AT FIVE LEAVES BOOKSHOP




Internationally acclaimed human rights lawyer Keio Yoshida uncovers the ongoing battle for LGBTQ+ rights, how far we've come, and how mmuch further we have to go.

In *Pride and Prejudices*, Yoshida analyses case law from around the world, including *Rosanna Flamer Caldera v Sri Lanka*, the first global precedent to call for the decriminalisation of same-sex intimacy between women, in which Yoshida acted as counsel, as well as other timely cases such as the bitter debate over self-ID for trans people in the UK and Florida's recent 'Don't Say Gay' bill.

Join us for an evening discussion with author of *Pride and Prejudices: Queer Lives and the Law*, Dr Keio Yoshida, where we will address the legal problems that still persist for the LGBTQ+ population and also discuss what more needs to be done to protect LGBTQ+ communities.





Supporting trans and gender diverse young people in Nottingham City


We are a social group for young people aged 13-17 who are trans and/or gender diverse. We will meet weekly to provide a safe and inclusive space to access social support and community.

LOOKING BACK

OCTOBER WAS BLACK HISTORY MONTH, INCLUDING BLACK LGBT+ PEOPLE



Audre Lorde a self-described "Black, lesbian, feminist, mother, poet, warrior," made lasting contributions in the fields of feminist theory, critical race studies and queer theory through her pedagogy and writing.



Cecil Belfield Clarke was an exceptional academic. After travelling to the UK in 1914. Clarke opened a medical practice which he ran for nearly 50 years after completing his training at University College Hospital in London.




Skin was the first Black artist to headline the Pyramid stage at Glastonbury. The rock icon, who found success in the '90s as the lead vocalist of British rock band Skunk Anansie, is a passionate LGBTQ+ advocate



A Turner prize-nominated artist, Isaac Julien is best known for his multi-screen art installations and distinguished films. Born in London, he graduated from Saint Martin's School of Art in 1985. Julien is now a professor of the arts at UC Santa Cruz.



Valerie Mason-John became an LGBTQ+ icon. She contributed, as co-author and editor, to the first books that documented African and Asian Lesbians in Britain.



Alvin Ailey was an American dancer, director, choreographer, and activist who founded the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater as a haven for nurturing Black artists and expressing the universality of the African-American experience through dance.



Jide Salami, whose drag name is Son of A TuTu, is a veteran drag performer well-known for wearing traditional Nigerian wear. The self-described "African drag queen extraordinaire" uses the drag platform to raise awareness of LGBTQ+rights in Nigeria



Ted Brown is a British activist and member of the Gay Liberation Front (GLF). In July 1972 he made history with a mass kiss-in in Trafalgar Square in which more than 2,000 people participated.



Phyll Opoku-Gyimah aka Lady Phyll is a co-founder of UK Black Pride, a political activist, and executive director of the LGBTQ+ Kaleidoscope Trust.

WAONG BODIES WAONG SCHOOLS

Local author and academic Claire Jenkins has just published her new book.

Inspired by Claire Jenkins' own experiences as a trans woman and working with young trans people, this book is is a much needed and vital resource for policy makers, educators, school leaders and the families of TGNB young people in today's UK schools.

Claire provides a comprehensive exploration of how societal, educational, and legislative frameworks affect the lives of trans youth, and advocates for an inclusive and supportive approach.

TOUGH TIMES IN TURKEY



A draft bill proposed by the government in Turkey would significantly extend existing restrictions on the freedoms of the LGBTQ+ community.

The proposed legislation would amend Article 225 of the Turkish Penal Code, entitled 'Immodest Acts', and sets out that anyone who behaves "contrary to the biological sex assigned at birth and general morality" faces a prison sentence of one to three years.

THE HEALTH SHOP AT SILVER PRIDE



Silver Pride is the social group for gay/bi men over 55. At their October meeting they had a visit from Lou and Jess from the Health Shop.

Much of the session was taken up with an entertaining quiz on sexual health set in the format of Family Fortunes. Many of the group were surprised by the gaps in their knowledge. The questions expanded to involve gay venues of yesteryear and cruising grounds.



Everyone also learned a great deal about the variety of support offered by the Health Shop. That includes their range of testing for STIs. It was made clear that tests carried out by the Health Shop do not go on your NHS record and those who are perhaps ultra concerned over their privacy can give a false name!

