### **HOSTING UKRAINIANS**

In February 2022, when war broke out in Ukraine, we felt compelled to help in some way. We had recently ended twenty-plus-years as foster parents, leaving areas of our large house unused. It seemed natural that we could use that space for Ukrainians fleeing to Canada – and so started our hosting journey.

In March, we inquired of Dave and Karen Murray (Oxford County of Ontario Helps Ukraine) about becoming a host family. Then, we discussed with potential families by text and video chat and found a match with one family. On May 21, 2022, our family grew by five – a father, mother, and three girls (15, 12, and 1,) and their dog, "Lucky!"

The next while was full of appointments – SINs, work permits, OHIP, and eventually G1 license applications, along with free 'shopping' at the warehouse in Woodstock which gathers household donations for new immigrants. Google Translate helped us hear about their stories from Ukraine, all they had lost in the war, and their heartache for their homeland.

We delivered many welcome baskets to Ukrainian newcomers and hosted monthly barn/hall potlucks in our to build connections and support where they could speak in their own language. Thus, in June 2022, we met another family that needed a new home, so our family grew by four more - a father, mother, and their daughter (5), and son (1.) So, there were 18-21 people at our dinner table every night! (Pictured below)

We were pleased to show them this corner of Canada – Niagara Falls, Toronto, the St. Jacob's Farmers' Market, the Stratford Festival, local parades, the CNE, etc. – but, mostly, we got to know each other. We got to learn so much about their homeland as they, in turn, worked to learn our ways here in Canada.

Moving to a new country is difficult. Our first family struggled with English and with Canadian life, deciding to move on in December 2022. Their space was soon filled by a single woman who was already connected to our second family. Together, they worked hard, and we're proud to say moved into their own lovely rental house in Woodstock on May 1, 2023 – close to work and allowing the older sister to stay at the school she loved.

Hosts are offering hospitality to those who, by no fault of their own, have found their own home untenable. It has been as rich an experience for us as it has been helpful to them. Many hosts are doing just as much with less space than we have. Many others have helped with donations, driving, welcome baskets, or at the warehouse. There is so much that can be done, and we're proud that the people of Oxford have done more than their share.

"Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it." Hebrews 13:2

The Al-Dean family-home in London is a joyous, busy household where the Al-Mohammedawi family will live for the month of June until they move to their own apartment on July 1. Our sponsored family arrived at Pearson Airport from Istanbul on the evening of Friday May 26 into the loving arms of Marwa and her family which includes her husband Basim and their children. Marwa, our sponsor, is the sister of Wisam Al-Mohammedawi. Marwa, Basim and their then two children were sponsored by Trinity several years ago. They now have four children who, like their parents, are happy and contributing Canadian Citizens. Marwa approached our church in August of 2021 to co-sponsor her brother and his family who had fled into Turkey from Baghdad, Iraq in 2017 to ensure the safety of their three daughters following the tragic loss of their twelve-year-old son at the hands of a terrorist group. We have found an apartment for them in White Oaks, London. A volunteer moving crew will take the donated items that will furnish their apartment from storage at Trinity to their new home on Canada Day. Other settlement related tasks are already well underway such as obtaining SIN and OHIP numbers, orienting them to their new city, neighbourhood and schools. Plans are being made for English classes. The three girls have some ability to converse in English gained by long distance communication with their cousins in Canada over the past five years. Understanding the Canadian monetary system and the importance of budgeting are high on the agenda to ensure our funds, committed for their first year's support, will be wisely spent.

We will be arranging a time of fellowship at the church for the congregation to meet them and experience first hand the genuine gratitude felt by this family. Sponsorship is not easy, but the rewards are absolutely heart warming, and, for new Canadians, life giving.



### The Lyrebird

Last month, you may remember the Fork Tailed Gondo, the bird that has learned how to tell lies, (or engage in fake news). One of our readers wrote to us and said this bird that lies "gave her pause".

So after the "liar" bird, why not follow it



with the Lyrebird. This amazing Australian bird gets its name because its displayed tail feathers resemble

a lyre. The purpose of the feather display is to impress and attract a would-be mate.

The Lyrebird is a master of mimicry. While it has a song of its own, it loves to imitate the sounds it hears in the forest. It can imitate the sound of the kookaburras so perfectly that kookaburras answer back. Does this make it the only multilingual bird on the planet?

### **FOOD FOR THE SOUL**

# Two steps Forward. . . Part Two

To continue the story of the early church after Pentecost, we turn to the book of Acts, written by Luke.

By the 10<sup>th</sup> chapter of Acts, Peter was convinced that this new community could include Gentiles. Luke describes in Acts the growth of the church in cities around the Mediterranean.

If the church's task is to change the world: to pray and work that "it may be done on earth as it is in heaven," we should not be surprised when the world pushes back. Jesus said as much when he said that those who choose to follow will need to "take up the cross."

Rome, thinking it had contained this Jesus movement, discovered it had not, so it began to persecute Christians. In spite of that, or because of the persecution and the raw courage and persistent love shown by Christians, the church continued to grow. However, in or around 60 CE both Paul and Peter were executed, probably in Rome. The world was pushing back.

Also, not only did the church seek to reshape the world, the customs and social practices of the world were showing up in the texts. In Ephesians 6:5 and Colossians 3:22 we read that slaves should obey their masters. Ephesians 5:23-33 states that wives should obey their husbands and husbands should love their wives as Christ loved the church. It is clear who represents Christ and who represents the church. In 1Timothy 2:11 the writer suggests that women should be silent when it came to spiritual matters.

If the church had listened to Paul's letter to the church in Galatia where he said

June 14, 2023 Page 8 of 8 that in Christ there was neither slave nor free, Galatians 3:28 and heeded Paul's letter to Philemon telling him that in Christ there was no place for slavery, one of the greatest injustices in Christian history might have been avoided.

If we had noted that some of the deacons Paul appointed were women, and if we had listened to his words "In Christ there is neither male nor female"; if we had ignored 1Timothy 2:11, that women should be silent, the Christian community would have avoided some of its historic patriarchy and it would not have taken us nearly 1900 years to ordain the first woman.


If these epistles were not written by Paul, then Paul can be seen in a more favourable light. These texts that support slavery and patriarchy represent at least two steps back from "the good news".

To use one of St. Paul's metaphors, "We have this treasure in earthen vessels." (2 Corinthians 4:7) To discern what is treasure and what is earthen vessel: what reflects the life and work of Jesus and what comes from the

world, is the tough but necessary work (journey) of the church. Thanks to the Spirit, that work still goes on, and needs to. Our life here on earth may just depend on it.
