#### **MOONLIGHT: A GIFT FROM GOD**



August this year ended in a week of glorious golden full moonlit nights. It was eyepoppingly beautiful; just soaking it in

brought back good memories.

Early in my life, for example, were the War Years, nights when everything was 'blacked out'. All our windows were fitted with thick, black curtains. Artificial light could indicate the presence of life for a bomber. Many important errands needed to happen quietly by moonlight either by bicycle or by motorcycle or car using only the light of the moon to find the way. Often en route Dad would gather some road kill – a rabbit or a wild turkey – to add to our pantry.

Driving on a cloudy night close to a full moon was an answered prayer to my Mother. It meant Dad would be safe on the road.

Another good time on a clear full moon was the time I went out early before breakfast with my Dad's Dad: Grandad. He and I gathered fresh mushrooms to clean and cook for a family breakfast, a breakfast to die for – all available without using any of our precious food coupons. By moonlight the mushroom circles shone in the meadows like fairytale places – special, magical, yummy.

Years later, Canadian moonlight walks were the setting for some of my romantic adventures during my salad days. Moonlit hours beside the creek talking about life in all its wonder were so honest and clear. Who was I? What did God want me to be or do?

I wonder when I lost track of my love of moonlight. When did electric light blot out my moonlight?

When I decided to go to University and, to do that, worked a night shift at Canadian Kodak. The shift ended well before breakfast time and to save money for my fees I would walk home along the main

streetcar line, a long walk for the most

part by moonlight.

Once back on Campus where the cafeteria opened early, around dawn, I would arrive with a voracious appetite and a mouth watering for eggs and bacon.

This year I have regained my connection to moonlight, a connection linking me more firmly to God and to God's world!

# OXFORD UNITED REFUGEE SUPPORT COMMITTEE (OURS)

The OURS Committee's function is to be available in **a supportive role** to United churches in Oxford who are considering refugee sponsorship. **How?** 

- We are a resource for congregations that wish to sponsor refugees who wish to come to Canada and for families hoping to co-sponsor refugee family members in accordance with the policies of the Ministry of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship of Canada (IRC-C). When a refugee contacts us seeking sponsorship we assist by helping to find a church who is willing to sponsor.
  - We assist congregations on where to find sponsorship guides and appropriate application forms including an explanation of the various pathways available for applications.
- The OURS committee does NOT raise funds, have a bank account nor have status with CRA as a charity. receipts are issued by the sponsoring churches. The committee can share fundraising however, ideas and information to set up bank accounts for refugee sponsorship as well governmental expectations re the necessity of keeping detailed records of donated funds and expenditures. We can help with calculating the amount of money needed to support refugees based on family size and assist with preparing a budget proposal to submit with applications.
- After an application has been successfully submitted, we are available for advice on issues around settlement of the refugee(s).

who were taken from their communities and families to residential institutions.



#### **FOOD FOR THE SOUL**

The Archbishop's Sermon

Archbishop Justin Welby's sermon for the Coronation of the Prince of Wales was the best four-minute sermon I have ever heard.

It must have been rather daunting to choose texts for a Coronation. After all the only word of Jesus to a rich man, and ruler or leader was, "If you are seeking eternal life, then go, sell all you have, give the money to the poor, and come and follow me." Hardly appropriate for the occasion. What was appropriate was Luke 4:16-21, which includes, "I come to bring good news to the poor"; a bold text for the gathered congregation in the Abby and for those watching on TV, the most affluent people on the planet.

The first line of the sermon was equally as bold: "We come to crown a King for service". Then, just in case that intent was missed, the Archbishop adds, "for the King of Kings, Jesus Christ, came not to be served but to serve."

For the first three minutes the sermon proceeded as any sermon on service might. Then I heard these words, referring to Jesus, "His throne was a cross. His crown was made of thorns. His regalia were the wounds that pierced his body". (Those who were crucified were stripped naked; it was part of the humiliation.)

By contrast, here was the soon to be crowned King sitting in a 700-year-old oak chair originally covered in gold leaf, judged to be one of the most precious pieces of furniture in the world.

The crown, one of seven royal crowns, was made of approximately 5 pounds of pure gold adorned with 444 precious stones.

The King's regalia included gold and silver embroidered robes of velvet and silk, so heavy he needed assistance in getting to stand following the coronation.

What was Archbishop Welby saying about service, speaking to royalty, and to us, as members of the wealthy First World?

The scriptural foundation for the sermon was God's vision of the new world: a world where there would be no rich and no poor; where all would have what they needed. That was part of "the year of the Lord" (Luke 4:19), a time when there would be a redistribution of wealth. That was the "good news to the poor".

The hurting people would be healed and the oppressed would be freed. As we know, for Jesus, supporting the oppressed took place mostly in Galilee. Confronting the oppressors took place mostly in Jerusalem. Service, for Jesus, meant both. The cost of reshaping the world would be high. The consequence was the cross.

The sermon from beginning to end was about service: about what it means to be a follower of the "King of Kings".

Was this also a not-so-subtle judgment from the gospel, of a world of rich and poor, with one example being the monarchy? I believe it was.

At any rate, it would and should give King Charles III, and us, much to think about.