The group heard about the outreach work carried out by the health shop. This not only reaches gay venues (such as the Lord Roberts) and LGBT+ groups such as Nottingham Front Runners, but also excursions to cruising grounds where they install "bird boxes". These are attached to trees and contain condoms, lube and information. On rare occasions they have actually been used by birds.

ROBIN HOOD HALF MARATHON

About 60 members of Nottingham Front Runners took part in this year's Robin Hood Half Marathon on September 28th.

This year saw NFR join the official Robin Hood Marathon Events volunteer team so NFR proudly made Castle Boulevard their own, ensuring every single one of the 14,000 runners got a much needed boost in the final 5km of the race .On top of that, Front Runners took part in other events in London and Loch Ness.

TRUMPERY



A rainbow crosswalk honouring the victims of the 2016 Pulse nightclub shooting in Florida, Orlando, has been painted over by the state's department of transportation.

The crosswalk was part of a larger memorial to the 49 people who were killed after a gunman opened fire at the gay nightclub in June 2016, in what was then the largest mass shooting in US history.



After Gov. Greg Abbott threatened to withhold funding from cities and counties with rainbow crosswalks, one Texas church has responded by painting its steps with colourful rainbow hues.

QUEER NOTTINGHAM BOOK LAUNCH




CJ DeBarra's (pictured above) book on Queer Nottingham 1960-1990 was given a grand launch to an audience of about 150 people at Central Library on September 18th.

After interviewing over 170 people while developing what was originally thought to be a single book, it soon became apparent that there was the need for a second volume. The book covering 1991-2020 will appear in February 2026.

That will not be the end. CJ has now been delving into local queer history before 1960 and hopes to produce a further book taking things back to the 18th century.

Queer Nottingham 1960-1990



One source of information for the books has been the sequence of local newsletters and magazines that have been produced here since the 1970s.

Those who live in Nottingham might assume that such publications are replicated in cities of a similar size. Not so. In fact, there are few other cities which can compare. We have the following:

Chimaera (1970s-1980s); NOGSOG News (1980s); Gay East Midlands (1980s); Diversion (1980s); Gay Nottingham (1980s); Metrogay (1980s); Outright (1980s-1990s); Outhouse newsletter (1990s-2000s); QB (1990s-2020s); I'm Free (2000s); Notts Rainbow Review (2020s).

Most of these can be downloaded online from either the Sparrows Nest or Nottinghamshire's Rainbow Heritage websites. A collection of some of these publications was on display courtesy of Sparrows Nest.




An incidental by-product of the interviews was that some people brought along mementoes and memorabilia and asked whether CJ would like to keep them.

People have donated posters, leaflets, badges, event tickets and flyers, photographs, documents and more.. This growing collection has morphed into the Notts Queer History Archive organised by CJ with help from Sparrows Nest.



QUEER NOTTINGHAM BOOK LAUNCH

Some of the photographs were shown during the evening. They included several of gay venues of the past such as La Chic and its successor Part Two and also The Palais, which housed a number of different nights over the years.




Nottingham's first (and fairly short-lived) gay club was the Parkside club on Station Street. In its brief existence it did, however, host Elizabeth Taylor and Richard Burton who were in Nottingham for the premiere at the Moulin Rouge cinema of their film Doctor Faustus.



One remarkable photo captured an astonished bus passenger viewing the late Chris Richardson's terrifying mask of Margaret Thatcher.





As part of the evening, we heard Greg Woods (Emeritus Professor of Gay and Lesbian Studies at NTU - pictured above) read one of his poems and Mike Atkinson (seen below) talk about his coming out experiences in 1980s Nottingham. Mike also reignited his DJ role by providing some music.




The event provided a bonus for Notts LGBT+ Network as it formed a fundraiser celebrating their 50th anniversary.

Those featured in the exhibition were all nominated through a public vote.
























KING CHARLES UNVEILS LGBT+ ARMED FORCES MEMORIAL







On October 27th, King Charles III, who is head of the armed forces, unveiled a memorial to lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender military personnel at his first official engagement in support of the LGBT+ community.

He will hear speeches from serving personnel and an address from Ed Hall, chairman of Fighting With Pride, which oversaw the construction and design, and spearheaded efforts to get justice for veterans.

It was illegal to be gay in the British military until 2000, and those who were gay - or were perceived to be - faced intrusive investigations, dismissal and in some cases imprisonment. On top of this they faced lifelong consequences, including being vilified by family and friends, and losing access to their military pensions.


