WHO IS GETTING AN AWARD?

The three Nottinghamshire's Rainbow Heritage awards for 2026 will be going to:

Nottingham Frontrunners, which has become a very successful group in a relatively short time. Not only promoting fitness, but providing a warm social environment and also campaigning against issues such as transphobia.



Lucy and Shell Buckle. Lucy and Shell have been the organisers of what is now an annual Queer History Walk. Lucy (seen right below) has, in her role as the "Nottingham Forager", organised several nature-related community events such as "Gays in the Garden". Shell has given her professional expertise to the swimming sessions sponsored by the Spencer Trust and has also founded the East Midlands Non Binary Association.



CJ DeBarra started researching Nottingham's LGBT+ history a few years ago. They have interviewed a huge (and growing) number of people and what originally might have been a single book (the first was published in July) has now turned into a second and probably a third.



A biproduct of the research and of the interviews was the beginning of a collection of artefacts and memorabilia and this has grown and grown and blossomed into the Notts Queer History Archive. Most of these materials will remain in Nottingham, but some - particularly duplicates - will go to the LGBTQIA+ archives at the Bishopsgate Institute in London

Nottingham is aware that it is "the Centre of the LGBT+ Universe", but it is time for others to realise that there is life beyond London, Brighton, Manchester etc.

Awards (to be announced) will also be presented by co-hosts Notts Pride. Thanks go once again to Pride for their generous funding of food and refreshments. To anyone who has been before, we need to say, yes, it's all free.

During the first half of the event people attending the Celebration and Awards evening can also have a look at the information tables which will be staffed by:

The Spencer Trust, Five Leaves Bookshop, Singing Proud, NASUWT, the Health Shop, Global Words, Notts LGBT+ Network, the Pride Shop, The Pastel Project, Nottingham Front Runners, Equation, Nottingham Recovery Group, Nottinghamshire Hurricanes and more.

After the presentation of the awards, we will have a performance by the choir from Singing Proud.

Fifth Word is an award-winning theatre company based in the East Midlands, founded in 2007. We develop and produce vital new plays that change how people see the world. We make work with and for younger audiences and under-served communities: uncovering the stories that need to be told.

In partnership with Nottinghamshire Archives, we are developing **Our Story** which is a collaborative heritage project uncovering trans and gender diverse lives in Nottinghamshire through oral histories, photography, and film.

In collaboration with Mansfield Museum, My Place Youth Centre, Notts Trans Hub, and Loughborough University, the project will train young trans and gender diverse creatives and their allies to capture oral histories of local trans and gender diverse stories.

These interviews will be dramatised into audio stories and released as a podcast, accompanied by a touring pop-up exhibition of portraits and a sound installation. Launching at Mansfield Museum and Nottinghamshire Archives, the exhibition will tour libraries across the county.

All stories will be archived for future generations, aiming to amplify trans and gender diverse voices, preserve overlooked histories, and increase representation in museum and archive collections.

Our Story will be produced in June/July 2026.

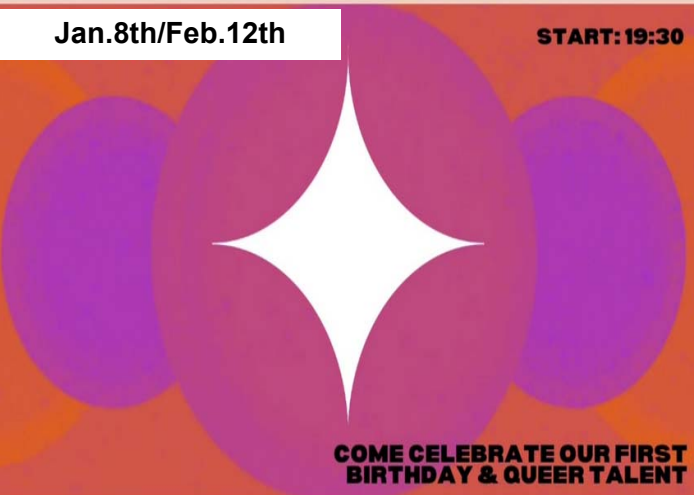

RAINBOW QUARTER OPENING DATE



In July, it was announced streets around Hockley would be transformed into the 'Rainbow Quarter' area, in a style similar to the popular "Gay Villages" in Manchester and Birmingham.

