MAY 17TH - LOCAL GROUPS CELEBRATED IDAHOBIT DAY

May 17th 1990 was the date on which the World Health Organisation said that I was not mad. In other words, that homosexuality was not a mental illness.

That is why May 17th is designated IDAHOBIT day, the International Day Against Homophobia, Blphobia and Transphobia.

Locally Notts Pride celebrated the event at BEAR, Hockley - see photos on the left. Other groups like Notts LGBT+ Network, the Spencer Trust and Notts Front Runners also acknowledged the importance of this date.

At County Hall they flew a rainbow flag. I'm sure it had the full approval of REFORM.





IDAHOBIT DAY IN PARIS



There are a few memorials across the world for the LGBT+ people murdered in the Holocaust. There are three in Germany, one in Amsterdam, one in Alaska, one in Australia and one in Nottinghamshire at the Laxton Holocaust Museum.

We can now add one in Paris. It was unveiled on May 17th and is by the French artist Jean-Luc Verna. Paris mayor Anne Hidalgo said: "Historical recognition means saying 'this happened' and 'we don't want it to happen again'."

PROGRESS IN POLAND



Poland has officially dismantled all so-called "LGBTfree zones", discriminatory declarations that once covered nearly a third of the country.

Following widespread criticism, EU funding threats, and fierce local resistance, the final declaration was repealed in May 2025.

BELFAST'S PRIDE WINDOW



Belfast City Hall's new LGBTQ+ stained-glass window was unveiled on May 22nd by Belfast's Lord Mayor Mickie Murray.



Arklow, in County Wicklow, has Ireland's first permanent Pride crossing. It is now in danger of being erased due to the council failing to provide money for maintenance.

CURTIS CHIN AT WATERSTONES



As part of a 12 event book tour, Curtis Chin came to Waterstones on May 23rd to talk about his memoir "Everything I learned, I learned in Chinese restaurant".

The Chinese restaurant belonged to his family and was in Detroit at a time of tremendous tension and upheaval. The book gives a crash course in American history, the rise of the AIDS epidemic and the experiences of a Chinese American family.

Owing to the proliferation of crack cocaine, violence, and murder in his Chinatown community, and well aware of the risks of his sexuality, Curtis was convinced that he would be dead by the age of 30.

Everything I Learned, I Learned in a Chinese Restaurant is beautifully crafted around the structure of a Chinese restaurant meal. It begins with "The Tea" and ends with "The Fortune Cookie", covering lots of sensory experiences that immerse you in his family's restaurant.

It feels different to other memoirs that compile a person's whole life; instead the end of the book is just the beginning. Curtis is about to embark on his new life in New York, pursuing his dreams of being a writer.

UK AIDS MEMORIAL QUILT AT TATE MODERN

The UK Aids Memorial Quilt is part of the world's largest community art project. It was founded by American human rights activist Cleve Jones in 1985, in grief and rage at the lives being lost to Aids.

It is made up of commemorative panels that measure 6ft by 3ft, the size of an average grave plot. This is intentional: at the time, many of those dying of Aids-related causes were denied a proper funeral, either because families had refused to acknowledge them, or funeral homes would not take in their bodies.

In June more than 20,000 people visited Tate Modern's Turbine Hall to see the quilt. Many of those visitors have wept openly in its presence, spending hours in the space. The atmosphere has been hushed, reverential. It is unfinished, still being made Until this display, the work had never been shown in its entirety in an art institution.

EQUATION'S LIFELINE FOR LGBTQ+ SURVIVORS OF DOMESTIC ABUSE

In a powerful show of solidarity and progress during Pride Month, Nottingham-based charity Equation officially launched its dedicated LGBTQ+ Domestic Abuse Service at Broadway Cinema on June 19th. The event brought together professionals, survivors, community advocates and partners from across the region, marking a vital step forward in ensuring that domestic abuse support is accessible, inclusive, and affirming for all.



The launch took place in the heart of Nottingham's creative quarter, but its impact reached far wider. Attendees described the event as more than a launch—it was, as one guest put it, "a moment of recognition—for our experiences, our stories, and our need to be seen and supported." Many said it felt like the community had truly been brought together, in a space that felt safe and empowering.

Opening the event, Equation's Domestic Abuse Services Manager Liam Fosten and Head of Survivor Services Rachel Daley spoke passionately about why this new provision matters. Both highlighted that, too often, LGBTQ+ survivors are overlooked in mainstream services. From fear of being outed, to past experiences of discrimination, the barriers can be significant—and sometimes life-threatening.