The memorial at the National Memorial Arboretum in Staffordshire , is named "an opened letter", is dedicated to people from the LGBT+ community now serving in the forces, as well as to mark the suffering of those who served under the ban. It resembles a crumpled piece of paper containing words from personal letters which were used as evidence to incriminate people.

Prime Minister Keir Starmer said the memorial "stands as a lasting tribute to the bravery and service of these veterans".

In December 2023, it was announced that veterans who suffered mistreatment under the ban will receive up to £70,000 each as part of the redress scheme. Veterans who lost their rank can apply to have their rank restored and discharge reason amended, ministers said.

Affected veterans say the monument signifies "closure" after decades of campaigning first to change the law, and then to push the government to make reparations. Some of those veterans are pictured below at a meeting at Whitehall in 2024.

It's a tough time for night-time venues and that includes LGBT+ venues. It's great to see Nottingham's Pride Shop celebrate its first anniversary, but in London, after 25 years, the G-A-Y bar in Soho has closed.



Apparently 61% of gay bars have closed in the last decade, but with regard to G-A-Y, one commentator said

"It is right to diagnose the challenges to queer spaces, and to Soho, but in this instance it seems like a convenient excuse. G-A-Y had a reputation for unfriendly bouncers, and only three years ago it received a one-star hygiene rating. Other – and older – gay venues further down the street are bustling, like Comptons and the Admiral Duncan."

He went on to say

'The innate urge of the gays to dress up, and parade up and down is always going to keep gay bars going – if they're good gay bars'.

The Queerstory Files

After over 40 years service in the British army as a pioneering surgeon **Dr. James Barry** retired to London where he died. His body was laid out in preparation for burial by a woman called Sophia Bishop. It was she discovered that James Barry was physically female and had successfully hidden this secret from the army for decades. When Sophia was refused payment for her services she took the secret to the press.




The revelation that one of the most revered army surgeons was born a woman caused quite a stir. The army were so embarrassed that they tried to suppress James Barry's military records for a hundred years. Their attempt failed and the world got to know James Barry's secret.

James Barry was baptised Margaret Ann Bulkley in Ireland. From adulthood he lived as a man. This suited James' father who managed to enrol him into Edinburgh University as a medical student in 1809. Women were not allowed to study medicine in those days.

James qualified as a doctor in 1812 and enlisted into the army a year later. He rose very quickly to become Assistant Surgeon to the Forces in 1815. This position gave James the chance to travel the world. His first posting was to Cape Province in South Africa where he became Colonial Medical Inspector. In this role he went to the leper hospital at Hermanus (the location of the present Hamilton Russell wine estate) and immediately set about improving health care and hygiene practices.

James had a reputation for voicing his opposition to many established medical practices wherever he went. He even had a big row with Florence Nightingale during the Crimean War over hygiene (she then stole his ideas and passed them off as her own).

A book, The Secret Life of Dr James Barry: Victorian England's Most Eminent Surgeon" by Rachel Holmes is available in paperback for about £11.



GROUP OF THE DAY

NOTTINGHAM LIONS FC



Nottingham Lions FC has been making a name for itself as Nottinghamshire's only LGBTQ+ football club since 2006. The club prides itself on providing an environment where players and supporters can enjoy football regardless of their sexual orientation.

The Lions (originally known as Nottingham Ball Bois) have seen many players and supporters join the club over the years and have had the privilege of gaining a number of honours, including becoming the champions of the GFSN gay national league for the 2008/9 season.

Their training sessions take place on every Sunday when they don't have any matches. These sessions run from 4pm until 6pm at Gresham Playing Fields. They say "We encourage people to join and take part no matter how much experience or knowledge you have of the sport as its never too late to learn."

They are supported by several sponsors, including the Lord Roberts, the New Foresters and the Unite East Midlands trade union. In return, they have raised money for charities such as Notts LGBT+ Network and Sands, the stillbirth & neonatal death charity. They have also helped raise awareness of issues such as prostate and testicular cancers.

In 2024 some members went to the 2024 Eurogames in Vienna.



They have twice received awards at the Rainbow Heritage LGBT History Month Celebration. Firstly in 2011 (as Nottingham Ball Bois) receiving the award from Peter Tatchell



The second award (now as Nottingham Lions) was in 2022



MISCELLANY

YOUNG BIRDS FROM STRANGE MOUNTAINS AT THE SCHWULES MUSEUM

The exhibition "Young Birds from Strange Mountains" at Berlin's Schwules Museum, features exciting, extraordinary works by queer artists from Southeast Asia and its Diaspora, particularly those with backgrounds from Thailand, Vietnam, Indonesia, Malaysia, and Cambodia.