The area will cover Broad Street, Carlton Street, and Heathcote Street around Hockley and see historical plaques installed, maps updated to reflect the district's new title, and a collective image for businesses.

The initial proposals were outlined by Sam Harvey, director of The Pastel Project charity which is spearheading the scheme, with the backing of It's In Nottingham and other local organisations.

The project is now expected to be fully complete and open by May 4, 2026 - a date agreed with It's In Nottingham and the city council.



Whilst the initial funds have already been secured, in order to allow the Rainbow Quarter to reach its full potential, we're asking for community support to help continue its growth!



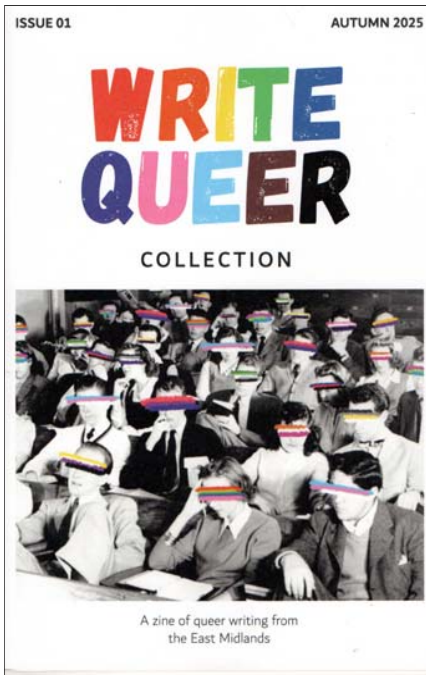

The **Write Queer** meetings started in October 2024 and over the last year many attendees have developed their writing skills.

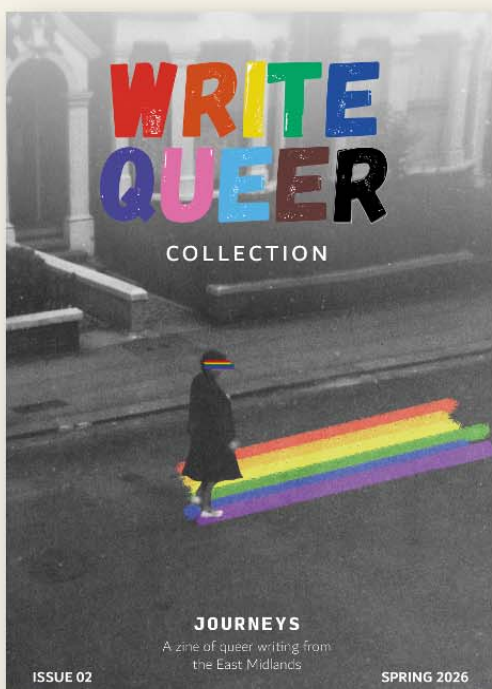
On November 1st about 50 people gathered at Central Library to welcome the launch of the first collection and hear readings by several of the 33 contributors.

PRIDE AND PREJUDICES



On November 5th internationally acclaimed human rights lawyer Dr Keio Yoshida spoke at Five Leaves Bookshop about their new book **"Pride and Prejudices - Queer Lives and the Law"** and about the ongoing battle for LGBTQ+ rights, how far we've come, and how much further we have to go.

Keio is an international human rights lawyer and a qualified barrister and in 2025 Keio was named one of Attitude Magazine's 100 LGBTQ+ influential trailblazers.

In *Pride and Prejudices*, Yoshida analyses case law from around the world, including *Rosanna Flamer Caldera v Sri Lanka*, the first global precedent to call for the decriminalisation of same-sex intimacy between women, in which Yoshida acted as counsel, as well as other timely cases such as the bitter debate over self-ID for trans people in the UK and Florida's recent 'Don't Say Gay' bill.

The right to life and the right to live life free from discrimination are rights that are codified and legally protected, but there is no dedicated and binding treaty or convention in international human rights law with respect to LGBTQ+ rights.