Commissioner Jane Lewis offered a wider perspective on the importance of embedding inclusion at every level. She emphasised that collaboration is key. Organisations working in collaboration such as Juno, Nottinghamshire Women's Aid and Nottinghamshire Sexual Violence Support Services, she said, have been—and will continue to be—central to building safer, more inclusive services across the county.

Central to the event were the voices of those working directly with LGBTQ+ survivors. Andrew and Kizzi, from Equation's LGBTQ+ team, spoke about the vital need for specialist support and the barriers LGBTQ+ survivors often face when accessing help. Andrew shared anonymised case studies to ensure survivor voices were centred in the conversation. They highlighted how fear of discrimination or being misunderstood can stop people from seeking support, and how this service offers safety, trust, and affirmation from professionals who truly understand LGBTQ+ experiences.

What also stood out was Equation's commitment to a full 360° holistic approach to domestic abuse. This isn't just about supporting survivors—it's also about challenging harmful behaviours at the source. Callum Buntrock, Head of Perpetrator Services, spoke about the charity's Your Choice Project, a behaviour change programme that works with individuals who use harm in their relationships, including within LGBTQ+ communities.

The programme creates a space for people to reflect on their actions and develop safer, healthier ways of relating, whilst still being held accountable. It's a vital part of Equation's vision to address domestic abuse from every angle—supporting survivors, engaging professionals, and disrupting cycles of harm.

Equation CEO Anthea Tainton spoke of the charity's long-term vision to build equity into everything it does. That vision, she said, must be more than words—it must be embedded in frontline services and shaped by the people it's designed to support. After the main event, attendees gathered upstairs in Broadway's mezzanine bar for refreshments and informal networking. Laughter, connection and determination filled the space. For many, it was the first time they had seen their community and their safety

Equation's LGBTQ+ Domestic Abuse Service is now live and accepting referrals. It offers support to people aged 16+ in Nottingham City and 18+ in Nottinghamshire.

prioritised so publicly.

Survivors and professionals alike can find help through Equation's website, by phone, or email.

This Pride Month, Equation has done more than show up—it has created a space, a service, and a message that resonates: there is no pride without safety, and no equality without support. This service is here. It's queer. And it's life-changing. With this launch, Equation continues to build on its mission: equal relationships, free from abuse—for everyone.

AT CITY ARTS



Building an LGBTQIA+ friendly Nottingham is a project which explores how LGBTQIA+ people experience life in Nottingham.

On June 17th City Arts hosted an evening where people could view the results of three workshops which included producing poems exploring queerness in Nottingham and drawing "memory maps" of Nottingham.

The project has produced a zine incorporating some of the maps and poems and also hopes to set up an online debate about the issues which have come to the fore.

TRUMPERY





Above is a photo of USNS Harvey Milk. Trump's US defence secretary, Pete Hegseth, has ordered the Unites States navy to strip the name of Harvey Milk the prominent murdered gay rights activist and navy veteran – from a ship, in the middle of Pride month.

The Trump administration has also said that Pride Month is now Title IX month.

PRIDE MONTH AT CROOKED HOUSE



The 600 year old Crooked House is in Lavenham, Suffolk and since 2021 it has been owned by husbands Alex and Oli.

This year the front has been repainted for Pride Month - though to be honest, they have done this in a computer generated form.



THE PRIDE SHOP SHUFFLE



If you go down to the Pride Shop today, you're sure of a big surprise! The café elements of the shop have been moved to nearer the front and the merchandise sections have been relocated to the back.

LOOKING FURTHER BACK

NOTTINGHAM'S EARLY PRIDE FESTIVALS 1997-2000

The first three festivals were actually called "Pink Lace" - Nottingham used to be known as a lace-making town.. The very first festival was a small-scale event held in **1997** on Broad Street, which was closed for traffic.

Stalls from various groups and organisations lined one side of the street and several bands gave performances on the steps of Broadway Cinema.

The fears that the event might be a focus for troublemakers proved groundless ... and that has continued to be the case at all subsequent events.





The second festival in **1998**, was more ambitious and took place in the grounds of Nottingham Castle.

"More" was the key word. There was more of everything: more stalls, more music, more people

The third festival in **1999**, again used the grounds of Nottingham Castle and continued to build on previous years.

The music was on bigger scale (and volume) than previously ... some of the sedate residents of The Park, adjacent to the Castle, complained about the noise.

The third Pink Lace exhausted the organising committee, which decided to leave the following year's event to others. The name change to "Nottingham Pride" came in **2000** along with a new organising committee.

The venue also changed from the Castle to the Embankment ("Bent by the Trent", was the headline in the local QB newsletter). Though well-organised, the event was not wholly successful. Moving out of the city centre and splitting the event across two days led to a decrease in the numbers attending.



