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# EPIPHANY – LOVE MAKES IT THROUGH

### **BLASTing off to Bethlehem!**

What a wonderful Advent experience the children of the Zorra United Churches enjoyed this season! As a result of the collaborative ministries initiative between Chalmers United in Kintore, Knox United in Embro and Westminster United in Thamesford, called **BLAST** (Bible Learning Adventure Station Time) the



leadership team together planned an incredibly rewarding event for their little ones. Close to 60 children made the journey back to

Bethlehem in period costumes with their travel passports, currency and luggage in hand. They heard of Jesus' birth, built wooden houses, wove woolen baskets, sculpted clay bowls and enjoyed a meal together within the town square. The three program was hosted in all communities on sequential Sunday mornings, allowing for sharing of décor and materials.

**BLAST** originated in Embro a number of years ago and after numerous conversations among the three churches in



Zorra related to ways ministry could be done together, children's ministry to seemed be natural place to start. All three churches share a rich history in providing quality programming for children in their communities. By

joining forces with regard to planning and sharing of resources, all three churches have benefitted from the collaboration in ways they couldn't have imagined.

Many thanks to the former Oxford Presbytery for the grant recently awarded to this collaborative group for curriculum, technology and supplies. This gift is so very much appreciated and will go a long way as monthly programming is developed for 2023.

As a side note: Folks at Westminster started investigating the concept of collaborative ministry a year ago with the hope and prayer they could partner with other communities of faith within their area. They felt that by dreaming big, actively inviting other communities of faith to join in the conversation and finding new and creative ways to do ministry they may just succeed in rekindling excitement and commitment for the life and work of the church.

Opportunities around a rural and urban partnership were sought after as well as collaboration with fellow communities of faith within Zorra township.

Collaboration between the Zorra churches continues in other ways as well. **We look forward to a Star-Studded Games Night on January 6<sup>th</sup>.** A short worship service at Westminster focused on Epiphany will be followed by a time of fellowship, refreshments and board games.

As 2023 rolls on, the three united churches

in Zorra will be exploring what it means to become affirming congregations. We all look forward to what the future holds for us.

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### FOR CHILDREN OF ALL AGES.

### The Leatherback Sea Turtle.

The Leatherback Turtle is the largest of seven different kinds of Sea Turtles. They measure about two meters from head to tail and weigh about 1000 pounds or 453.59 Kilos and are found mostly in tropical waters.



The only time they are on land is when they hatch and again

20 years later when female turtles go back to the sandy beach where they were born to lay their eggs. The turtle digs out a "nest", lays from 60 to 100 eggs and covers it with sand. When the babies hatch, they dig their way out and scramble as fast as they can to the ocean water.

The gender of the turtle is determined by the temperature of the sand. Hot sand results in a girl turtle and cool sand makes a boy turtle.

These may be the only creatures where the babies may never see their mothers and the mothers may never see their babies.

Sea Turtles are endangered even though they may live to be 100 years. Only about one in one thousand reach maturity. Birds and fish love to eat baby turtles. In some countries turtle eggs are a delicacy for humans. Beaches become crowded and there isn't room for an undisturbed nesting place. We humans are their number one enemy.


During the Covid Pandemic, the Sea Turtle population increased because there was less activity on beaches.

We need more signs on beaches that read, "Sea Turtles Only". Afterall, they were here first. We took their beaches without permission or apology. Their future depends on us. GW

# MODERATOR CARMEN LANDSDOWNE

In her Facebook account, our Moderator invites us to follow Kimberly Murray and Progress Update Report. review her Independent Murray is the Special Interlocutor for Missing Children Unmarked Graves and Burial associated with Indian Residential Schools, November 2022. The Report submitted to The Honourable David Lametti, Minister of Justice and Attorney General of Canada.

Murray has written a serious report with sensitivity and candour. That the work is sacred is obvious as is the truth that there are gaps in legal protections for possible burial sites. My heart was warmed as I read in her guiding principles that both the bodies and Spirits of missing Indigenous children must be treated with honour,

respect and dignity. A blanketed Empty Chair is always present in the room where they gather. The search for unmarked burials and the recovery of missing Indigenous children is to be governed by Indigenous Laws as well as United Nations Conventions. The 4 National Gatherings are being held throughout the 2-year Mandate. Recordings of these will be available on the Interlocutor's website.

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"Silent night, Holy night, All is calm, all is bright."

Those words sung in a quiet church in the gentle glow of candle light are indeed food for the soul. That meditative moment in music followed by silence gives us a glimpse of what the prophet Isaiah envisioned, a world of peace, justice, and loving relationships. We need that image in a world that seems to be coming apart at the seams.

Now, in the cold reality of January we face what we call the "real world".

Sometimes we forget stories of Jesus's birth are stories of hope set in the midst of a world, a culture and a family under extreme stress.

Mary and Joseph were ordered by Rome to leave the safety of Nazareth to register for Rome's inevitable taxation. Mary was far from her family, friends and the the village midwife. with not even a spare room in the Bethlehem Inn available. Joseph, in spite of what he thought the angel had said to him in a dream, knew that Mary's son was not his. Marriage would not be a problem, nor would adoption but would he have questions?

The first visitors to welcome the baby were shepherds from the fields. Shepherds were marginalised people, the riffraff of society. To speak of a "Good Shepherd" was almost as unheard of as speaking of a "Good Samaritan."

While gospel writer Luke has the family returning to Nazareth after a week in Jerusalem. Matthew has the family fleeing to Egypt because their baby is not safe anywhere in Judea or Israel. In Egypt they live as refugees to wait for the death of King Herod.

The "good news of great joy" is that Herod did not win. In her book "The Window Sonnets, Robyn Marie Butt writes,

### "Christ's joy cannot be snuffed. Love made it through."

Robyn uses this to sum up the Easter story of Emmaus, but it could apply to Jesus's birth.

It is love that motivates the resistance to evil. Love in the political world means a passion for justice. Here are some examples.

It is the love of democratic governance that has rallied the Ukrainian people and most of the western world to act. That courage sends a clear message to Mr. Putin and all would-be oligarchs, that the age of taking what is not yours is over.

Faced with a Pandemic, we love one another and ourselves enough to have created vaccines. With masks and distancing we are able to control the viruses that plague us.

The courageous protests against the treatment of women and girls in Iran and Afghanistan will continue.

The compensation package for Indigenous people being negotiated will finally become a reality in '23.

The Conferences on Climate Change in Egypt and Montreal have suggested if we follow though with action, that we actually love the planet that gives us life.

In Jan. of '23 all is not calm and all is not bright, but "Love made it through." It's a work in progress. Or as the gospel of John

states. "Light has come into the world and darkness has not overcome it." That too is part of the "real world." Thank God.