Combining deeply personal stories from their lived experience, together with their expert, accessible legal analysis, this book is unique and is a must read for all who care about equality and a much-needed antidote to attacks on trans rights.

CONVERSION THERAPY CONTINUES

Recent research by Prof Hel Spandler suggests electric shock aversion therapy practice was far more widespread than previously documented.

The BBC has found records confirming more than 250 cases, but Prof Spandler's analysis of medical archives and oral histories indicates the true figure could be close to 1,000 cases across the UK. Many of those treated were referred to hospital by their teachers, priests or GP.

Electric Shock Aversion Therapy was a form of conversion practice based on associating same-sex attraction with pain.

Patients were strapped to a chair and had electrodes placed on their arm or legs, they were shown images of men or women and then given painful electric shocks, sometimes for up to an hour at a time.

In 2017, NHS England and the Royal College of Psychiatrists pledged to stop practising conversion therapy, including electric shock treatment.

Yet conversion practices still remain legal in the UK and continue to take place in private homes, churches, and through some counsellors or therapists. According to campaigner Saba Ali: "People are still tortured and hurt in the name of conversion therapy."

The government has promised to draft a bill to end conversion practices by the end of this year, but it has not happened as yet.

QUEER BEER FOR THE 50TH YEAR



Black Iris Brewery has released a new beer to celebrate Notts LGBT+ Network's 50th anniversary. The brewery describes it in the following way....

"We went for a sessionable pale with Heidelberg malt for low colour and oats and wheat for body. With Idaho 7 and Citra in the copper, Mosaic Cryo at pitch and Azzaca, Cashmere and El Dorado in conditioning, this beer is packed with tropical notes with a citrus twist."

So now you know.

YET MORE QUEER BEER



The comedian Joe Lycett has launched a Pride-themed beer, in collaboration with the London-based LGBTQ+ beverage company, Queer Brewing.

The drink was launched to support Lycett's Queen's Heath Pride project, started by the comedian in 2021 in response to anti-LGBTQ+ protests in King's Heath Birmingham. The event is run together with Lycett's local pub, The Juke.

The beer is called "Rainbow Juice" and is a single-hopped Luminosa pale ale (4.5%), with "lots of tropical and peachy-mango-lemonade notes, and a soft, juicy body."

SEATTLE SAYS NO TO IRAN & EGYPT



Plans to celebrate LGBTQ+ rights and freedoms in Seattle during the World Cup next summer will continue despite objections from the Egyptian and Iranian football federations over the "Pride Match" due to take place in the city.

Seattle organisers confirmed that they are "moving forward as planned" with Pride activities in the city when Egypt face Iran in Group G on 26 June. FIFA will also allow rainbow flags into the stadium.

THE TRUMP EFFECT



FRONTRUNNERS DRESS FANCY



Nottingham Frontrunners welcomed the Health Shop for their quarterly sexual health screening combined with "pick a fancy dress theme!" It seemed to be a cross between the Adams Family and Halloween.

A few days later they took in the delights of the Winter Wonderland.



SUPPORT FOR PRIDE IS FALLING



The UK's biggest businesses are rolling back their public support for Pride celebrations, Guardian analysis suggests, prompting warnings that "clear signals" are needed in the face of growing global LGBTQ+ hostility.

NO FOR JAPAN



On November 28th A Japanese court ruled the country's ban on same-sex marriage as constitutional - bucking a trend set by courts around the country that had raised hopes for marriage equality in Japan.

Japan is the only G7 country that does not fully recognise same-sex couples or offer them clear legal protection. But it's not an outlier in Asia, where only Taiwan, Thailand and Nepal offer same-sex marriages.

The ruling by the Tokyo high court marks an exception to this series of verdicts, which had been adding weight to the push for same-sex marriage to be legalised in Japan. The cases will next be taken to the Supreme Court.

YES FOR POLAND



On November 25th The EU's highest court has ruled that same-sex marriages must be respected throughout the bloc and rebuked Poland for refusing to recognise a marriage between two of its citizens that took place in Germany.

The court said on Tuesday that Poland had been wrong in not recognising the marriage of the couple when they moved back to Poland, on the grounds that Polish law does not allow marriage between people of the same sex.