The Title "Young Birds From Strange Mountains" is borrowed from a poem by the Vietnamese gay -closeted poet Ngô Xuân Diệu (1916-1985), who was a correspondent member at Akademie der Künste during GDR times.

The curators and artists attempt to rebuild and re-investigate ancestral knowledge as well as engage with multiple archives such as directly from Schwules Museum, A Queer Museum Hanoi and Queer Indonesia Archive.





Precolonial roles of queer people as shamans are often neglected, and indigenous traditions like Ludruk in East Java are fading, while Vietnam's Mother Goddess religion (Đạo Mẫu) remains marginalized. Queer Southeast Asian spirituality and practices are frequently overlooked or misinterpreted in Western contexts.



Many political strides have been made recently, such as the recent legalization of same-sex marriage in Thailand or the founding of the world's only Islamic boarding school for transgender persons in Indonesia. However, crucial queer histories and practices in Southeast Asia have been erased or at least rendered invisible by nationalist policies.

There is a gap of knowledge about queer people and practices in Southeast Asia and its diaspora, both in Germany as well as within the region itself. This exhibition aims to reclaim these overlooked connections and bring them to the open discussion.





LGBT+ AWARENESS TRAINING

Do you belong to an organisation, a company, a group that would benefit from LGBT+ awareness training or would like to have a presentation on aspects of LGBT+ history?

When Nottinghamshire's Rainbow Heritage was set up in 2008 with a grant from the Heritage Lottery, part of its remit was to provide regular training. In the last seventeen years training and presentations have been provided for over one hundred organisations and groups. They include:

- 6 hospitals
- 8 health-related organisations
- 5 care homes
- 5 housing organisations
- 10 schools/colleges
- 3 universities
- Notts Sexual Violence Service
- Notts Police and both local councils

Between 2014 and 2020, the former Police and Crime Commissioner Paddy Tipping supported numerous training sessions which included a focus on hate crime against LGBT+ people.

The main elements of the training are:

- Getting the terminology right what the "words" mean .. and which words not to use
- Homophobia, biphobia, transphobia: what they are. their frequency, their causes and the effects they have
- Homophobia, biphobia & transphobia in a wider context of general prejudice against minorities
- Myths and stereotypes
- Negative laws and the more recent positive changes in the law.
- "Coming out": what it means; what it's like to be "stuck in the closet" and what happens when you come out

There can be an additional focus on issues such as

- Health issues and LGBT+ people's interaction with health care providers
- Supporting victims of LGBT+ hate crimes; why these crimes are under-reported and how reporting can be encouraged
- Same sex domestic abuse/Male rape
- The special concerns of young LGBT+ people and also of older LGBT+ people, particularly those in residential care
- Local resources and support systems

NOTES AND QUEERIES

- Actor John Barrowman nearly got the role of Will in Will and Grace in 1998. But he lost the part when producers thought he was 'too straight'
- The first openly gay doll, Gay Bob, was launched in 1977. He had a pierced ear and his box was shaped like a closet.





- While the monocle might have gone out of use, it had a huge following in the 'stylish lesbian circles of the earlier 20th century'
- Jimi Hendrix pretended to be gay to get out of the army in 1962.
- In early 17th century London, there was a gay brothel on the site where Buckingham Palace is today
- The word drag is apparently an acronym, a stage direction coined by Shakespeare and his contemporaries meaning 'Dressed Resembling A Girl'.
- Until the late 1400s the word 'girl' just meant a child of either sex. If you had to differentiate between them, male children were referred to as 'knave girls' and females were 'gay girls'.
- The Royal Navy commissioned a class of fast patrol boats during the 1950s which were prefixed with the word 'gay'. Names included the Gay Bruiser and the Gay Charger
- In the early 1980s, the USA Naval Investigative Service was investigating homosexuality in Chicago. Having heard gay men refer to themselves as 'friends of Dorothy', they went on a futile search for the elusive woman clearly at the centre of a homosexual ring.
- A brief note in the New Scientist mentioned that in a US hospital, the man in charge of surgery for penile dysfunction was Steve Hardman and his colleague responsible for vasectomies was Dick Chop.
- Joyce Grenfell's biography mentions film actor Maurice Flynn, described as "every gay man's dream". While filming, he left to go to the lavatory and was only found 8 days later painted blue from head to foot and playing the ukelele.
- The first two gay Danish authors who were publicly out about their sexuality were Herman Bang and Martin Kok.