2001 theoretically was the year of the 2 Prides. The Pride Committee and the Pink Lace committee both planned events, which resulted (to use a term borrowed from atomic physics) in "mutual annihilation", though the Pink Lace committee claimed that they cancelled because of Foot and Mouth disease.

GROUP OF THE DAY

THE EDWARD CARPENTER COMMUNITY — FOR MEN WHO LOVE MEN



Edward Carpenter was a hugely influential socialist, critic, writer, poet, thinker, vegetarian, and mystic. He was a pioneering supporter of many progressive causes we now take for granted, including women's rights and sexual reform.

His radically different lifestyle became a symbol of liberation from the oppressive middle class values of late Victorian England and his writings were an important contribution to the development of the English socialist movement and much later, to the gay liberation movement. He lived at Millthorpe, near Sheffield, with his lover, George Merrill (who inspired E M Forster to write his novel *'Maurice'*).

Our community chose to honour Carpenter by adopting his name in recognition of the strong resonance between his lifestyle and the shared values of the men who came together in the 1980s.

The Edward Carpenter Community functions mainly by organising events. These may be week-long retreats, weekends, facilitated workshops or freefomat where members bring their own energy. We don't have any base but we gather at a variety of venues in the United Kingdom. We organise regular monthly ECC Social gatherings for men in the East Midlands which are held at 1.30pm on the first Saturday of the month at The Pride Shop, 65 Maid Marian Way, Nottingham.

The meet-up is for all gay, bi, trans and non-binary men who love men and who subscribe to the ethos of establishing a rural community group house which would run on the principles of how Edward Carpenter lived his life at Millthorpe, Derbyshire.

Whilst this dream/vision hasn't as yet happened the ECC network has spent almost 40 years organising Gay Men's Weeks in order to develop like minded community of men.

We're receiving funding assistance for the group. Refreshments will be provided and donations collected on the day to cover the cost of room hire. We're always open to ideas and contributions for future meetings.

The Edward Carpenter Communuty Trust (ECCT) is a separate organisation from the main ECC Community. It is a registered charity with aims centred on health and education for and about the LGBTQ community.

It makes several grants per year to small LGBTQ charities whose aims are aligned with the Trust. Its longer term aim is to make a substantial grant to fund the purchase of buildings or land which will be used to promote the charitable objectives of ECCT



Sheila Rowbotham's acclaimed biography Edward Carpenter: A Life of Liberty and Love published in 2008. is an authoritative and detailed book exploring Carpenter's life and thought in relation to the social, aesthetic intellectual and movements of his day

LGBT+ AWARENESS TRAINING

Do you belong to an organisation, a company, a group that would benefit from LGBT+ awareness training or would like to have a presentation on aspects of LGBT+ history?

When Nottinghamshire's Rainbow Heritage was set up in 2008 with a grant from the Heritage Lottery, part of its remit was to provide regular training. In the last sixteen years training and presentations have been provided for over one hundred organisations and groups. They include:

- 6 hospitals
- 8 health-related organisations
- 5 care homes
- 5 housing organisations
- 10 schools/colleges
- 3 universities
- Notts Sexual Violence Service
- Notts Police and both local councils

Between 2014 and 2020, the former Police and Crime Commissioner Paddy Tipping supported numerous training sessions which included a focus on hate crime against LGBT+ people.

The main elements of the training are:

- Getting the terminology right what the "words" mean .. and which words not to use
- Homophobia, biphobia, transphobia: what they are. their frequency, their causes and the effects they have
- Homophobia, biphobia & transphobia in a wider context of general prejudice against minorities
- Myths and stereotypes
- Negative laws and the more recent positive changes in the law.
- "Coming out": what it means; what it's like to be "stuck in the closet" and what happens when you come out

There can be an additional focus on issues such as

- Health issues and LGBT+ people's interaction with health care providers
- Supporting victims of LGBT+ hate crimes; why these crimes are under-reported and how reporting can be encouraged
- Same sex domestic abuse/Male rape
- The special concerns of young LGBT+ people and also of older LGBT+ people, particularly those in residential care
- Local resources and support systems

The Historic Congressional Cemetery in Washington. HCC is one of the few cemeteries in the world with a dedicated LGBTQ+ section.

In the year ending March 2024, police in England and Wales recorded 22,839 hate crimes motivated by sexual orientation.

That's over 60 incidents every day.

Figures are 13% higher than five years ago. Campaigners warn that these numbers likely underrepresent the true scale, as many incidents go unreported due to fear or mistrust.