NO FOR ITALY



On October 15th Italy made it illegal for its citizens to go abroad to have a baby through surrogacy.

The move extends a ban on the practice inside the country to also include those who seek it out in places where it is legal, like the US or Canada. Those who break the law could face up to two years in prison and fines of up to €1m

LOOKING FURTHER BACK

IT WAS ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO



Violets as a symbol of lesbian love rose in 1926, when Édouard Bourdet's play *The Captive* showed a female character sending another woman a violet bouquet.

The play led to an uproar and calls for boycott and censorship, but some women wore violets to showings as a sign of support. The colour of violets (and fellow purple-hued flowering plant, lavender) was used as a derogatory way to describe gay or effeminate men in the turn of the 20th century.

The Broadway performance of *The Captive* prompted a New York State law making the performance of any play depicting "sex perversion" a misdemeanor. The law remained on the books until 1967.



Lotte Reiniger's film, *The Adventures of Prince Achmed* (1926) offers a very, very early cinematic gay relationship between the Emperor of China and his companion Ping Pong.

"I knew lots of homosexual men and women from the film and theatre world in Berlin, and saw how they suffered from stigmatization," Reiniger said, "I suspect that when the Emperor kisses Ping Pong, that must have been the first happy kiss between two men in the cinema and I wanted it to happen quite calmly in the middle of *Prince Achmed* so children — some who would be homosexual and some who would not — could see it as a natural occurrence, and not be shocked or ashamed."

On a Friday night in February 1926, a crowd of some 1,500 packed the Renaissance Casino in New York City's Harlem neighbourhood for the 58th masquerade and civil ball of Hamilton Lodge.

Nearly half of those attending the event, reported the *New York Age*, appeared to be "men of the class generally known as 'fairies,' and many Bohemians from the Greenwich Village section who, in their gorgeous evening gowns, wigs and powdered faces were hard to distinguish from many of the women."



In Berlin, figures like Lotte Halm were shaping the lesbian movement and entertainment scene through clubs like the Violetta Ladies' Club. Magazines like those published by Radzsuweit in Germany promoted the first homosexual movement and LGBTQ+ businesses.

GROUP OF THE DAY

NOTTS LGBT+ NETWORK

In 2025 Notts LGBT+ Network celebrated its 50th anniversary - or did it? Actually, it's a little more complicated than that. Originally it was an offshoot of CHE, the Campaign for Homosexual Equality.



The Nottingham CHE group started in 1971 and soon realised that many of the people who contacted it had "issues".

In 1974 the People's Centre opened on Mansfield Road. It was a sort of alternative Citizen's Advice Bureau and had themed nights when people could drop in and have help with legal issues, medical problems and more. The CHE group asked "can we have a gay night?" They said "yes" and this, in 1974 was the start, but it was just a face-to-face service on Thursday nights.

In 1975 the "gay night" acquired a phone line and a gay helpline was now underway similar to those already set up in Edinburgh and London, but it was still under the heading of CHE.

In 1976 the helpline copied London and started to call itself Nottingham Gay Switchboard. That means that the start of the service can be 1974, 1975 or 1976 depending on how you define it.

Though it now had its own name, Switchboard was still a part of CHE and was dependent on it for its expenses. Over the next few years the helpline added more nights one by one until in 1987 it was operating 5 nights a week and receiving over 2000 contacts per year. At that time the contacts were predominantly by phone with the occasional letter.

In the 1970s Switchboard had a prolonged battle with local newspapers (particularly Nottingham Evening Post) which refused advertisements. The main source of publicity at that time was through the Gay Guide pages on the fortnightly national Gay News. Most newspapers, including the Post, relented in the early 1980s.

For several years after 1987, things changed gradually. The service became more well known and started to receive grants from the Councils, the NHS and others. It changed its name to Nottingham Lesbian and Gay Switchboard. It started to liaise with other organisations, to have a presence at community events such as Pride (initially called "Pink Lace") and was invited to provide training on LGBT+ issues for the University of Nottingham, Notts Police and Victim Support.

Here's the Network at Pride in 2025.



Major changes began in the late 1990s. The clumsy printed database was replaced by one on a computer. The use of the internet meant that from about 2000 onwards contacts by phone started to drop and contacts by e-mail rose. These days, though the phone is still important, there are more contacts by e-mail and through social media.

