Fithawi, Selam, Sara and Naod), being sponsored by St David's, have an interview on March 10 in

preparation for their move to Canada after 3 long years of waiting in Ethiopia under dangerous conditions. St David's await word that will tell them that another 2 young men also have an interview date.


Trinity United's sponsored **Al-Mohammedawi family of 5** has recently received word that they will be interviewed on March 1. They have been waiting since





2017 as refugees in Turkey to hear this news. (shown below Lt-Rt: Wisam, Nedi Al-Saadi, Anaam, Razan, Shahad). They are excited and grateful that the final steps in the procedure to

bring them to Canada will soon be starting. They will be living in London to be close to the cosponsor, the father's sister and her family.



Westminster United has submitted their application for a Syrian family of 5 living as refugees in Lebanon. The Hamoudi family consists of a single mother and 4 children. Westminster has learned that the United Church refugee office is considering a plan to allow fund raising to continue while the application is being processed instead of having to have all the funds in place before that begins. This will shorten an already extended time period for the family to wait.

Both Knox and Westminster continue to fund raise and your donations to help bring these people to our beautiful, safe country of promise would be appreciated. **On Feb 21 you could travel to Knox United,**

Obituary REV DAVID FEARON



The Reverend David Sheldon Fearon died at the age of 84, peacefully in his home in Nanaimo, Vancouver Island, B.C.

at the beginning of January, 2023.

David was minister at Norwich UC from 1981-1988. Marie Avey notes in her recent book 'The Church that Spawned a Village' that it was a harmonious ministry. CONNECTIONS reported on the story of his Biblical scholarship in March 2020 page 4.

David's story is told in more detail in this article in the Los Angeles' blade. According to United Church Retired minister Rev. David Shearman, "Fearon's story is one of challenging scriptural interpretation, mistranslation and acknowledging a unique and special call to ministry. He is one of the pioneers and saints of the United Church of Canada.

His scholarly challenge to established scriptural translation is yet to be fully disclosed but will be the subject of an upcoming book to be published in mid-2023." Rest in Peace, David Fearon.

FOR CHILDREN OF ALL AGES.

The Semipalmated Sandpiper

What if your name was longer than you are? We could say that about one of the



marathon athletes of the bird world - the "Semipalmated Sandpiper". The bird has webbing between its toes so it can better

walk on mud or wet sand. The word "palmated" means webbed.

This shore bird, about 6 inches from beak to tail and weighing less than 2 ounces, nests in summer in the Canadian Artic. The new born chicks are walking and looking for insects to eat soon after they hatch. In less than three weeks they are flying, which is absolutely amazing.

These Sandpipers fly south for the winter and on their way, most of the ones born in the eastern Artic, stop for rest and food on the mud flats of Nova Scotia's Bay of Fundy. There they fill up on insects and crustaceans.

What is remarkable is they are able to fly nonstop for three days to get to the Bay of Fundy and then fly nonstop over water for another three days to get to their winter home in South America. That would be for us like running at fill speed for three days and nights without food or sleep.

What an awesome little bird. There **are** birds that fly even farther to their summer home. But that is a story for next month.

The January 19 Zoom Workshop 'Checking in with the Rural Church' was a wonderful chat with United Church Canadians. The Rev. Dr. Peter Bartlett summarized General Council's Strategic Plan showing the relationship between call, vision, values, commitments and affirmations.

was a strong sense that rural concerns were ignored. We were encouraged to bring our concerns of poverty, health care and big business taking over the community to our Regional Councils to be addressed.

And yet. Still. Amazing things are happening across Canada. I was really impressed by the story of retired Rev. She is one of 3 Carole McKenzie. volunteers who help with the Star City Community **Pantry** which groceries to up to 13 people/week with a monthly cost of about \$1000. Amazing given that the population of Star City is 460 and their congregation numbers 3-8 people on any Sunday. The pantry is open to all every Thursday afternoon and has grown to be a meeting place with coffee and cookies. Seeing is believing! FOOD FOR THE SOUL

Paths to Peace and Justice part one

In first-century Palestine there were at least three theologies or three paths to a world of peace and justice.

Rome's theology was quite simple. The emperor Caesar called himself the saviour of the world. On every coin, including those used by Jesus and his disciples, were the words, "Caesar Son of God". Peace was to be kept by military force.

When King Herod died about 4 BCE, there was the threat of revolution. To restore order the military was brought in. Two thousand of the resisters were rounded up and crucified. "Peace" was restored.

Another theology involving violence was that of John the Baptist. His message was to get your life in order because the Messiah was on his way and God was about to separate the wheat from the chaff. If you were judged to be chaff, you would be burned.

This may have come from Isaiah 62. The writer uses the image, not of threshing, but that of a wine press. As God's enemies are squeezed, blood will flow like wine. The author of the book of Revelation uses the same image. (14:20)

The third path to God's kingdom, as we know, was that of Jesus.

At the beginning of his ministry, Jesus went into the synagogue in Nazareth and was asked to read in worship. (Luke 4:15-19) He was handed the scroll of Isaiah. He selected verses 61:1-2a: As Luke records it, God's redeeming plan was to bring good news to the poor, release to the captives, sight to the blind and set the captives free. Missing was the line in Isaiah's statement: "To proclaim the day of

the Lord's vengeance". Jesus left it out. This may have been the most important words never spoken. Then Jesus adds. "This has been fulfilled." The kingdom of God is already here, though there is still much work to be done.

The response was stunned silence followed by the statement "Isn't this Joseph's son?" Jesus recognized a put-down when he heard one. Carpenters were part of the peasant class. There was no middle class in Palestine in the first century. The son of Joseph would have no authority to speak.

Now it was Jesus' turn to respond. He cited a couple of examples where God had chosen the outcast. One was that, while there were many lepers in Israel, God had chosen Naaman, a leper from Syria, for healing.

It was only then that the crowd got angry, grabbed Jesus and took him to the brow of a hill to push him to his death.

Jesus had outlined the trajectory of his ministry: raising up those society had designated as the lowly: bringing the outcasts back to the center. Jesus Seminar scholar John Dominic Crossan describes the ministry of Jesus as Radical Egalitarianism. That was the path for Jesus, and for us, to a world of greater peace and justice.

So, how are we doing in that path of discipleship, after nearly 2000 years? Is the world moving toward less or toward more violence? What do you think?
