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## **BE STILL**

I had an encounter last week in the grocery store. The woman ahead of me in line had four little children each morphed into an octopus type creature with 8 arms and legs all goung in different directions and yelling happily as they unloaded her cart, ate candy snatched from a low shelf or pretended to be a steam engine. The mother was oblivious and stood peacefully smiling in their midst. She was wearing a tee shirt which proclaimed: Be still and know that I am God.

Ever since that encounter I have been pondering Palm 46:10. What, I wonder, did the verse mean to that mother? What does it mean to me when I am myself in the midst of chaos in my life? What does it mean to so many of us as we despair of the state of our world?

Scholars say it was written in a time of war when Israel was at a critical point in its development. Does it mean we need to calm down, relax and take a break? Does it mean we need to turn our troubles over to Jesus and keep calm as we carry on? Does it just mean to remind us that most of our efforts to control our own lives are futile; God is already on it so relax? Maybe it is a reminder that we need to talk to God often; listen to God daily; depend on God always. Hebrew scholars say that the word used here for 'be still' means cast down or let fall; drop it! Let God do God's work while we tend to ours.

We are safe in God's hands. That mother knew her four rascals were safe on that

patch of aisle. She was therefore able to 'Be still and know that God had her back', as God always has ours. Olga McKellar

#### **GRATITUDE Habte Zecharias**

Today I am here to give thanks to all of you at St. David's United Church for the wonderful support you have given me and my family for many, many years.

I will always remember the cold winter night 33 years ago on December 08/1989 when we arrived in our new home in Woodstock. There were members of the church congregation waiting to welcome our family--Rev. Peter Scott, Helen McLeod, Jim Harrison, Becky White. Our children were very young (between 8 months to 6 years). After the 16-hour flight we were tired, hungry, and in a foreign place, not knowing what to expect.

That night, even though the weather was freezing cold, the warm welcome we got from our hosts filled us with happiness and made us comfortable.

From that time---over the next 33 years, through the support of St. David's Church, we have been blessed to have several family members join us here in Canada. The latest one is Bisrat.

There is a commonly referenced verse within the Bible, when accepting and welcoming strangers, Matthew 25:34-40: "For I was hungry, and you gave me something to eat. I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick you looked after me, I was in prison and you went to visit me. When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you? The king will reply, Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it for me."

I want to finish by saying---words will never be enough. We are grateful

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beyond measure. We will forever be thankful for the generosity and compassion the congregation of St. David's United Church has continuously shown my family through the many years.

Habte Zekarias has cosponsored many people from Eritrea. He spent only 3 months in a refugee camp!

We continue to pray for 17 additional refugees as they endure a long wait in difficult living conditions. Four Oxford County Churches have applied or are applying to sponsor these refugees. Eleven of the refugees have approved applications and are awaiting the final steps that will bring them to Canada.



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# FOOD FOR THE SOUL

## **NOT ZONED FOR KINDNESS?**

On Saturday Sept. 24<sup>th</sup> the London Free Press ran a story about churches who were involved in Ark Aid's program to provide meals to marginalised residents of London. Some merchants along Richmond Row were claiming that the zoning did not allow for such activity. Churches were zoned for Sunday worship. The powers that be indicated that the merchants may have a point and closing the meal program as it was being practiced was a possibility. Although First St. Andrews United Church is involved in the program, it was the Baptist Church near Richmond Row that made the merchants nervous.

One can feel only outrage, especially in this Thanksgiving season.

It was a reminder of a year ago when the city council of "the Friendly City" of Woodstock removed the benches from the downtown park so the men and women who are homeless would be discouraged from gathering.

But back to the London story. It just so happened that Sunday, the day after the Free Press story, the lectionary texts featured two of the foundation blocks of the Christian Faith, neighbourliness and the confronting of injustice. The Old Testament text told the story of the prophet Jeremiah in prison for calling out the King for the injustice in Jerusalem. The gospel told us of the rich man who neglected the needs of the poor man at his gate (Luke 16). The rich man ended up in a hot place after he died.

Some might suggest that the penalty for neglecting our poor planet is resulting in a

hot place, but it is here on earth. We call it global warming. We have just witnessed the fury of hurricanes when the oceans warm.

The gospel message was to close the gap between rich and poor. The Jeremiah story ends with Jeremiah buying a field in a land about to be lost as a sign that restoration is possible, in spite of evidence to the contrary. It was a bold move of hope in what seemed to be a hopeless time.

The Sunday scriptures are a stark reminder that churches that are zoned for public worship should also be zoned for public action.

While many of our churches themselves are in crises, it is in just such a time we have opportunity to look at the church's mission: how we best live in hope; how we participate in God's vision of restoration; how we partner

with God who, with our help, intends to make all things new.