Another name change brought in Nottingham and Notts Lesbian and Gay Switchboard and by 2015, after a survey, that was changed to the current name of Notts LGBT+ Network.



After so many years of providing a valuable service to thousands of people, the Network was nominated for the King's Award to Voluntary Service (the equivalent of an MBE) and this was awarded in 2024.

MISCELLANY

The Queerstory Files

Here are some features of LGBT+ Sydney.

LGBT Holocaust Memorial

This monument, designed by Jennifer Gamble and Russell Rodrigo, commemorates the many LGBT+ victims of the Nazis during the Holocaust. The pink triangle that gay prisoners were forced to wear has become an iconic symbol of gay rights in the 1970s.



Qtopia

Sydney's first permanent LGBT+ museum, said to be the world's biggest, opened here in February 2024 in buildings that were originally Darlinghurst's police station. (See picture top right). It is situated just off Oxford Street's pink mile in Sydney's historic gaybourhood.

As the police station it was where people arrested on homosexual charges were held in custody. This included a large number of participants in Sydney's first Mardi Gras in 1978, people who proudly sport the name of The 78ers. Sadly, a sign of the times included police brutality against those in custody.

The museum also has sections on AIDS, and a reconstructed AIDS ward from the neighbouring St. Vincent's Hospital where many AIDS patients were treated.



The rainbow crossing

Sydney's famous crossing was first established in 2013 for that year's Mardi Gras. However, due to concerns that people standing on it to take selfies put them in danger of being run over, the city removed it. This sparked a spate of graffiti chalk rainbow crossing popping up across the city in protest. Thankfully, the city council realised the importance of such a statement of identity and repainted crossing in 2019.



The Progress Shark

During World Pride 2023, hosted by Sydney, many artistic expressions of LGBT+ culture were on display. One of the most unusual, located outside the museum entrance, was the **Progress Shark**, a huge life-size model of a great white shark dressed in a Progress Flag-inspired lycra swimsuit.

Created by Sydney-based artist George Buchanan, the shark quickly became a tourist attraction and icon of WorldPride. Like many artworks created for the occasion it was taken down afterwards.

I RAM WHAT I RAM



Michael Schmidt's new collection of clothes is called "I wool survive" and is made from the wool provided by Michael Stücke, who runs a company called Rainbow Wool - see above.

The company produces wool from 'gay sheep' saved from slaughter, with his flock in Germany.

Rainbow Wool buys gay rams directly from breeders, outbidding the price they might receive from a slaughterhouse, and keep them for their wool. No ewes is good news?

LGBT+ AWARENESS TRAINING

Do you belong to an organisation, a company, a group that would benefit from LGBT+ awareness training or would like to have a presentation on aspects of LGBT+ history?

When Nottinghamshire's Rainbow Heritage was set up in 2008 with a grant from the Heritage Lottery, part of its remit was to provide regular training. In the last seventeen years training and presentations have been provided for over one hundred organisations and groups. They include:

- 6 hospitals
- 8 health-related organisations
- 5 care homes
- 5 housing organisations
- 10 schools/colleges
- 3 universities
- Notts Sexual Violence Service
- Notts Police and both local councils

Between 2014 and 2020, the former Police and Crime Commissioner Paddy Tipping supported numerous training sessions which included a focus on hate crime against LGBT+ people.

The main elements of the training are:

- Getting the terminology right - what the "words" mean .. and which words not to use
- Homophobia, biphobia, transphobia: what they are, their frequency, their causes and the effects they have
- Homophobia, biphobia & transphobia in a wider context of general prejudice against minorities
- Myths and stereotypes
- Negative laws and the more recent positive changes in the law.
- "Coming out": what it means; what it's like to be "stuck in the closet" and what happens when you come out

There can be an additional focus on issues such as

- Health issues and LGBT+ people's interaction with health care providers
- Supporting victims of LGBT+ hate crimes; why these crimes are under-reported and how reporting can be encouraged
- Same sex domestic abuse/Male rape
- The special concerns of young LGBT+ people and also of older LGBT+ people, particularly those in residential care
- Local resources and support systems
